1st On the dates mentioned in the report the Dispensary and waiting-room here were perfectly clean save for a few cobwebs which hung around the ceiling and walls.

2nd My reason for not having the medical Relief Register and Report Book written up was that I was ^{supposing} from blood-poisoning localised in the Right Hand and contracted from a patient, which Dr. MacLennan himself knows for I showed him my hand. This fact can be vouched for by the local Guardians and the general public throughout my district.

3rd I have never asked a fee from any patient having a Red Ticket, but when visiting such patient I have at times examined and advised and treated other members of the household for different diseases, and before leaving the house ^{may} have been given a small fee which I may have taken a few times as a voluntary bonus (as I call it) for the supplementary attendance rendered.

This I stated to the local Government Board Inspector when he visited in May last and his answer was. - "Oh that's a horse of a different colour."
