A man has been specially appointed to take charge of these patients, and he carries out his orders very satisfactory. He has to feed them and carry them when necessary to the water closet, clean and shave them, and make their beds when necessary etc etc.

Their very helpless condition surely should appeal to every mans humanity. They are now enjoying as they always did good health, and as far as my part is concerned I have left nothing undone to assist them in every way.

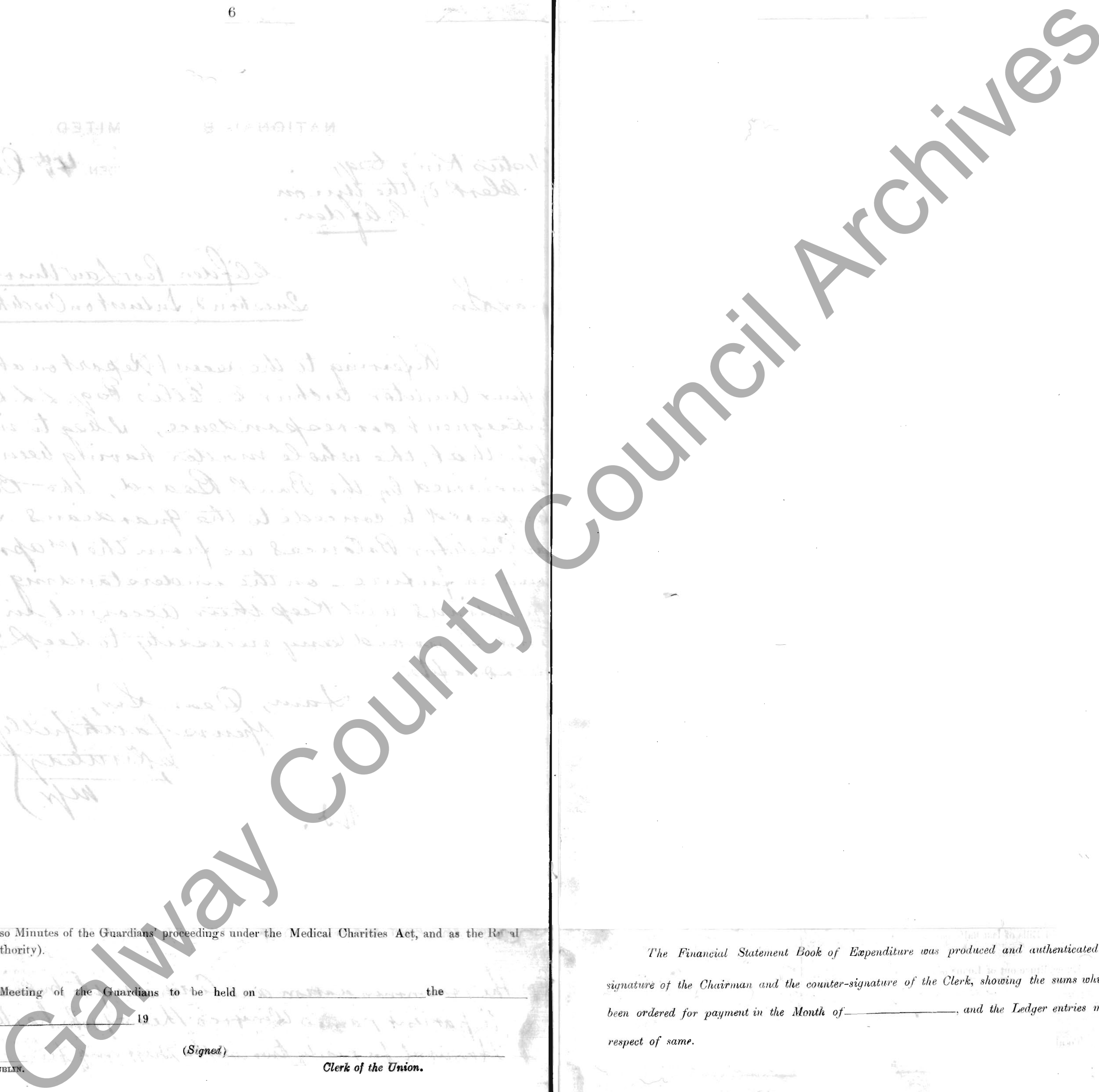
