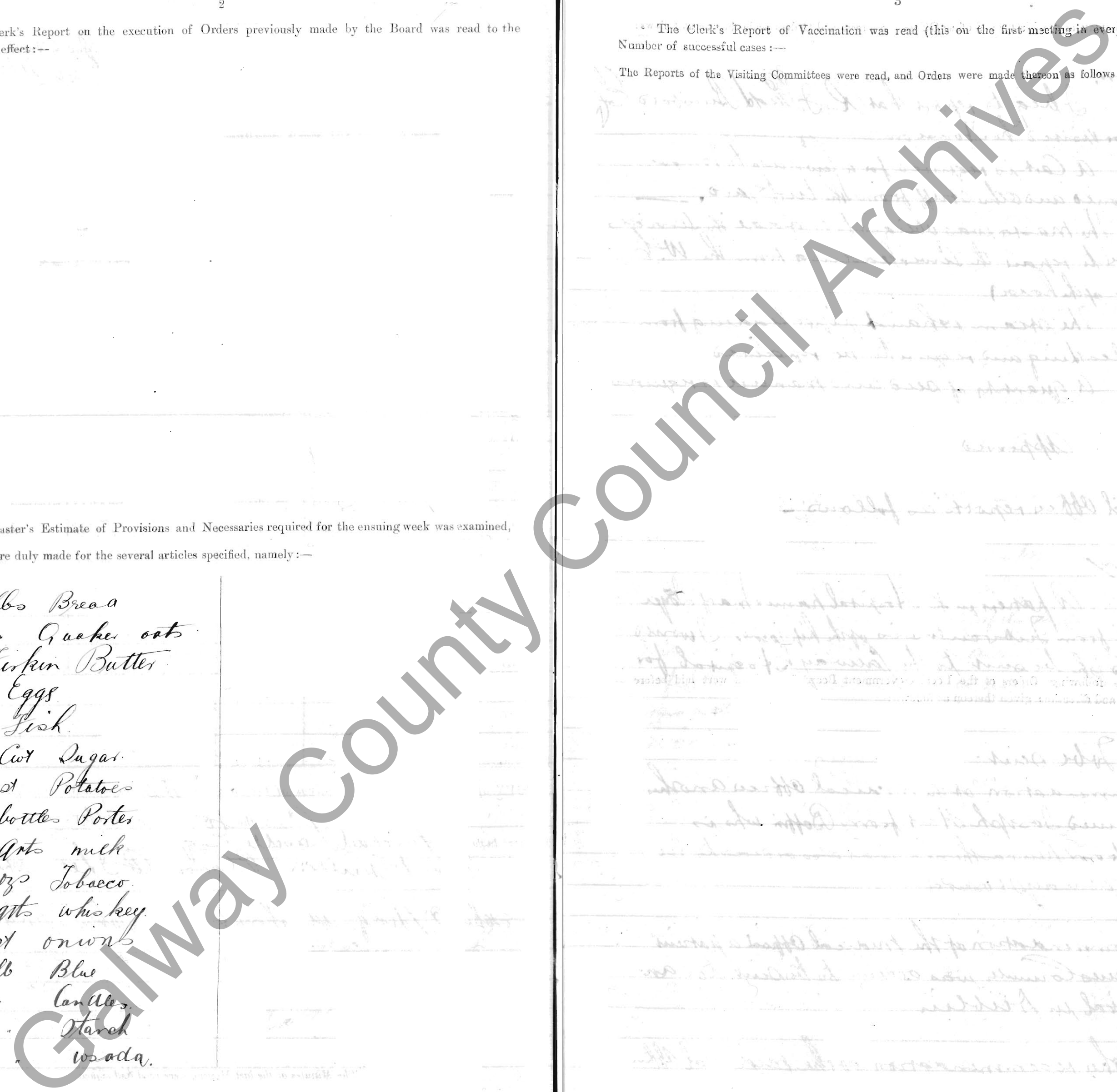

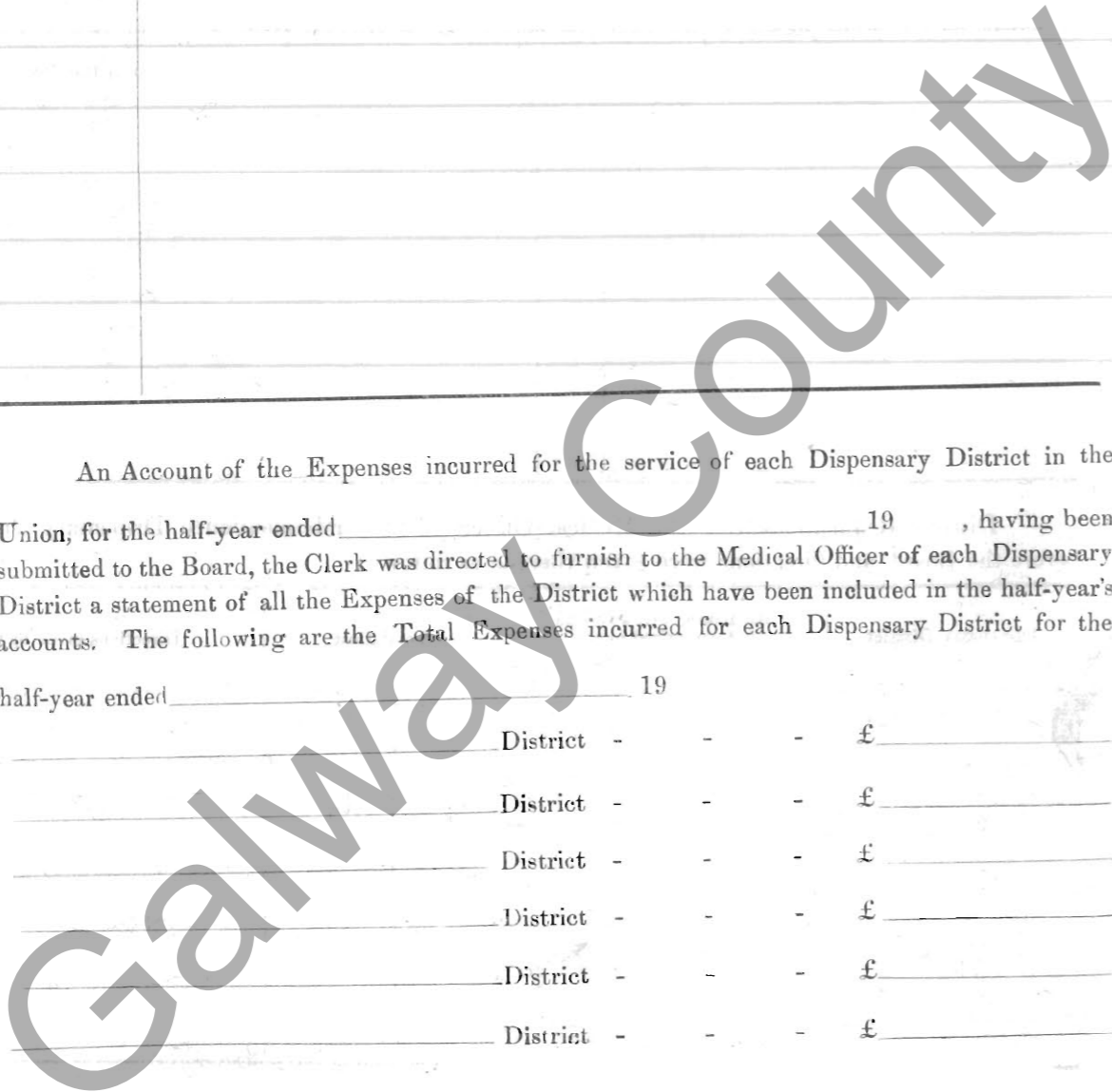

In the first case he left for a fortnight unattended after issue of ticket. — Schotfield has his son come after the doctor three times and even then only for the priest he was not going to attend, and the sick man was in a desperate condition. Anne Tierney now dead as the girl was very ill, I had to issue a second red ticket to try and compel the doctor to go. Mary Stalorran he did not attend for four or five days after red ticket, then had to come after him again. Young Deng he did not attend at all.

He was not attending the late Mrs. Tyles Joyce for many weeks before her death and yet he demanded whiskey for her and in her name, her daughter happened to come present before he got the whiskey and she was put to shame.

He was absent and had no dispensary on Wed. 20<sup>th</sup> November 1912. and did not return until the following Friday — He was absent 13<sup>th</sup> 14<sup>th</sup> 15<sup>th</sup> Nov. '12 and had no dispensary that week.

There was an urgent call to John Canning, was absent and had no dispensary Saturday 10th and Wednesday 14th August although many <sup>were</sup> waiting for medicine that day. He had no dispensary Saturday 24th August, was absent for some days previously but on that day though in his house, his servant came and told those who were waiting that he was on the mainland, was absent and had no dispensary Wed. 14th Sept. he was out of the Island. Dr. Naughton and Mark Lunnane called on that day for medicine Saturday 12th October + Wednesday 16th. no dispensary doctor absent. Martin Hughes and Joseph Start on that day came wanting to see the doctor in his dispensary, on the 26th Nov. he refused to see Mrs. Juville whom he had told to come on to his house for medicine. she had to return as she came although her husband was very ill, Mrs. John McDonagh he told to call for medicine for her husband now dead, He refused the poor woman the bottle of medicine unless she handed him 9/- having no money she returned without the medicine.

Attended Peter Schofield, Cloonamore 19th Oct. 1912. Had no instrument to perform necessary operation only knitting needles borrowed from said man's daughter one of which broke during the operation asked Schofield for 4/- for a bag to be applied informed Schofield that Clbairn Board of Guardians would refund same. From 19th Oct. date of first attendance he never visited till 23rd January 1913. and then brought the bag and asked me for 5/- more in all 5/-

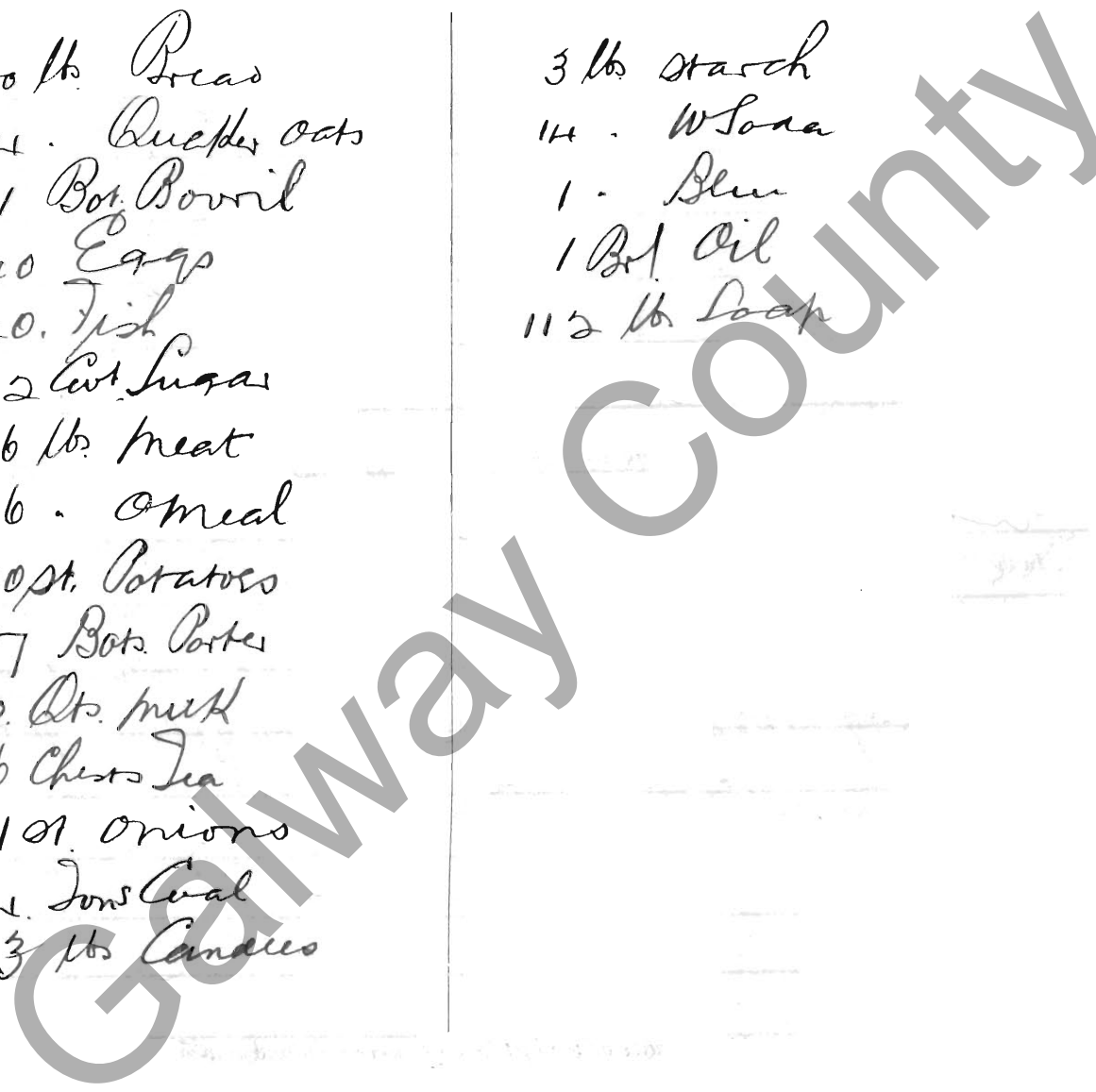
