I beg to inform you that on Tuesday evening the 2nd Sept Inst, Two women of the tramp class, under the influence of drink, demanded admission to the workhouse, there were 3 boys with them and the latter threatened to break all the windows in the house, they were all using bad language towards me, The Head Constable and 3 Constables of police appeared on the scene, and I charged those people with riotous, behaviour and with trying to get admission to the Union a second time, and with being drunk and disorderly, The Head Constable was going away, and took no notice whatever of my charge, I then said are you afraid of them, and he answered back saying he was not, or of me either, This was said in presence of the vagrants, The inference I could draw from the Head Const answer to me is

give all the annoyance you can to the Relieving officers, we don't want to be bothered with you in the Barrack. There is a Resolution on your books ordering me to hand over persons who present themselves a second time for admission to the Union, and the above is the result, I don't think the Head or any Constable is justified in making me such an answer, and I would be pleased for my future guidance, and that of the police, to sift this matter up before the County Inspector, with a view of ascertaining was the Head Constable justified in making me the offensive answer he did make, or, am I justified in the future to give admission tickets to every drunken tramp ~~that~~ who presents himself for one, The next evening the 3rd I brought the matter under the notice of the Sub Inspector, and he gave his opinion that the answer of the Head to me was most uncalled for, and said he would speak to him about it.
