The Guardians believe this man has no claim on this Union, no one knows to what Union he belongs but one thing is certain, he does not belong to Clifden Union.

The Official in charge of him brought him to the Workhouse, the Master refused to admit him without some written Authority, whereupon the Official approached the Relieving Officer and obtained the necessary tickets of admission.

The opinion of the Local Government Board is requested as to the legality of the admission.

The Master reports that there are three gates required for the Hospital two leading to the Garden and one between the male and female ~~ward~~ yards. He suggests iron as timber posts get blown down with the storm.

The Medical Officer reports on the same subject.
