I have the honor to submit
for your kind consideration, the following
subject, with a request that you
will be pleased to advise me
as to the true nature of the
case. -

On the 8th of January
last I entered into a deed with
you letting Bunowen Castle for
an Auxiliary Workhouse, in this Union
upon certain conditions and stipulations,
as set forth therein, one of the
stipulations was "that the said
lessees, their Successors &c. shall
and will from time to time &c.
well and truly satisfy content and
pay

pay to the said Martin Raphael
Hart" &c. - "The said Revised Yearly
Rate is sum of Eighty pounds &c.
- clear over and above all and
all manner of Taxes, Charges, and
impositions whatsoever."

By this Indenture I should
hope no doubt has been left,
that I am entitled to receive
£80. - clear without deductions, as was
my full and clear intention, when
making it, and which deed was
~~proposed~~ ^{prepared} by your Solicitors -

However the Poor Rate Collector
having this day applied to me
for one half the Rate as
that establishment, I deemed it
advisable to submit the whole for
your consideration, and finally hope
yours

decision will be in accordance with
the true intention of the deed -
that I shall not be held
liable for any Taxes, Charges or
impositions whatsoever incurred by
that establishment - while I have too
heavy Rates to pay in other parts
of the Union. -

SIR,

Adverting to the 2nd section of the Act 12 Vic., cap. 24, providing for the levying of a general Rate in Aid, which requires the Treasurer of the Union to reserve one moiety of all lodgments made with him of any Rate or Rates made in the Union next after receipt by the Guardians of the Order transmitted by the Commissioners for administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, pursuant to the 2nd section of the above named Act, until a Sum shall have been reserved by him sufficient to cover the Sum stated in the Commissioners' Order, to be leviable on the several Electoral Divisions of the Union, I am directed by the Commissioners to request that you will furnish, in one of the accompanying Forms, an Abstract, in continuation of that furnished in pursuance of Circular No. 553, M/49, showing the total Lodgments made with the Treasurer during the period from 1st September to 29th September, 1849, inclusive, in respect of any Rates made since the receipt by the Guardians of the Order of the 13th June, 1849; the total amount of moieties reserved out of such Lodgments in pursuance of the Act above referred to; and the total amount paid over of such reserved moieties into the Bank of Ireland to the "General Rate-in-Aid Account."

The Commissioners request that you will furnish from the Treasurer's Rate-in-Aid Cash Book, the required Abstract, with the least possible delay; and you will include in the Abstract the names of those Electoral Divisions only in which new Rates were made since the receipt by the Guardians of the Commissioners' Order of the 13th June, 1849, down to 29th September, 1849, inclusive.

If no new Rates were made in any of the Electoral Divisions down to that date, 1849, inclusive, you will be good enough to send up one of the Forms, stating the fact thereon.


