America' (30 Jun 1920), a letter from Secretary Galway County Council to Secretary Dáil Éireann, advising 'Minute no. 968 cuts off communication with the Local Government Board, but does not decide whether the regulations and orders of that Board under which the Council's business has hitherto been conducted are still to be observed. Under the Orders referred to many proceedings of the Council require the sanction of the Local Government Board. No instructions have been given to me as to whether such proceedings are to be carried through without any sanction in future, or, if sanction is to be sought, to whom I am to apply for it...

In view of Minute 996, which involves the whole financial work of the County Council, and of the other bodies financed by the County Council out of county Funds (Asylum, Board of Guardians, and Rural District Councils, County Hospital etc) the need for an immediate and clear decision as to future procedure is very urgent...

[The existing Security Bonds of the Collectors recite the condition of the Public Bodies Order relating to Rate Collection including the requirement as to fortnight lodgment by each collector of the County Council. The effect of [alternation in] these conditions without the consent of the sureties, on the validity of the Bonds deserves careful consideration].

But meantime the business of the Council has to be carried on, and it is understood that it is the desire of Dáil Éireann that local administrative services should be maintained as efficiently as possible. The County Council have three thousand miles of Roads on which there are from 700 to 1000 labourers employed under direct labour schemes. These men must be paid every fortnight. Paying Orders must also be issued to discharge remittances for the maintenance of the Asylum, Guardians, District Councils, payment for materials contracts, salaries etc. To discharge these liabilities the Council issue approximately 25,000 Paying Orders addressed to their Treasurer every half year

In connection with minute no. 968, of the County Council of the 18th. August, 1920:-

"That in future no minutes of the transactions of the Galway County Council be sent to the British Local Government Board, and the Secretary is instructed that he is to have no further communication on any subject with the Local Government Board," and minute no. 996 of the 24th. August, 1920:-

"That the services of the National Bank as Treasurer be and are forthwith dispensed with, and that we request the National Bank to publish in the Press notification to the effect that their office of Treasurer has been determined",

I beg to refer to my letters of the 27th. and 28th. August, to Dail Hireann, to which I have not had a reply.

As these resolutions are not valid without the consent of some Local Government Board, and as the Council have pledged themselves to abide by the decisions of Dail Hireann and have ordered me not to communicate with the Local Government Board for Ireland (an order which I have obeyed), I now beg respectfully to call your attention to Article 100, of the Public Bodies Order and to point out that Collectors are not lodging the poor rate with the Treasurer, and that there is no security that the poor rate as at present administered will be properly brought to account, and there is no senction for the procedure which the Council have adopted.

I enclose a return of the moneys collected by Poor Rate Collectors which have not been lodged with the Treasurer.

The Council have by their Minute No 892 undertaken to give full effect to all decrees duly promulgated by Dail Eireann in so far as same effect the Council, and I therefore respectfully ' ask for such sanctions and instructions as Dail Eireann may consider necessary on the points mentioned.

Sir,

Referring to Minutes 968 and 996 of the Galway County Council copies of which have been forwarded to Dail Eireann, I beg respectfully to point out that the position created by these decisions is exceedingly difficult.

Minute No 968 cuts off communication with the Local Government Board, but does not decide whether the Regulations and Orders of that Board under which the Council's business has hitherto been conducted are still to be observed. Under the Orders referred to many proceedings of the Council require the sanction of the Local Government Board. No instructions have been given to me as to whether such proceedings are to be carried through without any sanction in future, or, if sanction is to be sought, to whom I am to apply for it .

The difficulty, shortly, is that hitherto I have had a definite Code to which I could refer in every official matter. I do not know whether this Code is now swept completely away, and , if it is, whether any code has been substituted to which I can go for official guidance.

In view of Minute 996, which involves the whole financial work of the County Council, and of the other Bodies financed by the County Council out of County Funds(Asylum, Boards of Guardians, and Rural District Councils, County Hospital etc) the need for an immediate and clear decision as to future proceedure is very urgent.

The County Council have simply recorded a Minute terminating the appointment of the National Bank as their Treasurer; but in addition the Council have, I understand, instructed the Poor Rate Collectors, and made other arrangements under which the Poor Rate is not to be bacyed

I send herewith cony of resolution adopted by the General Council of County Councils in re the Belfast pogrom.

I desire to direct your sttention to the importance of this decision. The prosperity of Belfast is as dear to Irishmen as that of any other city or district - but recent tests put to Industrialists cannot be tolerated in this or any age of civilisation. Political, civil, and religious likenty must be maintained all over Ireland and thile the rest of the country is perfectly willing that Belfast should derive its financial accommodation from the South, East, and West, it will not permit Belfast to put any political or religious test which strikes at the foundations of liberty.

The attention and support of your Board is therefore requested to vindicate the rights of Irish citizenship.

Copy of Resolution passed unanimously by the County Councils General Council at a special meeting held 12th. August, 1920.

As the imposition of religious and political tests as a condition of industrial employment in any part of Ireland has been decreed illegal, this Council calls upon all public bodies here represented, and upon Local Authorities everywhere throughout Ireland, to take immediate steps to cease trading with the city in which such an illegel test is now attempted to be enforced. This Council further recommends that business be discontinued throughout Ireland with the branches of the banks which finance firms who soply, or permit to be applied, such illegal tests, and firms which expel, or permit to be expelled, employes who refuse to submit to such illegal tests.

This cassation of trade and the withdrawal of support from the Banks indicated are to be maintained until such time as the victimised employes are unconditionally re-employed. On the receipt from the local Labour leaders and the authentic representatives of the persecuted people of a White List of firms which have refused to permit their employes to be illegally expelled from their work, the Council will recommend that business with such firms be resumed. of Treasurer. This will not interfere in any way with the arrangements made for the disposal of the Poor Rate.

The Committee have given very careful and anxious consideration to this matter; they believe that the course they suggest is absolutely necessary, and they hope that Dail Eireann will concur, and give the authority which is now respectfully asked for.

Referring to my letter of the 27th inst. dealing with Minutes 968 and 996 of the Galway County Council I am to state that the Finance Committee of the Council ,at their meeting today, had the matters referred to therein again under consideration.

They have come to the conclusion that if the resolution determining the Treasurership of the National Bank is not rescinded it will not be possible to carry on local administration, and at the same time effect the object desired by Dail Eireann. If the Bank is retained in the position of Treasurer business will be facilitated , with little if any risk of endangering the object referred to.

Some Government Departments (c.g. Road Board) are still making payments to the County Council. The drafts are payable to the Treasurer and crossed National Bank, and can only be cashed by the Bank to a County Council Account. If they are not casehed, the money simply goes back to the British Treasury.

If the Bank is continued as Treasurer they can, and it is believed will, continue to honour Paying Orders for the liabilities of the Council to the extent of any required overdraft, even though the Poor Rate is not lodged to credit of the County Council Account.

If the Bank is not continued as Treasurer numerous, and, so far as the Committee can see, insurmountable difficulties will immediately arise in connection with payments. The local manager, on his own responsibility, has agreed to honour the orders issued today. Half the labourers are paid every week and a further list of payments will have to be met on next Saturday.

The Committee therefore recommend that authority may be given for the rescision of Minute 996 (determining the office

The Forestry Committee feels there is no need to labour the point that re-afforstation has become an acute national problem.

For years past the country has been steadily denuded of her woodlands without any serious effort being made to replace them. In these circumstances the duty of a council responsible and claiming to be responsive to the people's will is clear.

I have accordingly to ask whether your Council will cooperate with us in making Arbour Day a National festival. For

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the purposes of inspecting trees and giving instruction as to their planting, we should be specially glad to have the assistance of any forestry or other qualified officials your Council has in its service.

At the same time we would like to know whether your Council has already done or proposes to do anything for the furtherance of forestry in the coming planting season.
