8439. Election of Chairman.—Councillor Carty proposed, Councillor Geoghegan seconded, and it was unanimously Re-

That Senator Martin Quifin be re-elected Chairman of the Council for the year 1951/52.

8440. Election of Vice-Chairman. Deputy M. Killilea proposed, Councillor Higgins seconded, and it was unanimously Resolved :-

That Councillor M. Carty be re-elected Vice-Chairman of the Council for the year 1951/52.

8441. Ballinasloe Mental Hospital Board.—Letter, 15/6/51, from the Chief Clerk, Ballinasloe Mental Hospital Board, was submitted, stating that the number of inembers to be elected to the Board by the Galway County Council was 17.

It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor

Ashe, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That the following members be appointed to represent the Galway County Council on the Ballinasloe Mental Hospital Board for the year 1951/152, Viz. : Senator M. Quinn, Deputies P. Beegan and M. Killilea, and Councillors T. King, J. J. Ruane, J. Glynn, M. O'Donnell, M. Nicholson, J. Houlihan, R. Lahiffe, M. Kitt, Miss M. A. Ashe, M. Newell, P. Collins, M. Wall, J. J. Nestor, and L. O'Toole (Councillor Galvin having withdrawn his name in favour of Councillor Wall).

8442. County Galway Education Committee.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That the existing members of the Galway Education Committee be re-appointed for the year 1951/'52."

8443. County Libraries Committee.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Kitt, and unanimously

That the existing members of the County Libraries Committee be re-appointed for the year 1951/'52.'

8444. National Monuments Advisory Committee.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Kitt, and unanimously Resolved :-

That the existing members of the National Monuments Advisory Committee be re-appointed for the year 1951/52."

8445. Visiting Committee for District Institutions.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Ruane, and unanimously Resolved :-

That Councillor M. O'Donnell be appointed to replace Councillor P. Kyne, deceased, and that in addition the remaining members of the \ isiting Committee for the Council's District Institutions be re-appointed for the year 1951/'52.'

8446. Old Age Pensions Sub-Committees.-It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Kitt, and unanimously Resolved :-

'That all the existing members of the Old Age Pension Sub-Committees be re-appointed for the year 1951/'52."

8447. County Councils' General Council.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Kitt, and unanimously Resolved :-

That Senator M. Quinn, Deputy M. Killilea and Councillor M. Kitt be re-appointed the Council's representatives on the County Councils' General Council for the year

8448. Irish Tourist Association.—It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Kitt, and unanimously

'That Councillor J. Glynn be re-appointed to represent the Council on the Irish Tourist Association for the year

8449. Minutes.-The Minutes of the Council to No. 8438, having been circulated to the members of the Council, were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

8450. Vacancy.—It was proposed by Councillor Geoghegan and seconded by Councillor O'Donnell:— That Mr. Laurence O'Toole, Tullycross, Renvyle, be

co-opted a member of the Galway County Council to replace Mr. Patrick Kyne, deceased."

It was proposed by Councillor Nestor and seconded by Councillor Collins:—

'That the brother of the late Patrick Kyne be co-opted

a member of the Galway County Council.' Deputy Cawley suggested that as a general principle the Council should co-opt the last eliminated candidate for the electoral area concerned.

A vote taken as between Messrs. O'Toole and Kyne resulted

For—Councillors Ashe, Beegan, Carty, Geoghegan, Glynn, Higgins, Houlihan, Killilea, King, Kitt, Lahiffe, Newell, Nichol-

son, O'Donnell, Quinn and Ruane-16. Against—Councillors Cawley, Collins, Flaherty, Furey, Galvin, Joyce, Mannion, Mylotte, Nestor, Sirr and Wall—11.

The Chairman declared Mr. Laurence O'Toole, Tullycross, Renvyle, appointed a member of the Galway County Council.

8451. Rates for Financial Year ending 31st March, 1952.— It was proposed by Councillor King, seconded by Councillor Higgins, and unanimously Resolved:-

That the Council do hereby allow and make the rates for the financial year ending 31st March, 1952, as assessed in the Rate Books.

It was proposed by Councillor King, seconded by Councillor Higgins, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That the rate books for the year ending 31st March, 1952, be signed and sealed with the seal of the Council.' The rate books were then signed and sealed.

8452. Dail Elections.—The Chairman and other members of the Council congratulated Mr. P. Beegan on his appointment as Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Finance, and also congratulated Councillors Cawley, Mannion and Killilea on their election to the fourteenth Dail.

8453. Church Holydays. Councillor King proposed and Councillor Higgins seconded:

That all work of this Council, including office work, be

closed down on Church Holydays.

After a discussion, the County Manager suggested that it might be possible to arrange for the closing down of the Council's offices at the County Buildings on Church Holydays if the officers concerned would be prepared to work from 9.30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on each of the other five days of the week in which a Church Holyday

It was eventually decided to leave it to the County Manager to arrange with the staff concerned for the working of the necessary additional hours, so as to permit of the offices being closed down on Church Holydays.

8454. Children's Home. - Councillor Carty asked the County Manager to inform the Council of the position in regard to the carrying out of improvements at the Children's Home, Tuam.

The County Manager replied that the Architect had prepared

sketch plans for the work proposed, and that these plans had been submitted to the Department of Health, by whom a number of improvements had been suggested.

The decision of the Department of Health in regard to the allocation of a grant from Hospitals' Trust Funds for this work had not yet been given, and the estimated cost of the work as set out in report, 28/8/'50, from the Architect was £82,590

It was decided that the Department of Health be requested to make the position clear in regard to the future of the home and the financing of the cost of the necessary improvements.

8455. Ambulance Boat for Aran Islands.-It was proposed by Councillor Joyce and seconded by Councillor Nestor :-"That an ambulance boat he provided for the people

of the Aran Islands." Some other members suggested that it would be necessary

to provide a District Hospital in Aran.

Deputy Mannion stated that while a small District Hospital would be desirable it would not meet the necessity for conveyance of urgent difficult cases to Galway Central Hospital, which could not be treated in a District Hospital.

Councillor Mylotte also pointed out the necessity for provision of a boat for conveyance of patients from the outlying islands, viz., Inisheer and Inishmaan.

The County Manager stated that an arrangement was already in existence between the Council and the Life Boat Institution for use of the life boat for conveyance of urgent cases to hospital.

Councillor Ashe requested that information be supplied to the Council in regard to the number of patients from Aran treated in the Central Hospital during the recent period of one year.

It was eventually decided that the Manager would examine the possibility of providing accommodation in the life boat for stretcher cases.

8456. Light on Spiddal Pier.—Councillor Joyce stated that his Notice of Motion for provision of one street light on Spiddal Pier had already been dealt with.

8457. Water Supplies. In response to Councillor Higgins' Notice of Motion :-

That the Council instruct its engineering staff to make an immediate survey of existing piped water supplies, with a view to improving and extending same, where necessary, it was arranged that each member would be requested to submit his proposals in regard to extension and improvement of existing water supplies, and that these would then be submitted to the 8458. Adjournment.—At this stage it was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Deputy Killilea, and Resolved:— That the Meeting be adjourned until 3.30 p.m.'

8459. New Courthouses,---Reports from the Co. Engineer were submitted in regard to the necessity for provision of new Courthouses at Ardrahan, Derreen and Killimor.

The Secretary pointed out that plans were at present being prepared for provision of three new courthouses at Athenry,

Mountbellew and Gurteen. The Council approved proceeding with the preparation of plans for the new courthouses at Ardrahan, Derreen and Killimor

8460. County Councils' General Council.—Letter, 6/6/'51, from the County Councils' General Council, was submitted, requesting notice of matters to be placed on the Agenda for the next

Deputy Killilea proposed and Councillor Ashe seconded, and

it was Resolved :-

That the necessity for the appointment of additional Health Inspectors for the carrying out of the Food Hygiene Regulations be referred to the County Councils' General Council to ascertain what is being done by local authorities

8461. School Meals Gaeltacht Scheme.-Letter, 6/2/1951, from the Department of Social Welfare, was submitted, stating that the amount of the grant for the School Meals Gaeltacht Scheme is fixed by Statute, and that it is regretted that it is not possible to accede to the Council's request for a grant of not less than 50 per cent of the actual cost of provision of meals under this

It was decided that the Department be informed that it is the view of the Council that a grant of not less than 50 per cent. should be allocated in this case.

8462. Irish Public Bodies' Mutual Insurances Ltd.—It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor Carty, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That Senator Martin Quinn be appointed to represent the Council on the Board of the Irish Public Bodies' Mutual

8463. Loan for Improvement of Private Roads in Galway Borough.—It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan, and unanimously Resolved :-

That pursuant to the letter of sanction of the Local Government Minister, dated the 27th March, 1951, the sum of £13,000 be borrowed from The National Bank Limited.

Galway, for the purpose of defraying expenditure on the reconstruction of former private roads in Galway City, said sum to be re-paid within ten years with interest at the rate of one half per cent under Irish Bank's rate, rising and falling from time to time, with a minimum of £4 per cent. per annum as in said Letter of Sanction provided, the said loan and all interest thereon to be secured by a Mortgage over the Rates, and that the seal of the County Council be affixed to the said Mortgage to 'The National Bank Limited.'

8464. Flannery Bridge.—The Secretary reported that the Consulting Engineer's estimate of the total cost for erection of Flannery Bridge, including construction of approach roads, was £26,686 0s. 0d., towards which the Department of Local Government was prepared to allocate a grant of £4,500.

It was proposed by Councillor Geoghegan, seconded by Councillor Higgins, and unanimously Resolved :-

'That the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £26,700 from the Commissioners of Public Works for pro-

vision of Flannery Bridge; the loan to be repayable by instalments over a period of 25 years, with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council. It was proposed by Councillor Geoghegan, seconded by Councillor Higgins, and unanimously Resolved :-"That the Council hereby approve the obtaining of

overdraft accommodation on Capital Account not exceeding £10,000, pending the receipt of the loan for provision of

8465. Oranmore Dispensary Residence and Dispensary .- It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Higgins, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £3,700 from the Commissioners of Public Works to cover the cost of purchase of a dispensary and dispensary residence at Oranmore; the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of 25 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council.'

8466. Athenry Dispensary and Residence for Midwife. The Secretary reported that for some time the Council had been considering the provision of a residence for the Midwife at Athenry, but that difficulty was experienced in obtaining a site; that the dispensary premises at Athenry are also unsuitable, and that a site is now offered for £160 which would be suitable for erection thereon of both a dispensary and a residence for the midwife.

On the proposition of Councillor Glynn, seconded by Councillor Carty, the Council expressed their approval to proceeding with this proposal.

8467. Health Inspectorate Staff.—As already stated in Minute No. 8460, the Council decided that this matter be referred to the County Councils' General Council.

8468. Midwife's Residence at Ahascragh.—On the proposition of Deputy Beegan, seconded by Senator Quinn, the Council approved the Manager's proposal to purchase a residence for the Dispensary Midwife from Mr. Thomas Dillon, Ahascragh, at a cost of £450, plus costs of conveyance.

8469. Local Government (Superannuation) Act, 1948.— Letter, 3/4/'51 (E.L.1/51), from the Department of Local Government, having already been circulated to the Councillors, was sub-

Deputy Beegan suggested that the Department should be requested to reckon as pensionable service the period of employment of certain servants on Minor Relief Schemes and Rural Improvement Schemes.

8470. Orthopædic Theatre.—Correspondence in connection with the provision of a temporary Orthopædic Theatre at the Galway Central Hospital, at a cost of £3,500, was submitted, and the Secretary stated that the Department of Health are not pre-pared to allocate any grant from Hospitals' Trust Funds for this work, but that the cost would be apportioned between the counties in the orthopædic region in proportion to their valuation.

On the proposition of Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Nestor, the Council unanimously approved proceeding with this

8471. Monivea Water Supply.—Correspondence in connection, with the request for provision of a piped water supply at Monivea was submitted, together with County Engineer's report, 2/4/'51, stating that the cost would be approximately £10,000.

It was pointed out that an efficient pump is already available

on the Athenry Road.

It was decided to adjourn consideration of this request until the meeting in connection with water supplies generally, which is expected to be held in September, 1951.

8472. Turf Production.—The deputation from the Oughterard Turf Producers, which the Council had consented to hear

The County Manager stated that the Minister for Local Government had intimated recently that he considered that the Council should, as a permanent arrangement, produce turf for its own requirements; that the County Manager had given as his view that the Council is not properly equipped for permanent production of turf, and as its engineering staff is fully occupied with

ordinary Council works, he considered that the permanent production of turf should be a matter for the Department of Industry

The County Engineer stated that if a reasonable price were fixed at the start of each season he believed that sufficient turf for the Council's requirements would be available from private

On the proposition of Councillor Collins, seconded by Councillor Galvin, the Council approved the suggestions of the County Manager and County Engineer.

In reply to queries in regard to the turf supply for Ballinasloe Mental Hospital, the County Engineer stated that tenders from private producers had already been accepted for 1,400 tons, and that tenders would be obtained for approximately a further 600 tons—the balance required, viz., 8,000 tons, approximately, will be supplied by the Council.

Resolution by the Galway Corporation, at their meeting on the 5th April, 1951 :-

That the Council be requested to provide for production of the original target proposed ' was submitted and read.

8473. Rate Collectors; Infectious Diseases (Maintenance) Allowances; and Terryland Road.—In the absence of Councillor McElihiney, consideration of his notices of motion in relation to above matters was adjourned.

8474. Labourers' Cottages.—In reply to Councillor Nicholson's notice of motion, the Secretary gave particulars of the cottages which are being erected or are proposed to be erected in the Cooloo area.

8475. Midwife's Residence at Furbo.—Councillor Ashe requested that the Department be again requested to approve the provision of a residence for the Midwife in the Furbo area of Spiddal Dispensary District.

Councillor Ashe also requested that particulars be supplied to her of the hours of attendance of the medical officers at the Galway Nos. 1 and 2 Dispensaries.

8476. Committees.—Resolution from the Galway Borough Council was submitted, requesting "that the Borough Council be given representation on Committees relating to county-at-large

As the Committees in which the Borough Council would be interested were appointed at the annual meeting held in the local election year, no action was taken on this resolution.

It was decided to place on the next Agenda for consideration the filling of the vacancies on certain Committees resulting from . the death of Mr. P. Kyne, Co.C.

8477. Irish Public Bodies' Mutual Insurances Ltd.-The annual report of this Company for year ending 31st December, 1950, was submitted and noted.

8478. Rate Collector, No. 4 District.—Letter, 1/6/'51, from the County Solicitor, enclosing advice by Mr. F. J. Roche, B.L., having already been circulated to the members, was submitted.

It was proposed by Councillor Geoghegan, seconded by Councillor O'Donnell :-

That the advice of Senior Counsel be obtained in regard to this matter.'

It was proposed by Councillor Collins and seconded by Coun-

That the Council act on the advice already obtained." Deputy Mannion suggested that the Council should now appoint Miss Lee.

A vote taken on the question of obtaining Senior Counsel's advice resulted as follows:

For-Councillors Ashe, Beegan, Carty, Flaherty, Geoghegan, Glynn, Higgins, Houlihan, Killilea, King, Kitt, O'Toole, Lahiffe, Newell, Nicholson, O'Donnell, Quinn, and Ruane-18.

Against-Councillors Cawley, Collins, Furey, Galvin, Joyce, Mannion, Mylotte, Sirr, and Wall-9.

It was, therefore, decided that the advice of Senior Counsel be obtained.

8479. Rate Collector, No. 7 District.—The list of applicants (10), having already been circulated to the members, was submitted.

It was proposed by Councillor Collins, seconded by Councillor Galvin, and Resolved :-

"That having regard to the nature of the duties of the office of Rate Collector to No. 7 Collection District, the knowledge and experience necessary for the efficient performance of those duties, and the qualifications for that office, the Council consider that the person to be appointed cannot be satisfactorily selected by competitive examination, and decide, therefore, that the Council consider the qualifications of the applicants for that post and make an appointment after consideration of said qualifications."

The appointment of Mr. Martin O'Donnell, Kylesalia, Kilkerrin, Carna, was proposed by Councillor Geoghegan and seconded by Councillor O'Donnell.

The appointment of Mr. John Mylotte, Carna, was proposed by Councillor Joyce and seconded by Deputy Mannion.

The appointment of Mr. Walter A. Burke, Moyglass, Kylebrack, Loughrea, was proposed by Councillor Houlihan. This proposal was not seconded.

A vote taken as between Mr. O'Donnell and Mr. Mylotte resulted as follows :-

For Mr. O'Donnell-Councillors Ashe, Beegan, Carty, Geoghegan, Glynn, Higgins, Houlihan, Killilea, King, Kitt, O'Toole, Lahiffe, Newell, Nicholson, O'Donnell, Quinn, and Ruane-17.

For Mr. Mylotte.-Councillors Cawley, Collins, Flaherty, Furey, Galvin, Joyce, Mannion, Mylotte, Sirr, and Wall-10.

The Chairman declared Mr. Martin O'Donnell, Kylesalia, Kilkerrin, Carna, appointed to the office of Rate Collector for No. 7 Collection District, subject to sanction by the Minister for Local Government.

(COUNCILLOR CARTY now took the Chair.)

8480. Overdraft.—Councillor Galvin proposed, Deputy Beegan seconded, and it was unanimously Resolved :-

That the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation on General Account not exceeding £150,000 for the quarter ending 30th September, 1951." It was proposed by Councillor Galvin, seconded by Deputy

Beegan, and unanimously Resolved :-That the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £70,000 on Turf Account for the quarter ending 30th September, 1951."

8481. Shelters at Salthill.—It was proposed by Councillor Miss M. Ashe, seconded by Councillor P. Sirr, and Resolved :-

That pursuant to the letter of sanction of the Local Government Minister, dated the 24th April, 1951, the sum of £2,550 be borrowed from the National Bank, Limited, Galway, for the purpose of defraying expenditure on the provision of shelters at Salthill, Galway, said sum to be repaid within ten years with interest at the rate of one half per cent under the Irish Banks' rate, rising and falling from time to time, with a minimum of £4 per cent. per annum, as in said letter of sanction provided, the said loan and all interest thereon to be secured by a Mortgage over the Rates, and that the Seal of the County Council be affixed to the said Mortgage to The National Bank Limited.

8482. Sale of Derelict Site No. 47.—Correspondence in connection with the sale of Derelict Site No. 47, Tuam, was submitted-notice of the intended sale having been circulated to the members on the 18th May, 1951.

It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor Galvin, and unanimously Resolved :-

"That the Council hereby approve the sale of Derelict Site No. 47-area: 11 perches-situated at Church View, Tuam, to Mr. Brian Hardiman, Church View, Tuam, for £70, plus costs of conveyance of the site to Mr. Hardiman."

8483. County Home, Loughrea. Letter, 5/5/51, from the Department of Health in regard to the proposed change in the name of the County Home, Loughrea, was submitted, stating that this matter is one for the local authority.

It was proposed by Councillor Houlihan, seconded by Councillor Cawley, and Resolved :-

That the name of the County Home, Loughrea, be altered to St. Brendan's Home, Loughrea."

8484. Bridge at Derrywee.-Report, 21/6/51, from the County Engineer, was submitted, stating that the estimated cost of providing a new bridge at Derrywee, including the approach roads, etc., would be £4,000.

It was proposed by Councillor Lahiffe, seconded by Councillor Houlihan, and Resolved :-

That the Council approve the provision of this bridge, and that Clare County Council and the Department of Local Government be approached with a view to obtaining a contribution towards the cost of the work.'

"That the Government be asked to implement the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, by approving the issue from the local loans fund of the loan of £200,000, for which application had been made by the Galway County Council." It was proposed by Councillor McElihiney and seconded by Councillor Shields:—

"That the Council proceed with the issue of grants in so far as approval has been given in Department's letter, 17/8/'51, and obtain a loan for the balance on the best terms possible." After a long discussion, it was eventually agreed that above proposals be withdrawn and that quotations be obtained for a loan of £50,000, and that these quotations be submitted to the Council at next meeting.

8518. Scholarships in Secondary and Vocational Schools, 1952.—Letter 14/51 R.O. (2) 8130, of 8th August, 1951, from the Department of Education, was submitted, together with Minutes of Meeting of the Education Committee held on the 22nd August, 1951.

It was proposed by Councillor Higgins, seconded by Councillor Ruane, and unanimously Resolved:—

"That a scheme for Scholarships in Secondary and Vocational Schools for the year 1952, similar to the scheme for the year 1951, with the additions set out hereunder, be submitted for approval to the Minister for Education:—

"ADDITIONS: That the following Clauses be included in the Scheme:—

"CLAUSE II (5): A candidate who has already been awarded a Scholarship (full or partial) or a Bursary under any Scheme approved in accordance with the Local Authorities (Education Scholarships) Act, 1944, shall not be eligible for admission to the competition for Scholarships under this Scheme.

"CLAUSE X (2): As far as possible the Council shall determine the eligibility of each candidate before the date of the examination, and a candidate declared eligible shall not subsequently be rejected save in exceptional circumstances and with the approval of the Minister for Education. Where the Council is satisfied in the case of any applicant that there is need for further investigation, which is not likely to be concluded in sufficient time before the examination, the candidate may be admitted provisionally to the examination, subject to the prior approval of the Minister for Education and to the receipt from the parent (or guardian) of a written undertaking to accept the decision which will be given later regarding the eligibility of the candidate.'

8519. University Scholarship Scheme, 1952.—Minutes of meeting of Education Committee, held on the 22nd August, 1951, were submitted.

It was proposed by Councillor Higgins, seconded by Councillor Ruane, and unanimously Resolved :-

That a scheme for University Scholarships (Ordinary and Agricultural) for the year 1952 similar to the scheme for the year 1951 be adopted.

Letter, 31/7/51, from Mr. Ml. J. Brennan, Dalysfort Road, Salthill, Galway, was submitted, requesting that the value of his scholarship be increased from £90 to £120 during the period for which it will be necessary for him to pursue his studies at University College, Dublin.

Councillor King proposed, Councillor Geoghegan seconded, and it was unanimously Resolved :-

That the value of the University Scholarship awarded to Mr. Ml. J. Brennan, Dalysfort Road, Salthill, Galway, be increased to £120 during the period for which it will be necessary for him to pursue his studies at University College,

Letter, 3/8/'51, from Mr. Kieran Hanley, 8, Shantalla Place, Galway, was submitted, stating that though awarded a University Scholarship by the Galway County Council in 1950, he did not accept it, as he also qualified for a State Scholarship of a higher amount; this year, due to the fact that he had failed by 2 per cent to get honours in Chemistry, he had not retained the latter scholarship, and requested that the Council's scholarship be granted to him for the coming year.

On the proposition of Councillor Ashe, seconded by Councillor King, it was decided that if the facts are as stated by Mr. Hanley, the Council approve the payment to him of an amount equivalent to the amount which would be payable to him if he had availed of the scholarship under the Council's University Scholarship Scheme-this payment to be for the current year 1951/52 only. -

8520. Aughrismore Pier.—Letter, 17/8/51, from the Special Employment Schemes Office was submitted.

Deputy Mannion proposed, Councillor Geoghegan seconded,

and it was Resolved :-

That the Council approve the contribution of 25 per cent of the cost of improving Aughrismore Pier, in accordance with the terms of the Special Employment Scheme's letter of the 17/8/'51, and accept responsibility for the future maintenance of the pier and approach road on completion of the work now proposed."

8521. Eunowen Pier.—It was proposed by Deputy Mannion, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan, and Resolved :-

That pursuant to the letter of sanction of the Department of Local Government, dated 21/8/'51, the sum of £4,500 be borrowed from the National Bank, Ltd., Galway, for the purpose of defraying the portion of the cost of reconstructing Bunowen Pier which will be borne by the Galway County Council—said sum to be recouped within 15 years with interest at the rate of one-half per cent under Irish Bank's rate, rising and falling from time to time, with a minimum of £4 per cent per annum as in said letter of sanction, provided the said loan and all interest thereon be secured by a mortgage over the rates."

8522. Derelict Site at Tuam .- On the proposition of Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Lahiffe, the Council approved the making of a Preliminary Order under the Acquisition of Derelict Sites Act, 1940, in respect of site No. 1 (1951) area: 5 perches in the townland of Townparks 4th Division in the Town of Tuam; Owner: Mr. Patrick J. Prendergast, The Square, Tuam.

8523. Mass Radiography Service.—Correspondence in connection with this matter, including Department of Health letter, 20/7/51, was submitted.

Councillor King proposed, Councillor McElihiney seconded, and it was Resolved :

That the Council approve the payment of contribution of £709 to the National Mass Radiography Association, Ltd., in respect of that Company's expenses for the year ending 31st March, 1952."

8524. Improvement to Children's Home, Tuam.—The Secretary reported that the Architect's estimate of the cost of the improvement works required at the Children's Home, Tuam, was \$ 2,000, and that the Minister for Health is prepared to approve the provision of a grant of 50 per cent of this figure from Hospitals' Trust Funds.

It was proposed by Councillor Nestor, seconded by Councillor

King, and Resolved

"That the Minister for Health be again requested to make a grant of at least 75 per cent of the cost of this work available from Hospitals' Trust Funds, as it is the opinion of the Council that the full cost of this work should be met from this scource."

8525. Home Assistance.—The Secretary reported that while the amount provided in the estimate for the current year is £21,000,

it is anticipated that the actual cost of this service will be £23,000.

On the proposition of Councillor Nestor, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan, the Council approved the provision of an additional sum of £2,000 to meet the cost of home assistance for the year ending 31st March, 1952.

8526. Church Holydays.—Letter, 7/8/51, from the Galway Branch, I.L.G.O.U., was submitted, stating that the members of the Branch have decided not to accept the proposal in regard to Church Holydays.

The Secretary explained that the proposal was that the staff work from 9.30 a.m. to 6 p.m. on each of the other days of a week in which a Church Holiday would occur and that the office be closed down on Church Holydays.

Councillor King stated that in his original Notice of Motion there was no qualification in regard to working extra time.

Councillor King proposed, Councillor Geoghegan seconded, and it was Resolved

'That the County Manager be requested to close down all Council work on Church Holydays.'

8527. Commemoration of Late General Michael Collins.— Councillor Nestor proposed a vote of condemnation of the Government for withdrawing the services of the National Army from the Michael Collins Commemoration Ceremony.

The Chairman ruled the motion out of order, as he stated that it was a motion of a contentious political nature.

The Chairman declared Councillor's Kitt's amendment carried and Councillor McElihiney's motion lost.

8529. Infectious Diseases (Maintenance) Allowance.—Councillor McElihiney proposed and Councillor Ashe seconded :-

That the Council recommend to the Minister for Health that the present arrangement, whereby hospital patients receive only 5/- under the Infectious Diseases Allowances Act, 1948, be altered so that they shall receive 10/- per week, and the balance of the allowance going towards hospitalization be adjusted accordingly."

8530. Terryland Road. - In response to Councillor McElihiney's notice of motion, the County Engineer explained that it will be necessary to acquire compulsorily the lands for the construction of Terryland Road-that everything possible will be done to expedite this work.

8531. Ballygar Water Supply Scheme.—In reply to Councillor Wall's notice of motion, the County Engineer explained in regard to the difficulty in obtaining essential parts for the pumping plant at Ballygar; that it is expected, however, that these parts will be available, and the work of completion of the scheme will be put in hands within the next week or so.

8532. Cornamona Water Supply.—Councillor O'Toole proposed and Councillor King seconded, and it was unanimously

8533. "That the Council approve the raising of a loan of £50,000 from the Irish Assurance Co. Ltd., for issue of grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950; the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of 15 years with interest at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum."

It was proposed by Councillor King, seconded by Councillor Ashe and Resolved:—

"That the Ministers concerned be informed of the Council's disappointment by the fact that grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, cannot be made to persons availing of the Gaeltacht Housing Grant, and that the Government be requested to amend the law so as to provide that a person receiving the Gaeltacht Grant will also be eligible for the Council's housing grant."

It was proposed by Councillor King, seconded by Councillor Carty and Resolved:—

"That the Council recommend to the Minister for Local Government that the scheme for issue of housing grants by the Council be amended so as to render eligible applicants who had not actually received the Government housing grant

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before the 1st August, 1950, though, in fact, such grant had been allocated prior to that date."

It was proposed by Councillor Quinn, seconded by Councillor Galvin and unanimously Resolved:—

"That the Council recommend to the County Manager that the maximum grant be limited to 80 per cent of the State grant in the case of applicants who would not be eligible for housing by the Council under the Labourers Acts or the Housing of the Working Classes Acts.

8552. Housing Subsidies.—Letter 13/51 of the 6/9/'51 from the Department of Local Government was submitted stating inter alia that the capital cost limit for labourers' cottage had been increased to £950 for fully-serviced cottages and £800 for unserviced cottages.

It was proposed by Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Cunningham and Resolved:—

"That the Minister for Local Government be requested to increase the capital cost limit to a figure which would be adequate to cover the cost of providing a cottage at present, viz., £1,150 for fully-serviced cottages and £1,000 for unserviced cottages."

8553. Tuam Town Commissioners' Housing.—It was proposed by Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Cunningham and Resolved:—

"That the Council hereby approve the raising of a supplementary loan of £7,500 from the Commissioners for Public Works to enable the Council to make a grant of that amount to the Tuam Town Commissioners for completion of the Commissioners' housing scheme at Newtownmorris; the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of 50 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council."

It was proposed by Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Kitt seco

It was proposed by Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Cunningham and Resolved:—

"That the Council hereby approve the obtaining of an overdraft of £7,500 on capital account pending the receipt of the loan of £7,500 for Tuam Town Commissioners' housing—the raising of which has been approved by the County Council to-day."

8554. Small Dwellings Aquisition Acts—Loans.—It was proposed by Councillor Ashe, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan and unanimously Resolved:—

"That the Council approve an amendment of the third approved scheme for the issue of loans under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts, 1899–1948, so as to provide that where the floor area exceeds 600 square feet the amount

which may be advanced shall not exceed 80 per cent. of the certified value or £1,600, which ever is the lesser."

8555. Bridge at Banagher.—Correspondence in connection with this matter was submitted stating that Offaly County Council proposed to reconstruct and improve the existing swing bridge over the river Shannon at Banagher, provided the Galway County Council would be prepared to contribute 50 per cent of the cost of the work; the County Engineer's rough estimate of the cost of the work being £3,000.

It was proposed by Councillor Ashe, seconded by Councillor

Geoghegan and Resolved :-

"That the Council hereby approve a contribution of 50 per cent. of the cost of reconstruction of the swing bridge at Banagher by the Offaly County Council."

8556. Children's Home Improvements.—Letter, H11/7/1 of the 17th September, 1951, from the Department of Health was submitted, stating that the Minister had again considered the matter but could not approve a grant of more than 50 per cent. of the approved cost of the improvements to the Children's Home, Tuam.

The Secretary pointed out that the Architect's estimate, dated 28th August, 1950, of the total cost of the work was £82.590. After discussion it was proposed by Councillor Ashe and seconded by Councillor Glynn and Resolved:—

"That the Council will be prepared to meet the remaining 50 per cent. of the cost of the improvements at the Children's Home, in view of the urgent necessity for this work, provided a loan will be sanctioned which will be repayable over period of not less than 35 years.

Galway Fever Hospital Improvements.—The County Manager stated that improvements to the Galway Fever Hospital are required which are estimated to cost £36,000 and that the Minister for Health has informed the Council that a grant from Hospitals' Trust Funds will not be available for this work.

It was decided to refer the matter to the Visiting Committee for discussion with the County Manager and the Resident Medical Superintendant.

8557. Pier at Portnadoon, Gortnagopple.—File of correspondence was submitted including Special Employment Schemes Office letter, 12/3/'51, which stated that it is proposed to provide a slipway at Portnadoon, Gortnagopple, at a total cost of £530 provided the Galway County Council will contribute 25 per cent. of the cost of the work and will accept responsibility for future maintenance of the work when completed.

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It was proposed by Councillor Mylotte, seconded by Deputy Mannion and Resolved:—

"That the Council hereby approve and accept the conditions set out in Special Employment Schemes Office letter, 12/3/1951, in regard to the provision of a slipway at Portnadoon, Gortnagopple.

Councillor Mylotte requested that the repairs to Kilmurvey Pier receive attention and that the present light which is unsuitable be improved. Councillor Mylotte also requested that attention be given to Portnacarra Pier at Inishmann.

8558. Spiddal Dispensary.—The County Engineer's plan and estimate for provision of a dispensary at Spiddal were submitted

The Secretary pointed out that the proposed dispensary is similar to a labourer's cottage so that if at any time the dispensary became obsolete, it could be utilized as a cottage; the County Engineer's estimate of the cost of erecting this dispensary which would be typical of the dispensary required for all areas is £1,100.

On the proposition of Councillor Higgins, seconded by Councillor Geoghegan, the Council approved the County Engineer's proposal.

8559. Visiting Committe.—The Minutes of the Meetings of the Visiting Committee were submitted for:—

(a) County Home—Meeting held 6/9/51. (b) Sanatorium—, 12/9/51.

(c) Clifden Hospital—,, ,, 22/9/'51.
Copy of the diet scale for the County Home had already been circulated to the members. It was decided that no change be recommended.

In regard to the Sanatorium minutes, the Secretary reported that application had been made to the Department of Health for sanction to the appointment of two additional porters who would rotate on night duty as well as performing day duty at the Sanatorium; that proceedings for ejectment of Mr. Patrick Nolan from the Gate Lodge are pending and that it is expected that accommodation will be provided for him in one of the Corporation houses which are at present being erected; that application had been sent to the Department of Health for sanction to the appointment of a Sister Housekeeper.

In regard to milk supplies, Councillor King requested that the County Manager would seriously consider deleting from future advertisements the Clause confining tenders to Grade A milk or Pasteurised Milk.

The County Manager replied that in inviting tenders for Grade A or Pasteurized milk, he was acting in accordance with the opinion of the Minister for Health, the Resident Medical Superintendent at the Hospital and the Bacteriologist; that he

was not prepared to alter his decision unless the Council see fit to compel him to do so by proceeding in accordance with Section 29 of the County Management Act, 1940, in which case the Council would accept responsibility for the type of milk supplied to

Deputy Killilea recommended that a special meeting be called, with a view to adopting a resolution requiring the Manager to invite tenders in future for supply of pure new milk to the Council's institutions instead of Grade Amilk or Pasteurized milk.

8560. National Monuments' Advisory Committee.—Letter 3/9/'51, from the Secretary of the National Monuments' Advisory Committee, was submitted giving particulars of the attendance of members since 1947, and requesting that the Council would decide as to which of these members should constitute the Com-

On the proposition of Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor Ashe, it was Resolved :-

That the following be members of the National Monuments' Advisory Committee until the Annual Meeting in 1952, viz., Professor M. Duignan, Lord Killanin, Dr. Costello, Canon Crehan and Mr. H. McGlory.'

The remaining members may be continued as honorary members until the Annual Meeting in 1952, viz., An t-Athair E. Mac Fhinn and Rev. Fr. Egan; a list of the attendance of members between this date and the Annual Meeting in 1952 to be submitted prior to the Annual Meeting.

- 8561. Electoral Areas.—Resolution from Galway Corporation was submitted, requesting that the Electoral Law be amended so as to constitute Galway Borough a single electoral unit. As the Council consider that having regard to the number of electors in the Galway Borough area, the Borough should be be able to secure adequate representation on the Galway County Council, no action was taken in regard to this resolution.
- 8562. Revision of Valuation of County Health District.— A resolution from Galway Corporation was submitted, requesting that the County Manager have the valuation of premises, other than land in the County Health District, revised. No action was taken on this resolution.
- 8563. Cinema Licence.—On the proposition of the Chairman, seconded be Councillor King, the Council approved the issue of a cinema licence to Mr. George Bradley for his travelling cinema, subject to receipt of satisfactory reports from the County Engineer and the Chief Superintendent, Garda Siochana.
- 8564. Kiltormer Dispensary Residence and Dispensary.— Correspondence in connection with the necessity for provision

of a dispensary residence and dispensary at Kiltormer, was

On the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by Councillor Kitt, the Council approved the preparation of the contract documents with a view to obtaining tenders for this work; the cost to be kept approximately within the limits set out for the Turloughmore residence with an additional provision for the

8565. Flannery Bridge.—Councillor Mylotte stated that several men who were available for employment are not getting employment on the Flannery Bridge job as the ganger is employing his own friends or persons of his political views to the exclusion

Mr. Collins, chief A.C.E., stated that the arrangement made was that married men would be employed for a two months' period and single men for a one month period. When these periods expire the men are laid off and others taken on in their places that he would investigate the matter again to ensure that this instruction is being complied with.

8566. Claregalway Bridge.—Councillor Furey requested that something be done to improve conditions at the dangerous bridge at Claregalway, and Councillor Sirr requested that pending the carrying out of a permanent job on the bridge, a danger sign be erected at each side of it. It was decided that the matter be referred to the County Engineer to investigate and report on the possibility of improving conditions at this bridge.

8567. Williamstown and Glenamaddy Water Supply.—Consideration of Councillor Glynn's notice of motion regarding extensions at Williamstown and Glenamaddy was adjourned until the special meeting for water supplies.

8568. Ambulance Boat for Aran.—Councillor Joyce suggested that a deputation be sent to C.I.E. with a view to getting a cabin in the "Dun Aengus" properly fitted for hospital cases. The County Manager explained that it is expected that a new lifeboat will be provided at Aran early in 1952, and the Lifeboat Institution have undertaken to provide in this new lifeboat, at their own expense, accommodation for stretcher cases; that this would meet fairly adequately the position in regard to urgent cases and that non-urgent cases could travel by the "Dun Aengus" which service has been improved since it was taken over by C.I.E.

It was decided that no further action be taken pending the arrival of the new lifeboat at Aran.

8569. Sewerage Extension at Tullinadaly Road, Tuam.-Councillor Nicholson requested that the Tuam sewer be extended to the cottages in Tullinadaly Road.

The County Engineer pointed out that owing to levels there are difficulties in the way of this proposal and that at present the only way in which it is feasible to provide sewerage facilities for the cottages is by way of a septic tank.

It was decided that the County Engineer be requested to investigate the proposal in conjunction with the general proposal for sewerage arrangements for labourers' cottages.

Councillor King stated that at Bermingham, Tuam, there is a sewer for a distance of about 100 yards where no water main

- 8570. Muckinagh Burial Ground.—In reply to Councillor O'Donnell's notice of motion, the Secretary stated that Mr. John Ridge, the owner of the site which the Council is seeking to acquire for this burial ground, is now in a position to sell, and the County Solicitor has been requested to take the matter up with
- 8571. Repair of Roads to Quarries.—In reply to Councillor O'Donnell's notice of motion, Mr. Collins, Chief Assistant County Engineer, stated that it has been the practice of the Council to restore any bye-roads damaged by haulage of stones from quarries; that frequently these roads are also used by other parties in hauling turf, and the Council is sometimes blamed for damage which it has not caused. Councillor O'Donnell requested specially that attention be given to a bye-road at Clynagh Costello
- 8572. Labourers' Cottages.—In reply to Councillor Flaherty's notice of motion, the Secretary reported that a tender had been accepted from Mr. James Redington for erection of two cottages at Carrowlena in March last, but that up to the present, Mr. Redington had not commenced the work.

Mr. Cullinan stated that he hoped that the contractor would start this work in the near future.

Councillor Flaherty stated that he was aware of the position in regard to the cottage for Mr. P. Mullins, as a site could now be obtained on the lands of Mr. Patrick Flaherty, Gallagh, Brownsgrove; Councillor Flaherty requested that, if possible, Mr. Mullins be accommodated in the meantime in some one of the Tuam cottages as a temporary arrangement.

8573. Road from Cleggan to Claddaghduff.—Consideration of Councillor O'Toole's notice of motion in regard to above road was deferred until the special meeting for road works.

8574. Cleggan Sewerage Scheme.—Councillor O'Toole proposed, and Councillor O'Donnell seconded, and it was Resolved :-That consideration be given to the provision of a sewerage scheme for Cleggan village."

### GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS AT SPECIAL MEETING OF GALWAY, COUNTY COUNCIL, HELD AT COUNTY BUILDINGS, ON SATURDAY, 27th OCTOBER, 1951.

In the Chair: Councillor Michael Carty.

Also Present: Councillors M. Ashe, P. Cawley, P. Collins, J. J. Cunningham, J. Flaherty, P. Furey, P. Galvin, J. Geoghegan, S. Glynn, M. Higgins, J. Houlihan, J. P. Joyce, M. Killilea, T. King, M. F. Kitt, J. Mannion, J. J. Nestor, M. Nicholson, M. O'Donnell, L. O'Toole, M. Quinn, J. J. Ruane, V. P. Shields, P. Sirr, and M. Wall.

Dr. C. F. McConn, County Medical Officer; Dr. T. K. White, R.M.S., Central Hospital, and Dr. M. Folan, Bacteriologist, were also present.

8577. Milk Supply for Woodlands Sanatorium.—The Notice requisitioning a special meeting to consider a resolution in connection with milk supplies to Woodlands Sanatorium was submitted.

Deputy Killilea stated that he desired that the word "only" be omitted from the resolution, as it was not his intention that patients in the Sanatorium, who desired pasteurised milk, should be deprived of it.

Councillors Sirr and Nicholson stated that it should be left open to suppliers of other than ordinary new milk to compete for the Sanatorium Contract.

Councillor Flaherty stated that it would be unwise to ignore the advice of the medical officers concerned.

Councillor King stated that he would like to have information on the following points:—

If the Local Authority can decide on the class of milk to be supplied to the institution.
 Has the opinion of such a body as the Medical Association been obtained on the merits of pasteurised milk and

ordinary milk?

3. If ordinary new milk is injurious to health, why does the

Department of Health allow it to be used by almost all members of the ordinary public?

4. Was pasteurised milk first introduced to Woodlands Sanatorium on the recommendation of the medical staff?

Councillor Cunningham spoke on the advantages and disadvantages of pasteurised milk.

The County Manager asked if Dr. McConn would accept the views of the Bacteriologist on this matter as being the best qualified to give an opinion hereon.

The Chairman stated that he did not consider this a fair question, and the question was, therefore, not pursued.

Deputy Killilea pointed out that pasteurised milk is not supplied to various other institutions, such as Ballinasloe Mental Hospital, Castlerea Sanatorium, etc., and asked how the patients in those institutions fare.

in those institutions fare.

The County Manager replied that if it were possible to obtain supplies of pasteurised milk for these institutions, he would have pasteurised milk supplied. Since it is not possible to obtain pasteurised milk, ordinary milk must of necessity be supplied to those institutions.

The Chairman called on Dr. Folan to give his views.

Dr. Folan stated that milk is pasteurised so as to kill any disease-producing organisms which get into the milk before pasteurisation; that it kills such organisms but will not render the milk absolutely free from other germs which will sour the milk but are not disease-producing; that the energy in the milk is not diminished by pasteurisation, and that its nutritive value is not decreased appreciably.

Dr. McConn stated that he agreed with Dr. Folan that pathogenic organisms in milk are killed by pasteurisation, but that pasteurised milk does not sour so quickly as ordinary milk; that the milk supplied to the Sanatorium on occasions up to November, 1950, was not satisfactory; since that time on occasions, it has not been wholly clean, but generally the milk supplied from November, 1950, has been satisfactory.

Dr. White, R.M.S., stated that since the conditions of production of milk are not so ideal that it may not be contaminated, he would in these circumstances always recommend that a supply of pasteurised milk be obtained for Galway Central Hospital.

Councillor Collins asked whether ordinary milk or pasteurised milk would be the more advantageous for the patients, if in both cases the milk were produced under ideal conditions.

Dr. McConn replied that in such a case he would always prefer ordinary new milk, and would recommend it in preference to pasteurised milk.

Dr. Folan stated that if produced under ideal conditions new milk would be as advantageous to the patients as pasteurised milk, and if the patients found it to be more palatable, it would

be preferable to provide ordinary new milk; but the difficulty is that milk is not produced under ideal conditions, and such being the case ordinary new milk is more likely to be contaminated by disease-producing germs than pasteurised milk.

Councillor Cunningham asked if pasteurisation would render safe milk from a T.B. cow.

Dr. Folan replied that pasteurisation would render such milk safe.

Councillor Wall asked if the milk delivered to the Sanatorium was suitable to the patients, and if it complied with the minimum standard, as it appeared to him that the whole matter arose from unfavourable reports on the milk supplied to the Sanatorium.

In reply to Miss Ashe, Dr. Folan stated that he was not present at the meeting at which the dirty pads were produced, and therefore had not seen these pads.

Councillor Higgins stated it was not a question of the merits of pasteurised or pure new milk, but whether the milk being actually supplied to the Sanatorium is satisfactory and harmless to the patients.

In reply to the Chairman's inquiry as to whether milk supplied to the Sanatorium was satisfactory, Dr. McConn stated that prior to 1950 all samples of milk examined were clean; that dirt first appeared some time prior to November, 1950. Since then occasionally the milk went sour; that it was not satisfactory in the period April to November, 1950; that it has been reasonably satisfactory since November, 1950.

The County Manager pointed out that since 1950 the milk supplied to the Sanatorium is subjected to a more rigid test than previously as a result of reports made by inspectors from the Departments of Health and Agriculture on the ordinary milk supplied by persons who previously held the contracts for the Sanatorium.

The County Manager read a report made by Dr. McConn, some years ago, on milk supplied in the Galway Area, which stated that the production of highest grade or pasteurised milk would receive his full support.

Councillors Galvin and Sirr recommended that pasteurised milk be used as far as possible.

Councillor Collins stated that having heard the opinion of the doctors he came to the conclusion that pasteurised milk was most suitable.

Councillor Houlihan stated that as a member of the visiting committee he was not satisfied with the reports on pasteurised milk supplied to Woodlands Sanatorium; furthermore that the inviting of tenders for pasteurised milk eliminated any competition, as there is only one firm which could supply it.

Miss Ashe asked if pasteurised milk could be supplied in sealed bottles so as to eliminate danger after pasteurisation.

Councillor Ruane stated that the milk supplied to Athenry

by the Department of Agriculture Station is not pasteurised milk, and that apparently that Department considers that ordinary new milk is better than pasteurised milk.

Councillor Glynn asked if it was not a fact that pasteurised milk was found to contain T.B. germs and that Grade A milk was of a higher standard than pasteurised milk.

Councillor Kitt stated that the majority of the patients in the Sanatorium, when asked by the Visiting Committee, stated that they preferred ordinary new milk to pasteurised milk.

8579. Congratulations.—On the proposition of Councillor Houlihan, seconded by Councillor Nestor, the Councill unanimously congratulated the Galway Hurling Team on their fine performance in America, stating that the team was a credit not only to Galway but to all Ireland.

Councillor Houlihan recommended that a presentation be made to the team by the members of the Council.

On the proposition of the Chairman, seconded by Councillor Carty, the Council unanimously congratulated the Rev. Mother and Sisters of St. Raphael's Convent, Loughrea, on the occasion of their centenary.

8580. Minutes.—The Minutes of the Council to No. 8576, having been circulated to the members, were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

In reply to Councillor Galvin the Secretary stated that a letter had just been received from the Department of Local Government stating that under the terms of the Scheme, the Council could if it so desired, pay grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, in any case in which the whole or part of the State Grant had not been paid before 1st August, 1950; that this letter would be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting of the Council.

Deputy Killilea requested that a rough sketch be accepted by the County Engineer for such houses, in lieu of a site plan.

8581. Ballygar Water Supply.—Councillor Wall requested that the Chairman permit Very Rev. Canon Feeley, Ballygar, to address the meeting on behalf of a deputation for Ballygar Water

Canon Feeley stated that the scheme was first initiated thirty-seven years ago; that there were various delays, but eventually the work was undertaken in recent years, and carried up to twelve months ago, when work ceased entirely and nothing has been done since; that much inconvenience is being caused, especially to people who went to the expense of preparing their premises for the new service, abandoning their previous arrangements. Canon Feeley requested that the Council would do everything possible to expedite completion of the scheme. This request was supported by Councillor Sirr.

The County Engineer read a latter, 24/10/51, from Mr. O'Connor, Consulting Engineer, which stated that the storage tank had been despatched from England on the 6th October. The Chairman requested the County Engineer to do all possible to hasten completion of the work.

8582. Vacancy.—On the proposition of Deputy Killilea, seconded by Councillor Kitt, Mr. John O'Dowd, Rooghan, Laurencetown, was unanimously co-opted to fill the vacancy on the Council resulting from the resignation of Deputy P. Beegan.

8583. Loan for Oranmore Dispensary Residence and Dispensary.-It was proposed by Councillor M. Ashe, seconded by Councillor M. Carty, and Resolved :-

That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of three thousand seven hundred pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Public Assistance Act, 1939, and Local Government Act, 1941."

8584. Loan for Purchase of Bishop's Palace, Etc., at Tuam.— It was proposed by Councillor M. Ashe, seconded by Councillor M. Carty, and Resolved :-

'That pursuant to the Letter of Sanction of the Local Government Minister, dated the 20th September, 1951, the sum of £13,300 be borrowed from the National Bank, Limited, Galway, to defray expenditure on the purchase of the Bishop's Palace and grounds at Tuam, to be repaid within ten years with interest at the rate of one-half per cent under the Irish Bank's rate, rising and falling from time to time with a minimum of £4 per cent per annum, as in said letter of sanction, provided the said loan and all interest thereon to be secured by a mortgage over the rates AND that the Seal, of the Council be affixed to the said mortgage to the National Bank, Limited."

8585. Loan for Williamstown Water Supply Scheme. - It was proposed by Councillor J. Glynn, seconded by Councillor Nestor and Resolved :-

"That the Council approve the raising of a loan of £8,300 from the Commissioners of Public Works for provision of a Water Supply Scheme at Williamstown—the loan to be repayable by instalments over a period of 25 years, with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council.

8598. Local Government (Officers' Age Limit) Order, 1951.— Letter E.L.6/51, of the 13/11/51, from the Department of Local Government, in regard to above order, was submitted and the Secretary reported that in accordance with the terms of the order, the collectors for Districts Nos. 2, 17, 20, 25, 26 and 32 will cease to hold office on the 1st May, 1952. The contents of the letter were noted and it was ordered that arrangements be made for the filling of the vacancies prior to the issue of next year's rate warrants.

Councillor Nestor suggested that rates be collected in the same manner as land annuities are collected at present,

"That the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £15,500 from the Commissioners of Public Works so that a grant of this amount may be made by the Council to the County Council Vocational Education Committee for provision and equipment of a new Vocational School at Dumore; the loan to be repayable half-yearly by annuity over a period of 30 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date issue of the loan to the Council."

8602. Loan £8,400 for New Dispensaries.—It was proposed by Councillor J. Geoghegan, seconded by Councillor M. Carty and

of £8,400 from the Commissioners of Public Works for provision of new dispensaries at Ardrahan, Athenry, Ballygar, Kilmilkin, Recess, Roundstone and Spiddal; the loan to be repayable by instalment over a period of 25 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council."

**8603.** Dispensaries: Miscellaneous.—Councillor O'Donnell requested that a dispensary depot be provided at Carraroe.

The County Manager stated that the provision of a dispensary at this place is under consideration at present.

Councillor Collins stated that Mountbellew Dispensary is one of the worst in the county.

8604. Deputy Rate Collectors.—On the proposition of Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Lahiffe, the Council approved the appointment of the following Deputy Rate Collectors until the closing of the warrant for the year ending 31st March, 1952, during the absence of the permanent Collectors on sick leave:—

Mr. Joseph McInerney, Cahermore, Ardrahan, as deputy for Mr. Thomas McInerney, Collector for No. 20 district;
Miss Ita D. Walsh, Kilnadeema, Loughrea, as deputy for Mr. James Walsh, Collector for No. 24 district.

8605. Cinema Licence.—Councillor Quinn proposed and Councillor Geoghegan seconded:—

"That a Cinema Licence be issued to Mr. Michael Hayes for his travelling cinema, provided that satisfactory reports are received from the County Engineer and from the Chief Superintendent of the Garda Siochana.

8606. Local Authorities (Works) Act, 1949.—Co. Engineer's letter, 16/11/'51, was submitted, requesting that Councillors would, in the coming year, restrict their proposals to three schemes for each Councillor.

Councillors King and Sirr suggested that the restriction should be in cost rather than in the number of schemes.

Councillor Kitt proposed:—

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"That the Galway County Council protest strongly against the reduction of £29,000 in the amount of the grant made available for the current year under the Local Authorities (Works) Act, 1949, as compared with the year 1950/51."

Councillor Higgins stated that a meeting of the Loughs Corrib, Mask and Carra Joint Drainage Committee was called recently for a week-day, and it was impossible for him to leave his school and attend the meeting on that day. Councillor Higgins requested that in future these meetings would be held on a Satur-

that the Council, in Minute No. 8395, of the 31/3/1951, had approved the expenditure of £600 in extending the dispensary residence at Loughrea, provided the Medical Officer would undertake to pay a proportionate increase in rent. The Medical Officer had agreed to the Manager's proposal that he pay an increase of £17, making the rent £62 a year, plus rates, from the date the additional accommodation would be completed. In the meantime the County Engineer reported that the estimated cost of this work had increased to £850. Dr. Dyar has agreed to pay a rent of £70 a year, plus rates, in lieu of the rent of £62 previously arranged, provided the work costing £850 will be carried out by the Council.

On the proposition of Councillor Ashe, seconded by Councillor Carty, the Council approved the provision of additional accommodation at Loughrea dispensary residence at a cost of £850, on the understanding that the Medical Officer will pay a rent of £70, plus rates, with effect from the date of completion of the additional

8608. Additional Health Inspectorate Staff.—The County Medical Officer's recommendation for appointment of three additional Health Inspectors and one Superintendent Health Inspector was again submitted.

Councillor Collins proposed and Councillor Sirr seconded:—
"That the appointment of three additional Health
Inspectors and one Superintendent Health Inspector, as
recommended by the County Medical Officer, be not made."

In probable to Councillor Ashe, the County Manager stated that

In reply to Councillor Ashe, the County Manager stated that he would not accept a recommendation that Miss MacHale be appointed temporarily as Superintendent Health Inspector; the position had not yet been created, and the intention is that if the position is created the permanent appointment must be made on the recommendation of the Local Appointments Commission.

It was proposed by Councillor Quinn and seconded by Coun-

cillor O'Dowd:—
"That a Superintendent Health Inspector be appointed

"That a Superintendent Health Inspector be appointed, and that consideration of the appointment of any additional health inspectors be deferred."

Councillor King proposed :-

"That the Superintendent Health Inspector be appointed temporarily for a period of twelve months—one of the existing health inspectors to be promoted to the Superintendent post and a temporary health inspector to be employed to replace the officer promoted."

This proposal was not seconded.

A vote taken on Councillor Quinn's amendment resulted as lows:—

FOR: Messrs. O'Dowd, Carty, Cawley, Cunningham, Galvin, Geoghegan, Higgins, King, Kitt, O'Toole, Lahiffe, Newell, Nicholson, Quinn, Ruane, Shields, and Wall—17.

AGAINST: Messrs. Ashe, Collins, Flaherty, Furey, Glynn, Houlihan, Mannion, Mylotte, Nestor, O'Donnell, and Sirr—11.

The Chairman declared the amendment carried and Councillor Collins' proposal defeated.

8609. Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950.—Letter, 22/10/'51, from the Department of Local Government was submitted, stating that the Council may make grants in accordance with their scheme under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, in cases where the State grant or the final instalment of it was paid on or after the 1st August, 1950.

It was proposed by Councillor King, seconded by Councillor Carty, and Resolved:—

"That the Council's grant under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, be made available to applicants who, though allocated a State grant before the 1st August, 1950, had not been paid the full amount of the State grant before that date; in such cases, however, the amount of the Council's grant to be in proportion to the amount of the State grant paid to the applicants on or after the 1st August, 1950, viz. 100 per cent of that amount for applicants eligible for housing by the Galway County Council and 80 per cent of that amount for applicants not so eligible."

On the proposition of Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Galvin, the Council confirmed that the Manager shall be left discretionary powers in regard to the allocation of grants in any case where the applicant appears to be able to provide housing accommodation out of his own resources.

3610. Oughterard Housing Scheme.—The County Manager stated that he now proposes to provide a housing scheme at Oughterard under the Labourers Acts rather than under the Housing of the Working Classes Acts, and that it is intended that the houses in that scheme at Oughterard will be the subject of a differential rent scheme.

Councillor Carty requested that the Manager would consider

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the provision of water and sewerage services in the new cottages which are being provided by the Council at Athenry Road, Loughrea.

8611. Wild Birds' Protection Act, 1930.—Letters, 31/10/'51, from the Department of Justice and, 5/11/'51, from the Irish Society for the Protection of Birds, were submitted.

It was ordered that the particulars given in the latter letter be conveyed to the Minister for Justice.

8612. Anti-Partition.—Letters, 9/10/'51 and 29/11/'51, from the Anti-Partition Association, requesting that the Council appoint delegates to attend a Conference which will be held in the Mansion House, Dublin, from the 10th—12th December, 1951, were submitted.

It was decided that the following would represent the Council at the Conference: Deputies Cawley, Killilea, and Mannion, and Councillor J. M. Glynn.

It was also requested that any other members who would find it convenient to do so should attend the Conference in the Mansion House.

8613. G.A.A. Pitch at South Park, Galway.—Councillor Nestor referred to the recent resolution by the Harbour Commissioners that South Park be utilised for factory sites instead of being allocated to the G.A.A. as a site for a stadium, and suggested that owing to the prevailing wind, if a factory were erected on this site, it would smother the city with smoke and fumes; that ample room for factory sites is available at the rear of Rockbarton and elsewhere.

Councillor Ashe stated that this matter will be discussed at a meeting of the Galway Corporation on the 6th instant, when the interests of the G.A.A. in this matter will be adequately protected.

8614. Dogs.—Councillor Carty proposed and Councillor O'Donnell seconded:—

"That the Garda Authorities be asked to enforce the regulations made by the Council for the control of dogs, as substantial losses have been sustained by farmers in the Loughrea and Craughwell area during the lambing season."

8615. Loughrea Town Band.—Councillor Carty proposed, Councillor Shields seconded, and it was Resolved:—

"That the Council recommend the making of a contribution of £20 a year to the Loughrea Town Band for not less than ten performances a year of at least one hour each."

3616. Water Supplies, Roads and Cottages.—Councillor Cunningham's Notice of Motion, Nos. 18 (b) (i), (ii), and (iv) were, at his request, adjourned.

Councillor Carty now took the Chair.

8617. University Scholarships.—Councillor Cunningham proposed and Councillor Glynn seconded:—

"That a scholarship of £120 a year be made available to Mr. M. J. Connaughton, Mountbellew, for the coming year 1951/'52, as was approved for the past year in Minute No. 8331 of 25/11/'50."

Councillor Kitt stated that when this scholarship was granted by the Council last year it was understood that if the boy obtained Honours in his examination in 1951 he would again become eligible for the State scholarship. He had obtained First Class Honours in his examinations in 1951, but the Department of Education are not prepared to renew his scholarship. Councillor Kitt suggested that the Department of Education be requested to renew this scholarship, and the Council agreed to this suggestion.

8618. Kilmurvey Pier.—In reply to Councillor Higgins' notice of motion, the County Engineer stated that a proposal to expend £500 on Kilmurvey Pier under the Local Authorities (Works) Act, 1949, had not been sanctioned by the Department, and the County Engineer now recommends that the necessary work be done out of revenue.

Councillor Higgins proposed and Councillor Geoghegan seconded, and it was Resolved:—

"That the Council approve the provision of £500 to enable the County Engineer to carry out the necessary repairs to Kilmurvey Pier within the current financial year."

8619. New Cottages at Spiddal.—The Secretary informed Councillor Higgins that it is accepted that the necessary undertaking by the representatives of the owner of the site would be signed on the 1st instant, and that the Council would then be in a position to deal with the tenders already received for erection of cottages at Spiddal.

8620. Road at Kiltulla.—In reply to Councillor Newell's notice of motion, the County Engineer stated that he is attending to the flooding of the road at Kiltulla village.

8621. Road at Clonberne and Glenamaddy Water Supply.—Councillor Flaherty's Notices of Motion were adjourned to the special meetings to be held for Roads and Water Supplies.

8622. Roundstone No. 2 O.A.P. Sub-Committee.—The Chairman directed that Councillor Mylotte's Notice of Motion be adhourned until next meeting, so that, in the meantime, the Clerk

to the Committee would confirm the non-attendance of Rev. Fr. Corcoran and Mr. J. F. Cooke, who were appointed members on above Committee.

Councillor Mylotte's Notices of Motion, Nos. 2, 3, and 4, were adjourned to the Road Works Meeting.

8623. Forester.—Councillor Kitt recommended that a Forester be appointed for County Galway, who would operate a small Nursery to raise plants for the Council's own lands and who would sell the surplus to farmers in the county. Councillor Kitt explained that Foresters are already employed in other counties, e.g., County Kildare and County Cork.

It was decided that the views of the County Committee of Agriculture be obtained on the proposal.

8624. Pump at Cartrondoogan, Ahascragh.—On the proposition of Councillor Kitt, seconded by Councillor Collins, the Council unanimously approved the taking over responsibility for maintenance of Cartrondoogan Pump, provided the Irish Land Commission consent.

8625. Ahascragh: Water Supply, Sewerage, and Footpaths.

—Councillor Kitt's Notices of Motion in regard to these matters were adjourned until the special meetings for Water Supplies and Poods

8626.—Glenamaddy H.A.O.—Councillor Glynn stated that, as this matter has been arranged and that the district was actually divided, he did not propose pursuing it further, but he wishes to register a strong protest against the non-replacement of Mr. Garvey, Home Assistance Officer for this district.

8627 Midwife for Williamstown: Glenamaddy District.—
In reply to Councillor Glynn's Notice of Motion, the Secretary explained that it appeared that Nurse Coyne had attended to only three public assistance cases during the past three years. Nurses Cloonan and Greene had been appointed Midwives for Glenamaddy and Williamstown dispensary districts, respectively. The conditions of their appointment did not restrict their duties to any portion of these dispensary districts, and, therefore, the Department of Health was not prepared to approve any increase in remuneration for them on their taking over the area formerly held by Nurse Coyne.

It was proposed by Councillor Glynn, seconded by Councillor Sirr, and Resolved:—

"That the Council request the Minister for Health to approve the appointment of a Midwife to replace Nurse Coyne

in the electoral divisions of Ballinakill and Tobberee in Williamstown dispensary district and the electoral division of Creggs in Glenamaddy dispensary district."

8628. Cottage at Ballybritt.—In reply to Councillor King's Notice of Motion, the County Manager gave particulars of the various steps leading up to the selection of Mrs. Connolly as tenant for a cottage at Ballybrit, vacated by Mr. M. Hosty.

Councillor King stated he had strong feelings in this matter; that while there were eligible applicants from the vicinity, a stranger from forty or fifty miles away obtained the tenancy of the cottage. Councillor King requested that the present system be made more watertight and that applicants who would not be eligible would not be submitted to the County Medical Officer for his recommendation.

Deputy Mannion objected to the reference to Connemara in Councillor King's notice of motion.

8629. Abbey Assistance District.—The County Manager explained that the proposed abolition of Abbey Assistance District was part of the general scheme for the reorganisation of districts, so as to reduce the number of such districts; that since the officers to whom it was proposed to allocate the Abbey district did not, in fact, now wish to accept this addition to their districts, he intended to leave matters stand and to continue the employment of Mrs. Nicholson as temporary Assistance Officer.

8630. Water and Sewerage Services: Connemara.—In reply to Councillor O'Toole's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that Mr. E. R. Ryan, M.E., has been appointed Consulting Engineer for Clonbur Sewerage Scheme and is preparing his preliminary report; the County Engineer has made an initial survey of the villages of Tullycross, Tully-Renvyle, Cleggan, and Letterfrack, but the survey had not been finally completed.

The Secretary stated that the County Engineer had ordered engines for Tullycross and Derryinver Water Supplies, and that the period of delivery quoted for these engines was four months.

Councillor O'Toole's Notice of Motion in regard to Cornamona Water Supply was adjourned to the special meeting for Water Supplies.

8631. Galway Technical School.—Letter, 28th November, 1951, from the Executive Officer, Galway City Vocational Education Committee was submitted, requesting that the Council would make a contribution to the funds of the Committee in respect of 86 students from outside the borough who are at present attending the day classes in the Galway Technical School.

Councillor Ashe stated that the Committee are considering

he erection of a hall, and it might meet their request if the County Council would agree to contribute a portion of the cost of providing this hall.

It was ordered that consideration of the matter be adjourned to the next meeting, and that, in the meantime, particulars be obtained of the nature of the hall and its estimated cost.

8632. Housing Schemes: Loughrea Town Commissioners.-It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Councillor Ruane, and Resolved:-

"That the Council hereby approve the obtaining of over-draft accommodation on Capital Account not exceeding £500, pending the raising of a supplementary loan to meet the balance of expenditure on the Loughrea Town Commissioner's housing schemes.'

8633. Old I.R.A. Pensioners.—Letter, 29/11/'51, from the Clerk of Loughrea O.A.P. Sub-Committee was submitted, enclosing resolution from the Sub-Committee requesting the Minister for Social Welfare to amend the legislation or regulations relating to Old Age Pensions whereby military service pensions of members of the Old I.R.A. are calculated when computing means for Old

Age Pension purposes.

It was decided to forward the resolution to the Minister for Social Welfare for his favourable consideration.

8634. Oil Tanker Fleet .- Draft resolution received from the Irish Tanker Fleet Conference in letter, 26/11/51, was submitted. The resolution was adopted unanimously, viz. :-

"That Galway County, viewing the grave danger of our whole economy being brought to a stop by any interruption

of oil and petrol supplies to Ireland, resolves:—
"1.—That an Oil Tanker Fleet is essential to the national economy of an island nation;

"2.-That it is essential that immediate steps be taken to establish an Irish Tanker Fleet as a necessary means of securing the continuity of food supplies, agriculture, transport and industry in the country in the event of war or international tension resulting in the removal of the normal overseas organisation for the supply of oil and petrol through our

ports; "3.—That we call upon the Government to take immediate and vigorous steps to obtain such a fleet; and

4.—That copies of this resolution be sent to the Minister for Industry and Commerce, and to the Irish Tanker Fleet Conference."

8635. Miscellaneous.—In reply to Councillor Furey, the County Manager stated that it is not the practice to supply tools to burial ground caretakers.

8642. County Medical Officer.—Letter, 14/12/'51, from Deputy Killilea was read, stating that the Minister for Health informed the deputation which attended on him that he would deal

generously with the matter of a gratuity to Dr. C. F. McConn, on the appointment of a Medical Superintendent to Woodlands Sanatorium, which post was recently advertised.

Councillor Carty stated that he and Councillor Nestor would hand in a Notice of Motion relating to this matter.

8643. Miscellaneous.—Councillor Glynn stated that the streets in Glenamaddy are in a disgraceful condition, as they have not been restored following the completion of the Sewerage Scheme, and rubbish has been left dumped in the streets after a recent fair.

8645—Provision of New Pumps: The schedules of pumps already provided and pumps to be provided were submittedcopies having already been circulated to the members.

Clr. Carty stated that the schedule of existing pumps includes many which have not functioned for years and cited Newtowndaly pump as an example.

The Chairman referred to pumps which were sunk to a considerable depth and then abandoned, e.g., Liscune and Alloon in the Ballinasloe Rural District; the Chairman considered that since the necessity for pumps in areas such as these was established before the sinking of the abandoned pumps commenced, he considered

that these areas should have priority now.

Clr. Galvin stated that the list of pumps to be provided shows Killure Beg while, in fact, the place in which the pump is required

In reply to Clr. King, the County Engineer stated that the delivery time for the two well-sinking plants ordered has expired and, therefore, the plants should soon arrive; that with these two plants and the existing contractors, it would be possible to sink approximately twenty pumps in each year.

Clrs. Houlihan, Collins and Galvin recommended the improvement of existing wells and where such wells would be improved that a small approach road to the wells would be provided.

Clr. Collins asked why there should be such a delay in dealing with the repair of existing pumps-several of which are out of order and should be repaired before the provision of further new pumps would be considered.

The County Manager suggested that the Council raise a loan of £20,000 which would be sufficient for a two years programme of providing new pumps and that it be left to the County Medical Officer to recommend the areas which are most urgently in need of such new pumps—without allocating a number of pumps specially for each rural district.

It was proposed by Clr. Ashe seconded by Deputy Killilea and unanimously Resolved: "that the Council approve the raising of a loan of £20,000 from the Commissioners of Public Works or from such other source as may be approved by the Minister for Local Government for sinking of wells and provision of new pumps in the Galway County Health District; the loan to be repayable by instal-

The estimate, as prepared, provided for an increase of  $60\frac{3}{4}$ d. in the general rate as compared with the year ending 31st March,

The County Manager stated that the increase in the estimate is attributable to several factors over which a Manager cannot exercise any control, e.g., increase in prices of commodities; increase in salaries and wages; additional staff required for the implementa tion of new services; the increased cost of Mental Hospital fuel supply and the high cost of maintaining County Galway patients in St. Patrick's Chest Hospital, Castlerea.

The Chairman proposed that the estimate be considered in detail in the order as set out in the statement furnished to the

Roads. Clr. Nestor suggested that a reduction be made in the amount provided for roads, even though the Council at a special meeting had already agreed on the amount of the estimate for this account—as it appeared to be the only account in which any reduction could possibly be made.

Clr. Galvin proposed that the Roads Estimate be increased by £10,000 to make provision for new works.

Clr. Quinn now took the Chair.

The Chairman stated that Clr. Galvin's proposal should have been put forward at the Special Road Works meeting. He requested that the Council would devote its attention to reducing the increase of 5/03d. rather than to adding to that increase.

Deputy Cawley requested that attention be given to the Laurencetown-Kylemore road and that application be made to Bord na Mona for a special grant for repair of this road.

Clr. Carty asked if the expenditure could be reduced by having Coras Iompair Eireann convey tar for the Council's requirements by rail and having that tar stored in large tanks. The County Engineer agreed that if this were feasible it would reduce ex-

Clr. Sirr stated he considered that the Road Works Estimate, as submitted, should not be reduced.

Clr. O'Dowd drew attention to the dangerous condition of the Canal bridge of the Kylemore-Laurencetown road.

Clr. Collins stated that more work could be done for the amount of money allocated for roads.

Clr. Deputy Killilea stated that if road workers are not giving a fair return for their wages, their inefficiency is due to laxity on the part of the Engineering staff.

Deputy Mannion asked if the County Engineer is satisfied with the condition of the Galway-Clifden road as he, Deputy Mannion, considers that the amount provided for improvement and main-

8672—County Committee of Agriculture: The Secretary submitted correspondence relating to the filling of two vacancies on the County Committee of Agriculture. It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Clr. Kitt, and resolved that: "Rev. Br. Eugenius O.S.F., Agricultural College, Mountbellew be appointed to fill one vacancy on the County Galway Committee of Agriculture."

It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Councillor Carty and resolved that: "Clr. John O'Dowd, Rooghan, Laurencetown, Ballinasloe, be appointed to fill the second vacancy on the County Galway Committee of Agriculture."

8673—Rate Collection Districts, Numbers 15, 17, and 25: The Secretary submitted letter 1/3/1952, which was circulated to each member of the Council giving particulars of the proposed revision of the areas of Rate Collection Districts Numbers 15, 17 and 25 and the proposal to fix a maximum poundage rate of 7d. for each of the three revised Districts. It was proposed by Councillor Carty, seconded by Clr. King and resolved that: "the Council approve the revision of the areas of Rate Collection Districts Numbers 15, 17 and 25 as proposed by the County Manager, but the Council recommends that the maximum rate of poundage for each of the three revised Districts be 8d."

Mannion stated that when the office of Rate Collector for Number 4 District was being filled consequent on the death of Mr. James J. Lee, a drastic reduction was made in the poundage rate and he requested that consideration of the revision of the poundage rate for this District be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting of the Council.

8675—Sale of Plot of Land etc. at Loughrea Pumping Station: Notice dated 25th January, 1952 which was circulated to each member of the Council was submitted. It

was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Houlihan and resolved that: "the Council hereby approve the sale of a plot of land in the town of Loughrea, area 9 perches and 28 square yards or thereabouts, statute measure, to Mr. William McDonnell, Building Contractor, Moore Street, Loughrea for £75 plus costs of conveyance of the plot to the purchaser."

8676—Loan for Dual Purpose Fire Appliance: It was proposed by Clr. Higgins, seconded by Clr. Galvin and resolved that: "the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £5,800 from the Commissioners of Public Works or from such other source as may be approved by the Minister for Local Government for purchase of a Dual Purpose Fire Fighting Appliance for the Galway County Fire Service; the Loan to be repayable by instalments over a period of ten years, with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council."

8677—Excess Expenditure: On the proposition of Clr. Glynn, seconded by Clr. Galvin, the Council approved the following excesses in actual expenditure for the year ending 31st March, 1952, over the amounts authorized, viz.,

It was noted that the estimated savings on other items would amount to £43,130.

8678—New Dispensaries: Deputy Killilea proposed, Clr. Glynn seconded and it was resolved that: "the Council hereby approve the provision of new Dispensaries at Kilconly and Williamstown and consider that the proposal for a new Dispensary at Dunmore should be adjourned, as the existing building appears to be adequate. Clr. Collins stated that the buildings being provided for use as dispensaries are much too elaborate for the purpose and that a more simple and less costly type of building should be sufficient.

# 8679—Water Supply Schemes for Kilkerrin and Moylough

The Secretary gave particulars of the estimated cost of providing piped water supply schemes for Kilkerrin and Moylough, viz.,

or a combined scheme for both Kilkerrin and Moylough, which would also serve houses in the area between these two towns, the cost of which would be £25,137. Clr. Cunningham requested that the Council would proceed with these schemes, as the need for a proper water supply is acute, especially in Kilkerrin.

After a discussion, it was decided that the proposals be adjourned so that the Consulting Engineer may be requested to consider whether the schemes could be amended so as to reduce the estimated costs considerably.

8680—Midwifery Services—Glennamaddy and Williamstown: Letter of 23/1/52 (A 11/245) from the Department of Health was submitted, stating that the Minister for Health is not prepared to alter his previous decision to the effect that Nurse Coyne who acted as Midwife in part of Glennamaddy and Williamstown districts should not be replaced and that her work should be carried out by Nurse Greene and Nurse Cloonan without extra remuneration. The Council noted the contents of this letter.

8681—Cinema Licence: On the proposition of Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Lahiffe, the Council approved the issue of a Cinema Licence to Mr. Fred McCormick, for his travelling cinema.

8682—University Scholarships: Letter 10/1/52 (M.1960) from the Department of Education (Secondary Education Branch) was submitted, stating that the Department would not renew the State Scholarship for Mr. M. J. Connaughton, Longford, Mountbellew. It was proposed by Deputy Mannion, seconded by Clr. Carty and resolved that: "If the student requires only one further year to complete his University course, the Council approve granting a scholarship of £120 to him for the coming year, subject to compliance with the usual conditions of the Scholarship Scheme."

8683—Inspector for Boarded-Out and Nursed-Out Children: Correspondence in connection with the proposal to appoint an Inspector for boarded-out and nursed-out children in County Galway was submitted, giving particulars of the salary scale—£340 x £10 to £400 per annum (inclusive

of temporary bonus) together with travelling expenses. It was proposeed by Clr. Nestor, seconded by Clr. Carty and resolved that: "the Council do not approve the proposal to appoint an Inspector for Boarded-out and Nursed-out children and consider that the necessary duties could be carried out adequately by the Superintendent Assistance Officer and the Assistance Officers.

8684—Forester: Letter 12/2'52 from the Secretary County Galway Committee of Agriculture was submitted stating that as there is no suitable area of land available for a nursery, the Committee is of the opinion that the proposal to appoint a Forester is premature.

On the proposition of Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Collins, it was decided to adjourn the consideration of the appointment of a Forester.

8685—Footwear Scheme: In reply to Clr. O'Toole's notice of motion, the Secretary stated that the Grant for provision of footwear which was £928 for the year 1950/1 was reduced to £882 for the year 1951/2. The price of footwear had increased by 25% in the current year as compared with last year and consequently while 2280 pairs of footwear were issued in 1950/1951 is was possible to issue only 1816 pairs in the current year; that the issue of vouchers for footwear commences within a short period after the receipt by the Council of the notification of the continuation of the scheme in each year. On the recommendation of Clr. O'Toole and Clr. Galvin, the Council directed that the Minister be requested to issue the notification earlier in each year, so that the issue of footwear may be made available to the children concerned earlier in the winter.

It was proposed by Clr. Higgins, seconded by Clr. Galvin and unamimously resolved that: "the Minister for Social Welfare be requested to increase by at least 100% the amount of the Grant for provision of footwear for necessitous children under the Council's footwear scheme."

Councillor Carty now took the Chair.

8686—Abbert Burial Ground Road: The County Engineer's letter 23/3/1952 was submitted, giving particulars of the cost of complying with Clr. Nicholson's notice of motion. The County Engineer pointed out that this cost is fairly considerable, but he agreed that he would carry out some repairs to the road, which would result in an improvement of conditions.

Deputy Killilea requested that road to Cummer Burial Ground receive attention.

8687—Loughrea Abattoir: Clr. Shields stated that in former times there was a public abattoir in Loughrea but at the time that the holdings in the town were purchased from the Harewood Estate, the abattoir was sold to an individual and the other butchers now have no place to kill animals. Mr. Shields requested that the Council would examine the proposal to provide a public abattoir in Loughrea, and stated that the local butchers would contribute towards the cost of this work.

It was decided that a report on the proposal be obtained from the Veterinary Inspectors and other officials concerned.

8688—Rate Collector's Remuneration: In reply to Clr. Flaherty's notice of motion, the Secretary gave particulars of the remuneration of Rate Collectors in respect of the year ended 31st March, 1951, viz.,

8689—Dunmore Public Lavatory: In reply to Clr. Flaherty's notice of motion, the Secretary stated that provision for a new lavatory in Dunmore was made in the Council's estimate for the coming year.

8690—Cloon Well: It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Collins and resolved that: 'the well known as Cloon Well on the Potter Estate, Castleblakeney, be taken over by the Council from the Irish Land Commission and that the Well, when taken over, be adequately protected from contamination.

8691—Road Signs at Dummore: In reply to Clr. Flaherty's notice of motion, the County Engineer's report was submitted, stating that he is arranging for provision of the necessary signs at the Square, Dunmore.

8692—Clifden District Hospital: In reply to Clr. O'Toole's notice of motion, the Secretary stated that the Medical Officer for Clifden Dispensary District has also been appointed as Medical Officer for the Clifden District Hospital and that the appointment of an additional Medical Officer for the District Hospital would be an encroachment on his rights; that the provision of the extension to the Hospial is not

expected to result in an increase in the number of maternity cases, as these were in fact being accommodated with difficulty in the original hospital; that if at any time it is necessary to obtain a second Medical Officer for administration of anaesthetics, the regulations empower the Medical Officer of the Hospital to call in a second Medical Practitioner for

No action was taken on Clr. O'Toole's notice of motion.

8693—Landing Slips at Mullaghglass etc.: Clr. O'Toole requested that slips for the landing of small boats be provided as follows:

At Pat Flaherty's house, Mullaghglass; Near Rinvyle Hotel:

At Crump Island.

Clr. O'Toole stated that he understands that a Grant towards the cost of these works would be made available by the Department of Agriculture (Fisheries Branch). It was decided that the matter be taken up with the Department of Agriculture.

8694—County Councils' General Council: Letter 14/1/52 from the General Council was submitted requesting the views of the Council on motions in regard to the rating system and the appointment of Health Inspectors. It was decided that a copy of the letter be circulated to each member and that the item be placed on the agenda for the next meeting.

8695—Olympic Council: Letter 15/1/52 from the Hon. Secretray of the Olympic Council of Ireland was submitted, requesting that a subscription be made by the Council to their funds, together with letter 14/2/52 from the Department of Local Government, stating that the Minister has no power to sanction the making of such payment; in view of the contents of the letter from the Department of Local Government, no action was taken.

8696—Electricity Charges: Letter 14/1/52 from the Mayor of Limerick was submitted in regard to the charges made by the E.S.B. for electricity. It was ordered that copies of this letter be circulated to the members for consideration.

8597—Porter at Woodlands Sanatorium: Deputy Killilea recommended that the age limit for temporary porters about to be appointed at Woodlands Sanatorium be increased to

8698—Auditor's Reports: Auditor's Reports and Statement of accounts for the year ended 31st March, 1951 were submitted and noted, viz.,

Galway County Committee of Agriculture; Lough Corrib Navigation Trustees; Loughs Corrib, Mask and Carra Joint Drainage Committee; County Vocational Education Committee.

8699—Extension and improvements to existing Water Supply Schemes: The Secretary gave particulars of the recommendation of the County Engineer and the County Medical Officer in regard to the extension and improvement of certain existing water supply schemes. It was decided that a summary of the recommendations be circulated to each member of the Council and that consideration of the carrying out of these works be adjourned until the next meeting of the Council.

8700-Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950: Letter received in response to the Council's invitation for tenders for a Loan of £50,000 for the issue of Grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, were submitted and it was noted that the only quotation received was that from the National Bank Limited, which was for a loan of £50,000 repayable over a period of not more than twenty years with interest at ½% under the Irish Banks Rate varying—minimum 4%-and stating that if the Council require a fixed rate of 5% for the Loan, the matter should be referred to the Bank Directors again. It was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Clr. O'Dowd and resolved that: "The Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £50,000 from the National Bank Limited for the issue of Grants by the Council under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950; the Loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of fifteen years, with interest at the rate of 5%.

It was proposed by Deputy Killilea, seconded by Clr. Carty and resolved: "The Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £30,000 from the Commissioners of Public Works to enable the Council to issue Grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, to persons who would be eligible for housing by the Galway County Council; the Loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of twenty-five years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the Loan to the Council.

8701—Galway Fever Hospital: Correspondence in connection with the proposed improvement of the Galway Fever Hospital was submitted, including the Architect's Estimate of the cost of the work, viz., £28,000 for which a Grant will not be made available from Hospitals' Trust Funds. The Secretary pointed out that this matter had been brought before the Council previously, when it was directed that

consideration be adjourned until the proposal would be investigated by the Visiting Committee to the Hospital; that the matter was considered by the Visiting Committee together with the County Manager and that the Visiting Committee had recommended the carrying out of the work. After a discussion, it was, on the proposition of Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Kitt, decided to ajourn consideration of this proposal until the next meeting.

8702-Minutes of Meetings of Visiting Committees: Minutes of the Meeeting of the Visiting Committee held at the Central Hospital, Galway on 1/3/1952 and at Tuam Children's Home on 8/3/1952 were submitted. Clr. Carty referred to the item in the Minutes for the Central Hospital relating to Probationer Nurses' Lectures and stated that the Council was perturbed at not being made aware of the position in regard to the giving of lectures to Probationers in the Galway Central Hospital, which might result in an extension of the period of training for several probationers. The Secretary stated that the Manager had taken promptly the appropriate action in connection with this matter, and that the Minister for Health was made fully aware of the position. In regard to the Children's Home, the Secretary stated that Consulting Engineer for the Mechanical Services had been appointed; that the Architect's Report and Estimate of the cost of the work had been received and was under consideration by the County Manager; that the revision of capitation rate is also being considered by the Manager at present and that this will to some extent be affected by the carrying out of the improvement works.

E703—Irish Public Bodies Mutual Insurances Limited: The Council unamimously appointed Mr. Martin Quinn as representative to attend and vote at general meetings of the Irish Public Bodies Mutual Insurances Limited and to exercise every other right and power incidental to such membership.

8704—Appointment of Rate Collectors: It was proposed by Clr. Shields, seconded by Clr. Kitt and resolved that: "The County Manager examine the qualifications of all applicants for the position of Rate Collector and that only the names of the properly qualified candidates be submitted to the Council for consideration."

8705—Roard Workers: In reply to Clr. Shields notice of motion, County Engineer's report 15/3/52 was submitted, stating that the fall-off in labour output is due to the marked scarcity of workmen prevailing in this country for the past five or six years.

8706—Maintenance of Main Roads: Letter 25/2/52 from Roscommon County Council enclosing copy of resolution adopted by that Council to the effect that the full cost of the maintenance of main roads should be made a national charge was read and the resolution was adopted unaminously.

8707—Macra na Feirme: Letter 4/3/52 from Mr. J. Leonard, Kilmalaw Young Farmers' Club was submitted requesting that the Council would hear a delegation of the Young Farmers to discuss the increase in the rates: On the suggestion of the Chairman, it was decided that a copy of the printed Estimate as adopted for the coming year be supplied to Mr. Leonard, with a request that he would indicate the items which, in his opinion, could be considerably reduced; that it be pointed out that the rate for the coming year has been struck and that any suggestion which might be made would apply only to the rate for the year ending 31/3/1954.

Letter from Mr. John Donoghue, Secretary, Killallaghtan Young Farmers Club was submitted, stating that his club is by no means satisfied with the rate struck for the coming year. This letter was noted.

8708—Aughris Pier: Letter 12/3/1952 from the Secretary, Special Employment Schemes Office was submitted, stating that the cost of this work which previously was estimated to be £1,000 is now estimated to be £1,240, and enquiring if the Council would agree to contribute 25% of the increased cost. On the proposition of Clr. O'Toole, seconded by Clr. Geoghegan, the Council unanimously agreed on the contribution of 25% of the revised cost of £1,240 and agreed to the other conditions set out in letter 12/3/1952 from the Special Employment Schemes Office.

8709—Overdraft: It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Galvin and resolved that: "The Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodatin not exceeding £150,000 on the Council's General Account for the Quarter Ending 30th June, 1952."

It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Galvin and resolved that: "The Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £70,000 on the Council's Turf Account for the Quarter Ending 30th June 1952."

8710—Loughrea Town Commissioners—Housing: It was proposed by Clr. Shields, seconded by Clr. Carty and resolved that: "Pending the obtaining of a supplementary Loan to meet the balance of the cost of Loughrea Town Commissioners' Housing Schemes, the Council approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £7,000 on Capital

Account, so that an advance of this amount may be made by the Galway County Council to the Loughrea Town Commissioners."

8711—School Meals (Gaeltacht) Scheme: It was proposed by Clr. Geoghegan, seconded by Clr. O'Toole and resolved that: "The Council again inform the Minister for Social Welfare that it is their opinion that the Grant for the School Meals (Gaeltacht) Scheme should be increased to 50% of the actual expeenditure incurred by the Council in each year: that amending legislation should be introduced to enable a full 50% Grant to be paid by the State and to provide that accommodation and cooking facilities for school meals in the Gaeltacht Area should be provided by the Department of Education.

8712—Eyrecourt Sewerage Scheme: The Secretary reported that the Consulting Engineer's Estimate of the cost of this Scheme is £14,700 and that the population according to the last census is only 309; that the cost is considered high in relation to the population figure. As some Members had left the meeting by this time, it was decided to adjourn consideration of this matter.

8713—Miscellaneous: Letter 5/3/1952 from the County Council's General Council was submitted, stating that the next meeting will take place during the Spring Show Week 6/10th May and requesting notice of any matters to be placed on the Agenda.

8718-Loan £8,300 for Williamstown Water Supply Scheme: It was proposed by Clr. R. Lahiffe, seconded by Clr. M. F. Kitt and resolved: "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Eight Thousand three hundred pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Local Government (Sanitary Services) Acts, 1878 to 1950".

Co. 8735: Western Regional Health Institution The County Manager referred to the representations made by the Council that three representatives from Galway County should be appointed on the Joint Board for the Western Regional Health Institutions (Merlin Park and Woodlands Sanatoria) and stated that for the present the Minister is arranging that the Board shall consist of two members from each County concerned; that this arrangement can be reviewed later if necessary. The County Manager stated that a Provisional Board is being appointed which will consist of the Chairman and Vice-Chairman of each Coiuncil in the Western

The Manager requested that the Council would express its approval to the transter of Woodlands Sanatorium to the new Joint Board for the Westren Regional Health Institutions, either by way of conveyance or by licence on the understanding that 188 beds will be made available in Merlin Park to accommodate the existing patients in Woodlands Sanatorium and that there will be a permanent allocation of 160 beds in Merlin Park for County Galway patients in addition to which the County will participate in the pool of regional beds at Merlin Park Institution.

On the proposition of Clr. Carty seconded by Clr. Ashe, the Council unanimously agreed to the proposed transfer of Woodlands Sanatorium to the Joint Board for the Western Regional Health Institutions, either by conveyance or by licence.

Clt. Carty requested that the County Manager would examine the visiting hours for Woodlands Sanatorium which have been altered recently and are most unsuitable now. Clr. Carty requested that arrangements would be made for visiting time in the early part of the day and again in the evening after 6 p.m.

8736: County Galway Vocational Education Committee: It was unanimously decided to adjourn consideration of the filling of the vacancy on the County Galway Vocational Education Committee until the annual meeting on the 28/6/52.

8737: Loughs Corrib, Mask and Carra Joint Drainage Committee: Consideration of the appointment of representatives on above Committee to replace those disqualified was adjourned until the annual meeting on the 28/6/1952.

8738: Kilkerrin Water Supply Scheme: On the suggestion of Clr. Cunningham, consideration of this item was adjourned until next meeting.

### COUNCILLOR CARTY NOW TOOK THE CHAIR

8739: Athenry Water Supply Scheme: Correspondence in connection with the improvement of Athenry Water Supply

Scheme was submitted including the report from Mr. N. O'Dwyer, Consulting Engineer, stating that the estimated cost of the improvement scheme is £18,175. On the proposition of Clr. Ruane seconded by Clr. Shields, the Council unanimously approved proceeding with the scheme.

8740: Water Supply Improvements -General: It was proposed by Clr. Higgins seconded by Clr. Ashe and Resolved "that the Council borrow sufficient money to proceed with the proposed improvements and extensions to existing piped water

supplies in the County."

Clr. Ashe recommended that where the Council builds cottages, the water and sewerage services, if available, should be provided

Clr. Carty requested that a fountain be provided for the cottages at Athenry Road, Loughrea.

Clr. Ashe stated that there is a considerable number of houses in Knocknacarra which will not be served by the extension to the water main which is being carried out at the expense of the County Council.

8741: Loughrea Sewerage Scheme Improvements: The County Manager stated that the sewerage disposal works at Loughrea are not adequate to cope with the volume of sewage during wet weather and that improvements are necessary. The Manager requested the Council's approval to obtaining a report on this matter from Messrs. P. H. McCarthy & Sons, Consulting Engineers, Dublin, who were the Consulting Engineers for the original sewerage scheme. This proposal was, on the proposition of Councillor Carty seconded by Clr. Ruane, uannimously approved.

8742 : Childrens' Home, Tuam : Correspondence in connection with the proposed improvements to the Childrens' Home at Tuam was submitted. The County Manager pointed out that a grant of 50% of the cost will be made available from Hospitals' Trust Funds, but the Hospital Commission insists that as a condition of the making of this grant, an improvement scheme, as set out by them, shall be carried out. This scheme is estimated to cost £150,000 approximately. After a discussion, it was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Quinn and Resolved: "that the Council approve proceeding with the scheme of improvements at the Childrens' Home, Tuam, estimated to cost £150,000, on the understanding that 50% of this will be recouped from Hospitals Trust Funds and that an appropriate revision will be made in the capitation allowance payable by Mayo County Council.'

Clr. Collins recommended that the Council satisfy itself definitely as to the future of the Home before incurring this expenditure. Clr. King stated that it would be right for the Council to express

its appreciation of the services of Mother Hortence as Matron of the Childrens' Home, Tuam, and that the Council would express its regret at the departure of Mother Hortense from the Home at such a critical time in its history. Clr. King suggested that the Council would request the return of Mother Hortense as Sisterin-Charge of the Childrens' Nome at Tuam. This recommendation was supported by Clrs. Killilea, Nestor, Collins and other members of the Council.

The County Manager stated that he had considered this matter and that he does not think it proper to interfere with a Religious Order in the control of one of its members.

8743: Derreen Bridge: Correspondence with Clare County Council was submitted and while it was agreed that the Council had not given any undertaking to Clare County Council to bear the entire cost of the bridge at Derreen, it was on the proposition of Clr. Houlihan, seconded by Clr. Lahiffe, decided that if Clare County Council will contribute one-third of the cost of the bridge, the remaining two-thirds of the cost will be borne by Galway County Council.

8744: Loughrea Abattoir: Clr. Shields proposed that the ouncil get an estimate of the cost of provide Loughrea; this estimate to be prepared by the County Architectural Assistant. Clr. King proposed and Clr. Sirr seconded, "that the Council should decide first whether Abattoirs are to be provided for all towns in the County." After discussion, it was decided that the estimate for Loughrea be obtained and submitted

8745: Road Workers' Wages: Letter 1/4/52 trom the Federation of Rural Workers applying for an increase of 12/6 per week for road workers was submitted. The County Manager pointed out that at the Estimates Meeting in February 1952 he had drawn the Council's attention to the fact that the estimate submitted did not make any provision for an increase in road workers' wages and that if such provision were to be made by the Council, it should be made by increasing the amount of the estimate as submitted. Councillor Sirr proposed that a supplementary estimate be approved to provide for an increase in the road workers' wages. This proposal was seconded by Clr. Shields. Clr. Ashe stated that it is her intention to propose at the next meeting of the Council that the resolution adopted by Council in Minute No. 8653 of the 23/2/1952 be recinded.

Clr. King proposed that the application from the Federation of Rural Workers be adjourned for consideration by a Roads Committee which he recommended should be appointed at the Annual Meeting on 28/6/1952, Clr. King further recommended that

permanent road workers be paid wages for Church Holydays.

This proposal was seconded by Clr. Ruane.

It was eventually decided that consideration of the matter be deferred pending consideration of Clr. Ashe's Notice of Motion in regard to the rescinding of Minute No. 8653. Clr. Carty stated that in the Loughrea area in recent times a large number of established servants have been left off work for fairly long periods and, consequently, when they resume work eventually most of their wages for the first couple of weeks, after resumption, are devoted to paying arrears of superannuation contributions. The County Engineer stated that turf production and L.A.W. schemes were in progress at this time last year which gave greater employment than is now available. The County Manager asked the County Engineer to inquire into the distribution of plant in the various

Letter 10/4/'52 from the Town Clerk, Galway, was submitted enclosing a copy of resolution by the Galway Corporation requesting that that Body be allowed two representatives on the Visiting Committee of the Central Hospital, Galway. After consideration of the matter and having regard to the facts that (a) the Visiting Committee is a committee of the Galway County Council; and

(b) Miss Ashe, Co. C., a member of the Galway Corporation is a member of the Visiting Committee for Institutions.

The Council refused to accede to the request of the Galway

8748.—Overdraft: It was proposed by Clr. King, seconded by Clr. Carty and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £200,000 on General Account for the quarter ending 30th September, 1952."

It was proposed by Clr. King, seconded by Clr. Carty and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £30,000 on Turf Account for the quarter ending 30th September, 1952."

8749.—Rate Arrears: Deputy Killilea asked for an explanation of the delay in dealing with the collection of large sums due for rate arrears in Tuam, e.g., Hosty's. The County Manager stated that for several years he has been endeavouring to get the County Solicitor to take action in these matters. Deputy Killilea stated further that arrears of rates are due by a member of the Tuam Town Commissioners and requested that the County Manager would examine into these matters.

8750.—Fever Hospital Improvements: Clr. Houlihan proposed "that having regard to increased accommodation about to be available in our hospitals in the county, the proposition carried at our last meeting to expend £28,000 on the Fever Hospital be rescinded for at least one year when we will be in a better position to know whether same is necessary." The County Manager explained that this matter had been considered fully by the Visiting Committee and, subsequently, by the Council; that there is no proper isolation ward in the hospital; that it is impossible to state when there might be an outbreak of fever requiring adequate accommodation for patients in the Fever Hospital; that the accommodation for staff in the Fever Hospital is very bad.

It was proposed by Clr. Higgins and seconded by Clr. Carty "that the Council proceed with the improvement of the Fever

Hospital which is estimated to cost £28,000."

Clr. King asked whether the accommodation for fever patients could not be provided in a Regional Fever Hospital which would accommodate the small number of fever patients in the entire region comprising, say, five or six counties. Clr. King seconded Clr. Houlihan's proposal that the carrying out of the improvements be adjourned for twelve months. On a show of hands, the Chairman declared Clr. Houlihan's proposal defeated.

8751.—Adjournment: Consideration of items 17 to 24 inclusive excluding items 18 (c) and 22 (b) was adjourned until

the next meeting of the Council.

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Clr. Geoghegan referred to the delay in obtaining Department's sanction to the acquisition of sites for cottages, and suggested that the Deputies who were members of the Galway County Council should approach the Minister for Local Government, with a view to expediting sanction in such cases.

The Chairman and Deputy Mannion requested that an explanation would be given for the long delay in acquiring sites for cottages apart from any delay which may result from the Department's failure to sanction such proposals quickly.

SMALL DWELLINGS (ACQUISITION) ACTS: The Chairman referred to the delay in payment of final instalments of housing loans, due to the fact that the documents for such loans were not being registered in the Land Registry Office, and requested that a sample list of such cases be supplied to him so that he might take the matter up with the Land Registry Office.

DIFFERENTIAL RENTS SCHEME: Clr. King stated that the cottages in Headford, which it is proposed will be subject to a differential rent scheme, will probably cost more per cottage than the cottages to be erected in Tuam - with a consequent higher minimum rent. After a discussion, it was proposed by Clr. Ruane, seconded by Clr. King and resolved:

"that the committee recommend that the minimum rent in differential rent schemes should not exceed 7/6d. per week, and that the committee also considers that for all future lettings of new cottages in rural areas not subject to a differential rent scheme, the rent should be increased from the present figure of 5/- to 6/- per week.

Deputy Killilea suggested that the minimum rent of 7/6d. a week for differential rent schemes should be in respect of an income equivalent to the Agricultural wage for the time being.

GRANTS UNDER SECTION 7 OF THE HOUSING (AMENDMENT) ACT, 1950: The County Manager explained that in the Housing (Amendment) Bill, 1952, it was provided that the Council may proceed with the issue of grants under this Scheme in cases where the applicant was notified of the allocation of his grant before the 29th April, 1952; that this would be the cause of certain difficulties, and the attention of the Department had been drawn to this fact, and that a promise had been obtained that the section would be rectified, so as to provide that the Council could deal under theirscheme with the issue of grants in all date, say, 31st March, 1952.

It was proposed by Clr. Ashe, seconded by Clr. Ruane and resolved:"That the Committee recommend that Deputy Killilea and Deputy
Mannion should see the Minister for Local Government, to
ascertain what is being done to have this provision made in the
Bill".

It was proposed by Clr. 8768.—Kilkerrin Water Supply: Rev. Canon Waldron, P.P., Kilkerrin, attended with a deputation from Kilkerrin. Canon Waldron addressed the meeting and stressed the necessity for the provision of proper water supply for Kilkerrin.

Report 4/6/52 from Mr. O'Connor, Consulting Engineer, was submitted in which it is stated that the estimated cost for provision of a water supply scheme for Kilkerrin is £12,744 and the estimated cost of a water supply scheme for Moylough is £12,500, while, Mr. O'Connor states, that a Joint Scheme which would serve both of these towns and in addition the groups of houses between Kilkerrin and Moylough would cost approximately £1,000 more than the

total cost of the two separate schemes.

On the proposition of Clr. Glynn, seconded by Clr. Carty, the Council unanimously approved the provision of a joint water supply scheme for Kilkerrin and Moylough in accordance with the

Consulting Engineer's recommendation.

8769.—Water Supplies Generally: It was proposed by Clr. Higgins, seconded by Clr. Ashe and Resolved "that an explanation should be given of the progress made with the water supply extension schemes and the provision of wells, which works had been approved by the Council some months ago."

Clr. Carty stated that the delay in putting schemes in hands appears to be attributable to the Consulting Engineers, and Clr. Carty suggested that the Council should consider the employment of Consulting Engineers who are available in Galway. The Secretary pointed out that Galway Consultants, viz., Mr. Ryan and Mr. O'Connor are already engaged by the Council on a number of

### COUNCILLOR QUINN NOW TOOK THE CHAIR.

Clr. Collins stated that a considerable sum had been spent by the Council in the provision of wells and pumps which have not functioned and suggested that instead of providing pumps, the Council should again consider the possibility of providing regional piped water supply schemes. Clrs. Ruane and Nestor supported Clr. Collins' suggestion.

Clr. Nestor requested that a tap at Kilnalappa and Ballintava, Dunmore, which had been authorised sometime ago be provided

immediately as it is very much needed.

8770.—Chairman: The Chairman thanked the Council for re-electing him to the position of Chairman for the coming year and also for the motion of sympathy with him adopted by the Council at the last meeting.

8771.—Road Workers' Wages: It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Geoghegan and Resolved: "that a Roads Committee consisting of the entire Council be appointed to consider road works and road workers' wages; meetings of the Committee to be held once in each quarter and the first meeting to be held at 12.30 p.m. on Saturday, 12th July, 1952."

It was decided that Item 8 on the agenda be referred to this committee.

8772.—Oughterard Fairs: In reply to Clr. Joyce's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer explained that he had already arranged to have the streets at Oughterard cleaned in the evening of each fair day.

Deputy Mannion suggested that similar arrangements be made for Clifden Town.

8773.—Esker Bog Road: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer explained that this road is not a county road and, consequently, the Council cannot incur any expenditure on its repair and improvement.

8774.—Doon Cemetery Road and Employment of Road Workers: Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion in connection with these matters were referred to the Roads Committee.

8775.—Derelict Sites—Laurencetown: Clr. O'Dowd proposed and Clr. Carty seconded that the derelict sites in Laurencetown be taken over and demolished by the County Council. The County Engineer stated that he would give this matter his attention.

8776.—Rate Collector No. 4 District: It was proposed by

Deputy Mannion and seconded by Clr. O'Toole and Resolved: "that the Council recommend that the poundage for the Rate Collector in No. 4 Collection district which was reduced to 8d. on appointment of the existing Collector be now increased to 1/-."

8777.—New Dispensaries: Deputs Manie.

8777.—New Dispensaries: Deputy Mannion proposed that a new dispensary be provided in Oughterard to replace the existing dispensary which is entirely unsuitable. It was proposed by Clr Sirr that a new dispensary be provided in Glenamaddy.

The County Manager stated that there are 40 dispensary districts in the county and that in the majority of these districts it will be necessary to provide new dispensaries; that in some districts there are, in addition to the main dispensary, one or more out-lying dispensary depots and that some of these will also require replacement. A grant of £600 each is now being made available by the Department of Health for new dispensaries, and the Manager requested the views of the Council on his recommendation that the Council should proceed with the provision of new dispensaries in all cases where these are necessary. On the proposition of Clr. Kitt seconded by Clr. Nicholson, the Council approved the provision of new dispensaries in all cases where such dispensaries are necessary. Clr. Carty recommended that the Council would ensure that the buildings to be provided would be pleasing in appearance.

Clr. Flaherty requested that a dispensary be provided in Clonbern as patients have to travel six or seven miles to the nearest dispensary.

8778.—Hospital Bills: In reply to Clr. Carty's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that he cannot prevent anybody from making a recommendation for the reduction of a hospital bill, but that the question of reducing the bill is considered in relation to the information available in regard to the means of the patient.

On the Chairman's suggestion, it was decided that it is unnecessary to make any alteration in the present arrangements for dealing with hospital bills.

8779.—County Councils' General Council: (a) Rating System: Letter 14/1/52 from the County Councils' General Council was submitted requesting the views of the Council on a motion that the present rating system be altered. It was decided that the General Council be informed that the Galway County Council consider that the present rating system is reasonably equitable and that the Council does not agree with the terms of the Motion.

(b) Health Inspectors: Letter 14/1/52 from the County Councils' General Council was submitted requesting that the views of the Council be obtained on the appointment of additional health inspectors in connection with the Food Hygiene Regulations. It wadecided that the General Council be informed of the arrangements made in this county.

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(c) Road Transport Act: Letter from the General Council was submitted enclosing a motion requesting that haulage licence be issued for the use of farmers' tractors for conveyance of materials for road works. Clr. Carty proposed that the motion be approved. The County Engineer stated that C.I.E. has always been able to provide all transport required by him for road works. It was decided that the Council does not approve the terms of the motion received from the County Councils' General Council in regard to this matter.

(d) Housing Grants: It was decided to refer to the General Council for consideration the recommendation of the Housing Committee in regard to the issue of grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950.

8780.—Electricity Charges: Clr. Carty stated that since the issue of letter 14/1/52 by the Mayor of Limerick, a Conference had been held with the Electricity Supply Board and certain concessions had been obtained. It was decided that no further action in connection with this matter is necessary at present.

8781.—Reconstruction of County Roads: The County Engineer's report showing his proposals for the 5-year plan for reconstruction of county roads and setting out a total mileage of 226.1 miles be rolled was submitted. It was decided that consideration of this matter be referred to the Roads Committee.

8782.—Housing Committee: The Minutes of meeting of the Housing Committee held on the 21/6/1952 were submitted. In regard to the issue of grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, Clr. Carty stated that it is desirable that a statement be issued that the Council cannot proceed with the payment of grants until such time as the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952, will come into operation.

The recommendation of the Committee that the minimum rent for differential rent schemes to be 7/6 per week and that for future lettings of new cottages in rural areas, the rent be increased from 5/- to 6/- per week was submitted. It was proposed by Clr. Ruane, seconded by Clr. It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. A vote resulted as follows:

8783.—Western Health Institutions' Committee: Letter F.1/209 of the 30/6/52 from the Department of Health was submitted enclosing a copy of the Western Health Institution's Committee Order, 1952, which requires that two representatives of the Galway County Council on that Committee be appointed. It was decided that this matter be put on the Agenda for consideration at the next meeting of the Council.

8784.—Ardrahan Dispensary Residence: The Secretary stated that the site of Ardrahan dispensary residence was held by the Council under a lease from Mr. Shawe Taylor which has now expired; that the premises are now being offered by the owner to the Council in fee simple for the sum of £500 and that acceptance of this offer is recommended by the County Solicitor. On the proposition of Clr. Lahiffe, seconded by Clr. Nicholson, the Council approved the acquisition of these premises for £500 plus cost of conveyance.

8785.—An Tostal: Letter 30/6/'52 from the Town Clerk Galway, was submitted and noted stating that a meeting will be held in the Chamber of Commerce, Galway, at 8 p.m. on Monday, 7th July, 1952, to discuss arrangements for Galway's contribution to An Tostal—the Irish Festival proposed for April 1953.

8786.—Rate Collectors, etc.: Clr. Flaherty withdrew his Notice of Motion in regard to the retention of out-going rate collectors.

787 The County Engineer stated, in reply to Clr. Flaherty's Notice of Motion, that the steam rolling of the Clonberne-Moylough road will start soon.

Clr. Nestor recommended that the road from Moylough to the Mayo border be steam-rolled; this recommendation was referred to the Roads Committee.

Clr. Carty requested that consideration of the provision of the new road to Terryland be also placed on the Agenda for the Roads Committee Meeting.

8788.—Cottages at Oranmore and Kinvara and Oughterard: In reply to Clr. Lahiffe's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer stated that he expected that the new cottages at Oranmore would be available in approximately nine months time.

In regard to the cottages at Kinvara, the Secretary stated that six of the applicants in this area are in the Tooreen-Ballinderreen district and that the County Engineer is having the applicants and land owners in the district interviewed with a view to getting sites

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by agreement; that it appears that a site for erection of the remaining cottages will have to be acquired compulsorily.

In reply to Clr. Joyce's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer stated that it is expected that the advertisement inviting tenders for Oughterard cottages will be issued within one month.

Clr. Furey stated that a cottage in Tuam has been vacant for nine months; that he understands that the tenant is absent in Dublin.

8789.—Water, Sewerage, etc., in Loughrea: In reply to Clr. Carty's Notice of Motion, that the water supply be extended to the junction of Raruddy Road and Athenry Road, Loughrea, the County Engineer stated that he proposes to provide a fountain at the end of the existing main which will be reasonably convenient to the cottages. The Council approved this proposal.

The County Engineer stated that he is arranging to deal with Mr. Carty's proposals regarding the stream from Loughrea Sewerage Works; the river from Tobartee and the part of the Yellow Bog river as portion of the Dunkellin Drainage District maintenance for the current year.

In reply to Clr. Carty's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that the County Engineer is preparing plans for the extension of the sewerage scheme at Cosmona, Loughrea; that no previous application had been received for extension of the sewerage to the Hill, Loughrea.

Consideration of Clr. Carty's Notice of Motion in regard to another housing scheme for Loughrea town was, at his request, deferred.

The County Engineer stated that he has included in his proposals under the 5-year plan the steam-rolling of the road from Loughrea to Ballymana Chapel.

8790.—Auditor's Reports and Statements of Accounts:

Sympathy: The Chairman notified the members of the death of Mr. F. Forde, retired Clerical Officer, and paid tribute to his service under the Board of Health, and the Galway County Council. Sympathy was moted with his relatives.

Road Workers' Wages: Arising out of the application for an increase of 12/6d per wook, Mr. Sirr proposed that the labourer's wage be increased to £4. 0.0. per week. Mr. Helchan suggested that any increase granted be limited to married men only. Mr. Glynn asked that priority in employment be given to married men. Miss Ashe commented on the number of engineers and supervisory sta ff employed. Mr. Mannion stated that as the wages of forestry workers were based on County Council's labourers rates, workers in Mayo wore paid more than in Galway. Mr. King asked if there were any statistics available showing the numbers of labourors and supervisory staff employed and the output per man. Mr. O'Toole suggested that all road works be suspended during the month of March thus releasing labour for the farmers' requirements. Mr. Carty considered that the increased Read Grants allocated by the Government for 1952/53 should be applied for the provision of increased wages for the workers. Mr. Galvin said than an increase of 8/- per week should be granted within the current year's estimate. Mr. Wall suggested that any increase granted should be a percentage one based on output. Mr. Collins contended that the wage increase was necessary because of the increased cost of living. Mr. Kitt advocated such an increase as would give the road labourer a net wage of £4. per week after deduction of insurance and superannuation contributions. If . Higgins stated that as the insurance deductions were for the workers' own benefit he would favour a gross wage of £4. per week, because the workers' contentment was necessary to obtain maximum Production. Mr. O'Dowd criticised the treatment meted out to read and farm labourers in the past. Messrs. Fury and Mester said that the interests of the ratepayors would have to be considered. The Chairman stressed that it would be unfair to burden next year's Estimates of Expenses by carrying forward the cost of the increase. Messrs. Ruane, Micholson, Killilea and Cunningham also

After hearing the County Manager's views on the matter it was unanimously resolved "That the Committee recommend the following weekly wage increases -Labourers 8/-; Gangers 7/-; Foremon 6/-; Overseers 5/- to be payable from the beginning of the first pay period after receipt of sanction from the Minister for Local Government, and that over expenditure amounting to one half of the cost be allowed on the current year's Roads Estimate. The County Engineer advised the meeting that the approximate annual cost of the proposed increases would be £40,000.

Church Holydays: Mr. King proposed and Mr. O'Donnell seconded that road workers be paid for Church Holydays. A discussion ensued but no decision was made.

Terryland Road: The County Engineer told Miss Ashe that the delay was due to the fact that the land had to be acquired.

Doon Cometary Road: The County Engineer's report on Clr. O'Dowd's notice of motion having been read, the Chairman suggested that provision be made for this work in next years estimates to which Clr. O'Dowd agreed.

Employment of Road Workers: (a) Clr. O'Dowd, speaking on his notice of motion, said that seasonal employment only acted as an incentive to workers to leave the employment of the County Council entirely. The County Engineer stated that the laying off of machinery would be a costly proposal as the greater the use, the cheaper the charges.

(b) Clr. Lahiffe speaking on his notice of motion mentioned a recent news item in the "Connacht Tribune" The County Engineer stated that works were now in progress in the Lough Cutra and Kinvara areas which would absorb all available labour.

Road from Moylough to Mayo Border - Steamrolling; The County Engineer told Mr. Nestor that the estimated cost of this work was between £6,000 and £7,000 and that it was hoped to commence it shortly.

Reconstruction of County Roads - 5 year Plan: The unfavourable condition of the Road from Garbally Cross to Skehannagh was commented on and the County Engineer promised to look into it.

The County Engineer's report showing his proposals for the 5 year plan for reconstruction of county roads to a total miliage of 226.1 miles having been circulated, was submitted. He estimated that the complete work would cost £542,000. After a discussion it was decided on Mr. Killilea's suggestion that details of the cost of a long term loan to finance the reconditioning and resurfacing of the County roads be submitted to the next meeting of the Roads Committee.

8798.—Minutes: Minutes of previous meetings to 8797, having been circulated to the members were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

Arising from the Minutes Clr. Carty was informed by Mr. Collins, C.A.C.E., of the correspondence with the Office of Public Works in regard to the embankment, etc., adjoining the proposed road at Terryland; that negotiations for acquisition of the land have been in progress and that arrangements have been made for compulsory acquisition of this land if necessary.

Clr. Ashe asked for an explanation of the delay in proceeding with the water and sewerage extension schemes which had been approved by the Council several months ago. The Secretary stated that drawings and specifications of these works had been requested from the County Engineer and are still awaited; that it was intended to raise a loan for these works but it was considered, however, that some of the smaller jobs could be done from Revenue Account; the County Engineer's report in regard to these revenue jobs is also being awaited. Mr. Collins, C.A.C.E., stated that he expected to be able to proceed with the work at Moycullen within a short time.

Clr. Cunningham requested that the Kilkerrin Water Supply Scheme be expedited.

8799.—Tuam Home: Arising out of the Minutes for the Visiting Committee, the Secretary stated that the sanction of the Department of Health had not yet been obtained to the improvement scheme for Tuam Home for which sanction had been sought some months ago. On the suggestion of Clr. King, it was agreed that the Department of Health be informed that the Council desire that sanction to this work be issued immediately as there is an urgent necessity for the carrying out of the work. It was also arranged that the effect of the increase in food prices since July 1952, on the capitation rates for Tuam Home be investigated.

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8800.—County Galway Committee of Agriculture: It was proposed by Clr. Ruane and seconded by Clr. Carty, "that Mr. Martin Dolphin, Ballydavid, Loughrea, be appointed a member of the Galway County Committee of Agriculture to fill the vacancy created by the death of Mr. Pat Lambert."

It was proposed by Clr. Nicholson and seconded by Clr. Kitt, "that Rev. Brother Murdoch Walkin, Superior, Agricultural College, Mountbellew, be appointed a member of the County Galway Com-

mittee of Agriculture to replace Rev. Brother Eugenius."

It was proposed by Clr. Flaherty, and seconded by Clr. Collins, "that Mr. John Houlihan, Co.C., be appointed a member of the Galway County Committee of Agriculture to fill one of the abovementioned vacancies.

At Clr. Houlihan's request Clr. Flaherty's proposal was withdrawn, and as there was no other proposals the Chairman declared Mr. Martin Dolphin and Rev. Brother Murdoch Walkin elected members of the Galway County Committee of Agriculture.

8801.—Western Health Institutions Committee: Letter F.1/209 of 30/6/'52 from the Department of Health was submitted requesting that the Council would appoint two members on the Joint Committee for the Western Health Institutions.

It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Ruane, and Resolved "that Clr. M. Quinn be appointed a member of the Western Health Institutions' Joint Committee."

For the second vacancy, the appointment of Clr. M. Carty was proposed by Clrs. Kitt and Higgins.

The appointment of Clr. Shields was proposed by Clrs. Flaherty and Cawley.

The appointment of Clr. Ashe was proposed by Clr. Collins and Clr. Sirr. At Clr. Ashe's request her nomination of this vacancy was withdrawn.

8802.—Lettermore O.A.P. Sub-Committee: Letter 19/8/52 from the Clerk to the Lettermore O.A.P. Sub-Committee was submitted stating that owing to failure of the members appointed to attend meetings, it is difficult to obtain a quorum and suggesting the appointment of certain members.

It was proposed by Clr. O'Donnell, seconded by Clr. Geoghegan,

and Resolved, that the following be appointed members of the Lettermore O.A.P. Sub-Committee:

JOHN McDONAGH, Aibhineen, Bealadangan; DARBY NESTOR, Bealadangan. MICHAEL FLAHERTY (Dan), Cullane, Carraroe; JOE McDONAGH, Lettermore;

Clr. Nestor stated that it is almost impossible to have a quorum at meetings of the Dunmore O.A.P. Sub-Committee. It was decided that this matter would be pursued by the Secretary.

8803 .- Overdraft: The Secretary stated that the overdraft required for the quarter ending 31/12/'52 would amount, at the maximum period, to £300,000. It was pointed out that the debit balance has been increasing steadily and that the reasons for the large overdraft in the coming quarter are: (a) the increase in expenditure in the current year as compared with previous years; (b) the closing down of the Turf Account and its transfer to General Account; (c) the fact that money has to be advanced to the Mental Hospital Board before it normally falls due; (d) the authorization of certain items, such as, increase in road workers wages for which provision had not been made in the annual estimate. It was proposed by Clr. Glynn, seconded by Clr. Geoghegan, and Resolved, "that the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation, not exceeding £300,000 on General Account for the quarter ending 31/12/'52. Clrs' Collins and Cawley suggested that the Departments concerned be asked to expedite the payment of grants and that they also be requested to state if the interest on any over-draft which is attributable to the delay in payment of grants will be recouped to the Council.

8804.—Galway Regional Hospital Site: Notice dated 12/8/'52 in regard to the transfer of land near the Fever Hospital to the Galway Corporation was submitted; copies having already been circulated to the Council on 12/5/'52. It was proposed by Clr. Kitt, seconded by Clr. Carty, and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the transfer to the Galway Corporation of a plot of land situated W.N.W. of the Galway Fever Hospital; area—24.8 sq. perches—as part payment for a plot; area—4.87 acres which is being acquired from the Galway Corporation as part of the site of Galway Regional Hospital.

8805.—Woodlands Sanatorium: Notice dated 19/8/52 in regard to the transfer of Woodlands Sanatorium to the Western Health Institutions Committee was submitted; copies of the Notice having been forwarded to each member on the 19th ultimo. It was proposed by Clr. Collins, seconded by Clr. Nestor and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the transfer of

Woodlands Sanatorium with 17 acres 2 perches of land attached thereto to the Western Health Institutions Committee on the following terms:

1. The allocation by the new Western Health Institutions Committee of 188 beds for the accommodation of the patients at present accommodated in Woodlands Sanatorium and thereafter an allocation of 160 beds together with a proportion of the remainder of the beds in the Regional Health Institution as shall be determined by the Minister according to the requirements of each of the Counties of Roscommon, Leitrim, Sligo, Mayo and Galway, and a further allocation of a minimum of 30 beds in the Orthopaedic Hospital to be established in Woodlands Sanatorium.

2. The maintenance of the buildings including furniture, fittings and appliances and the walls of Woodlands Sanatorium by the Regional Health Institution's Committee.

3. The payment by the Regional Health Institution's Committee of all rates taxes and other outgoings payable in respect of Woodlands Sanatorium.

4. The payment by the Regional Health Institution's Committee of all monies to be expended in the maintenance, running costs and equipment of Woodlands Sanatorium, including salaries and wages of Medical staff and employees.

5. The recoupment of the Galway County Council by the Regional Health Institution's Committee of all loan repayment charges (including principal and interest) which the Galway County Council are, or may at any future date become liable to pay in respect of Woodlands Sanatorium.

6. The insuring of Woodlands Sanatorium, including all furniture, fittings and equipment therein, against loss or damage by fire in the sum of £105.680.

In reply to Clr. Ashe the Secretary explained that Woodlands Sanatorium has now passed out of the Council's control and that, therefore, our Visiting Committee would not be entitled to visit Woodlands Sanatorium. It was decided that the representatives on the Western Health Institutions' Committee would pursue any complaints in regard to visiting hours, etc., at the Sanatorium.

Clr. Ashe complained that the Council's officials from the highest to the lowest have no respect for the Councillors. The Secretary stated that his staff and he have always endeavoured to be attentive and courteous in any dealings which they may have with Councillors or anybody; that if there is an allegation of discourtesy, the name of the officer concerned should be stated rather than that there should be a vague allegation against everybody.

Clr. Cawley stated that he believed the Sanatorium is the Institution concerned. The matter was not pursued further.

8806.—Road Workers' Wages: The recommendation of the Roads Committee at a meeting held on the 12/7/52 was submitted and approved, viz., that the following increases be granted to the Council's road workers in the County Health District with effect from the start of the pay period next after the date of receipt of sanction:

Labourers and Carters 8/- per week
Gangers 7/- "
Foremen 6/- "
Overseers 5/-"

The Secretary was directed to inform the Federation of Rural Workers that it is the intention of the Council that the increase granted to labourers shall also be granted to carters in the County Health District.

8807.—County Roads—5-Year Plan: The recommendation of the Roads Committee at meeting on the 12/7/52 that a loan of £542,000 be raised to meet the cost of the County Engineer's 5-year plan for improvement of county roads was submitted. The County Engineer's letter of 22/8/52 stating that unless the work were done by contract, he did not consider he would be able to deal with it was also submitted. In the absence of the County Engineer on leave, it was decided to adjourn consideration of this item until next meeting of the Council.

8808.—Scheme for Scholarships in Secondary & Vocational Schools: The Scheme as recommended by the Education Committee was submitted and it was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Ashe and Resolved: "that a scheme for scholarships in Secondary and Vocational Schools for 1953 similar to the scheme for 1952, subject to the amendments set out hereunder, be submitted for the approval of the Minister for Education: the deletion of clause IV (2) of the scheme and the substitution therefor of the following: "For the purpose of reckoning total income, in cases where the parents or guardians of the candidate occupy land, £1, Poor Law Valuation of land shall be deemed equivalent to an annual income of £8, and that the last date for receipt of completed application forms be the 8th January, 1953."

Since the applications must be forwarded to the Department of Education by the 1st February, 1953, it was arranged that the acceptance of any application will be provisional only until such time as the applications will have been considered by a meeting of the Education Committee.

8809.—University Scholarship Scheme, 1953: The recommendation of the Education Committee at meeting on the 17th July, 1952, was submitted. It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Ashe, and Resolved: "that a scheme for University Scholar-

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ships for 1953 similar to the scheme for 1952 be adopted subject to the deletion of Clause IV (2) (11) of the latter and the substitution therefor of the following: "For the purpose of reckoning total income, in cases where the parents or guardians of the candidate occupy land, £1, Poor Law Valuation shall be deemed to be equivalent to an annual income of £8. Allowances paid under the Children's Allowances Act, 1944, shall not be regarded as income for the purpose of this Scheme."

Clr. Carty pointed out that students pursuing a course leading to the Degree B.E. (Mechanical) or B.E. (Electrical) can do only one year of this course at University College, Galway, and must attend University College, Dublin, for the remainder of the course. It was decided that provision for such candidates would be made in the scheme for 1953.

Letter 14/7/52 from Mr. P. K. Hanly, 8, Shantalla Place, was submitted and on the proposition of Clr. Ashe, seconded by Clr. Nestor, it was agreed to extend Mr. Hanly's University Scholarship of £30 for one further and final year, viz., year 1952/53.

Letter 22/8/52 from Miss Patricia Hanniffy, Creagh, Ballinasloe, was submitted. Miss Hanniffy had been awarded a scholarship of £120 a year in 1948l. This scholarship, tenable for a period of four years, has now expired and Miss Hanniffy who is pursuing a medical course requested that it would be extended for another year. On the proposition of Clr. Quinn, seconded by Clr. Carty, it was decided to extend Miss Hanniffy's scholarship for one further year, viz., 1952/53.

8810.—Loughrea Tolls and Fairgreen: File of correspondence in connection with the proposal to purchase the tolls, fairgreen and relative properties at Loughrea from Mr. Brian Ryan for £4,250 was submitted. On the proposition of Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Ruane, the Council approved the proposal to purchase the tolls, fairgreen and relative properties at Loughrea for £4,250 plus costs of conveyance and recommended that the fairgreen; when acquired, be improved and that pens be provided thereon. The Council also expressed the opinion that the charging of tolls should be continued.

### Councillor Carty now took the Chair.

8811.—Extern Hospitals: It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Galvin, and Resolved; "that the Council hereby approve payment of the increased charges for maintenance and treatment of patients in Extern Hospitals including Portiuncula Hospital, viz., at rate of £5 5s. 0d. per week with effect from 1st January, 1952. Clr. Carty expressed the view that having regard to the number of patients in Portiuncula Hospital for whose maintenance and treatment the Galway County Council pay, there should

be some arrangement for visiting of the hospital by the Council's Visiting Committee.

8812.—Loan for New Inn Vocational School: It was pro-

posed by Clr. M. Kitt, seconded by Clr. J. O'Dowd, and Resolved: "that our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of £2,863 proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Vocational Education Acts, 1930 to 1947.

8813.—Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952: The Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952, was submitted together with the accompanying Circular from the Department of Local Government dated 12th August, 1952 (H.9/52), copies of the latter Circular having been circulated to members of the Council.

It was proposed by Clr. Galvin, seconded by Clr. Sirr and Resolved: "that the Council proceed in accordance with the authority given by the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952, i.e., that grants in accordance with the Council's Scheme under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, be paid to qualified applicants whose applications were received and the erection of whose houses commenced before the 29th April, 1952, and that grants in accordance with Sections 9, 10 and 11 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952, be paid to qualified applicants, the erection of whose houses commenced on or after the 29th April, 1952.

Clr. Kitt gave notice of motion of his intention to propose that grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952,

be made available by the Council.

8814.—Supervising Health Inspector: On the proposition of Clr. Joyce, seconded by Clr. Cawley, the Council unanimously approved the revised scale for the post of Supervising Health Inspector, viz., £600 x £20 to £700 a year inclusive of temporary

8815,-Health Services: Letter 29th July, 1952, and White Paper relating to the Government's proposals for improved and extended health services were submitted together with a copy of the Secretary's letter of 2nd August, 1952, conveying to the Department of Health the County Manager's observations on the White Paper. MINUTES OF FIRST MEETING OF THE COUNTY FIRE SERVICE ADVISORY COMMITTEE HEID AT THE COUNTY BUILDINGS? GALWAY ON MONDAY - 15th SEPTEMBER, 1952.

### PRESENT.

Galway County Council:-Councillors Quinn, Ashe, Ruane and Higgins.

Galway Corporation.
Aldermen Lydon (Mayor), O'Flaherty and Owens.

Ballinasloe Urban District Council. Councillor Lynch.

Loughrea Town Commissioners. Mr. M. Carty.

Tuam Town Commissioners. Mr. J.A. O'Connell.

Mr. P.B. Sugrue, Chief Officer, County Fire Service was also in attendance. Mr. K. Doyle, Staff Officer, acted as Secretary to the Committee.

### CHAIRMAN.

It was proposed by Clr. Ashe, seconded by Mr. O'Connell and unanimously resolved that Mr. Quinn be appointed Chairman of the Committee.

### 2. GALWAY FIRE STATION.

Alderman O'Flaherty enquired what was the position in connection with the provision of a Fire Station for Galway. The Secretary informed him that Plans for the Station had been approved by the Department and that it was expected that advertisements would be issued inviting Tenders within a month.

Clr. Abhe suggested that an effort should be made to provide more than three dwelling-houses with the Fire Station for members of the Fire Brigade.

### 3. COMMUNICATIONS.

Clr. Higgins asked what was the position in relation to the availability of the telephone service from Post Offices and Garda Barracks in rural areas for reporting fires at night. It was proposed by him, seconded by Alderman O'Flaherty and unanimously resolved that enquiries be made from the Garda Authorities to ascertain their responsibility in the matter of reporting fires and to ascertain also from them and from the Post Office Authorities what facilities could be made available for reporting Fires at night in rural areas.

### 4. ALARMS.

It was proposed by Alderman Lydon, seconded by Clr. Ashe and unanimously resolved that tests be carried out periodically without advance notice to the Fire Brigade concerned in order to ascertain the time taken to mobilize the Brigades on receipt of a call, to test the engines and hydrants and the general efficiency of the Fire Brigade.

## 5. COMPETITIONS.

Mr. Sugrue informed the Committee that the County Manager, with a view to stimulating interest in fire-fighting and promoting the efficiency of the Fire Brigades was in communication with the Insurance Companies Standing Committee with a view to arganizing competitions for which the Insurance Companies concerned and possibly other local Firms would be requested to give prizes. The Committee agreed with this proposal.

## 6. BALLINASLOE FIRE STATION.

In reply to Clr. Lynch who asked what was being done to provide a Fire Station for Ballinasloe, Mr. Sugrue stated that Mr.P.J.Sheahan, Architect, had been requested to prepare Plans and that details of the accommodation requered

6. in the Fire Station has been supplied to him.

### 7. ATHENRY FIRE STATION.

Clr. Ruane enquired if it was intended providing a Fire Station in Athenry. Mr. Sugrue stated that enquiries are being made with a view to selecting a suitable site and that it was proposed building a small Fire Station and lecture room in Athenry.

### 8. FINANCES.

Clr. Quinn enquired how the costs of Firefighting are being apportioned over the County. The Secretary gave a summary of the contents of Agreements between Galway County Council and Corporation of Galway and the Urban District Council of Ballinasloe, stating that since the 1st April 1950 the cost of Firefighting in the County was treated as if it were a County at large charge and that the cost of the Fire Service is borne by the three authorities concerned in proportion to the P.L.V. of the districts concerned. He also stated that the amount provided in the Estimates for the current year for the County Health district is approximately £6,900.

In reply to Alderman Owens, the Secretary said that the Agreement between Galway Corporation and the County Council could be terminated and that in those circumstances the equipment taken over from the Corporation on the 1st April 1950 would be handed back and that compensation would be paid to the Corporation for any damage done to the equipment other than for ordinary Wear and Tear. If it was decided to terminate the Agreement after ten years, the Corporation would become liable for payment of the Loan Charges on the Fire Station.

### 9. STATE GRANTS.

In reply to a query by Clr. Quinn, the Secretary stated that State Grants are not available towards the cost of provision of Fire Stations or equipment. It was proposed by Clr. Quinn, seconded by Mr. O'Connell and unanimously resolved that delegates to the forthcoming Municipal Congress at Fermoy, raise the question of State Grants for firefighting at the Congress with a view to approaching the Minister for Local Government to request that State Grants be made available towards the cost of buildings and appliances and that the County Council's delegates to the County Council General Council also be requested to have the matter discussed at the next meeting.

Members expressed the opinion that Fire Insurance Companies should also be requested to contribute towards the cost of firefighting.

### 10. MOBILE TANKER.

It was proposed by Mr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Lynch and unanimously resolved that the Committee recommend the purchase of a Mobile Tanker which will carry water for firefighting in outlying areas where a proper water supply is not available for the purpose.

### 11. EQUIPMENT.

Clr. Ruane stated that unauthorized persons have access to firefighting equipment in Athenry and Clr. Quinn stated that similar conditions apply in Ballinasloe. Mr. Sugrue explained that the Fire Stations in those places were rented and were not the property of the Galway County Council but that no damage was being caused to equipment.

Clr. Ruane stated that the Athenry Fire Brigade required a ladder, hatchets and four lengths of hose. He stated that the extra hose was required owing to the inadequacy of the water supply in the town and that it may sometime be necessary to get water from an alternative source. Mr. Sugrue informed him that a ladder for the Athenry Fire Brigade was now on hands and would be delivered soon. He stated that he would examine the position in relation to the supply of extra hose.

Clr. Quinn urged the Chief Fire Officer to ensure that everything possible is done to provide for proper care of equipment and to prevent any avoidable deterioration.

### 12. INSPECTION OF BUILDINGS.

Alderman Lydon enquired if any steps were being taken to inspect public buildings, schools, etc. with a view to reducing the danger of fire and to ensuring that adequate means of escape are available in case of fire. Mr. Carty stated that

12. The Childrens' Home in Tuam is a fire trap and that St. Brendan's Home, Loughrea, is also dangerous.

Mr. Sugrue informed the Committee that a general inspection of all public buildings, including schools, hotels, orphanages and other institutions is preceeding and that he is in communication with some of the owners of those buildings in connection with certain improvements which are required. He also stated that Dance Halls are inspected once yearly and that the question of improvements to be carried out in the Childrens! Home in Tuam is being referred to an Architect.

# 13. ELIGIBILITY OF A MEMBER OF LOUGHREA TOWN COMMISSIONERS TO ACT ON THE COUNTY FIRE SERVICE ADVISORY COMMITTEE.

Mr. Carty requested that the County Manager be asked to decide if a member of Loughrea Town Commissioners in receipt of remuneration as a Fireman, could berve on the County Fire Service Advisory Committee.

### 14. DATES OF MEETINGS.

In reply to a query by Alderman O'Flaherty, the Chairman said he considered that a Meeting of the Fire Service Advisory Committee should be held once every three months.

### 15. GENERAL.

Mr. O'Connell asked Mr. Sugrue what steps are taken on an outbreak of fire to ensure that a proper water supply is available. Mr. Sugrue stated that wherever it can be arranged, the Waterworks Caretaker is also a member of the Fire Brigade and on the outbreak of fire he is contacted immediately.

He stated that in Galway when a fire is reported the Station Officer at the Fire Brigade immediately rings the waterworks department to request an increase in the pressure in the area of the town concerned. In reply to a query by Alderman O'Flaherty, Mr. Sugrue stated that the maximum output of water from the mains in Galway is approximately 200galls. per min. and that the large fire pump has a capacity of 700galls.per min. For this reason it is often necessary to lay a hose line from the river. He further stated that the ball hydrants which are in use in Galway are not very satisfactory and that valve hydrants would give an output of approximately 450 galls. per min.

In reply to Clr. Lynch, Mr. Sugrue stated that the Military Fire Brigade in Galway will attend fires if called but that their equipment was not very suitable for firefighting in towns.

Mr. O'Connell complained that there is still a scarcety of water in some streets in Tuam. The Secretary informed him that there was considerable wastage of water in Tuam and that an Inspector is being appointed to examine the water supply system.

Clr. Lynch enquired if consideration had been given to advisability of providing Chemical Apparatus for extinguishing fires. Mr. Sugrue informed him that a Foam Branch Extinguisher is available, that this is used for oil fires and that water is generally more satisfactory for extinguishing fires in buildings.

It was proposed by Mr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Ruane and unanimously resolved that the Chief Officer, County Fire Service, be congratulated on the comprehensive report prepared by him off the fire-fighting services in the County.

8875—Adjournment: It was proposed by the Chairman, seconded by Clr. King and Resolved: "that the meeting be adjourned for a half-an-hour as a mark of respect to the late Mr. John McKeigue, former County Councillor.

Votes of sympathy were also unanimously adopted with the King Family, Clifden, on the death of Mrs. King; with Mrs. Lougheed, College Road, Galway, on the death of her husband; the widow of Ml. Hough, P.C., Eyrecourt; to Dr. J. J. Waters, Eyre Square, Galway, on the death of his son; and Mr. Fallon, Newcastle, Galway, on the death of his wife.

The meeting was then adjourned until 1 p.m.

8876—Minutes: On the resumption of the meeting, the Minutes of the previous meeting to No. 8874, having been circulated to the Council, were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

8877—Cardinal: The Chairman proposed, Clr. Nestor seconded and it was unanimously Resolved: "that the Galway County Council congratulate His Grace, Most Rev. Dr. Dalton, Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of all Ireland, on his elevation to the Sacred College of Cardinals.

8878—Milltown Water Supply: Rev. Fr. Jennings, on behalf of a deputation from Milltown, addressed the Council on the necessity for the provision of a piped water supply for Milltown. Fr. Jennings's appeal was supported by Clrs. Flaherty, Nestor, Sirr, Killilea, Nicholson, Cunningham, Kitt and Wall. The Chairman pointed out that in the priority list of water supply schemes Milltown supply is No. 26 and stated that while he would support the application for the supply, it must be made clear to the Deputation that Milltown would have to await its turn in the priority list.

8879—County Committee of Agriculture: Letter 20/11/52 from the Secretary, County Galway Committee of Agriculture, was submitted stating that the Committee's requirements for the year ending 31/3/54 would be the equivalent of a rate

of  $5\frac{1}{2}$ d. in the £—the same as in the surrent year. It was proposed by Clr. Lahiff, seconded by Clr. O'Dowd and Resolved: "that provision be made in the Council's Estimate for the produce of a rate of  $5\frac{1}{2}$ d. in the £ to meet the demand of the County Galway Committee of Agriculture for the year ending 31/3/54."

8880—Loan for Dunmore Vocational School: It was proposed by Clr. R. Lahiff, seconded by Clr. T. King, and Resolved: "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Fifteen Thousand Five Hundred Pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Vocational Education Acts, 1930 to 1947."

8881—Loan for Kiltormer Dispensary and Residence: It was proposed by Clr. J. O'Dowd, seconded by Clr. P. T. Galvin, and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £4,550 from the Commissioners of Public Works for provision of a dispensary and dispensary residence at Kiltormer; the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of 25 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council."

8882—Loan for Issue of Housing Grants: It was proposed by Clr. R. Lahiffe, seconded by Clr. T. King and Resolved: "That pursuant to the Letter of Sanction of the Local Government Minister dated the 11th day of November, 1952, the sum of £50,000 be borrowed from The National Bank Limited, Galway, for the purpose of making Grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, said sum to be repaid within Fifteen Years with interest at the appropriate rate charged by the Bank from time to time for such advances as in said Letter of Sanction provided, the said loan and all interest thereon to be secured by a Mortgage over the Rates AND that the Seal of the Galway County Council be affixed to the said Mortgage to The National Bank Limited."

It was proposed by Deputy M. Killilea seconded by Clr. P. Sirr and Resolved: "that the Council approve the raising of a further loan of £13,000 to meet the balance of the Council's commitments for issue of grants under Section 7 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1950, to persons not eligible for housing by the Council under the Labourers Acts or under the Housing of the Working Classes Acts—the loan to be raised from such source and to be repayable for such period as may be sanctioned by the Minister for Local Government."

8883—Housing Grants—Miscellaneous: Clr. Sirr stated that

applicants for County Council housing grants were being circularised by Councillors informing them that grants had been allocated to them. Clr. Sirr considered this practice objectionable as it appeared to him to be an attempt to solicit votes. Clr. Sirr proposed that lists of the proposed allocations of housing grants be not circulated to the Councillors until notice of the proposed allocations would be published in the Press.

A lively discussion ensued. It was pointed out by the Chairman that the Council could not exercise control over the actions of any individual Councillor outside the Council Chamber.

Deputy Mannion stated that in some cases an 80% grant had been allocated and on inquiry in the Council's office, he ascertained that a 100% grant should have been allocated in these cases. The County Manager stated that if particulars of any such case were supplied to him, he would investigate the complaint.

8884—Tourist Road Scheme: Letter IR/244 of the 27/11/52 from the Department of Local Government was submitted and it was arranged that in due course the County Engineer's list of proposals in connection with the improvement of tourist roads would be placed before the Council.

It was noted that it is intended that the scheme will be spread over a period of 8 years and that proposals are sought for works to a value of approximately £50,000 for the year 1953/54.

8885-Improvement of Health Services: The County Manager's report on the Conference in connection with the proposals for the improvement and extension of health services which was held in Sligo on 24/11/52 was submitted. Clr. Sirr asked who authorised the attendance of the Council's representatives at Sligo for this Conference and how the figure of 2/- in the £ on the rates, stated to be the additional cost of these health services, was reckoned. The Chairman explained that the representatives who attended the Conference were nominated by him; that consideration of the proposals was at the last meeting adjourned by the Council pending the receipt of further information in regard to the financial implications of the White Paper; that the Conference at Sligo was held with a view to furnishing this information in so far as it was available. The Chairman considered that if the additional benefits could be obtained for an additional 2/- in the £ on the rates, he would be prepared to recommend the scheme to the Council, but he repeated what he had stated at the Conference that it did not appear to him that these addional benefits could be provided for 2/- in the £.

Clr. Ashe endorsed the Chairman's statements. Clr. Nestor stated that at the Conference he had opposed the proposals on the ground that their cost would be beyond the capacity of the ratepayers of County Galway.

Deputy Cawley considered that 2/- in the £ would be a heavy burden on the ratepayers; that furthermore there was no guarantee that the cost would not exceed 2/- in the £. Clr. Wall stated that the proposals would prove far too

costly and that it would be wise to postpone the scheme.

Clr. Flaherty stated that he would oppose any such scheme as the health of the people is well provided for already.

Deputy Mannion objected to the proposals to give full

health services to those who could afford to pay for them. Finally, on the proposition of Clr. Kng, seconded by Clr. Kitt, the Council approved the attendance of the delegates at the Conference in Sligo on the 24th November, 1952, and noted the contents of the County Manager's report on that Conference.

8886—Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme: Correspondence in connection with an application for an increase in the wages of labourers employed by the contractors on the Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme was submitted showing that the contractors stated that their tender was based on a wage rate of 1/8¾d, per hour for labourers; that it was not found possible to obtain any labourers at this rate of wages and that after negotations agreement was reached on a wage of 1/10d, per hour; that the labourers have now demanded 2/5d, an hour; i.e., a further increase of 7d. After a discussion, it was decided that the Council approve the wage rate of 1/10d, per hour for labourers employed by the contractors on the Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme, but the Council did not approve any increase in the labourers wages beyond the rate of 1/10d, per hour.

8887—Courthouse at Derrynea: Correspondence in connection with the proposal to provide a new Courthouse at Derrynea was submitted, and it was pointed out that while the Department of Justice stated that a new courthouse should be provided in Derrynea, the Council were of the opinion that it should be provided in Carraroe, as there would be little justification for incurring the cost of providing a new courthouse at Derrynea where it would be used only for the few Courts held there. It was proposed by Clr. Higgins and seconded by Clr. Geoghegan: "that the new Courthouse be provided at Carraroe."

It was proposed by Clr. Mylotte and seconded by Deputy Mannion "that the new Courthouse be provided in Derrynea." Clr. Joyce asked if suitable premises could be rented in Carraroe and the County Manager stated that he would make local inquiries as to the possibility of renting suitable premises in Carraroe. Further consideration of the matter was, therefore, adjourned.

8888—Dunmore O.A.P. Sub-Committee: The appointment of the following additional members was approved unanimously by the Council:

Mr. Thomas Walsh, Dunmore—proposed by Deputy Killilea. Mr. Martin Silke, Gurteen, Dunmore—proposed by Clr. Nestor.

8889—Dunmore Sanitary Accommodation: Correspondence in connection with the provision of sanitary accommodation at Dunmore was submitted, and as Clr. Nestor stated that he had discussed this matter already with the County Engineer, no further action was taken.

8890—Portnadoon Slipway: On the proposition of Clr. Higgins, seconded by Clr. Mylotte, it was Resolved: "that the Council approve an increase of £55 in the Council's contribution towards the cost of providing a slipway and clearing rock at Portnadoon, Gortnagopple, Inishmore.

8891—Rate Collector—No. 4 District: Letter 5/11/52 from the Department of Local Government was submitted refusing approval to the Council's further representations that the poundage of the Rate Collector for No. 4 district be increased Deputy Mannion stated that, apparently, the Minister had made up his mind on the matter, and that, therefore, there was no use in pursuing it further.

8892—Scheme of Polling Districts and Polling Places: List of proposed amendments in the Polling Scheme was submitted, and it was ordered that particulars of these proposals be circulated to each member of the Council before the next meeting. Deputy Cawley stated that the Rate Collectors should take more care in the compilation of the registers.

8893—Kylemore Bridge, Laurencetown: Letters from Coras lompair Eireann and Bord na Mona stating that these authorities would not be prepared to incur any expenditure on the improvement of Kylemore Bridge were submitted. Further consideration of this matter was adjourned on the request of Clr. O'Dowd who stated that he is taking the matter up with the Irish Land Commission.

8894—Galway Technical School: Letter 2/12/52 from the C.E.O., Town of Galway Vocational Education Committee was submitted giving particulars of the number of students (92) from outside the Galway Borough area who are attending the Galway Technical School this year.

It was ordered that this matter be referred to the County Vocational Education Committee for their consideration.

8895—Auditor's Reports: The Auditor's Reports for the year ending 31/3/52 were submitted and approved, viz:—
Loughs Corrib, Mask and Carra Joint Drainage Committee.
Lough Corrib Navigation Trustees.

8896—County Councils General Council: Letter 22/10/52 from the General Council in regard to valuation and Minutes of meeting of the General Council on the 7/8/1952 were submitted—copies having been already circulated to the members.

8897—County Council: The Secretary reported that Mr. John McElihiney had not attended any meeting of the Galway County Council since the 1st September, 1951; that as more than twelve months had elapsed since the 1st meeting after the 1st September, 1951, at which Mr. McElihiney was not present, he is now disqualified. On the proposition of Clr. M. Quinn seconded by Deputy M. Killilea it was Resolved: "that consequent on the absence of Mr. John McElihiney from meetings of the Galway County Council during the past twelve months, the Galway County Council declares that a vacancy now exists on the Council and directs that the appropriate notice be given of the existence of such vacancy."

The Declaration of Vacancy was signed by the Chairman, Clr. M. Quinn, Deputy M. Killilea and Clr. J. O'Dowd.

8898—Estimates Meeting for Roads and Sanitary Works: It was arranged that a meeting will be held on Saturday, the 10th January, 1953, at 12.30 p.m. to consider the estimate for the year ending 31/3/54 for road works and, if time permitted for sanitary works also.

8899—Relief Schemes in Loughrea: In the absence of Clr. Carty, his Notice of Motion (No.21 (r)) was moved by Clr. Lahiffe, and in reply, the County Engineer stated that the relief scheme for Loughrea at a cost of £210 had already started on the 2nd December, 1952; that reconstruction of the promenade at the County Home cannot be undertaken, as provision for this work has not been made in the current year's

estimate; that another small work, reconstruction of the streets, has also started recently in Loughrea.

8900—Road Widening: It was proposed by Clr. King and seconded by Deputy Killilea: "that the disused building at Quealy's Cross, Caherlistrane, be purchased by the Council and demolished." The County Engineer stated that the Council would be prepared to demolish the building and pay for any stones recovered from it for road works. Clr. King stated that the owner is now willing to have the place left surfaced roughly and requested that the County Engineer would get in touch with him again. The County Engineer stated that he would do this.

8901—Overdraft: It was proposed by Clr. Ashe seconded by Deputy Kililea and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the obtaining of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £300,000 on General Account for the quarter ending 31/3/1953."

that Mr. Eugene Hickey who had been acting as Clerk to the County Galway Local Old Age Pensions Committee would retire under the Age Limit Order on the 18th December, 1952. The appointment of Mr. A. J. Liston, Clerical Officer, as temporary Clerk to the County Galway Local Old Age Pensions Committee was proposed by Clr. Ashe. The appointment of Mr. David Egan, Clerical Officer, as temporary Clerk to the County Galway Local Old Age Pensions Committee was proposed by Clr. Collins and seconded by Clr. Flaherty.

Chr. Ashe withdrew her proposal and it was Resolved: "that Mr. David Egan, Clerical Officer in the Council's Offices, be appointed temporay Clerk to the County Galway Local Old Age Pensions Committee with salary of £19/2/0 a year, subject to sanction by the Minister for Social Welfare.

8903—Miscellaneous: The Chairman and County Manager expressed their appreciation of Mr. Eugene Hickey, Clerical Officer, who was retiring on reaching the age limit after almost 42 years service with the Galway County Council. Several members joined in paying tribute to Mr. Hickey and in expressing regret at his retirement.

The Chairman wished a happy Christmas to the members and to the Staff.

Consideration of items 21 and 22 on the Agenda excluding 21 (k), 21 (l), 21 (o) (ii) and 21 (r) was adjourned until the next meeting.

8908.—Road Works Estimate 1953/'54: The estimate of expenditure on Road Works for the year ending 31/3/'54 was submitted showing a total expenditure as follows:

MAIN ROADS COUNTY ROADS £147,708 GALWAY URBAN ROADS £8,250 £4,170 BALLINASLOE URBAN ROADS

£348,098

Clr. Nestor proposed that the Estimate as submitted be reduced by at least £35,000. Clr. Nestor also requested that particulars of the annual loan repayments by the Council for all purposes would be made available.

Clr. Carty and Deputy Cawley asked if an indication could be given of the amount of the estimated increase in the rate for all services for the coming financial year. The County Manager, in reply, stated that it is not possible to give an accurate estimate of the increase in the rate in the coming financial year as the figures for the estimate are only now being prepared; that from the information so far available it appeared that including the estimate for roads which has been submitted to the Council, the increase in the rate for the year ending 31/3/54 would be at least 5/- in the

Clr. Carty proposed that a reduction of £18,811 be made in the Roads Estimate so as to allow the same amount as was allowed for

Roads in the current year.

In reply to Cir. Collins, the County Engineer stated that the cost of the road diversion at Merlin Park is being met by road improvement grant. Cir. Collins asked if particulars could be supplied to the Council of the cost of supervision in relation to the actual cost of work done on Roads.

Clr. King considered that an increase on the current year's estimate of approximately £20,000 should be allowed so as to provide for the increase in wages which, in the current year, was granted from August 1952.

Deputy Cawley stated that the tourist road scheme grant should

not be spent exclusively in Connemara.

The Chairman informed the Council that an application had been received from the Federation of Rural Workers for an increase of £1 a week in the wages of road workers. The Chairman requested that the Council would decide:-

(a) whether an increase in road workers wages shall be allowed in the coming financial year and, if so, what provision should be made by the Council to meet such increase;

(b) whether provision should be made in the Roads Estimate for Councillors' proposals for new roads.

Clr. Carty proposed that no provision be made in the Estimate for Councillors' proposals for new roads.

Clr. King suggested that where a road has been improved out of public monies and is suitable, the Council should, if the occasion arose, consider the desirability of taking over the maintenance

Deputy Cawley supported Clr. King's suggestion and he referred particularly to a road at Greenwich, Craughwell, which connects with the Killeeneen Road. Deputy Cawley asked that this road be considered favourably and the County Engineer stated that he would inspect the road and furnish his report thereon.

Clr. Higgins supported Clr. King's suggestion. It was proposed by Clr. Collins and seconded by Clr. Flaherty that provision be made in the estimate for Councillors' Notices

Clr. Galvin supported Clr. Collins proposal and stated that the improvement of county and minor roads is more necessary than, for instance, the provision of footpaths in villages.

Clr. Carty suggested that the amounts included in the estimate for road improvements, viz.:-MAIN ROADS

COUNTY ROADS be struck out and that £15,000 be provided for Councillors' Notices.

The Chairman again asked for a definite decision in regard to

the application for an increase in wages and in regard to provision for Councillors' Notices of Motion.

Clr. Nestor stated that the Council should not consider any proposals for increases in the Estimate but should concentrate on reducing it.

It was proposed by Clr. Flaherty and seconded by Clr. Nicholson that no increase in road workers wages be allowed.

Clr. King proposed that the estimate, as submitted for Main and County Roads, be reduced as follows:—

MAIN ROADS reduced from £190,970 to £187,280; and COUNTY ROADS reduced from £147,708 to £140,240. As an amendment to Clr. Flaherty's proposal, it was proposed by Clr. Shields and seconded by Deputy Cawley that an increase of 10/- per week in road workers wages be allowed.

Cir. Lahiffe stated, he considered, that if the question could be discussed with the men concerned, they would be content with a smaller increase in wages or, perhaps, with no increase if they could be assured of permanent employment.

It was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Deputy Killilea that the following reductions be made in the amounts provided for improvements:

MAIN ROADS—reduction £13,720 COUNTY ROADS—reduction Clr. Sirr suggested that a reduction of £21,000 be made in the Estimate submitted.

Deputy Mannion proposed that the entire provision for Main Road Improvements should be cut out of the Estimate.

Clr. Shields proposed that the Estimate be reduced by £16,500 Finally, it was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Clr. Ruane: "That the Estimate, as submitted, be amended as follows :-

MAIN ROADS:

Maintenance to be reduced by £5,230 to £80,000 Surface-dressing ,, ,, £2,000 to £70,000 Improvements ,, ,, £13,720 to £10,000COUNTY ROADS:

Maintenance to be reduced by £2,968 to £110,000 Improvements ,, ,, £1,440 to £10,000 URBAN ROADS: The Estimate, as submitted, to be approved.

A show of hands was taken on the above proposal by Clr. Carty in so far as it affected the proposal to reduce County Roads Maintenance by £2,968. A majority of the members present voted in favour of Clr. Carty's proposal and the Chairman, therefore, declared the entire proposal by Clr. Carty as seconded by Clr. Ruane approved by the meeting.

It was then unanimously decided that no provision be made in the Roads Estimate for Councillors' Notices of Motion, and it was decided to defer further discussion of the application for a wages increase until the Estimates Committee Meeting which will be

held on the 31st January, 1953.

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS OF MEETING OF THE ESTIMATES COMMITTEE OF THE GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL HELD AT THE COUNTY BUILDINGS, GALWAY, ON SATURDAY, 31 JANUARY, 1953.

In the Chair: (1) Councillor M. Quinn; (2) Councillor M. Carty.

8909.—Adjournment: It was proposed by Clr. Geoghegan, seconded by Clr. Carty and Resolved: "That the sympathy of the Council be conveyed to the widow and relatives of the late Mr. Thomas Nee, Clifden, a former member of the Council, and that as a mark of respect, the meeting be adjourned until 1.45 p.m. Votes of sympathy were also unanimously adopted with Chief Supt. MacManus on the death of his son, and with the Secretary on the death of his mother-in-law. The meeting was then adjourned until 1.45 p.m.

8910. Estimate for Year Ending 31st March, 1954: The County Manager's Estimate of Expenses for the year ending 31st March, 1954, as circulated to the Council, was submitted showing for County Charges a total expenditure of £1,805,281 and Total

The County Manager explained that he had already examined very carefully the Estimate as prepared by the Accountant and had made reductions wherever possible; that he considered that it is not possible to make further reductions unless the Committee decides to eliminate some services. After an examination of each item in the Estimate, the Committee decided that the following

Public Assistance Account:

District Institutions—GALWAY CENTRAL HOSPITAL: Salaries: reduced by £2,700 to £84,000; Retiring Allowances: reduced by £500 to £2,500.

Food, Drink and Tobacco: reduced by £600 to £49,400; Medicines : reduced by £1,100 to £21,900 Medical and Surgical Appliances: reduced by £1,030 to Structural Repairs: reduced by £600 to £3,400. Total reduction in District Institutions.

Medical Assistance Account: Salaries of Officers: reduced by £1,000 to £37,700.

Other Expenses:

Ambulances : reduced by £800 to £7,200.
Total Reduction in Public Assistance Account... As a result of this reduction, it was necessary to reduce the Estimated Receipts from Health Grant by £4,165 leaving the net reduction in Public Assistance Account Expenditure £4,165.

General Purposes Account:

Election Expenses: reduced by £4,000 to Nil.

The reductions as set out above were proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Quinn and were unanimously approved by the

In connection with the discussion of the Estimate for Public Assistance Account the County Manager explained that the staff employed at the Galway Central Hospital was based on a bed occupancy of 505 calculated in proportion to the staff approved by the Department for the Regional Hospital with a bed comple-

Clr. King stated that, perhaps, the service provided at the Galway Central Hospital is too elaborate for a hospital of its nature and recommended that the officers concerned would economise in the use of medicines; that if the charges for maintenance and treatment of patients were abolished, it is probable that the patients who could pay would go elsewhere and thus save the council

Dr. White, R.M.S., stated that the hospital is not over staffed and that it would not be possible to carry on with a lesser number of nurses; that the total bed-days for the past year were as compared with 165,000 for the previous year.

Clr. Wall agreed with Clr. King's suggestion in regard to the province of the previous year.

abolition of charges for maintenance and treatment of Clrs. Kitt and Carty stated that there are many class in the hospital which could be treated adequately at home.

Deputy Cawley did not agree with the reduction in the results.

Clr. Higgins suggested that the provision for the tool scheme be eliminated. After a discussion, however, it was decided to leave the

Clr. Houlihan appealed to the officers to co-operate with

Council in curtailing expenditure wherever possible.

During the discussion on the Health Account Estimate, Cir Carty stated that in some cases spectacles are being supplied to children who do not wear them and who, in fact, provide other more attractive type of spectacles at their own expense. The Secretary stated that this matter would be pursued with the County Medical Officer.

The County Manager stated that it was proposed to appoint a second wholetime Dentist for the County Galway and this proposal was approved by the Committee.

During the discussion on the Sanitary Account, Deputy Killilea stated that sufficient progress is not being made with the protection of wells which would, in many cases, obviate the necessity for the

Clr. Collins asked why pumps had not been provided on other sites at Liscune and Alloon where the sinking of pumps had been abandoned several years ago.

Clr. O'Dowd stated that two pumps—Redmount Hill and Garry-more—were started a year ago and have not been completed and

that apparently work on these pumps has been suspended.

Mr. Tracey, A.C.E., explained that the Contractor (Mr. P. Pelly) was also Contractor for the pump at Aughrim; that he has been working on the latter pump and has now completed it and will be ready to resume work on Redmount Hill and Garrymore Pumps. The Chairman stated that cases, such as Liscune and Alloon, should get priority over any other pumps on the waiting list, i.e., if it was necessary to provide pumps in these places 10 years ago, the necessity must be much greater now.

It was noted that the Estimate makes provision for new sanitary conveniences at Dunmore and Athenry only.

Clr. Ruane stated that an extension of the public lighting at Athenry to the cottages is needed and he also recommended that the existing lights be switched on half an hour later each night and be switched off half an hour later than at present.

Deputy Killilea recommended that the position of the light near the dangerous corner at Raftery's Hotel, Glenamaddy, be altered or that a new light be provided there.

In the discussion of the Housing Account Estimate, Clr. O'Dowd requested that the repair of cottages in Eyrecourt and Laurencetown be expedited.

During the consideration of the General Purposes Account Estimate, Clr. Carty referred to a fire at College Road, Galway, where difficulty was experienced due to the absence of a Garda for regulation of the traffic. Mr. Sugrue, Chief Fire Officer, stated that in the normal course of events when a fire alarm is received, the Garda Station is notified and, in fact, the Brigade usually gets the greatest co-operation from the Garda Authorities; that in the case cited by Clr. Carty, it appeared that all Garda on duty were occupied elsewhere at the time.

It was decided that an Ordinary Meeting of the Council would be held on Saturday, 7th February, 1953, at 12.30 p.m.

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETING OF THE GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL HELD ON SAT .DAY, 7th FEBRUARY, 1953.

In the Chair: (1) Clr. M. Quinn.

8909.—Minutes: The Minutes of the Council to No. 8903 having been circulated to the members were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

8910.—Vacancy: Correspondence in connection with the filling of the vacancy on the Council resulting from the disqualification of Mr. John McElihiney was submitted.

It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Nestor and unanimously Resolved: "That the Galway Branch of the Irish Transport & General Workers' Union be requested to suggest a name for co-option to this vacancy and that consideration of the filling of the vacancy be deferred until a reply will be received from the Acting Secretary of the Branch.'

8911.—Housing Grants: It was proposed by Clr. Kitt "that supplementary housing reconstruction grants and supplementary grants for installing in a dwelling-house a private water supply and sewerage facilities, be made available by the Council in accordance with the provisions of the Housing (Amendment)
Act, 1952." This proposal was seconded by Clr. Cunningham.
Clr. Nestor stated that since this proposal would involve further

borrowing by the Council, he considered it unfair that the people who cannot avail of the proposed facilities should be required to pay for them. Clr. Kitt's proposal was supported by Clr. O'Dowd

Clr. Carty pointed out that over £17,000 was being provided in the current year's Estimate for repayment of loans for supplementary grants for new houses and suggested that the Government should provide the increased grants instead of requiring the Council to make up the balance.

The Chairman suggested that Clr. Kitt's proposal should be restricted to a definite period, say one or two years, and pointed out that the average annual number of applications for reconstruction grants is approximately 500.

The County Manager drew attention to the increase in the rate which is anticipated and stated that the only way in which the Council can curtail expenditure is by restricting the introduction

It was proposed by Clr. Nestor and seconded by Clr. Collins that consideration of Clr. Kitt's proposal be deferred for a period of twelve months.

It was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Clr. Ruane that the scheme as proposed by Clr. Kitt be adopted by the Council for a period of one year from the 1st April, 1953, to 31st March, 1954; the scheme to be confined to persons whose application forms will have been received by the Council during the period from 1st April, 1953, to 31st March, 1954, inclusive.

A vote taken on Clr. Nestor's amendment resulted as follows:—

Joyce, Killilea, Lahiffe, Nestor, Newell and Wall.—12.

Against: Clrs. Carty, Cunningham, Galvin, Geoghegan, Higgins,

The Chairman declared Clr. Nestor's amendment lost,

Clr. Carty's amendment was then put to the meeting and

Clr. Kitt stated that he was prepared to withdraw his proposal in favour of the scheme as proposed by Clr. Carty, and the Chairman, therefore, declared Clr. Carty's proposal approved by the

8912.—New Works: Clr. Houlihan asked that in view of the high rate in the coming year, the Council would defer consideration of all new works proposals for a period of twelve months. This suggestion was supported by Clr. Nicholson. Clr. Higgins stated that this proposal, if carried, would place an undesirable restriction on the Council. The Chairman stated that since the suggestion or proposal was not supported unanimously, he would not accept it.

8913.—Ballymoe Water Supply: In reply to Clr. Sirr's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that a Consulting Engineer had been appointed to prepare plans, etc., for the Ballymoe Water Supply Scheme.

8914.—Water Supply at Ballyhard, Clondoyle and Sonnagh: In reply to Clr. Sirr's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that the proposal to provide a pump for this area is listed as No. 24 in the priority list of pumps for which a loan is being sought by the Council.

8915.—Danderous Corners at Ballaghamurray, etc.: In reply to Cir. Sirr's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer reported

(a) no provision has been made in the Road Works Scheme

for removal of the dangerous corners at Ballaghamurray: that it may be possible to do this work as maintenance during the current year ;

(b) that provision for the improvement of the dangerous corner, known as Keeffe's corner, Creggs, is included in the Main Road Improvement Works Scheme for the current year, and that the work will be carried out before 31st March, 1953; that, however, the work is being held up by the fact that an old ruin at the corner is still occupied;

(c) no money has been provided in the current year's Estimates for road widening at Gortnadieve.

8916.—Dangerous Corner at Glenamaddy: Clr. Carty requested that a danger sign would be erected at the dangerous corner at Keaveney's, Glenamaddy.

8917.—Cornamona Water Supply: In reply to Clr. O'Toole's Notice of Motion, the County Medical Officer's report was submitted stating that there was no case of Typhoid Fever notified from the Cornamona area within the last five years, and Clr. O'Toole was informed by the Secretary that a Consulting Engineer has, subject to the sanction of the Minister for Local Government, been appointed to prepare the documents for the water supply scheme

8918.—Costello Water Supply Scheme: In reply to Clr. O'Donnell's inquiry, the County Manager explained that proceedings were taken by the Council for acquisition of the necessary water rights for Costello Water Supply Scheme; that at one stage all concerned had agreed to the Council's proposals; that subsequently the property owned by Mr. Ismay was purchased by Mr. O'Loughlin who objected; that this objection was the cause of the long delay in the acquisition of the water rights—the proposal for which is still awaiting confirmation by the Minister for Local

Clr. Higgins requested that a statement in writing to this effect be sent by the County Manager to Clr. O'Donnell, as Clr. Higgins had seen a letter from a member of the Government which stated that the delay in proceeding with the Costello Water Supply Scheme is attributable to the Galway County Council.

8919.—Cleaning of Rivers at Lerhin and Gurteen: In reply to Clr. Flaherty, the County Engineer reported that sufficient money was not allocated under the Local Authorities (Works) Acts, Schemes, Grant for the current year to enable him to clean the rivers at Lerhin and Gurteen; that these schemes will be included again in the list of L.A.W. Schemes for the coming year.

It was proposed by Clr. Sirr and seconded by Clr. Flaherty that the Council ask the Government to provide a larger amount of oney next year for the carrying out of such works as the cleaning of drains under the L.A.W. Act, 1949.

8920.—New Roads: After discussion on Clr. Carty's proposal regarding the road from Carra Bridge, Bullaun, it was eventually decided that the County Manager be requested to examine and report on all the proposals on the Agenda relating to the taking over of roads by the Council, viz :-

Scheme amounting to £100 has been approved for the portion of the district at Lackafinna and that this work is about to be put in hands.

8922.—Pump Repairs: In connection with his Notice of Motion, Clr. Carty stated that he will send in particulars of the cases he has in mind where unequal rates of pay are being paid to men enganged by the Council on repair of pumps.

My3.—Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme: The County Mana or referred to a previous decision by the Council to allow a rate of 1/10d. per hour to the labourers employed on the Ahascragh Water Supply Scheng and stated that the workers concerned, who were cemanding 2/5d. an hour, have now gone on strike. Clr. Collins stated that a deputation from these men had visited his

house and claimed that due to cuts in their wages for wet and 2. 9' broken time, they were not, in fact, receiving a wage equivalent to that of the Council's road workers. It was decided that the County Manager be authorised to deal with this claim and to settle it in whatever manner he would consider proper.

8924.—National Anthem: It was proposed by Clr. Joyce, seconded by Clr. Ruane and unanimously Resolved: "That the Council protest to the Irish Rugby Football Union against the failure to play the Irish National Anthem at the International Rugby Match at Raven Hill, Belfast, on 24th January, 1953.

Clr. Ruane said that the thanks of the Council should be conveyed to the Proprietors of the Connacht Sentinel for their leading article in connection with this matter. This suggestion was supported by Clr. Joyce.

8925.—Cartymore Well: Clr. Newell stated that the work referred to in his Notice of Motion had since been carried out.

8926.—Carna Dispensary Residence: The County Manager explained that the tenders received for Carna Dispensary Residence were considered unduly high; that a slight alteration in the plans was necessary and since the doctor had left the district, the erection of the residence was not a matter of urgency; it was, therefore, decided to re-advertise the contract and tenders are at present being awaited.

Cir. Geoghegan suggested that if a satisfactory tender is not received on this occasion, the Council should consider the erection of the residence by direct labour.

8927.—Flannery Bridge: In reply to Clr. Geoghegan's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that it is expected that work on the reconstruction of Flannery Bridge will be commenced very soon. Clr. Geoghegan stated that, due to low tides, the present is the most suitable time to commence this work.

8928.—Oughterard Cottages: In reply to Clr. Geoghegan's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that the Department's sanction to the contract documents for this scheme has now been received and that the advertisements inviting tenders will be published next week.

8929.—Derelict Sites-Loughrea: In reply to Clr. Carty's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that the County Engineer has already been requested to carry out a survey of all derelict sites in the County Health District with a view to having the sites cleaned up or, where necessary, acquired by the Council.

8930.—Fences on New Road at Cappaghamoyle: Clr. Collins requested that the fences on the new road through Patrick Curran's land, Cappaghamoyle, Newcastle, be put into proper repair. The County Engineer stated that there are three families concerned in this case and they are requesting that a stone wall be provided. The County Manager explained that at most the Council would only be responsible for maintenance of the post and wire fence which was provided originally; that the Council would not undertake the provision of a wall in lieu of the original fence; that the damage to these road-side fences is invariably caused by cattle owned by the persons whose lands are so fenced and that it is not unreasonable to expect that these persons would themselves keep the fences in repair.

8931.—Cloon Well, Castledaly: In reply to Clr. Kitt's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that pending the preparation of a re-sale scheme for the division of the Potter Estate, the Land Commission are not in a position to make a decision in regard to our proposal for Cloon Well.

8932.—Headford Waterworks Extension: In connection with Clr. King's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer stated that the cost of a pump might be taken as £800 while the cost of a water main extension would be £1 a yard. The County Manager pointed out that a big scheme of waterworks extensions had already been proposed by the Council and that the Department of Local Government had directed that this scheme be restricted to the six proposals which would be most urgent from a public health point of view; that the County Medical Officer is being asked to place the proposals in order of urgency.

8933.—Burial Grounds: Clr. Glynn proposed that Caretakers of Rural Graveyards be dispensed with and that the Council's road workers be employed in these areas to repair the boundary walls and to clean the burial grounds from May to October. After a discussion, Clr. Glynn withdrew his proposal and stated that he would send in particulars of two burial grounds which he had in

#### Councillor Quinn now took the Chair.

8934.—Improvement of Spring Wells: In reply to Deputy Killilea's Notice of Motion, the County Manager explained that each proopsal for the taking over of an existing spring well has to be examined so as to ascertain the number of families served and the quality of the water in the well; that it is also necessary to obtain the consent of the landowner which sometimes is not for coming readily.

Deputy Killilea, Clr. Nestor and Clr. Houlihan recommended

It it work be expedited in all cases for which application has been nade for such improvements.

8935.—Wells at Roscahill: Clr. Joyce recommended that a pump be erected over the well at Rosscahill and that a well at Killola, Rosscahill, be cleaned and that a protection wall be built

Clr. Joyce stated that he had been recommending these works or years and on various occasions had been promised by the County Engineer that they would be carried out promptly.

8936.—Clonbur Sewerage Scheme: In reply to Clr. Geoghegan, the Secretary stated that the Consulting Engineer was on the 12th June, 1952, requested to proceed with the preliminary report for this scheme; that the report had not been received up to the present, but an assurance had been given that it would be furnished to the Council by the Consulting Engineer on the 14th

8937.—Kilkerrin and Moylough Water Supplies: In reply to Clr. Cunningham's Notice of Motion the County Manager stated that a letter had been received from the Department of Local Government stating that there is no objection in principle to proceeding with the planning of the scheme as proposed for Kilkerrin; hat the Consultant should investigate the quality and quantity of the water at the proposed source in Springlawn and that he hould submit a detailed estimate for a separate scheme for Moy-

8938.—Cottages at Aughrim: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's otice of Motion, the Secretary stated that Mr. Harney had only .ow signed the Agreement Form for acquisition of the land for the cottages at Aughrim.

8939.—Pumps at Garrymore and Redmount Hill: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd, Mr. Tracy, Assistant County Engineer, tated that the delay in the completion of these pumps was due the fact that part of the equipment had jammed in the bore of one of them and that the Contractor is awaiting a supply of suitable explosives to clear this jam; that work is now in progress or the Redmount Hill Pump.

8940.—Eyrecourt Water Supply Extension: In reply to r. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the County Manager stated that riew of the difficulty in getting residents to connect to the existing ater main, he would not be prepared to recommend the extension the Eyrecourt Water Supply as the scheme was completed only

8941.—Old Age Pensions Sub-Committees: It was proposed by Clr. Flaherty seconded by Deputy Killilea and Resolved: That Rev. Fr. Malachy Concannon, P.P. Milltown, be appointed a member of the Milltown Old Age Pension Sub-Committee."

It was proposed by Deputy Killilea seconded by Clr. Flaherty and Resolved: "That Mr. Thomas Fleming, Gortaganney, Moylough, be appointed a member of the Mountbellew O.A.P. Sub-Committee to fill the vacancy resulting from the death of Mr. Thomas Kitt, Cooloo."

8942.—Oughterard Sewerage Scheme: In reply to Clr. Joyce, the County Manager stated that the intention was to make the appropriate refund in these cases on the basis of what it would cost the Council to do similar work; that the final account for the scheme has been sent to the Department of Local Government for sanction and that the Council would be in a position to deal with the matter mentioned by Clr. Joyce when this account will be returned to us by the Department of Local Government.

8943.—An Tostal: Clr. Ruane stated that as he had ascertained, in the meantime, that the Galway County Council is not empowered to make any contribution towards the expenses of An Tostal, he was withdrawing his proposal, but he protested against such a regulation which deprives small towns of the concession granted to the larger towns.

8944.—Athenry Public Lighting: Clr. Ruane stated that he would furnish particulars of his recommendations in regard to the extension of the Athenry Public Lighting to the County Engineer.

8945.—Dunmore Dispensary: The County Manager stated that he had inspected the existing dispensary at Dunmore which is unsuitable in many respects and, therefore, he proposed, subject to the Council's approval, that a new dispensary be provided at Dunmore.

On the proposal of Clr. Nestor, the Council unanimously approved the provision of a new dispensary at Dunmore.

8946.—Water Supplies—Fountains: It was proposed by Clr. Kitt that when water supply piped schemes are being provided to town and villages in the County, that suitable fountains be erected at the extremities to serve adjoining localities.

The County Manager suggested that this should not be proposed as a general resolution, but that the matter should be considered in each particular case where the number of houses would justify the provision of a fountain.

Eventually, Clr. Kitt requested that the County Manager would consider his recommendations that:—

(a) the water supply scheme at Ahascragh be extended along the Ahascragh-Ballinasloe road to the County, consultation people of Killupan;

(b) that the Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme be extended down the Cloonacannon Road for a short distance and that a fountain be erected at the end of the extension which would serve the residents of Clooncannon, Cornamuckla and Runnymeade; and

(c) that a fountain be erected at Ballinahattina, Mountbellew.

O'Dowd and Resolved "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Nineteen Thousand Eight Hundred Pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under Local Government (Sanitary Services) Acts, 1878 to 1948 and the Local Loans Fund Acts, 1935 to 1951.

8949.—Loan for Salthill Shelters: The Secretary reported that the estimated cost of providing three shelters at Salthill is £4,000 while the amount available is on,y £2,850, viz.:—

It was proposed by Deputy M. Killilea, seconded by Clr. J. This loan to be repayable by instalment over a period of 10 years with interest at such rate as shall be approved by the National Bank, Limited."

8950.—Shruffaun Pier: Letter S.W. 1/10/137 of 2nd February, 1953, from the Special Employment Schemes Office was submitted relating to the proposal to carry out improvements at Shruffaun Pier at a total estimated cost of £1,110; the work to be carried out by the Office of Public Works subject to a contribution of £287 10s. 0d. from the Galway County Council together with an undertaking that the Council will accept responsibility for the future maintenance of the works when completed. On the proposition of Clr. M. O'Donnell, seconded by Clr. Ruane, the Council unanimously approved the making of a contribution of £287 10s. 0d. towards the cost of the improvement works at Shruffaun Pier, and the Council approved the acceptance of responsibility for the future maintenance of these works when completed.

8951.—Aughrismore Pier: Letter S.W.1/10/119 of 2/1/53 from the Special Employment Schemes Office was submitted stating that the previous estimate for the improvement works at Aughrismore Pier, viz., £1,240 was not sufficient, and that the revised estimate for these works is £1,640. The Council had already agreed to contribute £310 and agreement is now being sought to the making by the Council of a total contribution of £410 in lieu of £310. It was proposed by Clr. M. O'Donnell, seconded by Clr. J. Geoghegan and unanimously Resolved: "That the Council hereby approve payment of 25% of the revised cost of the improvement works at Aughrismore Pier; it being noted that the amount of the Council's contribution is now estimated to be £410 instead of £310 as previously approved.

8952.—Library Conference: On the proposition of Deputy Killilea, seconded by Clr. Quinn, the Council approved the proposed attendance of the County Librarian at the Annual Conference of the Library Association which will be held in Llandudno from 28th April, to 1st May, 1953.

8953.—Improvement of Health Services: Letter from the Catholic Societies Vocational Organization Conference which was received on the 19th January, 1953, relating to the proposed improvement of health services, was submitted. It was ordered that copies of this communication be circulated to the members of the Council.

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8954 cc Juy and Vocational Scholarship Scheme, 1953: The Minutes of Meeting of the Education Committee, held on the 26th January, 1953, having been circulated to the Council were submitted and approved.

8955.—Dental Services: Correspondence in connection with the proposal to appoint a second wholetime Dental Surgeon under the Galway County Council was submitted. It was proposed by Clr. M. Quinn, seconded by Deputy Killilea and unanimously Resolved: "That the Council hereby approve the appointment of a second wholetime Dental Surgeon under the Galway County Council, with salary scale £900 x £30 to £1,080 per annum, inclusive of temporary bonus of 20% together with travelling expenses and subsistence allowance at the usual approved rates.

8956.—Control of Dogs: Letter 23rd January, 1953, from the Department of Agriculture requesting that the Council would again this year adopt measures for directing the attention of dog owners in its area to the regulations governing the control of dogs, was submitted and approved.

8957.—Mr. James Haverty, Springlawn, Mountbellew: Letter 12th January, 1953, from Mr. James Haverty, Springlawn, Mountbellew, was submitted requesting that the Council would hold inquiry into the allegation that a certain resolution was adopted by the Galway County Council in 1920 or 1921—this matter being the subject of an article in the Connacht Tribune on 27th December, 1952. Deputy Killilea stated that this matter was made the subject of much propaganda by the British Press at the time and proposed that some sort of inquiry be held to clear up the matter. The County Manager suggested that Dr. Thomas Walsh, St. Mary's Road, Galway, and Mr. James Haverty, be notified to attend a meeting of the Council when such records, as are available, will be produced. It was decided that the matter be placed on the Agenda for the next Ordinary Meeting of the Council and that Dr. Walsh and Mr. Haverty be invited to the meeting.

8958.—Visiting Committee: Minutes of Meetings of the Visiting Committee held at the Tuam Home on 5/1/53 and at the Central Hospital on 24/1/53 were submitted.

In connection with the reference to quarterly report in the Minutes of the Meeting at the Central Hospital, Clr. Kitt stated that the Visiting Committee desired that a quarterly report should be furnished to each member of the Visiting Committee stating, in regard to the Galway Central Hospital, the number of patients in the hospital at the date of the report; the number of staff employed, showing the various grades, and giving particulars of any untoward occurrence since the date of the previous report. It was also requested by the Council that the recommendation of

the Visiting Committee in regard to the entrance gate to the Regional Hospital receive consideration.

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS AT ESTIMATES MEETING OF THE GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL HELD AT THE COUNTY BUILDINGS, GALWAY, ON SATUR-DAY, 28th FEBRUARY, 1953.

In the Chair: Councillor M. Quinn.

Present: Clrs. M. A. Ashe, J. O'Dowd, M. Carty, P. Collins, J. Cunningham, J. Flaherty, P. Furey, P. Galvin, J. Geoghegan, J. Glynn, M. Higgins, J. Houlihan, J. P. Joyce, Deputy M. Killilea, Clrs. T. King, M. Kitt, L. O'Toole, Deputy J. Mannion, Clrs. M. Mylotte, J. J. Nestor, M. Newell, M. Nicholson, M. O'Donnell, J. Ruane, P. Sirr and M. Wall.

8960.—Estimate of Expenses for Year ending 31st March 1954: The Chairman stated that the Galway County Executive of Macra na Feirme had asked permission to send a deputation to the Estimates Meeting and that, on his direction, the Secretary to the Council had informed the Secretary to the County Executive of Macra na Feirme that the Galway County Council would receive a deputation, not exceeding 10 in number, and that the time allotted to hear the deputation would be half an hour. Mr. Ian O'Kelly, a member of the deputation, then addressed the Council stating that 70% of the farms in County Galway are less than 30 acres in area and that such small farmers do not share in the prosperity attributed to agriculture at present. Mr. O'Kelly requested that the Council would confine expenditure to productive schemes and that the amount of the rate be limited as otherwise the majority. of the farming community will not be able to meet it.

Mr. Joseph Leonard, another member of the deputation, suggested that the Council might economise by introducing the contract system for maintenance of county roads; that the distance for transport of gravel should be restricted; that expensive road diversions and road widening schemes are being carried out by the Council which require the acquisition of fairly considerable areas of land, while it is possible that less expensive schemes would be sufficient; that it appears as if the proportion of engineers and gangers employed is too great in relation to the number of labourers. Mr. J. Casey, Chairman of the County Executive of Macra na Feirme, said that since he had started farming his rates had been increased from £28 a year to £60 a year and that he was not satisfied that he was receiving any services which would justify the payment

of this amount of rates. Mr. Duane, County Organiser of Macra na Feirme, stated that the objects of his Organisation are not social only—that they advocate increased production and the improvement of agriculture. He requested that the Council would ease the burden of the farmers and in return the farmers would be prepared to co-operate wholeheartedly with the Council,

Clr. P. Sirr stated that while he agreed with most of what had been said by the deputation, he pointed out that the great cause of the increase in expenditure is attributable to the rising costs

resulting from the 1952 Budget.

The Chairman read a leading article in the Farmers' Journal of 21st February, 1953, stating that the increase in rates is becoming an important item in the farmers' burden and charging local authorities with gross inefficiency in their administration The Chairman stated that County Councils have many duties and responsibilities which they discharge conscientiously and that, in fact, the Galway County Council had taken on voluntarily many services which are solely for the benefit of the farming community. The Chairman pointed out that the total amount of the rate warrants for the year ending 31st March, 1953, is £466,458 which is equivalent to only 28.4% of the total revenue expenditure; that if capital expenditure for the current year is also included the amount contributed by the rates is equivalent to only 21.7% of the total expenditure; that the amount of Government grants being received for revenue purposes during the current year is £1,010,365 which is equivalent to 61.5% of the total revenue expenditure; that the number of holdings in the County with a P.L.V. exceeding £20 on land is 4,310 and that, therefore, all other rated occupiers, totalling approximately 20,000, receive the full abatement, equivalent to 3/5ths of the rate on land; that in addition to the revenue and capital expenditure of the Council totalling £2,148,187 for the current year, approximately £859,000 is paid into County Galway by the Government by way of Old Age Pensions, Widows' & Orphans' Pensions, Housing Grants, Bog Development Grants and Rural Improvement Grants. In addition to this, County Roscommon contributes approximately 1/3rd of the expenses of the Ballinasloe Mental Hospital and the other counties in the region contribute to the expenses of the Merlin Park Sanatorium. The Chairman stated that he was satisfied that the expenditure of all this money in the County Galway cannot fail to have a favourable effect on the farming community in the

Clr. Carty enumerated the services provided by the Council and stated that in so far as payment of rates is concerned, his sympathy is more with the people of the small towns than with the farmers as the former do not obtain relief from any source. Clr. Carty asked if it was suggested that economies should be effected by, for instance, reducing the number of nurses in the Central Hospital or in the Sanatorium or by curtailment of drainage works or housing grants.

Clr. Collins stated that it is not so much a question of the amount which is spent as of the amount which is mis-spent—and that many services which formerly were provided by the Central Authority are now being borne by the local authority.

Clrs. Cunningham, Houlihan, Kitt, O'Dowd, Galvin, Nicholson, Ruane, Sirr, Wall, Nestor and King congratulated the members of the deputation on the manner in which they had stated their case and trusted that, after having heard the Chairman's statement, the deputation would have a clearer idea of the situation.

Mr. O'Kelly of the deputation thanked the Council for hearing them and stressed again that the farmers income is limited and that eventually the time will arrive when he will be unable to meet any

further burdens.

The County Manager stated that lest the deputation should depart thinking that a reduction could easily be effected in the Estimate, he would point out that so far no provision had been made for an increase in road workers wages for which a demand had been served on the Council nor for the necessary funds to meet the cost of supplementary housing reconstruction grants.

The deputation then left the meeting.

The Chairman suggested that since a loan would have to be raised for the supplementary reconstruction grants and the repayment in the coming year will not be very much, financial provision for this purpose need not be made in the Estimate for 1953/54.

In reply to Clr. Sirr, the County Engineer stated that an increase of 5/- a week in the wages of road workers would require an additional £15,000 a year.

It was proposed by Clr. Glynn and seconded by Clr. Higgins that the Estimate, as submitted, be adopted.

It was proposed by Deputy Mannion, seconded by Clr. King, that the amount provided for main road improvements (i.e. in Maintenance) be deleted from the Estimate.

It was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Clr. Kitt that the General (Roads) Estimate be reduced by £15,000 so as to provide for an increase of 5/- a week in wages of road workers.

It was proposed by Clr. Furey and seconded by Clr. Nestor that no increase in road workers wages be granted. Clrs. King and Higgins supported Clr. Furey's proposal as they

stated that the road workers would prefer constant employment to an increase in wages with broken employment.

Clr. O'Flaherty proposed that the Estimate be reduced so as to provide that the increase in the rate this year shall not exceed

After a discussion the County Manager suggested that the estimated balances might be reduced by the equivalent of 11d. in the £. All other proposals were then withdrawn and it was proposed by Clr. Glynn seconded by Clr. Higgins and Resolved: "That the estimated balances against at 31st March, 1953, be reduced by an amount equivalent to a 11d. in f. and that the Estimate of Expenses as so amended, as set forth in Tables A, B, C, D and E be adopted and that the rates set forth in Tables C, D and E be the rates in the  $\mathcal{L}$  to be levied for the several purposes specified in the said Estimate for the year ending 31st March, 1954."

It was proposed by Clr. Glynn, seconded by Clr. Higgins, and Resolved: "That the demands on the Galway Borough Council and on the Ballinasloe Urban District Council be signed by the Chairman and Secretary and sealed with the Seal of the Council."

8961.—Tourist Roads Grant Scheme: Cir. Higgins complained that the County Engineer's list of proposals under the

Tourist Roads Grant Scheme do not serve any of the three main arteries from Galway to the West, e.g., that there is no proposal for work on the Barna-Spiddal road nor on the Galway-Maam Cross Road. The County Engineer explained that the work on the Barna-Spiddal road will be carried out through the Main Road Reconstruction Grant and that he had put up certain proposals for the Galway-Maam Cross road, but these had been struck out by the Local Government Inspector.

Clr. O'Donnell also complained that the greater portion of the

grant will be spent in non-Gaeltacht areas.

Clrs. Geoghegan and Mannion recommended that steps be taken as quickly as possible to improve conditions on the dangerous hill at Maumeenagowna on the Clonbur-Maam road.

8962.—Road Transport: It was proposed by Clr. Geoghegan, seconded by Clr. Higgins, and Resolved: "That the Council request the Coras Iompair Eireann Authorities to arrange that some new buses will be supplied for the Galway District as it has, apparently, been the practice to send old buses to Galway and to put the new buses into service elsewhere.

8963.—Sympathy: Votes of sympathy were unanimously adopted with the following:

John O'Dowd and Resoved: "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the Epayment of the sum of Twenty-two Thousand, Two Hundred Pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Local Government (Ireland) Act, 1898, S.22 of the Local Government (Application of Enactments) Order 1898, the Local Government Acts 1925 to 1946 and the Local Loans Fund Acts 1935 to 1951."

8967.—Loan for New Dispensaries: It was proposed by Clr. Michael F. Kitt seconded by Clr. John O'Dowd and Resolved: "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Four Thousand, Two Hundred Pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Public Assistance Act, 1939."

8968.—Loan for Ahascragh Water Supply: It was proposed by Clr. Michael F. Kitt seconded by Clr. John O'Dowd and Resolved: "That our Corporate Seal be affixed to the Deed of Mortgage of this date now read, whereby security is given to the Commissioners of Public Works in Ireland for the repayment of the sum of Fourteen Thousand, Two Hundred and Fifty Pounds, proposed to be advanced by them to us under the Local Government (Sanitary Services) Acts, 1878 to 1948."

8969.—Loan for Private Roads in Galway City: It was proposed by Clr. Michael' F. Kitt seconded by Clr. John O'Dowd and Resolved: "That pursuant to the Letter of Sanction of the Local Government Minister dated the 29th day of January 1953 the sum of £1975/0/0 be borrowed from The National Bank Limited, Galway, for the purpose of defraying additional expenditure on the reconstruction of former private roads in Galway City the said sum to be repaid within Ten years with the original loan of £13000 sanctioned by the Minister's letter dated 27th March, 1951 with interest at the appropriate rate charged by the Bank from time to time for such advances at present 5% per annum as in said Letter of Sanctions provided, the said loan and interest thereon to be secured by a Mortgage over the Rates and that the Seal of the Council be affixed to the said Mortgage to The National Bank Limited."

8970.—Loan for New Fire Appliance: It was proposed by Clr. Michael F. Kitt seconded by Clr. John O'Dowd and Resolved: "That pursuant to the Letter of Sanction of the Local Government Minister dated the 10th day of October, 1952, the sum of £5,800 be borrowed from The National Bank Limited, Galway, for the purpose of defraying expenditure on the purchase of a dual purpose Fire Appliance to be repaid within ten years with interest at the usual rate charged by the Bank from time to time for such advances as in said Letter of Sanction provided, that said loan and all interest thereon to be secured by a Mortgage over the Rates AND that the Seal of the Council be affixed to the said Mortgage to The

National Bank Limited.'

8971.—Spiddal Dispensary: The Secretary reported that when the question of providing new dispensaries was considered previously by the Council, it was estimated that the cost of each dispensary would be £1200 towards which a Government grant of £600 would be available. The County Engineer's report was now submitted showing that the total cost of the new dispensary at Spiddal is £2039/3/6 of which £456/15/0 is the cost of developing the site; £41 for rock excavation and £60/5/6 for furniture and lino.

The County Manager pointed out that the site in this case was an unusually difficult one and that while the cost of each other dispensary is likely to exceed £1200, it is unlikely that the cost of any other dispensary will be as high as that of

The County Engineer's report was noted by the Council.

8972.—Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme: Clr. Kitt stated that he had been approached by the workers at the Ahascragh Water Supply Scheme who have gone on Strike and they have pointed out that while their nominal rate of pay was 1/10d. per hour, the average weekly wage received by each labourer was only £3 and that sometimes the weekly wage was as low as £2 due to the fact that the men did not receive any payment for wet time. The County Manager explained that the Contractor's tender was based on a wage of 1/8d. per hour and a demand was made for 2/5 per hour which would be the rate for builders' labourers; that it was not admitted that the work in question is building work, but that eventually the Council and the Manager authorised a rate of 1/10d. per hour, on the understanding that, as regards wet time, the men employed on this scheme would be treated in the same manner as the Council's road workers. In reply to an inquiry by Clr. Kitt, the County Manager stated that any settlement on this basis could not be made retrospective. Clrs. Carty and Nestor suggested that this matter should be left to the County Manager to deal with.

Clr. Glyyn requested that the completion of the Williamstown Water Supply Scheme be expedited.

8973.—Spiddal Dispensary Residence: Clr. Mylotte asked if it is proposed to provide a dispensary residence at Spiddal. The County Manager stated that the acquiring of a site for this purpose is under consideration and that the matter will be brought before the Council again.

8974.—Oughterard Dispensary: In connection with a

Notice of Motion by Clr. Joyce, the County Manager stated that the provision of a new dispensary for Oughterard in the Bridewell had been considered already, but the proposal was rejected on the grounds of unsuitability; that the acquisition of a site at Camp Street is being considered now, Clr. Joyce said a dispensary at Camp Street would not be favoured by the people in view of its proximity to the sewage disposal tank. The Council approved of the County Manager's recommendation that the proposal to provide a dispensary in the Bridewell be abandoned.

8975.—Excess Expenditure: On the proposition of Clr. Glynn seconded by Clr. Higgins, the Council unanimously approved the following additional expenditure for the year ending 31st March, 1953, in excess of the amounts already authorised:

8976.—Rate Collector No. 23 District: The Secretary reported that Mr. Thomas Flanagan, Rate Collector for District No. 23 reached the age of 65 years on the 21st January, 1953, and that, therefore, he will cease to hold office at the closing of the warrant for the current year. On the proposition of Clr. Kitt seconded by Clr. O Dowd, the Council directed that the usual arrangements be made for the filling of the vacancy.

8977.—Roads Proposals: The County Manager's report—
17/2/53—on the following roads for which Notices of Motion had been furnished by members of the Council was submitted and noted:—

(1) Road from Carra Bridge, Bullaun, to Nogginstown, Kilrickle;

(2) Road in the Townland of Cloonkeen Eighter, Clon-

berne;
(3) Road from Behan's house on Caltra-Ahascragh road through Castlegar East to the Eglish Road;

(4) Road at Shanbally, Currandulla;(5) Killsallagh-Kilmacrickard Road;

(6) Road from Dooley's house, Clonberne Park to Bally-

Clr. Carty asked if in the event of the Council's making available a sum of money for the maintenance and gradual improvement of these roads, would the County Manager be willing to take over the roads. The County Manager pointed out that there is in the County already a very considerable mileage of County roads which are in poor condition and that these roads should be brought up to a proper standard before the Council would consider burdening itself with any new roads; that having regard to the limited financial resources available, he would not recommend the taking over of any further roads of this type at present. Clr. Carty then suggested that the Council would recommend to the Miniter that a section be provided in the new Bill which would authorise the provision of funds by the local authority for limited maintenance of these minor roads.

On the suggestion of the Chairman, it was decided that the matter would be left over pending the coming into operation of the new Act relating to minor roads.

8978.—Health Services: Letter from the Catholic Societies Vocational Organization Conference in regard to the proposals for improvement of health services having been circulated to the members was submitted and noted.

by Clr. Nicholson and Resolved: "That the Council hereby approve the provision of overdraft accommodation not exceeding £200,000 on the Council's General Account for the quarter ending 30/6/53.

8980.—Tourist Road Grant Proposals: The County Engineer's proposal for the expenditure of the grant for improvement of Tourist Roads during the year 1953/54 having been circulated to the members was submitted and approved. Clrs. O'Toole and O'Donnell objected to the lack of pro-

vision for expenditure of portion of this grant in certain areas in Connemara.

In reply to Clr. Carty, the County Engineer stated that the expenditure of the grant is resricted to important tourist routes and that, therefore, the Terryland Road would not come within the scope of the scheme.

8981.—"Peace Resolution": By permission of the Chairman; Mr. James Haverty, Springlawn, Mountbellew, addressed the meeting in regard to a "Peace Resolution" which in Press reports in 1920 was alleged to have been adopted by the Galway County Council. Mr. Haverty read a Notice which had been sent to him at the time calling a Special Meeting of the Council for Friday, the 3rd December, 1920, at 11 a.m. to consider whether the accounts of the Council should be submitted to the British Local Government Board for Audit. Mr. Haverty stated that for lack of a quorum, the meeting was not held and that, therefore, the resolution was never adopted by the Council; that he had brought the Notice of Motion to the meeting with the intention of proposing it so as to upset certain negotiations which he knew were in progress at the time, but, that since there was no meeting he had no opportunity to make the proposal. Mr. Haverty stated further that Minute No. 147A of the Finance Committe of 27th November, 1920, is a forgery; that at a meeting of the Council on 16/2/21 a number of members rose to propose that the "peace resolution" be rescinded and that they were informed by the Secretary that there was no such resolution in the Minute Book; that in the notices calling the Special Meeting for 3rd December, 1920, it was not stated that the period for which the books were to be submitted for Audit would be the period prior to the election of the new Council in June 1920.

Clr. Flaherty asked if Mr. Haverty could explain how the Connacht Tribune obtained the words of his Notice of Motion.

Mr. Haverty, in reply, stated that at one time Mr. Kenny, Editor, of the Connacht Tribune had suggested to him that the Reporter got the text of the proposal from the Secretary to the Council.

8982.—Auditor's Reports: The Auditor's reports on his Audit of the accounts of the under-mentioned Bodies for the year ending 31/3/52 were submitted and noted:—

Ballinasloe Joint Mental Hospital Board;
 Galway County Committee of Agriculture;
 River Suck Joint Drainage Committee.

8983.—Knocknacarra Water Supply: Clr. Higgins recommended that the piped water supply to be extended from Knocknacarra Cross to Earner's house—an approximate distance of 500 yards—to serve 14 families. The county Manager drew attention to the difficulty of sewage disposal in this area and the fact that an extension of the water main would enhance the value of sites and property there. After a discussion the County Manager agreed that he would obtain an estimate for this work.

8984.—Housing Grants: In reply to an inquiry by Clr. Sirr, the Secretary explained that the application already received are sufficient to absorb the full amount of the £200,000 which the Council had agreed to provide for supplementary housing grants.

It was ordered that consideration of this matter be placed on the Agenda for the next meeting.

8985.—Tullycross & Derryinver Water Supplies: Clr. O'Toole requested that the pumping plant obtained for each of these water supplies would be installed immediately. The County Engineer explained that he is endeavouring to obtain a site for the pump house at Derryinver and stated that he will do everything possible to expedite the installation of these engines.

8986.—Cemeteries at Addergoole & Dummore: In response to Clr. Nestor's Notice of Motion the County Manager stated that he will investigate the question of providing additional burial ground accommodation at Addergoole and at Dunmore.

8987.—Oughterard Rubbish Dump: In reply to Clr. Joyce's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that a site for a rubbish dump is being sought; that a site previously selected at Claremount was abandoned as a number of objections to it were received by the Council; that a site is now being considered on the southern side of the Oughterard-Clifden road.

8988.—Killeaney Harbour: In reply to Notice of Motion by Clr. Ashe, the County Engineer stated that the repair and lime-washing of the beacons at Killeaney Harbour is not the responsibility of the Galway County Council.

8989.—County Councils' General Council: Letter 5/3/53 from the County Councils' General Council requesting notice of matters for inclusion in the next Agenda was submitted and noted

8990.—Irish Public Bodies Mutual Insurances Ltd.: On the proposition of Clr. Geoghegan seconded by Clr. Ruane, the Council appointed Mr. Martin Quinn, Co.C., as its representative on the Irish Public Bodies Mutual Insurances Ltd. Co.

8991.—Turf Production: Letter 24th January, 1953, from the Department of Local Government requesting particulars of the Council's intentions in regard to turf production in 1953/54 was submitted together with the County Engineer's report of 9th March, 1953, recommending that the Council

should use up the turf stock still on hand from previous seasons and that all further requirements of the Council should be obtained by contract. This suggestion was approved by the Council, on the propositions of Clrs. Collins and Ruane.

8992.—Main & County Road Reconstruction Grants 1953/54. The County Engineer's report of 10th March, 1953, giving particulars of his proposals for expenditure of the above grants was submitted. It was ordered that copies of the report be circulated to the members of the Council:

8993.—Anti-Partition Association: Letter dated February 1953 from the Anti-Partition Association stating that a Parade would be held in Dublin on Easter Monday and inviting the Council to be present was submitted and noted.

8994.—Athenry Water Supply Extension: Clr. Ruane requested that the carrying out of this work would be expedited.

MINUTES OF PROCEEDINGS AT MEETING OF THE GALWAY COUNTY COUNCIL HELD AT THE COUNTY BUILDINGS, GALWAY, ON SATURDAY, THE 25th APRIL, 1953, AT 12.30 p.m.

8996.—Minutes: The Minutes of the Council to No. 8995, having been circulated to the members, were taken as read and were signed by the Chairman.

The Chairman welcomed Mr. John McDonogh—who was recently co-opted a member of the Council. Mr. McDonogh expressed his thanks and stated that since he is a member of the Galway Branch of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, of which Mr. McElihiney was Secretary, he considered that he is eligible and well qualified to fill the vacancy resulting from Mr. McElihiney's departure.

8997.—Loughrea Fairgreen: It was proposed by Clr. Carty and seconded by Clr. Ruane that application be made to the Minister for Local Government for an Order under Section 1 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, constituting the Galway County Council as a Market Authority for the Town of Loughrea. Clr. King considered that the proposal was premature as the proposal to purchase the Loughrea Fairgreen, Tools and Customs has not yet been sanctioned. Clr. Nestor agreed with Clr. King and stated that in Dunmore there is strong opposition to the payment of tools. Clr. Ruane stated that farmers do not object to paying tolls if some reasonable accommodation is provided in return for such payments. After further discussion, Clr. Carty's proposal was put to the meeting and approved.

8998.—Portumna Fairgreen: It was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Shields, and Resolved: "that application be made to the Minister for Local Government for an Order under Section 1 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1896, constituting the Council as a Market Authority for the town of Portumna."

8999.—Housing Loans: The Secretary reported that the sum of £100,000 which had been provided by the Council for making advances under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts had been absorbed by loans already allocated, and that

it would be necessary to provide further funds if the housing loan scheme was to be continued. It was proposed by Clr. Higgins seconded by Clr. Carty and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £50,000 from the Commissioners of Public Works for the making of advances under the Small Dwellings Acquisition Acts; the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of 35 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the

The Chairman, Clr. Carty and Clr. Miss Ashe stated that there is altogether too great a delay in payment of the final instalment of housing loans; that in some case years elapse between the payment of the first instalment and the final instalment. The County Manager stated that, some mess there is great difficulty in obtaining proof of the title of the borrower and that there is also delay in registration of the documents in the Land Registry Office; that, he believed, however, that the County Solicitor could do much to expedite the completion of the legal formalities in connection with these loans.

9000.—Supplementary Housing Grants: The Secretary explained that the sum of £200,000 which was provided by the Council has been absorbed by grants already allocated and that further applications had been received which, if allocated, would amount to approximately £11,000. The County Manager suggested that the scheme for the issue of supplementary grants should not be continued by the Council as a Government Grant will still be available together with rates remission for seven years and that he believed the majority of the houses would be built whether a supplementary grant would or would not be made available. It was proposed by Clr. Carty seconded by Clr. Sirr and Resolved: "that the scheme for issue of supplementary grants be continued so as to enable the Council to issue supplementary grants to qualified persons who will be allocated Government grants up to 31st March, 1954, inclusive, and that the Council approve the provision of a further sum of £50,000 for this purpose in addition to the sum of £200,000 already approved.

As the amount of the loans which had been actually obtained up to date for the issue of supplementary housing grants was £130,000 and it is now necessary to borrow the remaining £70,000 plus the additional £50,000 approved to-day, it was proposed by Clr. Carty, seconded by Clr. Sirr, and Resolved: "that the Council hereby approve the raising of a loan of £120,000 from the Commissioners of Public Works for the issue of supplementary housing grants under Sections 9, 10 and 11 of the Housing (Amendment) Act, 1952—the loan to be repayable by annuity over a period of

25 years with interest at the rate prevailing at the date of issue of the loan to the Council."

9001.—Housing Grants—Miscellaneous: Clr. Glynn stated that he wrote to the Secretary of the Council in connection with the allocation of a supplementary housing grant in a case where an 80% grant was allocated and he considered the applicant was entitled to receive a 100% grant—and that he had not received any reply to his letter.

9002.—Supplementary Housing Reconstruction Grants, Etc. The draft scheme for issue of supplementary housing reconstruction grants and supplementary grants for installing in a dwelling-house a private water supply and sewerage facilities, which was circulated to the Council, was submitted. The Secretary pointed out that at a previous meeting, the Council Resolved: "that the scheme would be confined to applications received during the year ending 31st March, 1954." The draft scheme submitted provided that a grant under the scheme may be made only in respect of a house for which the Minister for Local Government or the Minister for Lands allocates a re'evant grant within the year ending 31st March, 1954—the date of allocation being taken to be the date on the certificate of approval or notification of allocation of the grant. This amendment was approved unanimously, and it was also recommended that if there should be a difference between the date on the certificate of approval and the date on the notification of allocation of the grant, the applicant should be given the benefit of the doubt. The draft scheme, as submitted, was approved on the proposition of Clr. Carty seceonded by Clr.

9003.—Traffic Regulations—Galway City: Clr. Carty stated that the traffic regulations in Galway City are causing much inconveniences to visitors to the city and on his proposal, seconded by Clr. Higgins, it was agreed to request the Garda Authorities to modify the regulations so as to enable country people to park for a short while within a reasonable distance of the shopping centres.

9004.—Sympathy: The Council unanimously adopted a vote of sympathy with the mother, brothers and sisters of the late Fr. Canavan of Headford whose death in Korea has been confirmed recently.

2005.—Loughrea Pound: In reply to a question by Clr. Carty, the Secretary explained that the Council cannot transfer the Pound in Loughrea to the County Vocational Education Committee until a suitable alternative Pound has been made available; that the alternative Pound was provided and the

County Registrar was requested to certify it as suitable; that the County Registrar had requested the provision of some further facilities in the alternative Pound and that the carrying out of these works had been referred to the County Engineer who now reports that they will be completed within a short time.

9006.—Deputy Rate Collector No. 27 District: Correspondence, including medical certificate, was submitted and on the proposition of Deputy Killilea, seconded by Clr. O'Dowd, the Council approved the appointment of Miss Mary Kyne, Clonbur, to act as Deputy for Mr. M. J. Kyne, Rate Collector in No. 27 District, for a period of six months from 1st Mary to 31st October, 1953, inclusive.

9007.—Landing Place at Inishturbot: Letter SW.1/10/4 of 8th April, 1953, from the Director, Special Employment Schemes Office was submitted, and on the proposition of Clr. Geoghegan seconded by Deputy Killilea, the Council approved the contribution of £182/10/0 towards the cost of carrying out of improvement works at Inishturbot Islands landing place and to undertake responsibility for the future maintenance of the works when completed—the estimated cost of the improvement scheme being £730.

9008.—Cinema Licences: On the proposition of Clr. Carty seconded by Clr. Ashe, the Council approved the issue of Cinema Licences to:

(a) Mr. Henry O'Shaughnessy, The Square, Gort, for

Cinema at Gort.

(b) Mr. Fred McCormick for travelling cinema.

9009.—Auditor's Report: The Auditor's Report on his his Audit of the accounts of the County Galway Vocational Education Committee for year ended 31st March, 1952, was submitted and noted.

9010.—Spiddal Dispensary Residence: The Secretary reported that so far the Council had not succeeded in securing the offer of a site for the dispensary residence at Spiddal and requested that the Council would consider the giving of approval to the proposal to provide a dispensary residence in this district. The proposal to provide a dispensary residence at Spiddal was approved by the Council on the proposition of Clr. Geoghegan seconded by Clr. Ashe.

9011.—Ballinasloe Mental Hospital Board: Letter 16/4/53 from the Chief Clerk, Ballinasloe Mental Hospital, was submitted stating that Mr. Michael O'Donnell, Co.C. has become disqualified as a member of the Hospital Board due to non-attendance during the past six months. On the proposition of

Clr. Ruane seconded by Clr. Ashe, Mr. Michael O'Donnell, Co.C., Carraroe South, Carraroe, was re-appointed a member of the Ballinasloe Mental Hospital Board.

9012.—Galway Harbour Commissioners: It was proposed by Clr. Carty seconded by Clr. Quinn and Resolved: "that the Council hereby guarantee an overdraft of £5,000 on the Galway Harbour Commissioner's account for the purpose of repairing the Dun Aengus Dock Gates."

9013.—Carna Dispensary Residence: The Secretary reported the the acceptance of the tender of Messrs. Kelly & Sons, Ltd., Westport, for provision of a dispensary and residence at Carna at a cost of £6,297 was recommended by the County Engineer. On the proposition of Clr. Geoghegan, seconded by Clr. Ashe, the County Council approved the provision of the dispensary and residence at Carna and noted that the tender for this work is £6,297.

9014.—Visiting Committee: The Minutes of Meeting of the Visiting Committee held at St. Brendan's Home on 19/3/1953 and Clifden Hospital on 4/4//1953 were submitted and noted.

Clrs. Ashe, Carty and Cawley paid tribute to the excellent manner in which Clifden Hospital and St. Brendan's Home are kept.

9015.—Galway Central Hospital—Radio Service: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the report of 12/3/1953 from the Resident Medical Superintendent was submitted stating that the cost of the radio installation was approximately £250; that apart from licence fees, the maintenance cost is neglegible; that the volume is controlled from the receiving set but cannot be controlled for each individual loud speaker although each loud speaker can be turned off or on as required. Clr. O'Dowd stated that he noted that there was some improvement in the operation of this radio service recently.

9016.—Cottages: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the Secretary stated that at 16th instant 83 tenants had been paid the Council's contribution for the wiring of their cottages and that it was expected that most of the remaining 126 applicants would be paid by the end of this month.

In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer's report of 9/3/53 was submitted and the Chairman, Deputy Killilea and other members expressed the opinion that it was most undesirable to build cottages in groups in rural areas.

9017.—Pump at Crossconnell—Garryduff: In reply to Cir. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the County Medical Officer's report of the 25/3/1953 was submitted stating that he agreed that this pump should be put between the villages of Crossconnell and Garryduff—preferably nearer to Garryduff than to Crossconnell.

3018.—Employment of Road Workers: In reply to Clr. O'Dowd's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer stated that much of the work of the Council is connected with the use of tar and bitumen and that this work must be done in fine weather; that drainage work could also be carried out only during the fine weather period; that since it is necessary to get as much surface dressing as possible done during the Summer, the employment of workers on overtime for surface dressing only is authorised.

\$019.—Roadway at Ballygar: Clr. Wall recommended that the Council take over and maintain the roadway leading from the Church Square, Ballygar to Farrell's house. The County Engineer stated that he would consider the obtaining of contributions from the persons concerned to cover the cost of repairing this roadway.

9020.—Kilkerrin—Moylough Water Supply: At Clr. Cunningham's request, consideration of his Notice of Motion—No. 3 (c)—was adjourned.

9021.—Hill at Kildaree, Glenamaddy: In reply to Clr. Nestor's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer reported that the cost of levelling this Hill would be £542/10/0 and since there has been no financial provision made for this work, it cannot be carried out by him. Clr. Nestor suggested that the County Engineer would consider the carrying out of an improvement to this hill at a lower cost.

9022.—Improvement of Wells: Clr. Nestor recommended and the Council approved that a spring well on Thomas Mullin's land at Quinaltagh be protected.

Deputy Killilea stated that a number of wells in that area had been submitted by him for improvement up to two years ago and that nothing has been done since. Deputy Killilea requested an explanation.

Clr. Nestor stated that a year ago he had recommended that a well at Lisheenaheilta be improved and that the work had not been done so far.

9023.—Footpath at Dunmore: In reply to Clr. Nestor's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer stated that he was arranging to have the footpath opposite Miss Naughton's house. Dunmore, repaired.

Deputy Cawley drew attention to the dangerous condition of the road near Headford where there is a diversion causing a double road with no warning sign.

9024.—New Bridge—Windfield Pump: On the proposition of Clr. Flaherty, the Council recommended that the pump on the Fallon Estate be taken over by the County Council—if suitable; the County Engineer's estimate for repairing this pump and putting it in order being £55.

9025.—Pump at Killooney and Ballinlass: In reply to Clr. Flaherty's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer's report of 17/4/1953 was submitted stating that this pump is No. 34 on the priority list and that it will not be provided during the current year, but that it probably will be commenced during he next financial year.

9026.—Athenry Derelict Sites: Clr. Ruane proposed and Clr. Ashe seconded and it was unanimously recommended that the derelict sites at Athenry be acquired by the Council and cleaned up.

9027.—Athenry Latrine: In reply to Clr. Ruane's Notice of Motion, the County Engineer's report of the 17/4/53 was submitted stating that Messrs, Garvey & Solan are willing to discuss the sale of a suitable site which is owned by them near Cross Street, Athenry, and that the County Engineer is arranging to discuss this matter with the owners as soon as possible.

Oranmore Water Supply and Public Lighting: On the proposition of Clr. Ruane seconded by Clr. Ashe, it was recommended that the Oranmore Water Supply Scheme be extended to a point at Gurrane Lodge to supply Messrs. Fahy's, Joyce's, Martin's and Burke's houses, and that the public lighting system be extended to the same point. Clr. Ashe also recommended that the water scheme be extended as far as the village of Cartron.

9029.—Control of Dogs: On the proposal of Clr. O'Dowd, the Council decided that the Authorities concerned be again equested to enforce the Regulations governing the control of dogs during the lambing season.

9030.—Pump at Kylemore Abbey, Loughrea: Clr. Houlihan stated that this pump is out of order for a long time and requested that it be repaired.

Clr. Ashe asked why the County Manager did not consult with the members for the Galway area in regard to the allocation of the tenancies in the Ballybrit Cottage Scheme. Clr. King pointed out that so far this consultation with the local members had been arranged only for the cottage schemes at Athenry and Headford - to each of which the differential rent applies.

Clr. King recommended that the differential rent arrangements should not apply to cottages built in groups near small towns as the tenants are unable to afford to pay even the minimum rent fixed, and suggested that not more than five cottages should be built in one group and that there should be some scheme in operation whereby the person appointed as tenant would be able to become the owner of the cottage eventually; that if this were done it would avoid the frequent changes in tenancy which occur at present.

In reply to his inquiry, Clr. Lahiff was informed that the Department's approval had been requested to the provision of a scheme of rural cottages on a site near the church in Kinvara and that demolition orders had been served a week ago on the owners of the unfit houses in Crowe Street, Gort; that it is intended to transfer the people in Crowe Street to other cottages in Gort so as to give the Council an opportunity of demolishing the present houses in Crowe Street and providing a scheme of cottages there. Mr. Cullinan, Chief Assistant County Engineer, in reply to an inquiry by Clr. Lahiff, stated that the Council is at present endeavouring to obtain a site at Oranmore. Clr. Lahiff stated that a year ago he had got an assurance from the County Engineer that the cottages at Oranmore would be completed within twelve months from that time.

In reply to his inquiry, Deputy Mannion was informed by Mr. Doyle, Staff Officer, that there are 22 applicants for cottages in Clifden, but these applicants are not all prepared to pay the rent which would be chargeable under the differential rent scheme. The Committee noted that there are 26 old cottages in Athenry town together with 20 recently provided making a total of 46 which appears to be a fair provision for that town. Clr. Ruane stated that there is a definite need for at least 20 further cottages and that even when these will be provided there will still be 18 further applicants requiring cettages.

Clr. Nestor stated that the Land Commission is dividing land at present in the vicinity of Dunmore and that sites could be obtained thereon for 4 cottages which are urgently needed. Clr. Nestor handed to Mr. Doyle, Staff Officer, particulars of the names and addresses of these 4 persons. Clr. Nestor stated that one of the applicants, a Mr. Barrett, has been seeking a cottage for a couple of years past and that he and his family of five reside in one room.

Cir. Ashe requested that a cottage be provided for a Mr. Concannon who failed to qualify for the tenancy of one of the Ballybrit cottages and is at

The Chairman requested that the acquisition of the site at Aughrim would be completed quickly so that the Council could enter the land to provide the necessary cottages.

Clr. Collins requested that the provision of a cottage for Mr. McDonagh, Esker, Castleblakeney, would be expedited as the site is available.

Clr. Ruane requested that a cottage would be provided quickly for Mr.

Heavey who is residing in a shack at Ardfry.

On the proposition of Clr. Ashe the Committee eventually decided unanimously to recommend to the Council that the first scheme of cottages should be completed with all possible speed and that in the meantime the Council should proceed with the provision of cottages for all eligible applicants in addition to those included in the first scheme.

Clr. King suggested that applications for cottages should be brought before a meeting of the Committee so that the latter would decide if and where the cottages would be provided. This suggestion was supported by Clr. Kitt.

2. SMALL DWELLINGS (ACQUISITION) ACTS: The Secretary gave the following particulars in regard to applications for advances under the Small Dwellings (Acquisition) Acts :-

9033-Road Transport: In connection with Minute No. 8962 and letter of 11th March, 1953, from the District Superintendent, Coras Iompair Eireann, it was proposed by Clr. Geoghegan seconded by Clr. O'Toole and Resolved: "that the Council send a protest to Coras lompair Eireann in regard to their failure to deliver any new buses to the Galway area up to the present although the Tourist season is well

Clr. Geoghegan stated that while a considerable number of the new 'buses had been delivered to Ballina and Clonmel, the vehicles being used for the Connemara tours are most

On the proposition of Clr. Sirr, the Council also agreed to request Coras Iompair Eireann to arrange that the train which leaves Westport for Dublin at 9.20 a.m. daily will leave at an earlier time so that travellers would have extra time in Dublin. Clr. Sirr explained that many people from North Galway avail of this train service.

Clr. Ashe recommended and it was agreed that Coras lompair Eireann would also be requested to improve the bus service to Merlin Park, Galway.

and explained that in accordance with the new system the supplementary allowance will cease entirely and the employment allowance will be doubled so that there will be a loss of approximately £14,000 in the total amount of the agricultural grant for the current year.

Clr. Collins proposed that the Council oppose and protest against the new system of distribution of this grant as it results in a definite loss to the ratepayers since an additional allowance of £6/10/0 a year will not induce any farmer to

employ an extra workman.

The County Manager explained that the Department's circular was not received by the Council until 21st May, 1953, when the work on the applotment and on the writing of the demand notes was well advanced. It was necessary to cancel the demand notes already written and to revise much of the work on the ratebooks

Clr. King considered that the principle in the revised system is good, but that the increased allowance is not by any means

sufficient to achieve its object.

It was proposed by Clr. M. Quinn, Chairman, seconded by Clr. P. Collins and Resolved: "that the Minister for Local Government be requested to make good the loss sustained by the Council as a result of the late notification of the change in the system of distribution of the agricultural grant for the

9047—Housing Grants: As item No. 13 on the Agenda had been considered at a meeting of the Housing Committee on 11th instant, it was decided to defer further consideration of this matter until 27th June, 1953, when the Minutes of the Housing Committee will be available.

9048 County Roads Improvement and Five-year Plan: On the proposition of Clr. Collins seconded by Clr. Sirr, the Council approved the five-year plan for improvement of County roads as set out in the County Engineer's report of 11th June, 1952—Clr. Wall dissenting.

Kitt: "that the Council recommend that the road from Garbally School to Horseleap be included in the five-year plan." The County Engineer's report was submitted stating that he would like to wait until the end of the present year before making any recommendation to increase the programme of roads included in the five-year plan; that good progress is being made and that it may be possible to increase the programme. This report was noted and approved.

9060-Kylemore Pump: Clr. Houlihan requested that the pump at Kylemore, Abbey, Loughrea, would be put in order. The County Engineer's report of 12th instant was submitted from which it appears that the well is only 18' deep and that it will be necessary to sink the pump further to improve this supply. The carrying out of this work was recommended by the Council.

9061 Eyrecourt Sewerage Scheme: Clrs. Houlihan and O'Dowd requested that the provision of a sewerage scheme in Eyrecourt be expedited. The Secretary reported that only 27 out of a possible 52 houses had agreed to connect with the main sewer when provided; that the estimated cost of the scheme in January 1952 was £14,700 which would be approximately £545 per house for 27 houses. The County Engineer undertook to have the matter examined immediately with a view to seeing what could be done to improve the supply quickly. The County Manager stated that the Consulting Engineer had been directed to submit a proposal for the improvement of this water supply.

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9080.—Kilkerrin & Moylough Water Supplies: In reply to Clr. 9085. Kylemore Pump: Clr. Houlihan again drew attention to the state of this pump and requested that it would be put in working order.

9086.—Local Elections: Circular Letter 5/53 of 19th June, 1953, from the Department of Local Government was submitted and noted.

9087.—Rate Collector No. 4 District: The Secretary submitted medical certificate dated 24th June, 1953, stating that Miss Nora Lee, Rate Collector for No. 4 district, would be unfit for duty for at least two months from that date. It was proposed by Clr. Ashe seconded by Clr. O'Donnell that the Council hereby grant Miss Nora Lee, Rate Collector for No. 4 district, sick leave for the period 24th June to 23rd August, 1953, inclusive, and that her sister, Miss Margaret Lee, Clifden, be appointed as Deputy Rate Collector for No. 4 district during that period.

9088.—Anti-Partition Protest: Letter 22nd June, 1953, from the Anti-Partition Committee inviting the Council to attend a meeting in Eyre Square on Saturday, the 28th instant, to protest against the visit of the British Queen to Ireland, was submitted and noted.

9089.—Boarded-Out Children: The Chairman recommended that the request made by Mr. Delaney, Newbridge, that a boarded-out child, formerly boarded-out in his home, would be transferred to the house of a Mr. Hughes, Ballinamore Bridge, receive comsideration.

Clr. King recommended that some alteration be made in the regulations so as to permit of the retention of a boarded-out child in the house even though the foster-mother dies, in cases where the child has been boarded-out in that house for a long period.

9090.—Local Authorities Works Act, Schemes: Clr. Kitt proposed that there should be co-operation between the Council, the Department of Local Government and the Department of Agriculture in regard to the carrying out of Local Authorities (Works) Act, Schemes in areas where land project schemes are also being carried out.

The Chairman stated that he could not agree to restricting the County Engineer to proposals for particular schemes or schemes of a particular type and suggested that in such cases as Clr. Kitt had in mind, the work might be carried out as a Rural Improvement Scheme on payment of a contribution by the persons benefiting.

Deputy Mannion suggested that of the amount available for L.A.W. schemes for this year approximately £300 could be devoted to each Councillor's area.

The County Engineer stated that the sum available will only be sufficient to complete schemes which already have been started.

Eventually, on the proposition of Clr. Collins, seconded by Clr. O'Dowd, it was recommended that any additional schemes to be carried out in the current year be selected from the lists submitted for last year.
