ESTIMATES 2002

The County Manager gave a summary of the contents of the Estimates as contained in the Book of Estimates 2002, a copy of which was circulated to each member on 30^{th} December, 2001. He explained that the estimates had been prepared on the basis of a Local Government Fund allocation of £18,911,905, an increase of 8% on last years allocation, but that the Council had since been notified by the Department of Environment and Local Government that the actual allocation from the Local Government Fund would be £18,734,830.75, an increase of 7%. In total 74.97% of revenue income comes from state grants.

The Minister for the Environment and Local Government has directed that the rate in the pound for the year 2002 shall not exceed the rate in the pound for 2001 by more than 7.5%. As the Council's work and activity programme must be related to its

income level a 7.5% increase in the rate in the pound has been provided for. The estimated rate income based on this increase for 2002 is £7,457,100. The County Manager stated that the Council had the second lowest increase of the Rate in the Pound in the country in the period 1977-2001. The Council's Rate in the Pound in 2001 was the eighth lowest of any county council, and the lowest of any of the comparable large western counties such as Donegal, Mayo and Kerry.

The County Manager said that there would be no increase in Water Charges for 2002 for metered accounts and that there is a 5% increase over 2001 proposed for fixed charges (with the exception of farm troughs).

He then proceeded to outline the proposed expenditure programmes for 2002. In addition to the day to day operational arrangements, he highlighted some of the more significant features of the various programmes for 2002.

- Increased provision for Non-National Roads.
- Review of the Galway Land Use and Transportation Study.
- Additional funding for :

 - Arts Grants
 - Economic Activity Grants

- Continued improvements in Water and Sewerage network.
- New Initiative for Village Regeneration.
- Completion of planned housing upgrade programme.
- Burial Ground Grants provision.
- Further development of Financial Management System.
- Promotion of Forward Planning process.
- Extension of Service Delivery Programme.
- County Development Board Strategy.
- Review of Development Plan process.
- Fire Service development.
- Waste Management and Litter Control progress.
- Library Service extension.

The County Manager said that total revenue expenditure for the year is increased by 10.7% to £78,038,621 and that total expenditure for the year, including capital expenditure, would reach almost £135 million. He said that this amounted to expenditure of approximately £1/2 million per working day.

He said that the Council continues to play the lead role in the development of the County, primarily through its Capital Investment Programme in the provision and improvement of the infrastructure and through pursuing the objectives of the

Corporate Plan, adopted earlier this year. The implementation of the Programme of Change, provided for in "Better Local Government" both in respect of members and staff, is significantly improving measures for the evaluation and formulation of policy. The objective of increasing co-operation between the Council and Community and Voluntary Groups is also gaining momentum.

He thanked the Members of the Council for their assistance and support during the past year, especially the Cathaoirleach, Cllr. Michael Regan and his predecessor, An Comh. Connie Ni Fhatharta, and for their wholehearted commitment to the duties of the office and for their courtesy to the staff and himself. He recommended adoption of the Estimates as presented.

Cllr. Callanan welcomed the 7% increase in the allocation from the Local Government Fund and said that the Directors' Reports illustrated how many activities the Council was involved in. He said that it was unfortunate that rates must be increased by 7.5% and that this could cause difficulties for businesses especially in rural areas. He highlighted the difficulties experienced by Galway marts and hoped that this would be taken into account.

Cllr. Callanan complimented the Housing section on their work and welcomed the increased expenditure proposed for Disabled Persons Grants. He welcomed the Village Regeneration Scheme and the recognition given to communities through Amenity and Arts Grants. He hoped that the Council's contribution to the refurbishment of Ballinasloe Swimming Pool could be increased, as it is an amenity for all of East Galway and not just the town of Ballinasloe. He requested that Council officials investigate the state of traveller accommodation at Cappira. He also asked for clarification over where the income received from development contributions is spent.

Dep. Connaughton said that the report was a record of the tremendous activity of the Council. He said that the number of people employed by the Council and its' level of expenditure made it a very important part of the local economy. He said that the Estimates reflected the downturn in the economy. He expressed concern that although the level of road grants was increased, the level of inflation in the construction industry meant that the amount of work done on the roads in 2002 would be less than in the current year.

He expressed concern that it would take 10 years for a person going on the housing list now to get a house given the current level of investment, despite the increase in spending in the last number of years. He felt that Affordable Housing was not a solution in itself, as there remained many families who could not afford a mortgage at all.

Dep. Connaughton also welcomed the increased expenditure on the Disabled Persons Grants and said that it illustrated the necessity for a home improvement grant. He welcomed the introduction of the Village Regeneration Scheme on the proviso that it shouldn't replace once-off rural housing. He questioned whether there was infrastructure in place to facilitate village regeneration and where the funding for improving infrastructure would come from.

He said that it is essential that work proceed on the extension to Aras an Chontae so that the best possible service is provided to the public, but that this should not occur at the expense of decentralisation. He also said that decentralisation to electoral area offices, should not reduce the service available in existing engineering area offices.

Dep. Connaughton felt that the increase in rates would cause difficulties for many businesses and requested that the special difficulties experienced by marts in the past year be taken into consideration. He hoped that refurbishment works on the swimming pools at Ballinasloe and Tuam be funded before the end of the current grants scheme.

Cllr. Loughnane proposed that the amount of discretionary expenditure that each councillor has in relation to public lighting be increased to £2,000 and that each councillors allocated 'Notice of Motion' expenditure on roads be increased to £10,000. He said he was disappointed that councillors representations in regard to road improvements at Carrabane were not taken on board, and stressed the councillors role as the voice of the public. He said that delays in housing improvement works need to be addressed. He said that decentralisation should not affect the status of Athenry area office and requested that funding be made available for a swimming pool in Loughrea.

Cllr. Joyce said that road workers were doing an excellent job and that any long-term temporary staff should be made permanent if possible. He seconded Cllr. Loughnane's proposals regarding councillor's discretionary spending on provision of public lighting and 'notice of motion' roads works. He welcomed the number of water and sewerage schemes that have started or are due to start, but complained that only one out of 18 was in the Ballinasloe Electoral Area. He said that funding should be available for both upgrading existing schemes and new schemes, and that a special effort should be made to eliminate water pollution. He also requested increased funding for swimming pools and for sign posting along the Portumna-Ballygar tourist trail.

Cllr. P. McHugh complemented the Head of Finance on the way the Estimates were presented and the way the Council's finances are managed. He welcomed increased expenditure on Disabled Persons Grants and requested that delays in processing applications be addressed. He also requested information on the delay in dividing and renaming Parkmore Estate in Tuam and a report on the status of turnkey developments. He asked that the Council considers the purchase of land for the extension of burial grounds as a matter of urgency as burial plots are scarce.

Cllr. P. McHugh also felt that it is unfair of the Council to refuse planning permission because an Area Action Plan was needed, where the Council itself had not yet prepared such a Plan. He also stated that he had difficulties with the proposals for Abbey Trinity carpark in Tuam. He said that he voted in favour of the sale of the site on the basis that the development would include a hotel and streetscape, and that neither were now part of the planning application. He asked that the members be consulted about the implementation of disc parking schemes and that any such schemes be implemented simultaneously for on-street and off-street parking.

Cllr. J. Burke said that he was concerned by the reduction of certain state grants and that it was difficult to ask business for a 7.5% increase in rates when grants hadn't increased accordingly. He said that the valuation of premises by the Valuations Office was causing great difficulty for some businesses.

He welcomed the implementation of the Community Warden Scheme on a pilot basis in Co. Galway and the increased level of Arts grants. He agreed with Cllr. P. McHugh that disc parking should be implemented simultaneously both on-street and off-street.

Dep. Burke said that the rates increase is large, especially in an economic downturn and hoped that the Council would be sympathetic to cases of hardship. He said that the county was losing out to the city in rate income. He was concerned that improvements made in some services in recent years would not continue next year. He feared that the upgrading of group water schemes would not continue and hoped that the DoELG would increase funding.

Dep. Burke said that the current level of provision of new housing by the Council was insufficient to meet the demands of all those on the housing list. He asked the Council to consider approaching the Dept. of Environment and Local Government to refine the Town and Urban Renewal Scheme because of the low uptake. He asked that a special effort be made by the Council to stop the disintegration of Loughrea Town Hall. He said that the bridge at Kilchreest needs improvement work as a matter of urgency.

Cllr. T. McHugh said that the rate increase is very high, especially as it falls on such a small part of the community. He said that increasing valuations was causing difficulties for businesses when they could least afford it. He said that the implementation of Better Local Government had caused difficulties and looked forward to the smoother operation of services next year. He noted the increase in expenditure for public lighting and hoped that the member's discretionary allocation would be increased.

Cllr. T. McHugh suggested that works be programmed to ensure they are completed on time, so that best value is achieved from funding. He asked that the Council consider using sub-contractors to do works that Council staff could not, to ensure grants are not lost.

Councillor J.J. Mannion said that if the Council did not implement the full increase in the rate in the pound, it would be penalised in future Local Government Fund Allocations.

The County Manager noted that as Council employs almost 1200 staff and will spend £135 million in 2002, it must be seen to spend this money effectively. He acknowledged that there had been difficulties with the amount of staffing changes, but he was encouraged with the way senior staff have taken to their new posts. He looked forward to an improved service in the future, as the new staff that had been recruited are highly qualified, and apologised for any inconvenience caused during the changes. He said that the new structure of SPC's and the CPG was taking shape and that a programme of work for 2002 would be formulated in the near future.

The County Manager said that the Council had a major role to play with regard to the development of the county. He said that in preparing the Estimates a balance had to be struck between the requirements of the county and the ability of ratepayers to pay. He noted that the Council would spend £135 million in 2002, with only £7.5million being collected in rates. He said that a submission had been made to the Department of the

Environment and Local Government on the difficulties that Galway marts had experienced paying rates in 2001.

He said that he would report back to the members on the operation of the Village Regeneration Scheme. He said that the Amenity and Economic Development Grants in the Estimates helped strengthen the links between the council and communities.

He said that the housing programme outlined in the report was ambitious and he paid tribute to the various voluntary bodies also involved in the provision of housing. He said that all options needed to be utilised to meet the increasing demand for housing.

The County Manager explained that the extension of Áras an Chontae was necessary because of the unforeseeable increase in the level of services and staff since the building was originally designed. He said that a master plan had been prepared for the development of the remainder of the site at Áras an Chontae and that the recruitment of consultants was imminent and that a design remit was being prepared. Phase 2 of the development of the site would be the extension to Áras an Chontae and Phase 3 would include a new Library Headquarters, Branch Library and archival space. He said that the development would proceed without undue delay and that he would report to the CPG on developments.

With regard to decentralisation, he said that 5 electoral area offices had been agreed and that as many services as possible would be decentralized without reducing costeffectiveness. Ballinasloe office was being used as a pilot scheme to identify the level of service to be decentralised. He gave an undertaking that although the functions of the existing area offices may change, no office would be closed. He said that £10,000 per member would be provided for 'notice of motion' road works and that he hoped that this would be spent effectively. He said that contact would be made with the ESB to sort out delays in provision of new public lighting.

He said that Mr. T. Kavanagh would prepare a report for members regarding burial grounds, and that the council was having difficulty acquiring land to extend burial grounds.

He undertook to get planning officials to look at the difficulties encountered with Area Action Plans. He accepted that the uptake of the Urban Renewal Scheme was not as much as was hoped for and undertook to prepare a report for the members on the matter. He said that the level of Arts grants in the estimates for 2002 was as high as possible given the restrictions.

Mr. F. Gilmore told the members the Council had advertised for proposals for turnkey developments and that they received responses from twenty developers, offering 200 units. Two developments in Loughrea for 56 houses had been accepted and other proposals are being reviewed. He said the difficulty in relation to turnkey developments was not a lack of supply, but in matching supply to areas where there was demand. He said that staff had been appointed to improve estate management in the county.

APPLICANT: Mr. Eamon Conneely, Oyster Homes Ltd.

Mr. Comer gave details of the application referring to report dated 3rd December, 2001 which had been circulated in advance.

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT: The proposed development is for the construction of 14 dwellinghouses, sewage treatment plant, roads and all associated services and Outline Permission for crèche, 52 dwellinghouses and all associated services in the townland of Raheen, Athenry

LOCATION: The site is located at Raheen, Athenry and it fronts the public road. It is inside the Athenry town speed limits.

ZONING: The site is currently located in an agricultural zone according to the present Athenry Town Development Plan which was adopted in April 1992. The Draft Athenry Town Development Plan has now included this site in lands which are zoned for residential use. There is an archaeological site on part of this (site 118 of Map 84, Sites and Monuments Record) and is included in Table 3.2 and Map 2 of the current Athenry Town Plan as Ref. No. P25, "Site of Road" Preservation to be considered. Having discussed this item with Dúchas, conditions will be included in the planning permission to ensure that a careful archaeological survey and excavation with full report will be carried out.

PLANNING HISTORY: There were a number of planning applications made along the road frontage of this site, namely Planning Reference No. 53999, which was an outline permission granted for 4 no. dwellinghouses in September 1987. Planning Reference No. 23839 was an outline permission granted for the same site as above for 4 no. dwellinghouses in May 1976. Prior to the above applications, Planning Reference No's 2241, 10642, 10709, 10784, 10888, and 13276 were refused by the County Council and the Minister for Local Government on dates between May 1966 and August 1973.

OBJECTIONS: There is an objection from a neighbour based on (i) the zoning, (ii) the provision of a treatment plant rather than discharge to a public sewer which causes concern for the objector, (iii) the proposed boundary fence between both properties, (iv) the unclear site location map which was initially submitted with the application. The above concerns were taken into consideration when making the recommendation. (i) The material contravention was recommended due to the zoning of the present plan and because it is included in a residential use in the Athenry Town Plan. (ii) As a result of the request for further information the treatment plant was relocated within the site to an area where it conflicts with the County Council's Guidelines. (iii) The construction of a 2 metre high wall has been included in the conditions to be erected along the boundary between the properties. (iv) A revised site location map was submitted as a result of a

request for further information. There is an observation from another adjoining neighbour regarding the building line. Copy of the objection and observation attached.

ASSESSMENT: The proposal is for (i) Planning Permission for 14 no. dwellinghouses, sewage treatment plant, roads and all associated services and (ii) Outline Permission for crèche, 52 no. dwellinghouses and all associated services on this site which has a stated area of 4.93 hectares (12.256 acres). There is a good mix of house types including detached, semi-detached, both two-storey and single storey, and some terraced houses. There is also provision for a crèche facility. Site no. 80 shall be reserved for a community facility development which shall be the subject of a further planning application. Open space is satisfactory. The site adjoins a site on which planning permission was granted for 68 no. dwellinghouses in April 2000 and works on the construction have commenced.

RECOMMENDATION: It is recommended to materially contravene the Athenry Town Development Plan and to grant planning permission for the construction of 14 dwellinghouses, sewage treatment plant, roads and all associated services and outline permission for crèche, 51 dwellinghouses and all associated services, with conditions.

STATUTORY CONSIDERATION: A decision to grant permission cannot be made unless a resolution is passed by the members requiring that such a decision be made in accordance with Section 26(3) of the 1963 Planning Act as substituted by Section 39(d) of the 1976 Planning Act as amended by Section 45 of the Local Government Act 1991.

Public notice of the Council's intention to consider deciding to grant permission was given on 12th October 2001 and the notice invited members of the public to submit representations or objections. None were submitted.

If a resolution is passed requiring that a decision to grant permission be made, such a decision will issue with suitable conditions, otherwise a decision to refuse permission must issue.

The latest date for a decision on this application is 11th December 2001.

Cllr. Cunningham proposed that having considered the Planning Application made by Mr. Eamonn Conneely, Oyster Homes Ltd., for (i) Planning Permission for 14 no. dwellinghouses, sewage treatment plant, roads and all associated services and (ii) Outline Permission for crèche, 52 no. dwellinghouses and all associated services in the townland of Raheen, Athenry, and having considered the Report dated 3rd December, 2001, Galway County Council in accordance with the provisions of Section 26(3) of Local Government (Planning & Development) Act 1963, as amended by Section 39(d) of Local Government (Planning & Development) Act 1976, as amended by Section 45 of the Local Government Act, 1991 hereby require that a decision to grant permission be made in the case of this application.

TO CONSIDER DRAFT SLUDGE MANAGEMENT PLAN FOR GALWAY CITY & COUNTY.

Introducing the Draft Sludge Management Plan, Cllr. T. Mannion said that the Council is obliged to make a Waste Management Plan for all non-hazardous waste arising in the county and to comply with this requirement, the Council has adopted the Waste Management Plan for the Connacht region.

He said that one of the issues which the Council must now deal with is the Sludges created at the Council's Water and Sewerage Treatment plants. The Council must deal with this and this is being done jointly with the Galway Corporation as provided for in the legislation.

Cllr. Mannion said that the Draft Plan was considered by the Environmental and Conservation Services S.P.C. meeting on 14th November 2001. The S.P.C. recommended that the Council approve the Draft Plan, which will form a subset of the main Waste Management Plan.

Mr. Whyte of P.H. McCarthy & Partners, Consulting Engineers made a presentation to the Council highlighting the following, in relation to the Draft Sludge Management Plan. He said that the purpose of the Plan is to identify current sources, rates of production and final destinations for sludge in the county and to identify more appropriate uses based on the hierarchy of methods for waste management. The central element of the Plan is the provision of a high tech facility to be based at the Hub Centre in Tuam which will convert sludge to a biosolid product for beneficial reuse mainly as an agriculture fertiliser. Collection of the sludge within the county will be enabled by the construction of collection facilities at four satellite centres to be located at Ballinasloe, Loughrea, Oughterard and Clifden. An operational plan over a twenty year period will ensure the efficient distribution of the fertiliser principally in the agriculture sector.

In reply to matters raised by the members, Mr. Whyte also made the following points:

- Every small sewerage treatment plant will have an on-site treatment facility.
- Farmers in REPs can reuse sludge as a substitute for artificial fertiliser.
- Mutton Island is treating sludge to a biosolid standard and Tuam will only be used as an alternative to Mutton Island if the agricultural market dries up.
- Odour from the plant will be at a low level.

In reply to Cllr. T. Walsh, Mr. Kavanagh said that the Council was not obliged to go through the public consultation process but that this would be done and that the matter would also be on the agenda of a Tuam Area Committee.

It was proposed by Cllr. Mullins, seconded by Cllr. Cunningham and agreed that the matter be put on the agenda for each Area Committee and that the Draft Sludge Management Plan be put on public display.

The County Manager informed the members that a tour of the Sludge Treatment Plant at Ringsend, Dublin was taking place at 11.30a.m. on Friday 7th December 2001.

TO CONSIDER DRAFT LITTER MANAGEMENT PLAN 2001 1327

Introducing the Draft Litter Management Plan, Cllr. T. Mannion said that in accordance with the Litter Pollution Act 1997, the Council is required to review its Litter Management Plan every 3 years and that review had now taken place.

The Draft Plan seeks to identify the causes of litter, how to deal with them and prevent litter.

He said that this involves a whole number of issues: Attitude, apathy, awareness, education etc.

The Draft Plan encourages actions to tackle these issues, i.e.

- Increasing environmental awareness, especially among young people
- Involving schools in environmental campaigns
- Recycling initiatives
- Tidy towns competitions
- Working in partnership with communities
- Through enforcement if necessary

It is hoped that the community warden scheme will be a big help as regards litter management when the scheme is up and running.

Cllr. Mannion said that the Draft Plan was considered by the Environmental and Conservation Services S.P.C. on 14th November 2001 and he recommended it for approval by the Council.

Cllr. Joyce congratulated the Portumna Community School who got a Green Flag for their environmental project.

Mr. Kavanagh stated that there is now a litter phone line $-1850\ 24142$. He stated that the public are encouraged to use this phone line to report anybody seen littering anywhere in the county.

Cllr. Gavin welcomed the Draft Litter Management Plan and the new phone line. However, he stated that the Council needs greater teeth in dealing with problems such as abandoned vehicles and persistent offenders.

Cllr. Mullins welcomed the Plan but stated that the Council must get tough with litter louts and he felt that there were not enough litter wardens employed to do so.

Cllr. McDonagh welcomed the Plan also and congratulated the Council on the work being done. He hoped that the public will co-operate and use the phone line and stated that there is marvellous work being done in schools to promote anti-litter.

Dep. Burke congratulated the Environmental Education Officer for her work. He stated that one of the major causes of litter in towns are the A.T.M. machines operated by the Banks and stated that the Council should discuss this problem with the Banks.

The County Manager stated that two Assistant Environmental Education Officers and 14 Community Wardens are being employed by the Council and the Council intends to wage war on litter louts by putting people out in force to deal with the problem. He stated that the Council will look at the problem of A.T.M. machines causing litter.

RATES ON MARTS IN COUNTY GALWAY

Callanan asked that the Council consider giving the Marts in County Galway, a 50% reduction on rates due to the fact that they had to close for a substantial length of time during the year because of the foot and mouth crisis. He said that farmers had played a very important part in preventing the spread of foot and mouth disease in the country. Dep. Connaughton said that many of the Marts in the County were in financial difficulty. He said that they had complied with the directives from the Department of Agriculture in every way at their own expense. Cllr. Hynes asked that an exception be made in this case and a waiver be given to the Marts in recognition of their efforts in preventing the spread of the disease.

The Cathaoirleach stated that he had an interest in the planning application, the subject of this material contravention, and he left the meeting. It was agreed that Cllr. Callanan would act as Cathaoirleach for this item.

APPLICANT: Callanan & Fitzgerald, c/o O'Connor, Keogh & Mulcaire, Woodquay Court, Woodquay, Galway

PROPOSED DEVELOPMENT:

The proposed development is for the construction of 77 no. dwellinghouses with all site works and services at Danesfort Road in the townland of Caherwalter.

LOCATION:

The site is located in the townland of Caherwalter, at Danesfort Road on the north eastern outskirts of Loughrea Town where the maximum speed limit applies.

PLANNING HISTORY:

98/2685: Callanan & Fitzgerald withdrew application for outline permission for 6 no. dwellinghouses and full permission for 106 no. dwellinghouse in the townland of Caherwalter.

99/322^{Adj. site}: Jardonelle were granted permission to construct 60 no. dwellinghouses and associated services on the 8th November 1999.

ZONING:

The site is at present zoned for agricultural use in the current Loughrea Development Plan, but is zoned residential in the Draft Development Plan for Loughrea.

ASSESSMENT: The proposed development comprises of 77 no. dwellinghouses, comprising of a mix of units. The site size is 3.64 hectares (9 acres). A total of 16% of open space is being provided which is well supervised and relatively well sited. All gardens have the 11 metres minimum required rear garden space. A revised layout was submitted to the Planning Authority on the 13th March 2001, in order to incorporate a greater mix of house types due to the fact that the Planning Authority had some concerns in relation to the original layout in which house no's 8 & 50 were very close to the boundaries of an adjoining housing development, and were likely to interfere with the residential amenity of these existing houses. The revised layout is satisfactory.

The proposed development is to be connected to the public sewer. The time was originally extended on the application based on a Sanitary Services report and a Roads Design report because at the time of the application, it was considered premature as there was an existing deficiency in the sewerage treatment facilities in Loughrea. These problems have now been overcome.

OBJECTIONS: No objections to this planning application have been received.

RECOMMENDATION: Taking into consideration the proposed zoning of the lands for residential development in the Draft plan for Loughrea, a grant of planning permission is recommended subject to appropriate conditions.

STATUTORY CONSIDERATION: A decision to grant permission cannot be made unless a resolution is passed by the members requiring that such a decision be made in accordance with Section 26(3) of the 1963 Planning Act as substituted by Section 39(d) of the 1976 Planning Act as amended by Section 45 of the Local Government Act 1991.

Public notice of the Council's intention to consider deciding to grant permission was given on 7th September 2001 and the notice invited members of the public to submit representations or objections. None were submitted.

If a resolution is passed requiring that a decision to grant permission be made, such a decision will issue with suitable conditions, otherwise a decision to refuse permission must issue.

The latest date for a decision on this application is 6th November 2001.

Cllr. M. Loughnane proposed that having considered the Planning Application made by Callanan & Fitzgerald, c/o O'Connor, Keogh & Mulcaire, Woodquay Court, Woodquay, Galway for Planning permission for the construction of 77 no. dwellinghouses with all site works and services at Danesfort Road in the townland of Caherwalter, and having considered the Report dated 16th October 2001, Galway County Council in accordance with the provisions of Section 26(3) of Local Government (Planning & Development) Act 1963, as amended by Section 39 (d) of Local Government (Planning & Development) Act 1976, as amended by Section 45 of the Local Government Act, 1991 hereby require that a decision to grant permission be made in the case of this application.

On the proposal of Cllr. Fahy, seconded by Cllr. Callanan the Council noted the auditors report of River Fergus Joint Drainage Committee.

RIBBON DEVELOPMENT

Mr. L. Kavanagh responded to the written proposal submitted by Dep. U. Burke, recommending that the current County Development Plan be varied for the reasons stated in his proposal. Copies of the proposal and response had been circulated to the members. Mr. Kavanagh addressed the different points contained in Dep. Burke's proposal, namely:

The restrictive nature of current interpretation and application of Section 7.212 of the County Development Plan by planning officials.

- The present application and interpretation of the County Development Plan is at total variance with the Councillors stated policy intentions.
- If the rural population is to be sustained, resettlement has to be part of this process and resettlement cannot happen under the present interpretation of the Plan.
- The need to respond to the needs of families and planning applicants who work in an area and want to live in this rural environment.
- The sustainability of our local Sporting Clubs, which is seriously affected by rural population.
- Retention of the elderly in the rural areas, rather than urbanisation.
- Freedom of Choice
- The fact that family lands, where available as gifts, can ease the burden of the high cost of housing for young couples.

He stated that the County Development Plan is being correctly interpreted, and referred to planning statistics, which had been circulated, that indicated that the Council are granting a significant number of houses in rural areas under the current Plan. He rejected the notion that the Development Plan is responsible for rural decline, pointing out that decline in rural population is closely aligned with weak urban structure. He stated that the Development Plan is interpreted and applied by the Planning Authority in accordance with the policies and objectives stated in the Plan and that any policies or opinions not included in the Plan cannot be included in this interpretation.

Each case is considered on its merit. He stated that the Plan is more lenient on one-off housing development than current National Policy would appear to indicate as being appropriate. Rural de-population can best be reversed by providing a strong interlinked network of rural towns and villages, providing a range of economic opportunity, services, and social outlets sufficient to enable people in rural communities to remain there. He stated that each application for permission within the one and a half mile restrictive zones was given consideration on the merits of the particular case put forward, and that while the case of care for the elderly is a complex issue, there is nothing in the one and a half mile zone objective that makes this difficult issue any the more difficult. Under the present Plan, even in those restricted areas where the one and a half mile zone ribbonization objective applies, nobody deriving their income from agriculture is excluded, and they are allowed freedom of choice to remain in these rural areas. Referring to the suggestion that the use of family lands, given as gifts, and which could ease the burden of the high cost of housing for young couples, he stated that the inclusion of such a provision in the Development Plan would effectively mean that all rural lands within the County could be sold as development land, that this would contravene current National Policy, and be impossible to administer, leading to uncontrolled rural housing. Mr. Ridge referred to the Planning statistics for 2001 to date, a report on which had been circulated to members. He stated that the average refusal rate of 11.6% is well below the National average of 17.9%.

He stated that the Council had granted permission for 3,308 housing units in rural areas to date in 2001, and that at present the Council has 1,069 hectares of zoned residential development land, which using a density of 25 units per hectare, will accommodate

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26,725 housing units. Based on an occupancy rate of 2.2 persons this will house 59,000 persons, and this alone will house all the population growth in the county including Galway City, for the next 15 years. He stated that these figures refuted the allegation that development control is too restrictive. He stated that there was not a need to remove the ribbonization clause from the Plan, but that any changes should go through the normal review procedures.

Dep. U. Burke stated that the difference in interpretation between officials and members had to be eliminated, and that members have noted a change by planning officials in their interpretation of what constitutes ribbonization. He formally proposed a variation of the County Development Plan whereby the general objectives of the current County Development Plan as set out in section 7.212 "Control Ribbon Development in Rural areas" be removed for the reasons stated in his written submission.

In the discussion which followed, members made the following points regarding the proposed variation of the Development Plan: -

- The interpretation of Section 7.212 by officials is totally unreasonable and at variance with the wishes and understanding of members at the time that section of the Plan was agreed and the Plan adopted.
- The interpretation of the Section has changed mid-stream during the life of the current Plan.
- A person living in an area for up to 50 years may not be entitled to planning permission under the current provisions of the Plan.
- The provisions of the Plan apply equally to areas around Galway City as they do to outlying villages and towns, where entirely different situation exists.
- If An Taisce appeal all one-off housing development, as reported, this will cause major problems.
- 3 new houses in outlying areas could be as important economically as 700 would be to Galway City.
- East Galway is suffering from rural decline, with many parishes having no towns or villages.
- Officials who deal with these problems don't live in the rural area and are cushioned from its effects.
- Why does the Plan put people into villages and towns, but does not provide proper services?
 - The Clár report shows the declining population in County Galway, and while the decline is not all the fault of the Council or the Development Plan, the next Plan should take on board these figures.
 - The Development Plan should protect and enhance the entitlement of people to get planning permission in their own area.
- Members do not want to damage the environment but to sustain rural areas.
- The National Spatial Strategy does not reflect the situation in the West of Ireland.
 Development restrictions based on speed limits is wrong.

- The objectives seem to be to denude rural areas and bring people into larger towns and villages leading to traffic problems, underdeveloped services and social problems.
- To what extent can planning officials use their discretion in determining whether to grant or not to grant permission.
- If the one and a half mile development restrictions is revoked, an alternative proposal needs to be agreed.

Mr. Ridge, in reply to the points made by the members, stated that he understood the importance of this issue to members and was in agreement with most of the comments made by members. He stated that the structural weaknesses in the County were not as a result of development control. The National Spatial Strategy will have positive implications for the whole county and there is a need to see improvements in the areas suffering rural population decline. The Department of the Environment and Local Government has already been informed that towns and villages must get infrastructure and services, and the failure to have proper infrastructural services led to rural depopulation, not as a result of development control. The Council are at present giving permission for more than double the number of houses being developed. He stated that the few cases quoted where the Planning Department has been restrictive is low. He stated that policy is quite clearly laid out, and Officials have not got a right to interpret the policy as they see fit, that the requirements followed are statutory and do not allow use of discretion.

There are large parts of the County in which there are very few restrictions on development, and he contended that there is a need for social integration of towns and villages to attract industry, that the towns and villages are seen as being the backbone of rural Galway. Referring to the Clar report he stated the figures given are from 1926 and that most of the decline predates Development Control. He noted that while there are little restrictions except in a few areas the Officials would take into account the wishes of people wishing to live in their own area when the review of the Development Plan takes place.

The County Manager stated that the decline in population was not due to the Councils actions but was due to the structural changes in the rural areas. The Department accept that more money is needed to be spent to bring infrastructure up to standard and to attract investment to rural areas, and following rural development houses will follow. He suggested that the members agree to appoint a committee which would meet and work out an agreed clarification on the issues raised. Following further discussion members agreed to defer the motion on the understanding that progress would be made on the matter within a short time frame. It was agreed that the Committee would consist of the Cathaoirleach, Dep. U. Burke, Cllr. S. Walsh and Cllr. P. McHugh and they would agree the time scale for an outcome to their discussions.

NATIONAL SPATIAL STRATEGY – Indications for the Way Ahead

1293

Report dated 27th September, 2001 was circulated to each Member.

The County Manager explained that the N.S.S. document circulated to the Members was a discussion document. He said that the vast majority of the population of the country was in the Eastern region/Greater Dublin area. With the increase in the number of cars on the road, journey times have lengthened with a consequent pressure on the roads infrastructure. Up to this, a greater proportion of available funding has been directed towards the cities and larger towns. The aims of the N.S.S. include: -

- (i) The redistribution of jobs and population from the Eastern region.
- (ii) Examining ways in which funding for smaller towns and villages can be sourced.

Mr. Gavin said that the National Spatial Strategy is intended to provide an overall framework for dealing with spatial issues sustainably. Balanced regional development is central to the N.S.S.

Cllr. Joyce said that he felt that it would be difficult for the town of Ballinasloe to survive and compete with Athlone and Tullamore in attracting industry. Cllr. McClearn said that the State Agencies had failed to bring industry to the towns and villages in Galway. Cllr. P. McHugh said that forward planning, with substance, was necessary. The majority of industry is based in Galway City and is causing the roads to be clogged with traffic every day. The IDA promoted Galway City but should have also included Tuam and Ballinasloe.

The County Manager said that there is a strategy to change this and create a better balance. He said that there was more money available and that the Council should buy land for small enterprises. He said that there was tourism potential in East Galway and that Mr. Enda Thompson had been appointed as tourism co-ordinator. He said that, with the agreement of the Members, the Council would make a formal submission in relation to the N.S.S. by the 31st October, 2001.

POLICY TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR1294ALL COUNCILLORS1294

A copy of Circular Letter dated 4th October, 2001, from DoELG was circulated to each Member. Mr. Murphy said that the I.P.A. have now informed the Council that the next training seminar for this region, on the planning function, will be held in January 2002. The Members will be informed when further details come to hand.

CHAIRMANS BUSINESS

In reply to a query by Cllr. Hoade on the guidelines for erecting telephone masts, the Cathaoirleach said that this matter was being dealt with by the Planning and Development Strategic Policy Committee.

In reply to Cllr. Hoade, Mr. Morgan said that the speed limits for non-national roads would be available within the next couple of weeks.
