Drawing attention to Article 28 of the Dispensary Rules from which it will be observed that the Guardians are bound to pay the Medical Practitioner employed to discharge temporarily the duties of the Medical Officer when on vacation such reasonable remuneration as the Local Government Board shall approve or direct.

The Board note that Dr. Waters is willing to accept remuneration for his services as temporary Medical Officer at the rate usually allowed, namely, £ 3-3-0 a week, and the Board consider that this scale of remuneration is reasonable and they direct that payment be made to him accordingly by the Guardians out of the Union Funds.

The Guardians beg to observe in reply that they adhere to their decision stated in the Minutes of the 1<sup>st</sup> inst.

The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon, as follows:—

Samples of 20 chests of Tea stored in Custom House, and one delivered at the Workhouse by the new Contractor, were forwarded to the Analyst on the 24<sup>th</sup> inst.

The Medical Officers report the Tea to be bitter and that it cannot be used by nurses, patients, and inmates.

*Order.* A small supply of other Tea to be procured from the Contractor, pending the Analyst's report on samples forwarded to him.

Kate Butler and Lizzie Berkery, inmates, reported to me on 23<sup>rd</sup> inst. that the Schoolmaster had severely beaten their children. I saw them and they bore marks of punishment with a rod. Four boys in all were beaten. Dr. Lyden's attention was called to them and he has a report on the matter.

Pat Barrett, an old inmate, gave another old inmate named Pat. Comeely, a blow of a stick on his head and cut him on the 26<sup>th</sup> inst. Comeely was sent to the Hospital for treatment. I stopped Barrett's allowance of Tobacco pending the order of the Guardians.

*Approved.* The tobacco allowance to be stopped until further orders.

Nurse Clynnes is off duty in the Workhouse Hospital since 25<sup>th</sup> inst. being ill. She is at present on the Doctors' Book as a patient.

The Schoolboys were out once during past week.  
*Order.* The boys to be brought out 3 or 4 times a <sup>week</sup> when the weather permits.

Hospital.

I requisitioned the Workhouse Ambulance and  
a nurse to come to Clarenbridge to remove  
the patient to Hospital, coming through the  
village of Braamore the Police got the Ambulance  
driver to go to the Courthouse, the patient was  
committed a prisoner on remand to Galway  
Gaol. Learning this I wished to send the Am-  
bulance away without the patient but the  
Magistrate objected, the prisoner and two Police-  
men were conveyed in the Ambulance to the  
Gaol.

Margaret Lane was charged with murdering her infant  
child, An Inquest was held on the remains. Dr.

Dr. Kirwan was examined at the Inquest.  
Order - Dr. Kirwan to be called upon to furnish an explan-  
ation in writing why, knowing the woman was in  
the custody of the Police, he requisitioned her removal  
to the Workhouse Hospital.

Order. Placards giving information as to how the services

"Gentlemen,

In giving you an explanation as to the charge of ill-treatment preferred against me on Wednesday last, I most respectfully beg to state that owing to filthy language I was obliged to punish a boy named Beidler the son of an able bodied carpenter at present in the Workhouse. His conduct was so demoralizing to the other children that some personal correction was indispensably necessary. On previous occasions several of the other boys drew my attention to him. He would not allow them to sleep at night, while the expressions he made use of in their presence would be unfit for reproduction. Even while at prayers in the Chapel he was heard to express himself most indecently. As regards the other boys the occurrence was purely unintentional on my part. A few of them have contracted very filthy habits at night, which if allowed to grow up with them would render them nuisances all their lives. If I punished them to eradicate these dirty habits I considered I was doing it for the best. However in dealing with

children it is very easy to outstep the margin that lies between moderate correction and a little severity. If I have done so though indeliberately on this occasion I am very sorry for it and it will never occur again.
