The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and orders made thereon as follows:—

Dr. J. J. McDonagh reported to me on the 3rd inst. that John Duggan's premises had been put in a sanitary condition, and I resumed taking a supply of milk from his son Thomas on the 4th inst.

20 chests of Tea have been stored by the contractor and 8 sent samples to the Tea Taster on the 6th inst.

The Nurses having returned butter supplied to them, I called the attention of the Medical Officer to it, and he directed that it be returned to the contractor. This was done, and good butter was supplied instead. Nurse Laniel returned after vacation on the 8th inst, and her substitute, Nurse Noonan, left this morning. Dregated beef and mutton supplied by the contractor several times during the week, and in ^{some} instances had to buy some elsewhere charging him with the extra cost.

The Schoolmaster was admitted to Hospital as a patient on the 9th inst. Stook took of the Boys' clothing but not having the clothing books I cannot say how the return stands.

Workhouse Medical Officer.

The Schoolmaster is at present a patient in Hospital suffering from an injury to his chest. It will be some time before he will be able to resume duty.

A plaster cutter is required for use in the Hospital.

4th Oct. } -minded persons under 60 years of age (exclusive of persons certified as insane) who were inmates of the Workhouse, or otherwise chargeable to the Union, on the 1st January, 1906.

3rd Oct. 06. From the Engine Boiler Insurance Co., reporting that one of their Inspectors made an ordinary inspection of the Engine Boiler at the Workhouse on the 26th inst. and where seen found same and the mountings attached in working order.

3rd Oct. 06. From Mr. P. Blake, offering to give the Guardians a lease of the portion of land on his property at the rear of the

Workhouse which has been selected by them as a site for a new Fever Hospital, for a term of 999 years at an annual rent of £10, the Guardians to pay all taxes. Also to make a roadway around the edge of the plot for the use of the people having fields adjoining on his property; and to arrange with Mr John Hurley who now grazes the plot for possession of same. The lease to be prepared by Mr Henry Concanon, (Mr Blake's) Solicitor, and the costs of same to be paid by the Guardians; to date from 29th September, 1906.

The Clerk read a copy of a notice posted to each Guardian on the 6th inst. that this offer of Mr Blake's was to be considered at meeting today.

It was proposed by Sir J. O'Donoghue, seconded by Mr W. McNeill, and unanimously

Resolved - that Mr Blake's offer be accepted, that the Fever Hospital Committee be instructed to make all preliminary arrangements and report to the Guardians as soon as possible.

The order given to Mr Murphy, Solicitor, to take steps towards acquiring this site compulsorily to be withdrawn.

9th Oct. 06. From Mr. O'Hara, Tea Taster, reporting that he tasted and examined the 20 samples of tea sent to him from the Workhouse and found them the same as the contract sample.

10th Oct. 06. From Miss Molloy, Workhouse Hospital Nurse, referring to the Guardians' request to pay 1/2 the cost of an extra day for the nurse who acted as substitute during her vacation, and

explaining that she left on 30th August and returned on the 26th Sept. and reported herself to the Master before 6 pm on that date. Before leaving she told the Master she would return on the evening of the 26th Sept.

Order. To be informed that the Guardians will insist upon her payment of the 1/2 extra cost.

The Workhouse Master submitted a scale of dietary for tramp women's children under two years of age, as follows: -

Children from 1 to 2 years, for breakfast - 4 oz. white bread and 1/2 pint of milk; same for dinner, and same for supper.

Children under 1 year, for breakfast 1/2 pint of milk, same for dinner, and same for supper.

I have been informed that the bedding and clothing in the Fever Hospital are in much the same condition as that of the Workhouse Hospital, and I have valued them in accordance. Some boots in the Schoolmaster's Department were green moulded though otherwise good.

This may be due to keeping them in a damp place. A little oil should be put on them.
