

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland, and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively), as follows:—

Read Letter from L.G.B. No 4156/16, dated 1st February, 1916.

adverting to the entry in the Minutes of the 5th mtg. relative to the terms of the Deed of Conveyance of the 9th Decr., 1913, to the Guardians of the plot of ground at Moycullen used as a site for the Medical Officer's Residence & Dispensary, stating that the Board are advised that the Deed should have been enrolled within six months from the date of execution. If the Disentailing Deed mentioned in the letter which the Guardians received from their Solicitors & stated to have been enrolled on the 7th Oct., 1914, includes the lands comprised in the Conveyance of 9th Decr., 1913, it would confirm the voidable estate vested in the Guardians by the latter Deed, & they would now have an absolute estate in fee simple vested in them. It should, however, be definitely ascertained that the Deed of 7th Oct., 1914, not only contains a description which includes the lands comprised in the first Deed, but also that it does not contain any words of exception which would exclude lands which have been sold or parted with.
