

Read Letter from *Mess<sup>rs</sup> Poileau & Coys*, dated *22<sup>nd</sup> Feb.* 1916,

Contractors for the supply of Medicines, calling attention to the % furnished by them for increased prices owing to the War, amounting to £8-4-10. The drugs on which advanced prices are asked are only those referred to by the L.G.B. in their circular letter to Medical Officers, dated 15-10-14, & amount claimed only partially represents their loss.

*23<sup>rd</sup> Feb. '16.* From same requesting that arrangements be made by Medical Officers for the return of empties from Workhouse & Dispensaries.

*Orders.* See Contractors' claim for £8-4-10 to be again forwarded to the L.G.B. with a request to be informed whether, in the event of payment being made by the Guardians, the Board will ensure that a recoupment of half the amount will be made.

In connection with this matter the Guardians beg to refer the Board to the note made in the Minutes of 19-5-15, after the entry of Board letter No 22374/15, dated 13-5-15.

The several Medical Officers to be requested to make arrangements for the return of empties as suggested by the contractors.

*28<sup>th</sup> Feb. '16.* From Dr Lanyon of Dracumore, certifying that Miss Powell, Midwife in the Curloughmore Disp. Dist. is suffering from Anaemia with debility, &c, & will be unable to work for four weeks. Moved by McLoone, seconded by McHydon, & Resolved that Nurse Margt. McIntyre be appointed to act as substitute at £1-5-0 a week, as remuneration for her services.

*29<sup>th</sup> Feb. '16.* From Dr G. A. Francis, Medical Officer of Moycullen Disp. Dist. applying for 6 days' leave of absence; stating that he has made arrangement with Dr Loftus, Medical Officer of Spiddal Disp. Dist. to act as substitute, remuneration for such services to be paid by him (Dr Francis). *Six days' leave of absence granted. The proposed arrangement approved by the Guardians.*

*29<sup>th</sup> Feb. '16.* From Dr Glynn, Medical Officer of Curloughmore Disp. Dist. requesting the Guardians to deduct from next payment to the Medicines Contractors, the sum of £1-10-0 due by them being cost of two deliveries of Medicines & empties. *Order.* A copy of this claim to be furnished to the Contractors.

*29<sup>th</sup> Feb. '16.* From the Porter of the Salway Dispensary, applying for a War Bonus because of the increase in the cost of living. He finds he is unable to live on his present small salary, a little over 8/- a week, calling attention to the saving in the consumption of coal since he came into office. *The Guardians are unable to comply with this request.*

*1<sup>st</sup> Mar. '16.* From the Relieving Officer of the Spiddal Disp. Dist. reporting that the Medical Officer resumed duty on the 23<sup>rd</sup> ult. after leave of absence.

Mr. Kims B.C. submitted a claim for £5-5-0 being for inspection of the Medical Officers' Residence at Spiddal, preparing specification & superintending the carrying out of contract for repairs, & car hire.
