transmitting for the information of the Guardians
a memorandum of the inspection on the 11th ultimo
of the insane inmates of the Workhouse.

" I inspected on the 11th October those inmates of the
" Galway Workhouse who are classed as lunatics or
" imbeciles. There are only 4 in number - 3 lunatics
" and 1 deaf-mute imbecile - all males. They seemed
" to be quiet and harmless patients, and are
" associated with the infirm inmates whose con-
" dition in some cases they so closely approach.
" One of them works in the Cook-house, and a second
" is employed carrying coal. Their condition and
" treatment call for no special remarks. There
" is an evident desire to treat these afflicted
" people humanely, but I regret to be obliged to
" state that neither their persons nor bedding were
" clean, or free from vermin. I need not remind
" the Guardians that a class so helpless as the great-
" majority of the insane, require constant attention to

"to their personal cleanliness, while as regards the bedding, I consider the Guardians would in the long run find it more economical to supply them with wire woven bedsteads covered with hair, or even fibre mattresses, than obliging them to sleep on straw ticks, which in some cases require to be renewed almost daily if the bedding is to be kept clean."

Order the attention of the Master and Matron of the Workhouse to be directed to the very unpleasant nature of this report.

25th Oct 92. Circular letter from the Secretary to the Irish Cattle Traders and Stockowners' Association, enclosing a copy of a resolution of the Association.

"That we, the Committee of the Irish Cattle Traders and Stockowners' Association, demand from the Government the appointment of an Irish Agricultural Department, to be worked by Irishmen who have a thorough knowledge of the agricultural necessities of their own country; seeing that in England, where the agricultural interest is but 14 per cent. of the industrial volume, there is an Agricultural Department, with 82 salaried officials, while in Ireland, where the overwhelming majority of the population have to depend for income on the products of the soil, there is no Agricultural Department whatever. That copies of this resolution be forwarded to the Premier, the Lord Lieutenant, the Chief Secretary, and the Irish Corporations, Grand Juries, and Poor-law Boards."

The adoption of the foregoing resolution was moved by Mr. P. Kearns, seconded by Mr. T. A. O'Sullivan, and carried unanimously.

Pursuant to notice given for this date Major Whynoch, Esq. moved the adoption of the following report.

REPORT.

We the Committee appointed to consider the scheme for promoting Technical Education in Galway Union, met Mr Arnold Graves on the 11th inst, and discussed with that gentleman the different branches that might be found applicable to this district.

It was agreed that the fishing industry, viz:—the catching and curing of fish, the making of nets and boat building, having been already taken up by the Congested Districts Board, it had best be left in the hands of that body to develop.

That this Union confine itself

First—To the improvement of Agriculture.

Second—To the breeding and rearing of Stock viz., Cattle, Sheep, Poultry, etc.

Third—The Woollen and other local Industries.

Fourth—For the town of Galway and its immediate vicinity, manual instruction for boys in Carpentry, Smith work and other trades; and to girls, instruction in Cooking and Laundry work.

That peripatetic teachers be engaged to give instruction in the above trades and local industries. That in order to give effect to the above schemes it was agreed to apply to the following bodies for such assistance as they usually afford to promote and foster similar undertakings, viz:—

First—The science and art department;

Second—The National Board of Education;

Third—The Congested Districts Board;

Fourth—The Minister for Agriculture;

Fifth—The Royal Dublin Society;

Sixth—The various Universities of England, each of whom it is hoped will recognise the utility of those various schemes for improving the status of the labouring classes. For instance, the science and art departments have power to grant £500 for buildings for the promotion of science, and a like sum for building for art instruction, and we feel assured the other departments named will contribute substantial Subsidies

As local aid is required where grants are voted by some of the above departments, it was agreed to ask the guardians to vote a sum not exceeding 1d in the £ over the union at large, which with such grants as may be afforded them, would be applied.

First—To the acquiring of a suitable building where instruction would be given, and evening lectures delivered on one or other of the various industries.

Second—For the salaries of the lecturers, and the peripatetic teachers.

Third—For the purchase of implements looms, &c. required for the various trades and industries.

It was finally agreed to invite the following to lend their names and services for the promotion of the above useful undertaking. The Lord Bishop of Galway, the President of Queen's College, the Chairman of the Board of Guardians, the Chairman of the Galway Town Commissioners, Rev. P. J. Lally, Rev Mr. Berry, Rev. Mr. Clarke, Captain Waithman, Mr. Perry, M.E., and Mr. Grealy.
