Read Letter from Secretaries to Board of National Education, dated 15th June, 1866, forwarding the following extract from the District Inspector's Report of the 20th April last on the state of the Workhouse School:—

"In the boys' department the course of training and instruction is satisfactory. The boys are nearly all of tender years and they have been intelligently instructed up to their capacity. In the girls' school the progress has been somewhat retarded during the past three months by the insubordination of a few of the more grown girls, who seem, by precept and example to have over-ruled discipline. I spoke to the principals of them and they promised amendment, so that I hope action by the Board of Guardians will be unnecessary. I think it right to state that Miss O'Keilly conducted the Clevedon Union School satisfactorily for two years.

The promotion from class to class in boys' school amounted to 88 per cent of the average attendance during the year—

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

The following entries were read from the Chaplain's Book: -
 "Visited this Workhouse and was much pleased with the neatness and cleanliness, particularly in the Hospitals and Schools - We would respectfully call the attention of the Chaplain to the following points, with the view of submitting them to the proper authorities - one a question of right, and the other a question of fact. 1st. Is it allowable according to the rules of the Workhouse to admit Bible readers into the Hospital, and in a loud declamatory tone address a single pauper in a tone calculated to excite the feeling of all the other patients? 2nd. If this be not allowable, has this taken place within the last eight or ten days? We request the Chaplain's attention to these points, to submit them to the proper authorities, to vindicate the right, if violated, and to prevent the recurrence of the fact, if it occurred, and if it be not allowable -

"In reply to the above, referred to me by the Most Rev. J. Macrilly, Lord Bishop, I beg to recommend the first question of right to the attentive consideration of the Board of Guardians. As to the second of fact, I beg to state that on last Board a layman in the employment of the Church Mission Society assisted at the dying bed of a protestant pauper - After adjournment of the Board I was credibly informed he did so in a manner offensive and annoying to the Catholic patients in the same ward in Hospital -

I beg respectfully to request the Guardians will establish a rule excluding such persons in future, or, at least put a stop to such a scene as occurred on last Board. - I beg further to state that in imparting instruction and administering the Sacraments of the Catholic Church, I always take especial care not to be perceived or heard, if possible, by Protestants, should there be any in the Hospital - a similar regard for religious belief I would expect from persons of a different persuasion -

Resolved - That having made inquiry into the subject matter of the Reports entered on the Chaplain's Book by the Lord Bishop of Galway and the Rev. Mr. Dooley, Roman Catholic Chaplain, the Board find that the person referred to was inadvertently permitted to enter the Workhouse, owing principally to the want of a Porter.

The Board strongly disapproves of the improper and unauthorized admission of such a person as the Scripture reader, and regret the annoyance it has caused -

Although there has been some remissness the Board are glad that no Union Officer has had any participation in the impropriety that has taken place, as the Protestant Chaplain has disclaimed any sanction of the act -

That his Lordship be informed that the Board would visit with the most severe censure any Officer who would be guilty of encouraging the visits of such a class of persons to this House - and that the Chairman be requested to convey to his Lordship this resolution -

In pursuance of notice given on the 8th inst, Mr. James Clarke moved - That the resolution passed on the 17th November last be rescinded, and that a petition against "Union Rating" be that day adopted and forthwith forwarded to one of our Members for presentation to Parliament. That this subject having been five times considered by the Board within the last few months ought not to be again reopened for discussion, as it can be of little importance which way a resolution may be carried after the formal presentation of a petition to parliament in favor of Union Rating, which cannot be now withdrawn by any resolution of this Board.

A Division was taken on the amendment, and it was declared lost, 15 Voting for it and 18 against -

The resolution was then put, and Mr. Grealy moved as an amendment - that the consideration ^{of the question} be adjourned to this day six months.

The Board again divided, and the amendment was lost, the numbers being the same as on the first division -

On the resolution being again put from the chair, the following amendment was moved by Mr. George Morris, and seconded by Mr. W. J. Inman Resolved - A petition having been presented to parliament in favor of Union Rating, is derogatory to this Board now to present one against it.

A poll was taken and the amendment lost - 15 for and 18 against -

The original resolution was again put, and upon a Division was declared carried by a majority of 18 to 15 -

Mr. Clarke thereupon submitted for the adoption of the Board a petition to the House of Commons against Union Rating -

Several members objected to the adoption of the petition, and argued that, according to precedent, it should lie on the table for at least one week for the consideration of the guardians.

and moreover special exception was taken to the terms of the first paragraph, the only one read.

Mr. J. Grealy immediately handed in the following notice of motion.

I hereby give notice that I shall move on this day for a night, - that the resolution carried this day to petition parliament against Union Rating be rescinded, inasmuch as it would derogate from the character and consistency of the Board to forward such a petition after the presentation of a petition in favor of that measure, and also because the altered condition of the country renders that change in the law of rating just and necessary, and that the resolution passed this day does not represent the opinion of a majority of the Guardians of this Union.

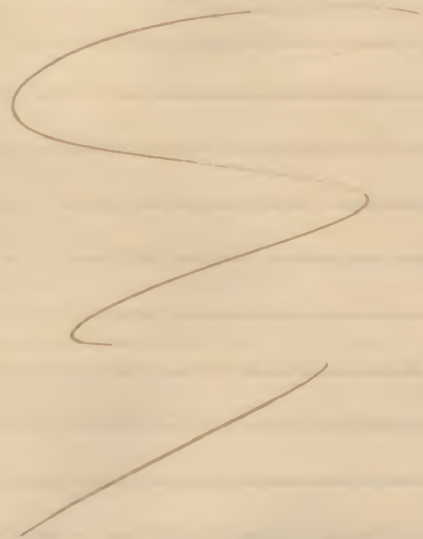
