Whereas the Poor Law Commissioners are of opinion that I should only receive the sum of £4 the same as the other Relieving Officers whose duties are different to mine, I respectfully decline the receipt of the £4 per annum and for the future shall do the duty gratuitously rather than take so small a sum until such time as your Board shall give this matter your further consideration. I am still of opinion if my case were fully laid before the Poor Law Commrs they would not refuse the increase you have so kindly recommended.

1st That the meals had not been served at regular hours, the dinner having been on some occasions delayed to 7 o'clock -

The Master stated that this was owing to the death of the Meal Contractor and to difficulty and delay in procuring supplies of Meal from his representatives -

2nd That Sturabout made of all Indian Meal had on some mornings been given to the inmates for Breakfast instead of equal parts of Potmeal and Indian Meal -

The Master explained that this arose from the cause above stated and that he gave Sturabout made from all Potmeal on an equal number of mornings. He denies that Brown Bread had on any occasion been made from all Ind. Meal exclusively.

3rd That no onions had been put on the soup for a period of about two months, although onions grown on the Workhouse ground were in store, and charged every week in the Provision Account as Consumed -

The Master's explanation on this point was to the effect that, having a supply of Turnips on hands, he thought it better to use them and spare the Onions lest the supply may run short during the Summer -

The Master maintained that the Meat and Milk supplies for use of the House are of fair, good, though not best quality.



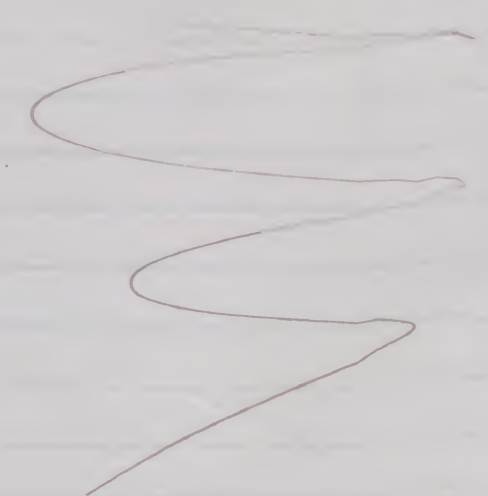

Gentlemen,

With reference to the question of the produce of bread made from equal parts of Oatmeal and Indian Meal, I beg to remind you that the standard of increase on the meal used, up to May 1862, was one-seventh, or about 14 per cent. At that time the Board, on the recommendation of the Visiting Committee, desired that I should make a trial to ascertain the actual yield, and upon my report a standard of 20 per cent increase was fixed, and the late Master accounted for the consumption at that rate thenceforward until he resigned in September, 1864. The same proportion of increase has been charged to the present Master since he took office 2½ years since -

In accordance with the request of the Board to have a further trial made, I got on Thursday, the 21st instant, 10 stones of meal (5 of each kind) weighed from the

Stone

store, and attended in the bakehouse to see it ~~weighed~~ made into dough and scaled.

The 140 lbs meal, less 4 lbs remaining unused, produced a number of cakes made for different classes, which in the aggregate should have weighed $149\frac{1}{4}$ lbs in baked bread, being equal to an increase of $9\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. However 12 cakes, supposed to be 24 lbs, having been put into the scale weighed only $22\frac{1}{2}$ lbs. At this rate the 136 lbs of meal, although scaled for $149\frac{1}{4}$ lbs of Bread, would yield only $137\frac{1}{4}$ lbs.

I am at a loss to reconcile the experiment with the former trial, and am led to think that by using the smallest possible quantity of water and by extra baking this description of bread may be made so as to give very little increase on the meal used. At the same time the 20 per cent increase charged to the late Master for over two years without any complaint shows that such a yield is attainable, and also the difficulty of fixing any definite ratio between bread and meal.

Having weighed the meal in store on Saturday night last and compared the quantity with the balance appearing by the Provision Acct. to be on hand of the Master, I find there is a deficiency of ~~242~~¹⁹⁸² lbs of oatmeal and 2462 lbs of Indian meal.

From 29th Sept. 1864 to 25th inst. 80,782 lbs of brown bread have been consumed in the Workhouse, for which the Master has been allowed 67,310 lbs of meal. Assuming that the deficiency is owing to loss in baking, and adding it to the quantity already credited to the Master, the result would exhibit an average increase in bread over meal equal to 14 per cent.

From this it is evident that there is a good deal of uncertainty regarding the weight of bread produced from the meal by the process in use - that in fact it varies with the quantity of water used and the degree of baking received - and that consequently the inmates are affected to the same extent.

I would respectfully suggest for the

Consideration of the Board that this trouble
and uncertainty could be avoided by procuring
wholemeal bread by contract, which is much
better than the bread now made in the House,
and could I think be obtained at a trifling
additional cost. For the children at least
the substitution of whole-meal bread would be
a desirable improvement in the dietary -
