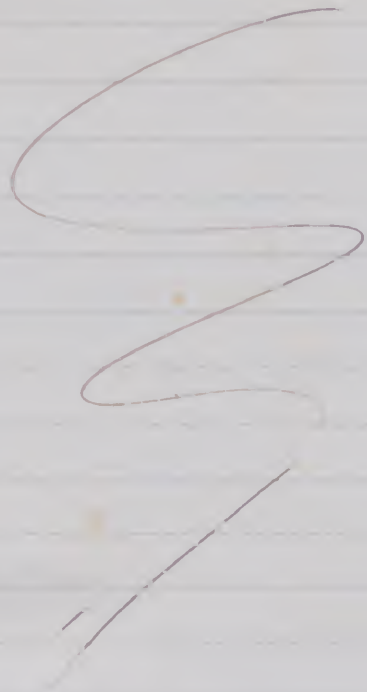

Read Letter from Secretaries of National Education Board, dated 4<sup>th</sup> July, 1867, forwarding Extracts from the District Inspector's Report of 14<sup>th</sup> May last on the Workhouse Schools:

The pupils in the male department of the school have passed a fair examination on the whole; but they read in all the classes in a low indistinct tone of voice. They show fair proficiency in slate arithmetic; but should be much more ready at mental calculations. The junior classes also should be much more accurate in the multiplication and pence tables, the penmanship is taught with some care, but a closer imitation of the head lines should be insisted upon -

"The girls show a fair proficiency in reading and spelling, and know perhaps as much grammar and geography as need be expected from them; but their knowledge of arithmetic is very low, no child in the girls' school being able to write down numbers as far as millions, and all the third class failing to divide money. They are not taught mental calculations, and they know the tables very imperfectly. The penmanship in their department was <sup>is</sup> very

poor

poor; the style is meant to be angular; but it, in most instances, is an ugly scratch, not in the slightest degree an imitation of the writing of the schoolmistress, who writes a neat angular hand -"

Ordered. That the attention of the Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress be directed to the report of the School Inspector, and in particular to the defects he has noticed.

Read Letter from Mr. William Kelly, Poor Rate Collector, dated 5<sup>th</sup> July, in reference to the case of arrears of Poor Rate brought under the notice of the Board of Guardians by Mr. Robt. J. Sivers on the 20<sup>th</sup> June - Stating that the occupier of the tenement was so poor as to be unable to pay the rate, and that there was nothing on which to distress for rent or rates - that one of her children became an inmate of the Workhouse last year - That the rate Committee directed the arrears in question to be brought forward to the current rate -
