The Clerk laid before the Board a notice served upon him of Mr. John Miller's intention to appeal against the reduced valuation of £1000 laid on the Salmon Fishery as being excessive.

Also a notice prepared by him for service on Mr. John Miller and the Commissioners of Valuation of the intention of the Board of Guardians to appeal against the said revised valuation, on the ground that it is too low.

One tender was received for executing the proposed improvements in the Lavatories attached to the Workhouse Schoolrooms, for the sum of £108.

The Board considered the sum too large, and declined to accept the tender.

Tenders were received for the supply of oatmeal and Indian Meal to the 29th Sept next.

After some consideration, it was agreed that the necessary supply of those articles should be purchased by the Master for a month on the cheapest terms, to enable the Guardians to judge of the course of the markets by that time.

Report of Visiting Committee-

Tuesday, 31st March, 1860.

Members Present: Messrs James Davis, Edward D. Burke, James Dohy, John Gill, and Capt. F. D. Donohue.

After an inspection of the Chapel, the Committee arrived at the conclusion that the walls do not require to be painted, and felt some doubt whether painting would be an improvement on their present state and appearance. The western side is somewhat dark in appearance owing to damp.

The Committee did not discover any defect in the sewerage, or other cause for bad smells in the House, with the exception of the dung keeve which during the prevalence of northerly winds would diffuse an unpleasant odour. The only remedy for this is the use of some deodorizing substance, such as dry peat-mould, dried earth,

The accommodation afforded by the privy in the Women's yard for the use of a large number of females and children is defective, consisting entirely of portable boxes, which are inconvenient to the children. There is no rain or sewer to carry off water.

The Committee recommend the cancelling of 20 men's shirts from the Hospital stock to be broken up for repairs, and the supply of 60 yards of gray calico to replace those articles.

Michael Mc Mahon and James Minogue, two single men, for whose discharge an order was given on Friday last, refused to leave the House, and the Committee advised the Master to bring them before the magistrates.

The Committee requests the Board's approval of their recommendation to the Master to give James Connaughtan a pair of shoes, and to provide clothing for his two infant children (twins) lately born in the Workhouse.

The House generally was in a satisfactory state of cleanliness and regularity.

At the stock taking in June last year, a deficiency of 10 sheets, 1 blanket, and 1 Rug was reported in the Fever Hospital stock, and an order made that the deficiency should be made good by Mr. Hatcher. The Committee find that this order has not been carried out, and recommend the matter to the consideration of the Board.

The Committee would suggest that P. Colahan be requested to count the stock of clothing &c. in the Fever Hospital, and to make a return of same to the Board.

A large quantity of unsewable clothing accumulating for years, was found in the store. It appeared to the Committee that it is a mere fiction to retain those articles on the clothing books. Without going to the full extent of clearing away the whole, the Committee recommend the following to be cancelled, destroyed as whole garments, and sold after picking out whatever portions may be useful for repairs and mopping cloths:-

With the exception of the last-mentioned item, these articles, have been removed to a separate keeping place, the key of which is in the Clerk's possession.

The Committee recommend the supply of 200 yards of Cotton stripe, for wrappers and frocks for women and girls, and 100 yards of flannel for girls petticoats, and 57 1/2 yards of twilled calico to make 23 sheets for Hospital, to replace a portion of those cancelled.

The Committee also recommend that a range of shelving be put up in the female infirm Ward No 2 and 4 night chairs provided for the same ward.

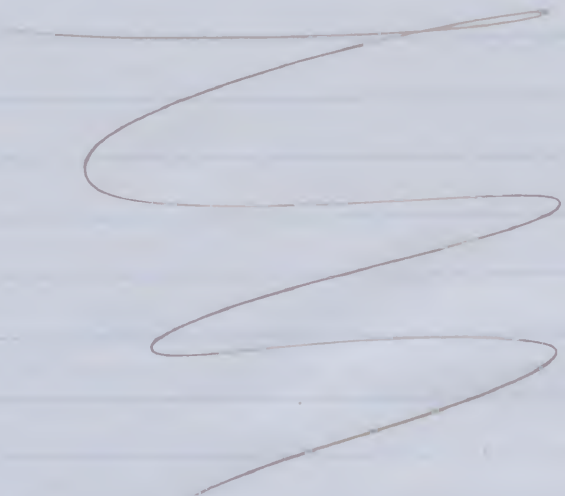

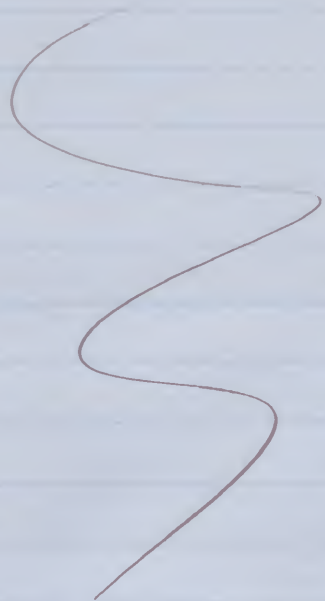
