Proposed by Mr. Thomas Connors, seconded by Mr. George Morris, and Resolved - That draft for £289 transmitted with the Commissioners' letter of the 11th inst. is £47.11.9 less than the sum which the Guardians should have received from the Parliamentary Grant in aid of the medical and educational expenses of the Union for the past half year.

In their resolution of 23rd August 1867, the Guardians remarked that the sum of £257.19.2 then received was deficient by £31.0.4 of the sum to which the Guardians were entitled, and it was expected that the Commissioners would have made provision for that deficiency in the next estimate submitted to the House of Commons.

The Commissioners have not only taken no notice of this claim for indemnification, but have caused a loss to the Union of £47 of the amount

of relief that should have been derived from the Parliamentary Grant: and the Guardians are therefore compelled to remonstrate strongly against the manner in which this matter has been managed by the Commissioners-

The Board can see no reason why the Commissioners should not by means of a proper and full estimate obtain from the Treasury a sum sufficient to give every Union in Ireland its even proportion of medical and educational expenses, and, in case of any over-plus to account with Treasury.

The Guardians have therefore to request that the Commissioners will inform them whether provision will be made, in the ensuing session of Parliament, for the deficiencies specified, and measures taken for insuring to the rate-payers the full amount of relief contemplated by Parliament.

Budie, Poor Law Inspector, that, on the 6th instant, he visited the place where Maryanne Mc. Donagh is confined, and that he considers it altogether unsuitable; that there is not room for a second bed in the apartment, (a little closet, and that the patient may at any time have an epileptic fit without any person being near to take care of her. - Requesting that under these circumstances the matter may receive the Guardians' reconsideration -

After some discussion the Board divided on the question of sending Maryanne Mc. Donagh to the Lunatic Asylum, when there appeared 3 for sending her there and 3 against.

That not having received such a reply as was obviously the intention of this Board by its resolution of the 25th ultimo belied from the Commissioners in reference to a deficiency arising on two separate grants from the Treasury in aid of the medical and educational expenses incurred by this Union and for the repayment of a moiety of which the law clearly provides, this Board still presses for a more distinct expression and remedy on the part of the Commissioners -

The collateral issue raised in their communication of the 5th instant as to the increased expenditure in each halfyear, has been referred to the medical officers for consideration, but to the Board it is not satisfactory explanation, because each increase must have had the approval of the Commissioners themselves, and with such knowledge, as their assent implies, should have been included in the Medical Charities expense -

The Board would therefore urgently impress on the Commissioners the justice and necessity of inserting in their forthcoming estimate the debt due by the Government to this Union - Such a course would be only in accordance with the rules by which the public income and expenditure are framed whenever a deficit is found to exist.
