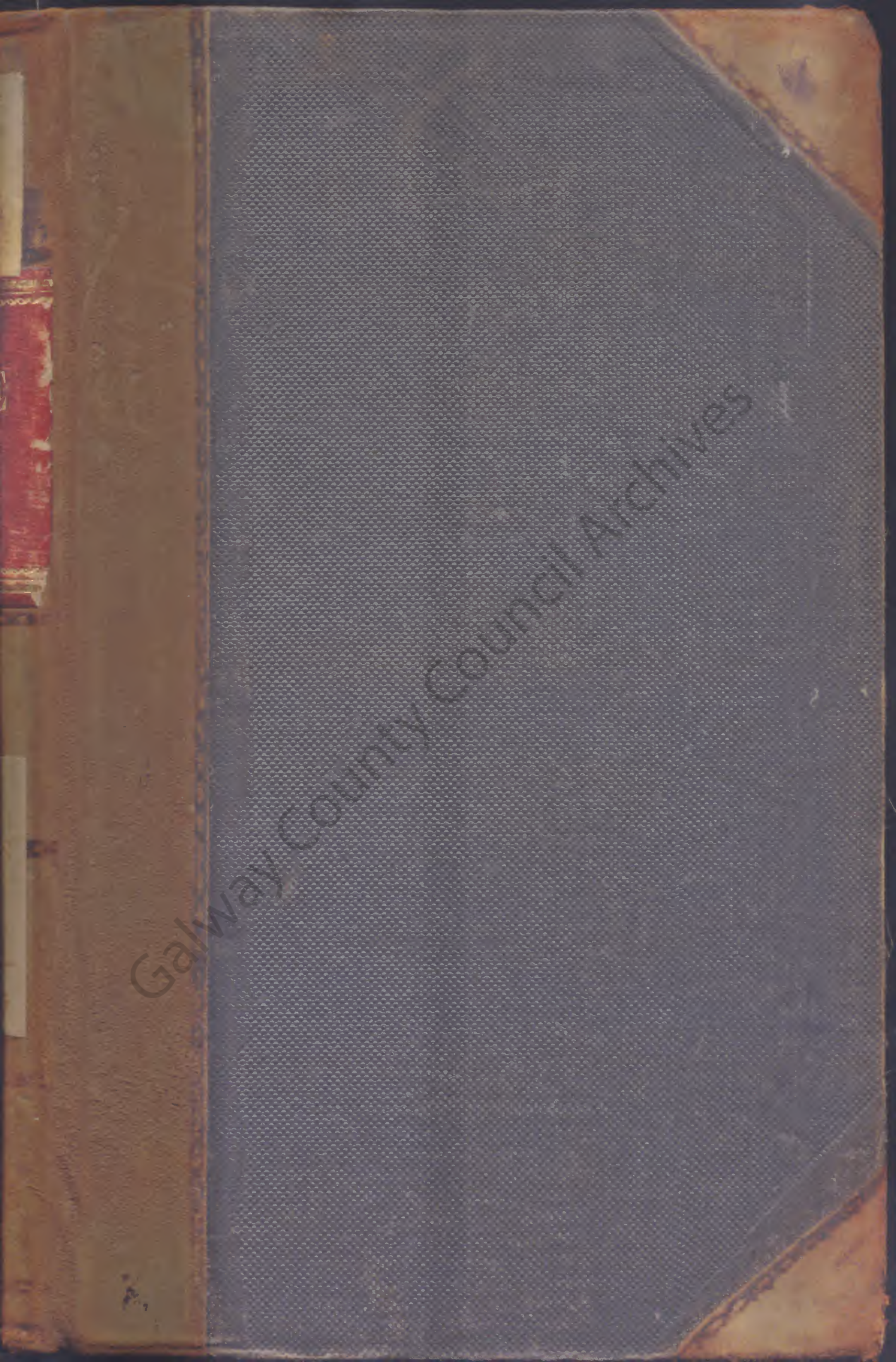

Letter from Secretary of National Education Board, dated 4<sup>th</sup> January, 1869, forwarding the following observations of the District Inspector who visited the Workhouse School on the 21<sup>st</sup> Oct. last: -  
The course of instruction in both male and female departments is in accordance with their respective programmes.

In the male school the pupils passed a very fair examination in all subjects of their course; and there is a marked improvement in Grammar and Geography, especially of third class. The reading of both second and third classes is much improved. The penmanship requires a little more attention.

"The female school shows some signs of progress, though it is not in the same state of efficiency as the male school. The reading & arithmetic have improved since last visit - Needlework seems to be fairly attended to -  
"Both schools are now in neat order."

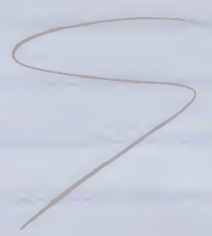

Received notice from Mr. P. H. Cullen of the intended eviction of Lawrence Burke from a house in Henry Street, the property of Miss Gratton.

Ordered - That Bridget Quigley get the clothing of her sister Margaret Kennedy, who died in the Workhouse -

Ordered - That Bridget Mullally get the clothing which belonged to her husband, Edmond Mullally, a deceased inmate -

Upon the application of Hugh Neeson, Bill Porter, it was agreed to increase the annual allowance for posting notices in the Town from £1 to £1:10:0.



The cases of provisional relief, and applications for relief were considered and decided on as set forth in the Application and Report Books.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Ordered - That the Master forward a sample of the milk supplied by Contractor Small on the 5th inst. which produced only 6 Degrees of Cream to Professor Cameron for analysis.

Mr. John Gill's notice of motion with reference to the Lunatic Mary Anne McDonogh was withdrawn.

A girl named Mary Anne McDonogh, 12 years of age applied for admission to the Workhouse. She was accompanied by her mother, who stated that she could maintain herself, but was unable to support the child.

It was resolved by a majority of 5 to 2 to admit the girl without her mother.

Against this decision Mr. Joseph Grealy entered the following protest: - I protest against the decision of the Board on this day in admitting Mary Anne McDonogh, a girl of 12 years of age, without her mother, who accompanied her to the Board-room, but refused to come in, it being contrary to law. The Commissioners' opinion is requested.

It is thus obvious without any general remarks of mine, that so far as the Galway Workhouse is concerned, there is no foundation for the statements in the Irish Times to which the Comm<sup>n</sup> have called attention - The children at school keep their health well, and appear generally to grow up robust -
