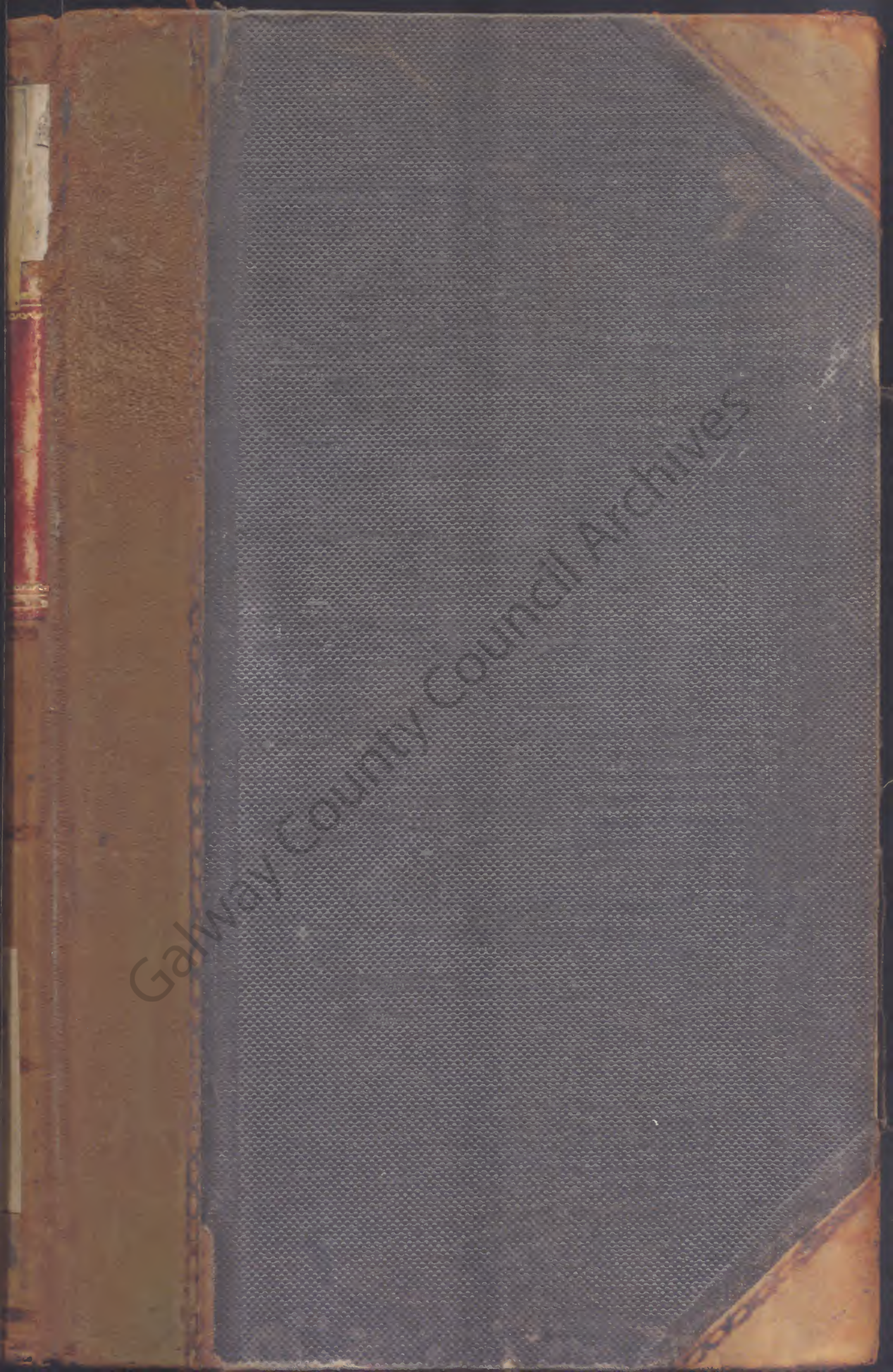

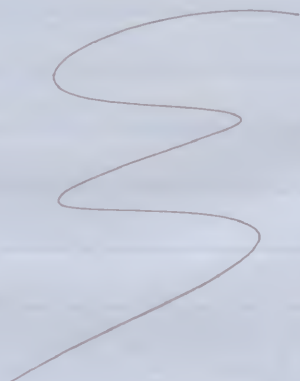

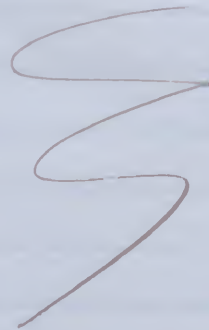

That the discharged lunatic soldier, John Tracey, arrived here on the 1st instant in charge of a Corporal of the 8th Regt., who gave him £1.5.4 of Tracer's money, and said more was due which would be forwarded: that it is stated on the back of the discharge that Tracey's intended place of residence is ^(Inam Union) Derrinmore, Galway, Ireland.

That Bridget Burke who had been undergoing penal servitude in Mountjoy prison was sent here on the 1st instant as a lunatic in charge of a female officer of that establishment, who handed him £1.9.0 of Burke's money, earned in prison, and said there is nearly £10 more due which would be forwarded. That Burke is a native of Galway and ^{was} convicted here.

With respect to the rates due on premises occupied by caretakers, the Committee recommended that some practical steps be taken without further delay to decide the question of the liability of the owners of such premises to payment.

As regards the other item of arrears returned as recoverable (£103.5.2), the Committee are aware that a large proportion cannot be made immediately available, and that some portion may be found irrecoverable; but consider that the Collector should retain his warrants until the time arrives for transferring the arrears to the new books, securing himself to get in as much as possible, and then be held personally liable for any sums it may appear he could have collected.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read, to the following effect:

That the processes for recovery of Poor Rate against Mr. Michael J. Chevers and Capt. Blake Porter were dismissed by the Chairman of Quarter Sessions on the 15th instant, on the ground that the occupation by "carreta kens" was for protection and did not constitute occupation for use and enjoyment.

Appeals were taken to the Assizes against these decisions.

Evidence was given of the use of Mr. Chevers' house as a lodging for the Constabulary at the Parliamentary Election for the Borough in November last, but this was waived for the purpose of having a decision by the Judge of Assize on the main question at issue.

That only one member of the Rate Committee, Mr. James Fahy, attended yesterday; that Wednesday next having been fixed for the signature of the new Rate Books, and no definite resolution arrived at for the discharge of the uncollectable arrears, he is placed in a position of some embarrassment.

Arithmetic is still backward in the girls' School, but I hope to find an improvement in this respect at next visit. Needlework is not at present in so satisfactory a state as formerly; only 6 girls learn plain sewing and even that subject is not regularly taught. Little instruction is given in Knitting. It would be an advantage if the arrangements for teaching baking were such that the girls who learn this important branch of female industry were not deprived of their literary teaching for two full days each week."

Ordered - That the attention of the Master and Schoolmistress be directed to this letter.

Letter from Mr. John Lenthem, Contractor for Tea, dated 20th October, stating he is much aggrieved by the great excess in the price of the Tea purchased by the Master in lieu of his Tea rejected - asking for fair play, &c. - The Board declined to interfere with the due discharge of his duties by the Master.

Letter from Mr. William Kelly, Poor Rate Collector, dated 20th October, reporting that, at the Petty Sessions on Monday last, he had the executors of the late Isaac Comerford, ^{summoned} for the rates due on two stores which belonged to the deceased - that the magistrate ruled that he should get the Rates from the subsequent occupiers, who could recover the amount from those who were primarily liable. That in another case he had ^{an} immediate lessor summoned, and that the magistrate postponed the case until after next assizes, because it was proved to them that an appeal to the Judge of Assize has been ^{taken} on behalf of the Guardians in another case. That he got a decree in the case of the Harbour Board although there were two attorneys against him, namely Mr. Stephens and Mr. Mc Namara. That it is for the Guardians to say whether these cases have been decided according to law or equity.

Letter from Milk Contractors Cottingham, Hughes, J. Crowe, and D. Crowe, dated 20th October, complaining that the Master does not take from them as much Milk as they think they have a right to supply. Ordered - That the Master take the required daily supply from the several Contractors in proportion to the quantities they have respectively contracted to deliver.

Letter from Workhouse Master, stating that he has been served with a test to attend as a witness at the forthcoming Quarter Sessions on the 22nd instant: asking permission to go - (Granted)

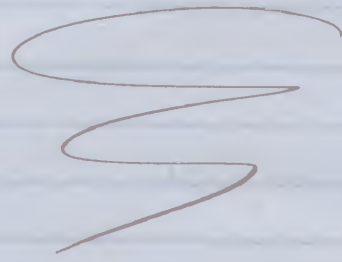

The Board desire to advert to the case of the Arran Islands in regard to the matter under consideration - In this district the Medical Charities Expenses form the heaviest item of the poor rate, - more than half. During the past half-year, and from that time up to the present the death of one medical man and the illness of another have caused extra expenses which will make a considerable addition to the rate, to which, according to the Commissioners' view nothing would be contributed from the grant.

The Guardians are of opinion that this was not the intention of Parliament, and therefore direct the Clerk to send back the return to the Commissioners, without alteration; and they trust that the Commissioners will find no difficulty in remitting one-half the amount actually expended on the salaries of the medical Officers during the past half-year.

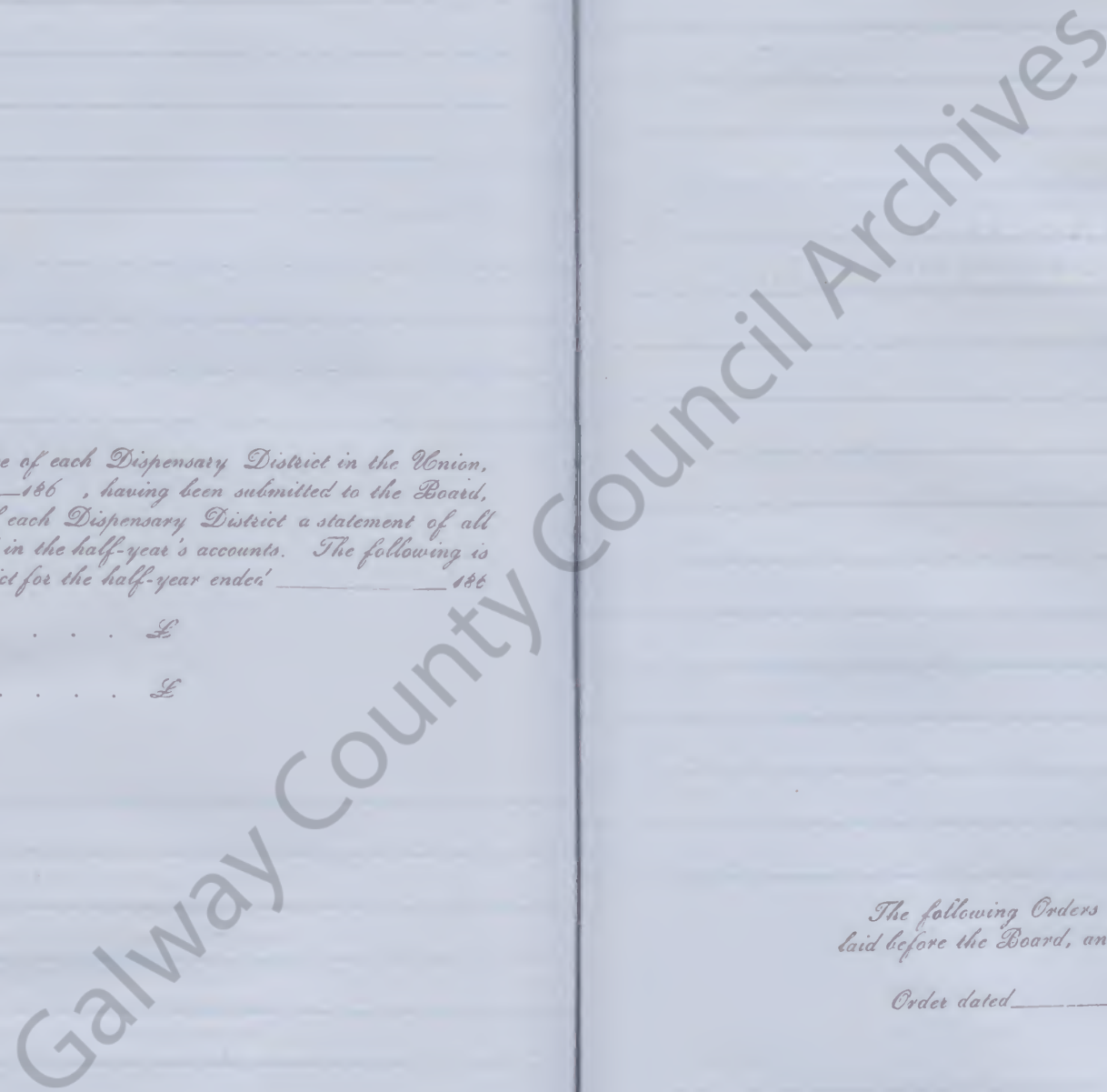

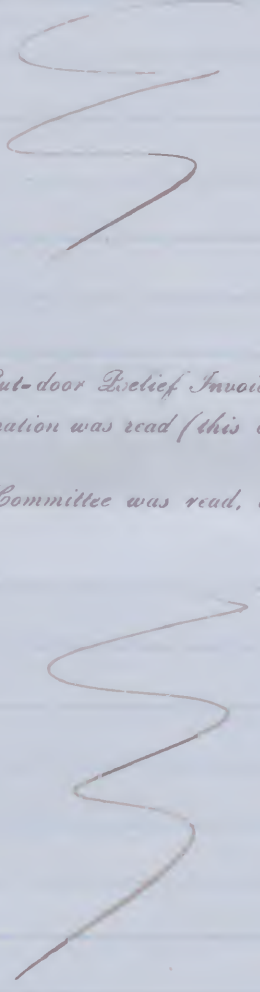
