The following letter from the Protestant Chaplain of the Workhouse was read.
To the Guardians of the Galway Union,
Galway, March 8. 1870.

Gentlemen, I beg leave to state to you certain occurrences connected with Protestant inmates of the Galway Workhouse, that in my opinion call for strict inquiry.

These three cases come within a very few weeks.
1st Bessie Holmes entered the Workhouse a Protestant. She attended Divine Service in the Workhouse on Sunday, and she came before the Board a few days afterwards to be registered a Roman Catholic. She has left the Workhouse while the rest of her family are there still; and her father volunteered to tell me that the account she gave of her change was "she did it to make a friend."

2^{ndly} Mary Forde, a Protestant, was registered a Roman Catholic, without her authority, as she affirms. The Master readily went, or deputed the Matron to go, at my request to ask the woman particularly. She reported to me that Mary Ford distinctly said she was then and always a Roman Catholic. I immediately went into the Ward in which she was, with the object of visiting another inmate; and as I was leaving, Mary Forde called after me that she wished to see me. This I declined to do; but the Master, went by my desire, and reported her to me as a Protestant.

Mary Forde states that she told the Matron what she says she also told one of the Sisters of Mercy before I spoke to her, that she was a Protestant.

3^{rdly} Ellen Clarke, a Protestant, was registered a Roman Catholic; she affirms, without her authority. She is a stranger here, and I heard by accident of her being in the Workhouse. The Master questioned her, at my request, and she professes that she was and is a Protestant. Her child is not yet, I believe, baptized.

Upon

Upon these facts I ground no charge, and I make no imputation. But if they be true, I respectfully submit, that the imputation they cast upon the character of the House will need to be vindicated.

I conceive it a great hardship upon any poor creature lying upon an hospital bed, almost alone among a roomfull of an opposite Creed, that she has to run the gauntlet of the ~~Harshness~~ ^{children}, the Nurse, the Master, the Chaplain, and the Inspector, before she can peaceably see her clergyman.

That an unmarried woman named Ellen Clark was admitted to Workhouse Hospital for confinement on the night of the 26th ultimo, and was registered as a Roman Catholic - the cause of her being so registered was, that she and her brother, a boy of 13 years were previously admitted to Workhouse on the night of the 2nd ultimo, and left on the 3rd, and as stated by the Porter and the woman in charge of the female Probationary ward, and as appears by the Porter's application and report book. She on that occasion, in reply to the Porter's inquiry, as to what religion she professed, stated she was a Catholic; her brother also stated the same for himself. The same parties were again admitted on the night of the 6th ultimo and left on the 7th of their own accord.

That on the 7th instant the Protestant Chaplain called on me and asked, if there was lately a woman of the name of Clark admitted as a Protestant. I showed him the Register and that the person of that name admitted was registered a Catholic - but circumstances stated by him in relation to her, caused me to make personal inquiry of herself on the subject - in doing so, she stated that she is a Protestant and that the Porter did not ask her what religion she was of on the occasion of her first admission to Workhouse.

As she is desirous to be registered a Protestant I request your consideration of the subject, so that her child (born on the 6th instant) may be baptized. (The Register was produced, and the religious denomination of Ellen Clarke altered from "Roman Catholic" to "Protestant.")

Resolved. That the Clerk put himself into communication with the Secretary of the Flax Committee, Royal Agricultural Society of Ireland, in order to secure the services of an instructor in the cultivation of Flax for this district for the ensuing season. Should the Government continue the grant to this country for this purpose.

Proposed by Capt. O'Hara, seconded by Mr. Thomas Collins, and carried unanimously.

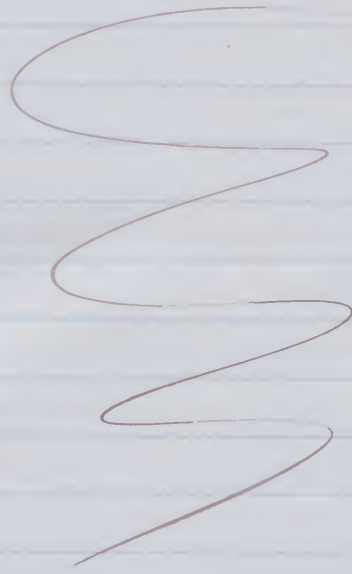

I did not blame him, or myself, for questioning the woman. But such questioning was not the less a hardship upon her. And I did and do complain of such a performance of the duty of registering as made the hardship a necessity.

Dear Sir, I beg to acknowledge the receipt of your letter of yesterday calling my attention to a communication of the Protestant Chaplain addressed to the Board of Guardians, in which he calls for a strict inquiry

inquiry into certain late occurrences connected with the Protestant inmates of the Jail Workhouse.

In reply, I beg to state for the information of the Board, that I had nothing whatever to do or say to these cases of which the Protestant Chaplain complains, nor had myself or else acting for me.

As to the grievance of the Protestant pauper having to run the gambler of the Catholic Chaplain, I can positively assert it was solely and purely imaginary on the part of the Protestant Chaplain; the fact is, as it appears to me, he must have considered his description of the Protestant pauper running the gambler would lose its effect had he omitted to name the Catholic Chaplain, in order to make the forlorn hope appear still more forlorn.

To the whole tenor and spirit of his letter, I will not say a word, save that, to take me to task without any reasonable ground was to say the least of it, uncalled for, and unwarrantable.

(Copies to Com^{rs} with minutes.)
The following resolution on the subject was proposed by Mr. Thomas Collins -

Resolved - That this Board cannot avoid expressing its entire disapproval of the hasty and intemperate line of action adopted by the Protestant Chaplain in implicating the majority of the officials of the House in charges of a very grave and irreputable nature, namely, tampering with the religious creed of some of the inmates and falsely representing others, which charges, on investigation turn out to be wholly groundless as regards many of the officers - and only an error of mistaken registry, in one case, the party having been previously a Catholic, attributable to the Master -

In the course of the discussion that ensued, the Rev. Mr. Sullivan, who was present, was invited to withdraw the last paragraph of his letter of 8th inst., the proposed resolution to be also withdrawn if he agreed.

Mr. Sullivan declined, and the resolution having been seconded by Mr. J. Grealy was put to a division and carried by a majority of 6 to 1.

(Two guardians had gone away before the poll -)

Martin Saffin, the only Candidate who offered, was appointed to collect the outstanding rates in the Electoral Divisions of Droicullen, Slieveanena, and Tullokyne, at a remuneration of eight pence in the pound; and the sureties proposed by him, - John Kyne of Knockrammy and Matthias Saffin of Newtown, - were approved.

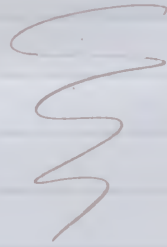

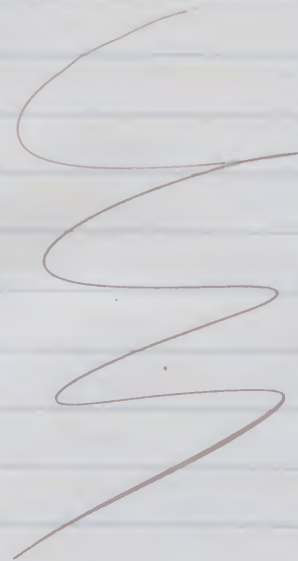

"The proficiency of the male department is very fair on the whole. The present classification shows that a large number of promotions have lately been made - nearly one half the pupils present being now in Third or highest class. The pupils in the Senior draft of this class showed very fair proficiency in reading, writing, arithmetic, and the geography of Ireland. Some of the pupils in second class are a little backward in spelling, arithmetic including ^{tables} and map of the World; but this is to be explained in part by the promotions lately made from the First class. Much of the penmanship is executed with care.

The pupils of the female school are not so highly classed as those of the male school, there being only two girls present in the third or highest class.

"This evidence of lower proficiency is partly accounted for by the fact that an hour daily is devoted to needlework, and partly by the average age of the girls being a little lower than that of the boys. The proficiency in the various subjects of the course is fair, on the whole, with the exception of arithmetic, which I hope to see much improved at my next visit. Writing has very much advanced of late. Needlework is now fairly attended to."

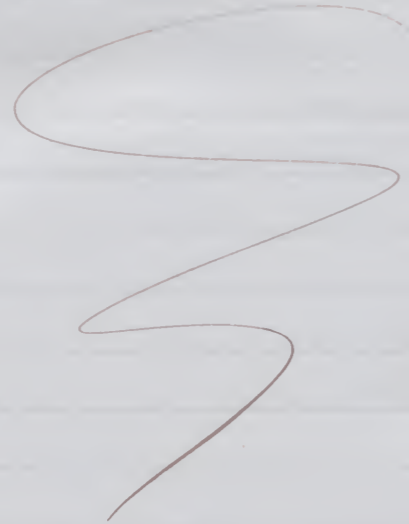
