Rudwell, War Office, dated 9<sup>th</sup> June, stating in reply to Clerk's letter of 7<sup>th</sup> ultimo, that Michael Gannon, late 44<sup>th</sup> Foot, has been granted a pension of six pence a day for three months, and that instructions have been given to the Staff Officer of Pensions at Salisbury to pay the same to the Board of Guardians.

Letter from Secretaries to National Education Board, dated 14<sup>th</sup> June 1870, appending an extract from the District Inspector's report of his visit to the Workhouse School on the 20<sup>th</sup> ultimo. - 13<sup>th</sup> June.  
"In the boys school, Reading is not quite so satisfactory as I have found it at former visits: Penmanship and writing from Dictation are well attended to; Arithmetic is rather poor in Second Class, but improved in Third Class. Grammar and Geography are taught up to the minimum limit of the school programme, the pupils have a tolerably fair acquaintance with this limited course.  
"In the girls school, Reading, Writing and Arithmetic have improved since last visit, especially Arithmetic, Grammar and Geography are in rather a backward state. Needlework continues to be taught with a fair amount of success."

(The Schoolmaster and Schoolmistress were called before the Board, and the extract from the Inspector's report read for them, with the view that they should exert themselves to improve the children in those branches of education wherein he has remarked them to be deficient.)
