"With reference to the request of the Guardians to know the reason of the high average cost last week, I have to say that there are several cases in Hospital that require more than usual nourishment but I anticipate a reduction in the average cost, and can assure the Guardians that I shall always try to manage matters as economically as I can consistently with duty. With regard to the numbers at present in Hospital I am happy to say that although at this period of the year the number always increases, it is still exceptionally low. I believe that I am correct in saying that so low a number was never known in Hospital prior to last summer; and the unusually good health which the Town has enjoyed since the spring before last can scarcely be expected to continue always.

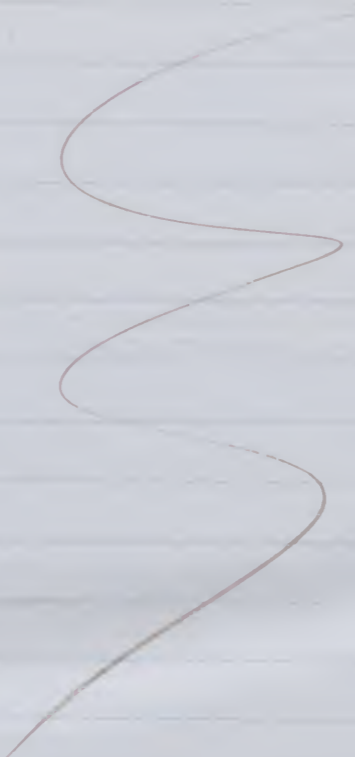

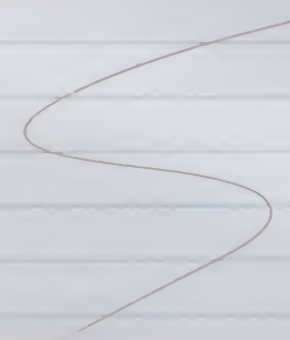

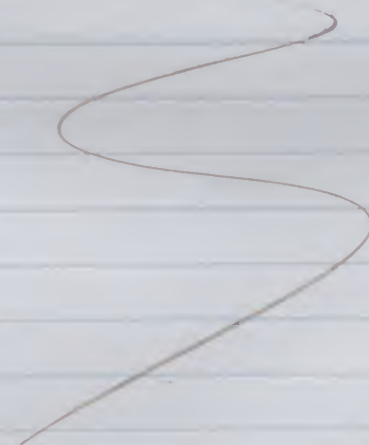

Many of these children are no doubt mere infants; still a fair proportion of them are old enough to learn to read in the first book with much greater readiness than they do at present.

Though there was no needle-work in this department on the day of my inspection, I had satisfactory evidence, from the large number of worn garments submitted by the Matron, as having been executed by the girls, that this important branch is well attended to, and the skill of the pupils in the use of the needle turned to thoroughly good account.
