Sir, In reply to your letter of the 26th inst. - That the daughter of Mrs Kane, Inmate of the Fever Hospital, had the exclusive use of one of the female wards, although not regularly admitted as a patient, I have to state that the deceased girl was moved into one of the large female wards from the confined sleeping room of her Mother, for the purpose of enabling her to struggle under favorable circumstances against the dangerous form of disease with which she was attacked, - but it was not at my suggestion nor with my will the ward was exclusively devoted to this one patient. I told her mother distinctly that if additional patients came in they should have admittance to the ward in which her daughter lay -

Mrs Kane was directed by me to enter the name of her child on the books as a patient admitted under ordinary circumstances afflicted with fever, but she positively refused to do so and stated that she would defray the expenses of the support of her child out of her own resources. I should have brought the matter under the notice of the board, had I not known from the symptoms of the child that the case would speedily terminate fatally; and I felt a difficulty in subjecting the mother to blame, although I greatly disapproved of her refusal - in her afflicted and stricken circumstances.

I must remark however that it was my intention to do so at an early period when humanity would justify such a course, and have the opinion of the Board on this very unusual case -

With respect to the entrance into hospital of the several inmates of the family of the Inmate, this was speedily made known to the Doctor, Mr. Lynch, as will be seen by the gate-keeper's reports, with the certainty on my part that when the

the matter was brought by him before the Board this abuse would be prohibited.

In conclusion I must take the liberty of saying that irregularities are not allowed nor passed over on any part, and in justification of the manner in which the hospital is managed I can appeal with pride to the great success of the treatment of the sick, and the confidence of the public in entrusting their families and friends to the care of an institution in which, irrespective of the dangers and difficulties of his position, the physician, is always found faithful.

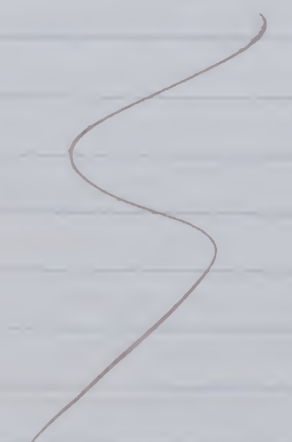

Nursery.

The following report of Dr. James Davis was read and adopted, and the Master was directed to have his recommendations carried into effect:—

15th February, 1872.

Being the only member of the Visiting Committee in attendance today I accompanied D. Brodie, Poor Law Inspector, to visit the Nursery apartments occupied by married women and their children.

To obviate the objection in D. Cleland's report of 24th ultimo, and for the purpose of making the upper and lower wards separately available for an assigned

assigned number of inmates, I would recommend that a door-way be opened at foot of the ^{staircase to the} upper ward, from the passage leading to the Women's dormitories, and that the stairs on the inside be boarded up to form a partition and cut off the communication with the upper ward. To supply the want of a fire-place, a stove should be fixed in the upper ward. The field on the outside of the women's yard may be used for air and exercise, but due care should be taken by the Officers to prevent any communication with the inmates over the boundary wall.

The portion of the Shed occupied by orphan and deserted children requires a small inner porch for protection from cold winds. James Davis -

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Small-Pox - Dr Colahan's Report.

Two infants P. Connaughton aged 12 and M. Greany aged 6 months were admitted into the Fever Hospital on the 9th February from the Workhouse. According to the statements of the mothers who accompanied them, they were six days ill before admission and both children became affected on the same day. The Pock when minutely examined in Fever Hospital presented the character of a mild, modified, and thinly scattered form of eruption. In one M. Greany, the Pock had aborted, not presenting the vesicular or pustular stage.

The other, aged 12 months, had reached the stage of maturation, but did not present the usual pustular appearance, the fluid contents of the eruption of an opaque or milky hue - in fact resembling some forms of chicken pox. These children had never been vaccinated, - and I regard the occurrence of the Pock in this modified form, from whatever form it may have reached us, to be, I should hope, a favorable indication of the exhausted nature of the epidemic cause.

All intercourse between these patients and other departments of the hospital has been strictly forbidden. N. Colahan -

" Fever Hospital, 14th February - 12 1/2 oc -

Since writing above report a boy aged 18, servant to Mr Roberts, has come into hospital, covered over face and hands with Small-pox, to which I beg to call the attention of the Guardians -

This boy exhibits no reliable sign of being vaccinated, and has no recollection that he ever had been - N. Colahan -

Resolved that a Committee consisting of the following members of the Board be appointed to make arrangements for taking a suitable place for patients affected with Small Pox, should it unhappily break out here to any extent. 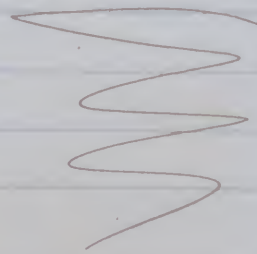

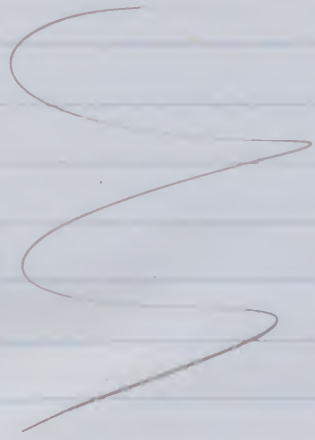

And, therefore, I ask you to call upon those Guardians who, at the last meeting day of the Board, thought to malevolently and calumniously asperse my character, by saying that I persecuted an officer of the Board in order to make him resign, and keep the fruits of his office for a friend of my own.

I look upon these insidious assertions as conveying to the public a malignant calumny on my character, and therefore respectfully ask you again to make them give an apology in the papers that disseminated their treacherous insinuations.

If they don't act in accordance with ordinary etiquette in the matter there is some other remedy open for me.

Letter from W. P. Morris, Relieving Officer -
Feby. 20th 1872.

Gentlemen, I did not intend to trouble you with any reasons for having resigned my situation as Relieving Officer, after a service of 19 years, without

without a single complaint against me; but I hope you will now allow me to give my reason for doing so when I see an uncalled for attack made on members of your Board by the Rev. Mr. Lyons for their expression of sympathy for me. I shall merely state the facts, but perhaps on a coming occasion he will find I will not be wanting in moral courage to speak out.

Some weeks before the late election, I received a letter from Mr. Lyons requiring me to vote for Capt. Nolan, when he well knew I had promised Capt. French - and the day before the poll in Dughterard, by letter he called on me to attend a number of people whom he stated as requiring my attendance as Relieving Officer.

I thought it very strange so many suddenly required relief on the day for the poll in Dughterard, particularly as his list gave names from extreme ends of his parish. I went to Dughterard and voted, and immediately proceeded with the Doctor to visit those persons described by Mr. Lyons as so ill and requiring relief. The result of my visit will be seen by my relief book - but in a few days afterwards I found Mr. Thomas Lyons, the nephew of Rev. Mr. Lyons, canvassing for my situation -

I don't know what Mr. Lyons considers persecution, but in making my place insupportable, and having a nephew ready to fill it, he has at all events persecuted me out of it, and now discovers that where I lived for 14 years is not in the Centre of the District.

I leave you, gentlemen, and the public to draw their own conclusion from these facts; and will only add, that if the Rev. Mr. Lyons thought so many people were dangerously ill in his parish, it is strange that he and his other nephew, the Curate, neither of whom had a vote, should absent themselves from the dying in electioneering in Dughterard, twenty miles off.

There were 21 cases of fever in the parish, 14 of which are testified to by the respectable medical officer of the District, Dr. Cronin: two girls, sisters, between the ages of 20 and 25 years, died of this malignant fever.

6th It is true, ^{Mr. Morris} voted in Augherard on the polling day, but it is untrue that he immediately visited the sick after coming home, for 7 days passed after the polling day without looking after their wants at all.

7th I was at Augherard on the polling day, but was at home again that evening at 10 o'clock to attend to the wants of my people.

8th If my friend Mr. Lyons canvassed any party for the position of Relieving Officer it was wholly without my knowledge or consent. So much for the supposed veritable facts of Mr. Pat Morris.
