Recd Letter from Poor Law Comm^s No 11577 dated 6th July 1872
stating that

expressing their sanction of the proposed increase of the salaries of Drs Fealy and Clayton, Medical Officers of the Fallow Dispensary District, from £90 to £100 per annum, each.

Letter from Poor Law Comm^s, No 19022/72, dated 9th July, referring to the complaint of Dr Hughes, Med. Officer of Brammore Dispensary District, that two samples of drugs submitted by him to the Board of Guardians on the 3rd instant are of inferior quality, and to the order of the Board thereon - Enclosing a copy of a letter which the Commissioners have received from Dr Hughes on the subject. Stating that the Comm^s will be glad to learn the result of the analysis of articles directed by the Guardians -

Upon a reconsideration of the matter, the Guardians were of opinion that as Dr Hughes' complaint related only to the "inferior quality" of two articles, and as there is no charge of adulteration, an analysis is not necessary; and ordered that Dr Hughes return the articles complained of to the Contractors, and procure others instead -

Letter from Dr Conroy, Maccabon, dated 8th July, recommending that the Relieving Officer of the District be directed to serve notices on the persons resident therein and then report the result to the Guardians.

Ordered - That the Clerk instruct the Relieving Officer to act upon Dr Conroy's recommendation -

Dr Suggan sent in a Report, form R., certifying that he had successfully vaccinated 75 persons in the Durloughmore Dispen District during the half-year ended 30th June 1872. (The Report was certified to have been laid before the Dispensary Committee on the 8th inst.)
