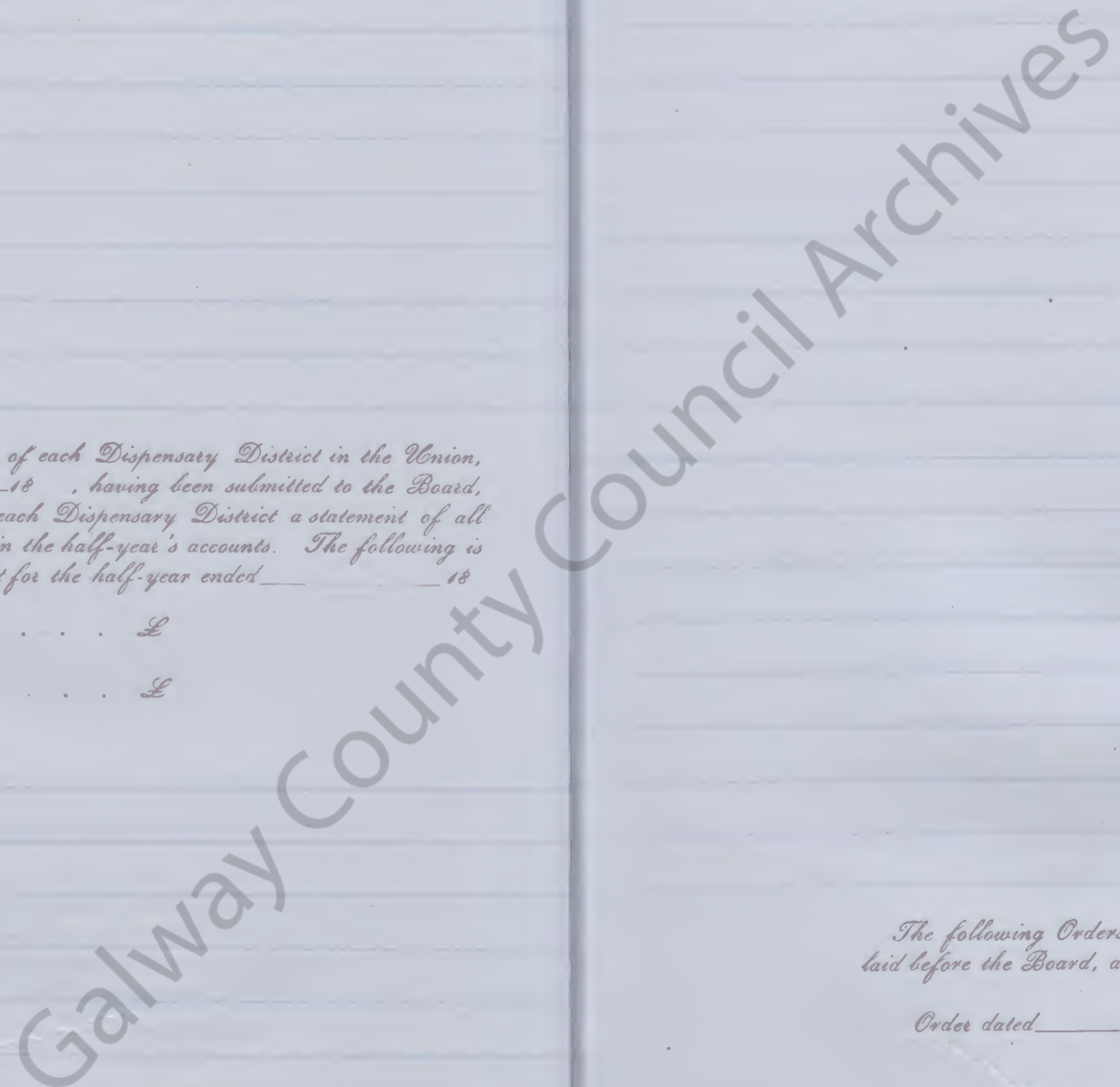



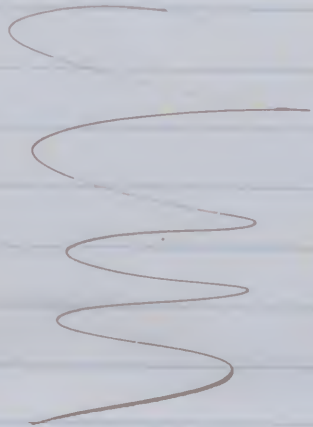

D. Deland's Report.

The Master is at present engaged in trying to set right a surface drain at the back of the hospital; but it is quite impossible to make it as it should be, unless the Board be so good as to direct him to replace the surface drain with a pipe which will carry its contents directly into the main sewer. With the present arrangement there is a very offensive accumulation, injurious to health.

Ordered - That the improvement of the sewerage, as recommended by D. Deland, be carried out by the Master.

Burial Ground.

Report of Relieving Officer Connor -

That he inspected the burial ground at Moyrus, which is entirely unenclosed, and found that the present site would require 19 perches (Irish) of a wall to enclose it, at a probable cost of £1 per perch, exclusive of gate entrance. That the burial ground is much crowded, there being no space for the opening of new graves, but that there is a nice piece of land attached, which if obtained would be a great boon towards its extension.

Ordered - Consideration postponed for a month with a view to obtaining the additional land required - that the Relieving Officer get tenders for breaking the enclosure and make a further report.

Report of Relieving Officer Young -

That he visited the Burial ground of Ballynacorney, and found the South and West walls in a bad way not able to keep out cattle. That he also visited the Klogimyr Burial ground in the Ballynacorney P.D. which is enclosed on the South and East sides; that the tenant on whose land this figure ground is informed him that he is paying rent for it, and therefore grazes his cattle and sheep upon it.

That the Stradbally burial ground in the Clarenbridge E.D. is very badly fenced, and that cattle and sheep were trespassing upon it at the time of his visit.

Ordered - That six months notice be served on the owners in each case to have these grounds fenced and put in proper order.

Punishment Book -

James Murray was reported for having remained out of the Work-house on the night of the 24th Decr., having got a "pass" for three hours only.
