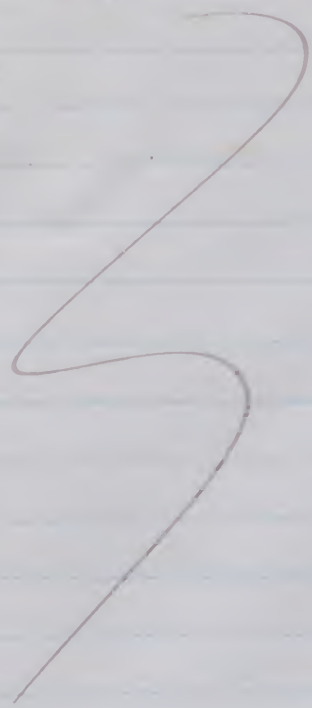

Upon an examination of clothing &c submitted by the Matron your Committee agreed to recommend the Board to condemn the following articles to be used for repairs and deducted from the general stock of the house. viz - 20 Blankets, 20 Girts, 50 Men's shirts, 28 women's gowns, 30 women's petticoats, 50 women's shifts, 25 women's aprons, and 25 girls' frocks.

Your Committee recommend also that the following articles, forming a portion of the separate Hospital stock be condemned - 50 sheets, 3 Rugs, 7 Blankets, 18 men's shirts, 16 women's gowns, 13 women's petticoats, 12 women's aprons, 9 women's shifts, 7 hawls, 7 caps, and 6 girls' bibs.

Your Committee made a general inspection of the Workhouse and found it clean and orderly throughout. No complaint was made to us by any inmate. The Master directed your Committee's attention to some necessary repairs, which escaped our notice on a former ~~occasion~~ inspection, and your Committee believe that the Master, finding the Guardians satisfied with the state of the Buildings, did not consider it necessary to report specially on these matters, and that he was restrained by the evident desire to save any considerable expense.

It is quite clear that the wood and iron work of the house require to be painted. The locks and latches should be first put into order, and any requisite repairs to doors, sashes &c be effected. The state of the wood work of the establishment is generally

speaking, due to the wear and tear, and inevitable decay incidental to a building over 30 years in use. This is specially remarkable in the case of doors and yard gates.

Your committee would recommend the appointment of a special committee to examine into all these matters with the aid of a practical builder, if required, to report how far more repair or renewal may be required.

Your committee also beg to suggest that should the aid of a builder be required he should be consulted as to the ventilation of the infirm wards on both sides of the house, which your committee consider defective, and thereby rendering the rooms unwholesome and unpleasant. Your committee caused the Master to remove the coverings of some of the sewers, in consequence of complaints by the Board of Townsmen about the house and they found some of the sewers choked and in want of cleansing. They consider that in general repairs and renovating of the house if the drains are looked to and put into ~~proper~~ ^{thorough} order the Board will have no cause of complaint in future, on this matter.

With reference to the appointment of Dr. Colahan, the following resolution was proposed by Mr. Martin J. O'Flaherty. -

We feel called upon to express our regret and surprise at the continued refusal of the Local Govt. Board to ratify the appointment of Dr. Colahan to the Fever Hospital on the sole alleged ground that the salary named has been deemed inadequate.

We must remind the Local Govt. Board that £300 was the sum fixed by public advertisement with the official consent of the Local Govt. Board. The Guardians also feel that the striking fact for their body to keep in mind is, first, the entire competency of the person selected (of which there seems no doubt in this instance), and next, the most saving mode of effecting the appointment for the ratepayers of the Union. The ratio of remuneration, in the opinion of the Guardians, is a question for the medical gentleman himself; and therefore they object to alter their former resolution until the Local Government Board point out how the appointment of Dr. Cleland would contribute to economy.

The resolution having been seconded by Mr. L. L. Ferdinand it was put to a vote and declared carried - 13 having voted for it and 3 against.

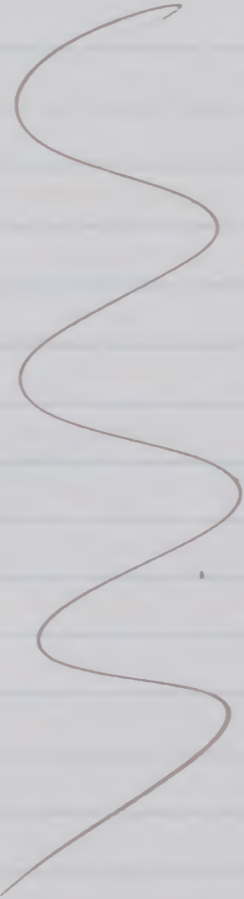

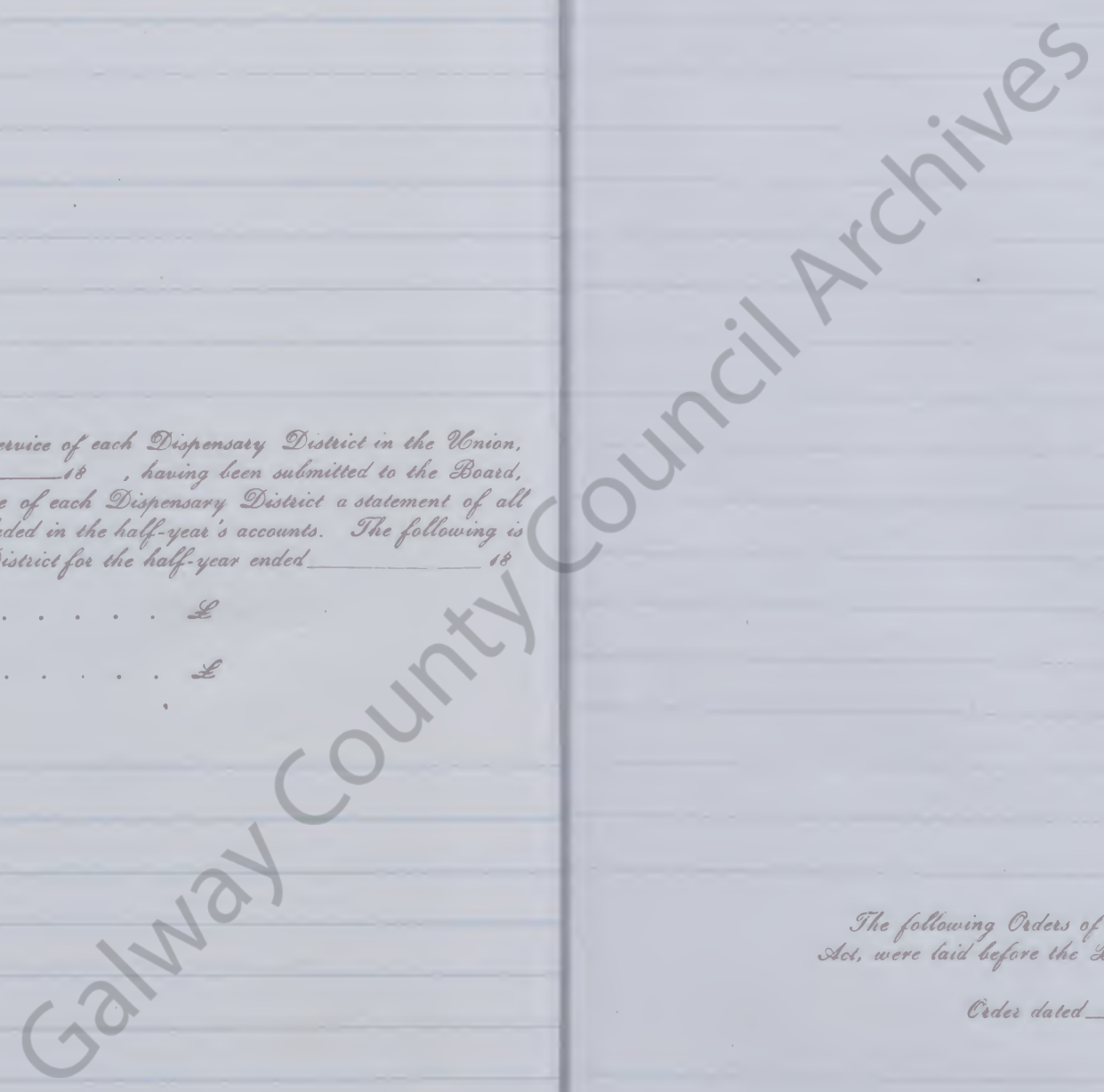
