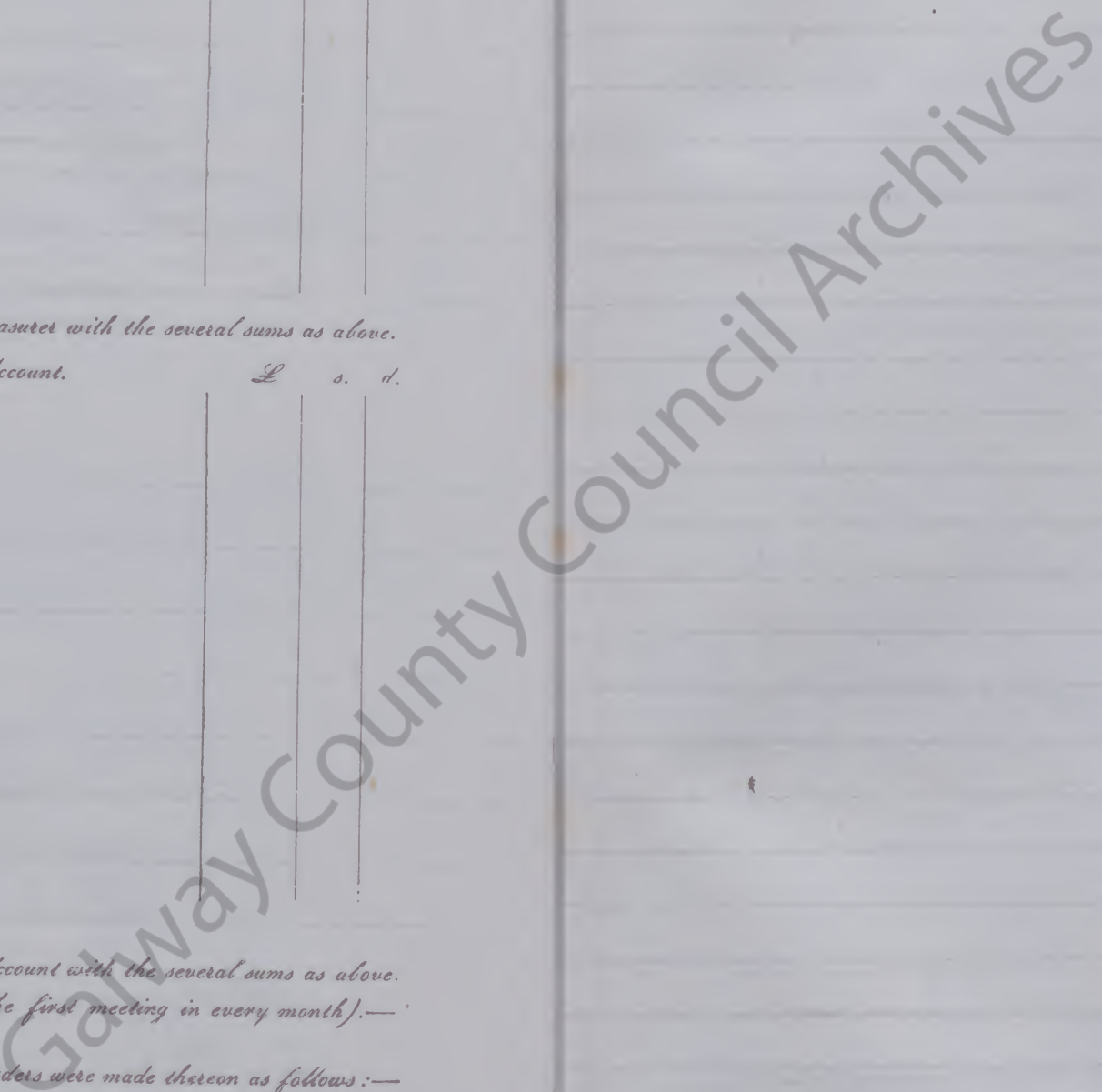

 In accordance with your instructions, I went on last Friday, 9th inst., to Bushypark graveyard, and took men with me to examine that portion of it set apart for interment of the deceased inmates of the Workhouse -

It is but a comparatively small space, being only 32 yards by 16, and has been in use for over 20 years -

I got it opened in several places that seemed not recently broken; but in every instance met with coffins at a depth of about 18 inches - I also got it sounded with a Crowbar in many other parts, and in most cases met with coffins at from 12 to 24 inches from the surface; therefore, showing that the ground is in a great measure used up for at least some years to come, and that it will be difficult to make room there for coffins until the new Cemetery is available -

Ordered - That the Board, keeping in view the appropriation of a portion of the new Cemetery for the burial of deceased inmates of the Workhouse, are of opinion that the Master can provide for Workhouse burials at Bushypark until the new ground shall be available -
