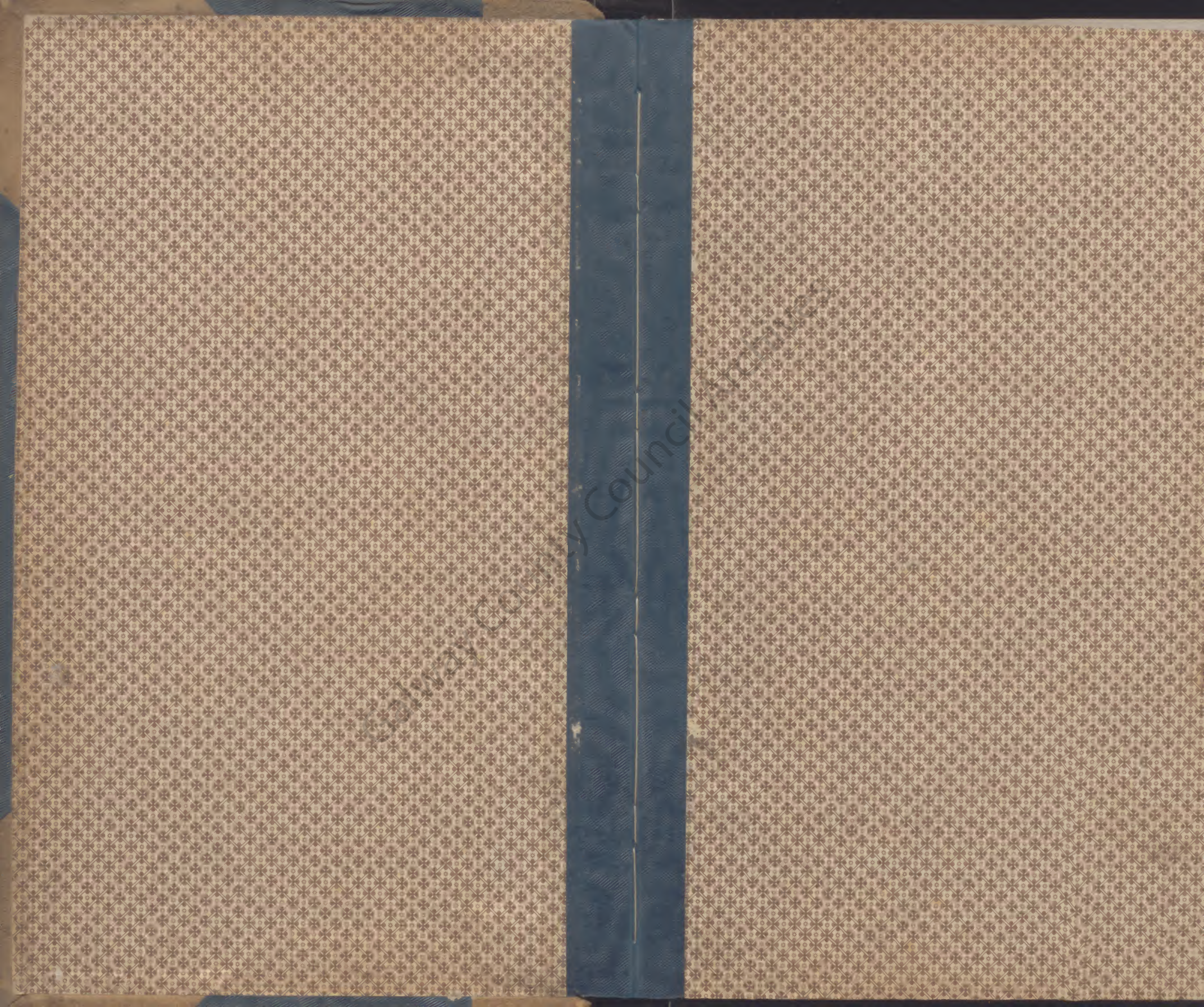

The accounts of the Union for the Half Year ended the 29th September last ^{are} ~~are~~ unsatisfactory in the following respects

I In the first place I find that a sum of £8.1.4 has been overpaid in the following way. A Bill was furnished by Mrs Beddies Kelly for trimmings &c which was paid on the 3rd May and this amount was included in a subsequent Bill and was paid to the same person on the 13th July

The amount in question was repaid and lodged to the credit of the Union today otherwise I would have charged it against the Clerk and Master, and it is unnecessary to comment upon their carelessness in the transaction.

II The Rate abstracts of Messrs Concanon, Curran, Wallace, and Kynce, are not regularly made up in detail nor periodically examined by the Clerk, who appears satisfied with having the Balance sheet in each of the Abstracts made up at the close of the Collection

Although the receipts and payments appear in the aggregate to be fully accounted for, yet the neglect of the Clerk in the cases referred to is not the less excusable.

(2) I have not been able to touch the expenditure for Out Door Relief in Arund inasmuch as the Applications and Report Book of the Relieving Officer was not sent in by him

III

The out Door Register is only partially kept

Kept up, and when questioned about it the Clerk did not appear to know of its existence. Although the Relief list which he is bound to check necessitates a direct reference to it in one of its headings.

The Outdoor Relief lists also contained some omissions in regard to the Numbers relieved thus exhibiting a want of proper care in the checking of them.

IV. The Clerk omits altogether to authenticate the blocks of the Cheques issued by his initials, and it is only in ^{rare} ~~some~~ cases that the Treasurer who signs the Cheques affixes their initials to the blocks. It is of some importance for Audit purposes that this part of the Cheques should be initialed in accordance with the form.

V. There is no sanction of the Local Government Board for the temporary services of the Clerk while acting as relieving officer and I reserve to myself the right of disallowing the amount paid for the purpose at the next Audit unless the necessary approval of the Local Government Board be procured in the meantime.

VI. Sufficient care does not appear to be exerted by the Clerk in distributing the charges in certain Bills to the proper a/c's. In instance a large sum is charged on one Bill to Establishment account, whereas it ought to have been debited to

VIII. The errors which exist in the sick Sick Books and to which reference was made on the occasion of the last audit, appear to be continued during the greater portion of the half year ended 29 September last.

Inasmuch however, as the Returns of these errors, which were then directed to be prepared is not yet ^{finally} made up. I have deferred examining or touching those Books until the next Audit when the Returns for the two half years are to be submitted.

VIII. There has been no stock of the clothing in the Workhouse talked for some years past and I wish to impress upon the Surintendant the necessity of having this important duty no longer deferred.

It would be desirable also to have the value of the clothing estimated & become the item in the accounts which represents the value at £186. is unquestionably very much under the actual value.

IX. There is no Inventory Book showing the Stock of the Furniture and Utensils in the House, altho such a Book is prescribed in the Regulations and is obviously a record of importance - I have accordingly directed that a Book of this kind should be provided and put into operation, but in order to start it on a proper basis.

The stock of the different articles in the House to which it relates should be regularly taken. The

X. The clothing appropriated both under the Diet books forms C and D, are not kept.

XI. I have found it necessary to draw the attention of the Medical Officers to the imperfect state of the Record of Sickness and Mortality, as both which comes under their charge.

XII. It will some steps should be taken to insure that the Relief authorized by way of Loan shall be applied for and collected in a systematic manner - There was only 979 lodged during the half year under this head.

With regard to the accounts of the Union generally it is manifest that the duties of the Clerk are not satisfactorily performed and obviously demand more care and attention in the examination and rendering of them than has hitherto been bestowed upon them: and I regret to observe that some of the most important books of the Institution, for the accuracy of which he is responsible, have not been examined by him from the close of the last half year up to the present time, altho' a weekly examination of them is necessarily required.

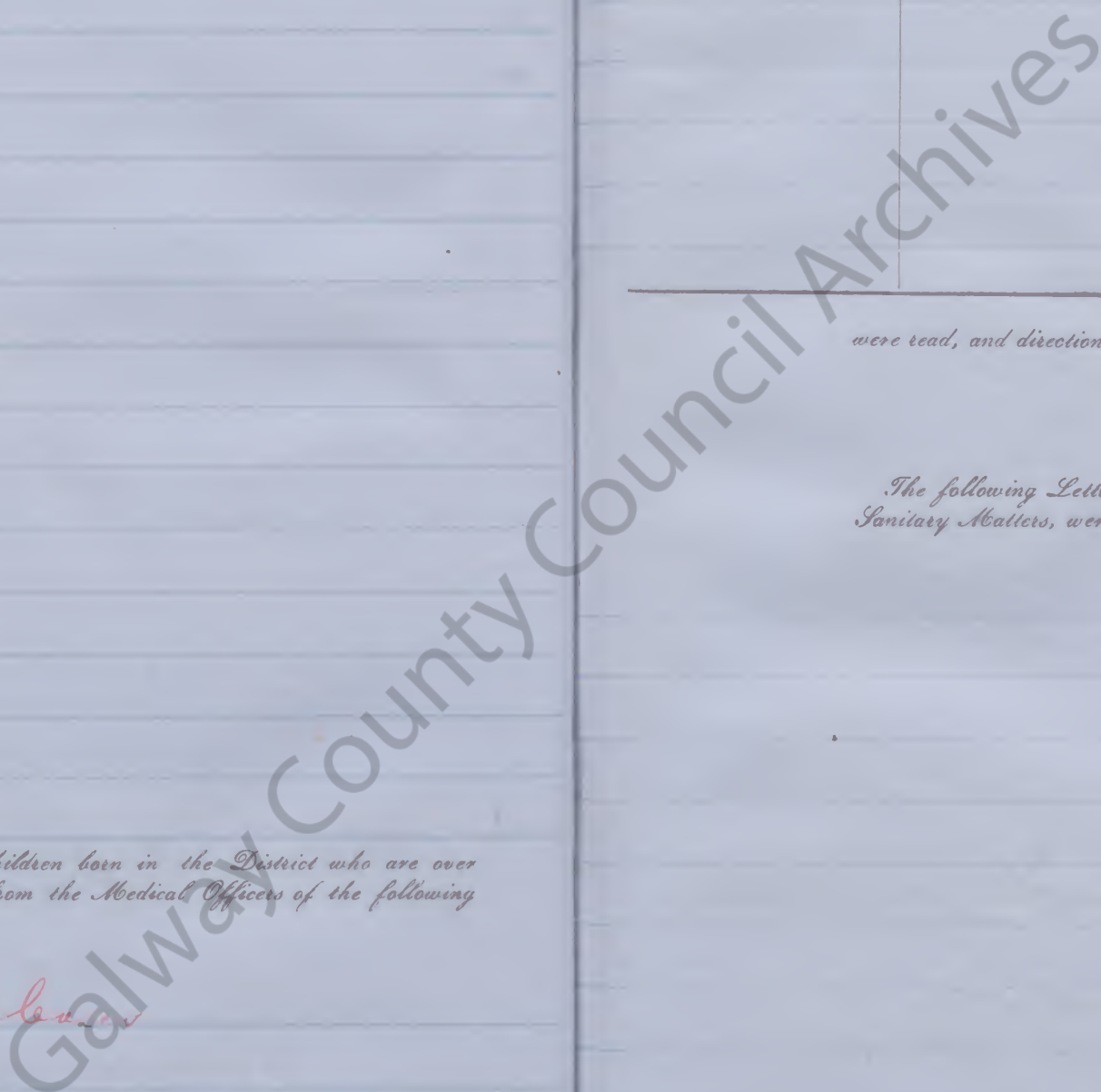

I beg to say, that Mr Kelly furnished a Bill
at the close of the Half year, as did the other contractors
and in some days after called at the Workhouse for
the amount, when on application to the Clerk,
she was told by him, that on looking for such Bill
he could not find it, and that if he got it, it
would be along with the others.

She then called on me about it, and I
assured her I gave it to the Clerk along with the
other Bills that I checked and signed, and that
he probably would on further search make it out.

She several times spoke to me for some weeks
after and said she had not yet got it, and requested
I would make further inquiry about it, which
I did, and the Clerk still was of opinion that
he did not get the Bill.

Under the circumstances I decided, that she
should furnish a duplicate of the missing Bill,
and she did so, and I handed her a cheque for
the amount and got her receipt which I gave to
the Clerk.

You will therefore I trust perceive that furnishing
the duplicate Bill was under the circumstances
an act of necessity.

How Mr Kelly came by the other (or lost
cheque) I cannot say, as I know nothing of
the circumstances connected with it.

In reference to that portion of the Report as
to the Form B "healthy daily diet Book" not being kept
I beg to say, that owing to the great press of additional


