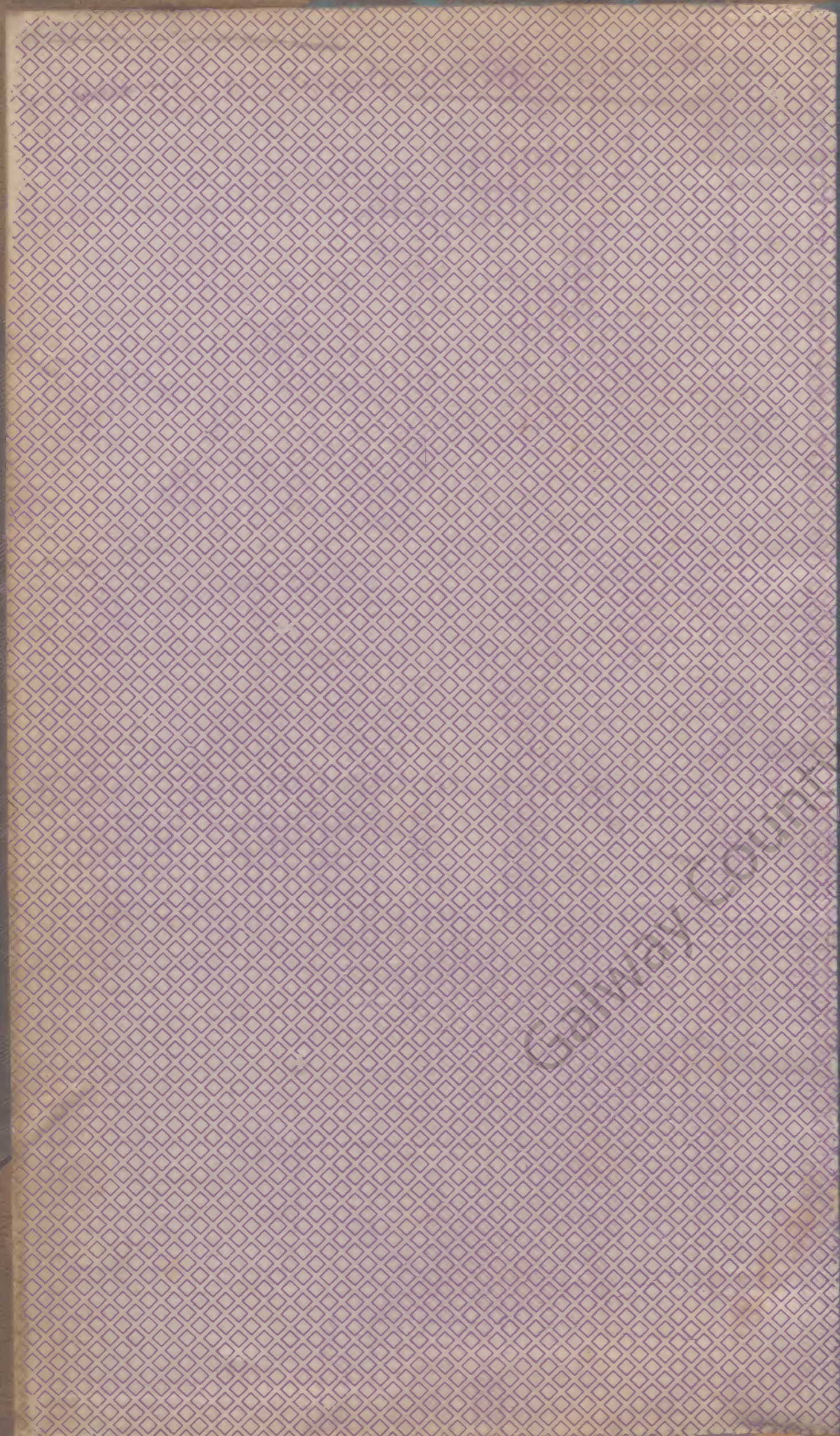

TEMPORARY ASSISTANT RELIEVING OFFICER WANTED.

THE Board of Guardians of the above Union will, at their Meeting on FRIDAY, the 13th instant, consider Applications from competent persons willing to undertake the duties of

TEMPORARY ASSISTANT RELIEVING OFFICER AND SANITARY SUB-OFFICER, for a portion of the Spiddal District of the Union, comprising the Electoral Divisions of Kilcummin, Killanin, and Selerna.

The salary is fixed at the rate of £10 per annum as Relieving Officer, and £20 as Sanitary Sub-officer.

The person appointed must give an undertaking to resign the appointment at any time the Guardians may consider his services unnecessary. He will be required to devote his entire time to the duties of the office, and must reside in a central position of his District. He will also have to enter into a bond with two sureties in sum of £50, for the due fulfilment of his duties.

The several candidates having been duly proposed and seconded, and a vote taken

12 votes were recorded for Mr Connor, 7 for Mr Lyons and 5 for Mr Kelly.

Mr Kelly's name was then withdrawn and a new vote had, when 14 votes were recorded for Mr Connor and 9 votes for Mr Lyons. Mr Connor was declared Elected, the appointment to be for a period of six months and the person appointed to take charge immediately — The remuneration for that period to be £15 for acting as Relieving officer and £10 as Sanitary Sub officer

A Report from a Comtee appointed to enquire into certain matters contained in the Auditor's report of his last examination of the Union accounts was laid before the Board

Reviewed and laid before the Board Executors notice at the suit of Anne Coyne and vs John Lydon for possession of certain premises in High Street Galway

Mr Larkin Porter of the Workhouse nominated as his Surety Mr John Olive of Eyre Square Galway; and Mr M Connor Relieving officer nominated Mr Patrick Hickey of Parnce (both instead of Mr John Connor now a Guardian)
 "Approved"

Dr. N. W. Golahan reported in reply to the Clerk's letter that the cause of his non attendance at the Hospital on certain days last week, that he was then and since, suffering from sore throat, and that at his request, Dr. Clayton discharged his duties

Report Considered Satisfactory

Ordered. That Mary Maloney get the clothing of her mother a deceased inmate of the workhouse, who was buried at the expense of her relatives.

Mr Cullinan Relieving officer reported that the Rev^d Mr McPhepin C. C. Attorney has furnished him with a list of the names of 80 families in his District who require Out door Relief

Mr Young Relieving officer was before the Board a list of persons given to him by the Rev^d Mr McPhepin who were stated to be in a destitute condition

Mr Cullinan's Report was to the effect that out of the list of 80 families furnished to him, he visited 61 and that out of the number so visited only 3 persons applied to him for relief (out door) and of the 3 one is already in receipt of some, the others he should visit as soon as possible,
 Mr Young gave it as his opinion that the

persons on the list supplied to him did not require relief

The Rev Mr M Phipps then addressed the Board on the Subject, — And it was eventually decided that as the Board had no applications then before them, that these matters be left to the discretion of the Relieving Officers

Resolved. That the Tender of Mr J. J. Brady for the Execution of the Sewerage works in Connection with the Workhouse Buildings for a Sum of £729 was accepted Mr J. M. Blake Esq. to prepare a Bond to be entered into by Mr Brady and his Sureties Mr J. J. Gunning Wood Quay and Mr Jas Kearney Cornock St

Circular from W S B Kay Esq Dublin Castle dated 12th February to be furnished monthly with a list of the payments made under the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act 1878

Report of the Committee appointed to enquire into certain matters contained in the Auditors Report for year ending 29th September 1879

We beg to report that in Reference to the Surcharge of £ s. d. on the Master, Mr Lynch, for Extra diets issued to the Fever and Workhouse Hospitals that having examined the accounts, we find that an irregularity crept in in the half year commencing September 1877 which continued, as regards the Fever Hospital up to the 29th Sept 1878, and as regards the Workhouse Hospital, up to 25th March 1879.

It appears that the practice was that the Schoolmaster, Mr Maurion, who kept the books for the Medical officers, issued diet docket for the Hospitals each day to the Master and inserted in these docket quantities in excess of what was ordered on the Books of the Medical officers

These errors in excess though trifling amounted in the aggregate to an average of about £2.16.0 in each of five half years and when the audit took place amounted to the sum surcharged on the Master

No doubt the rule of having his accounts checked weekly was not complied with, but as there was neither fraud nor intention of fraud on the part of the Master we recommend that the sum surcharged be remitted and that the Local Govt Board be requested to sanction this remission.

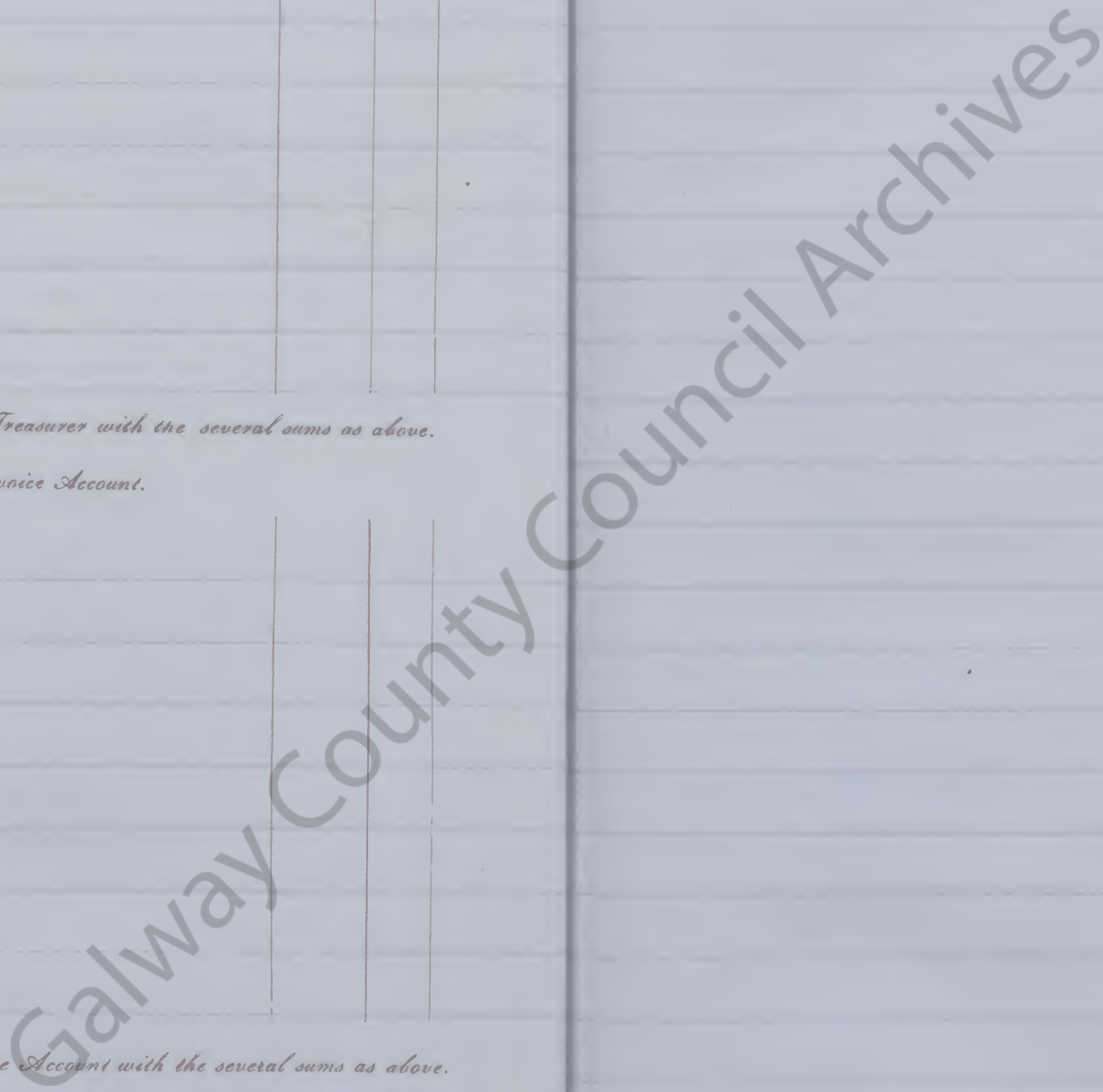

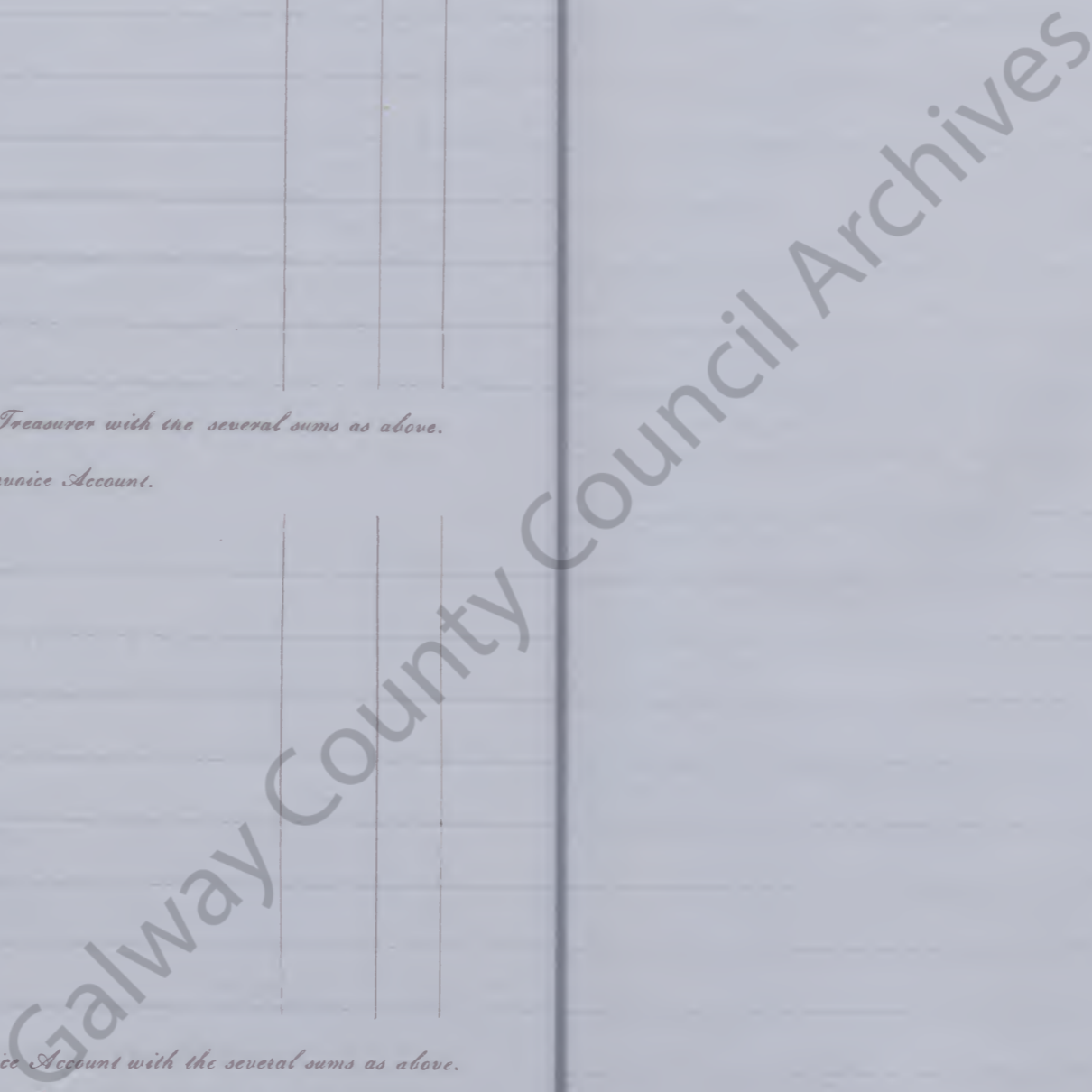
