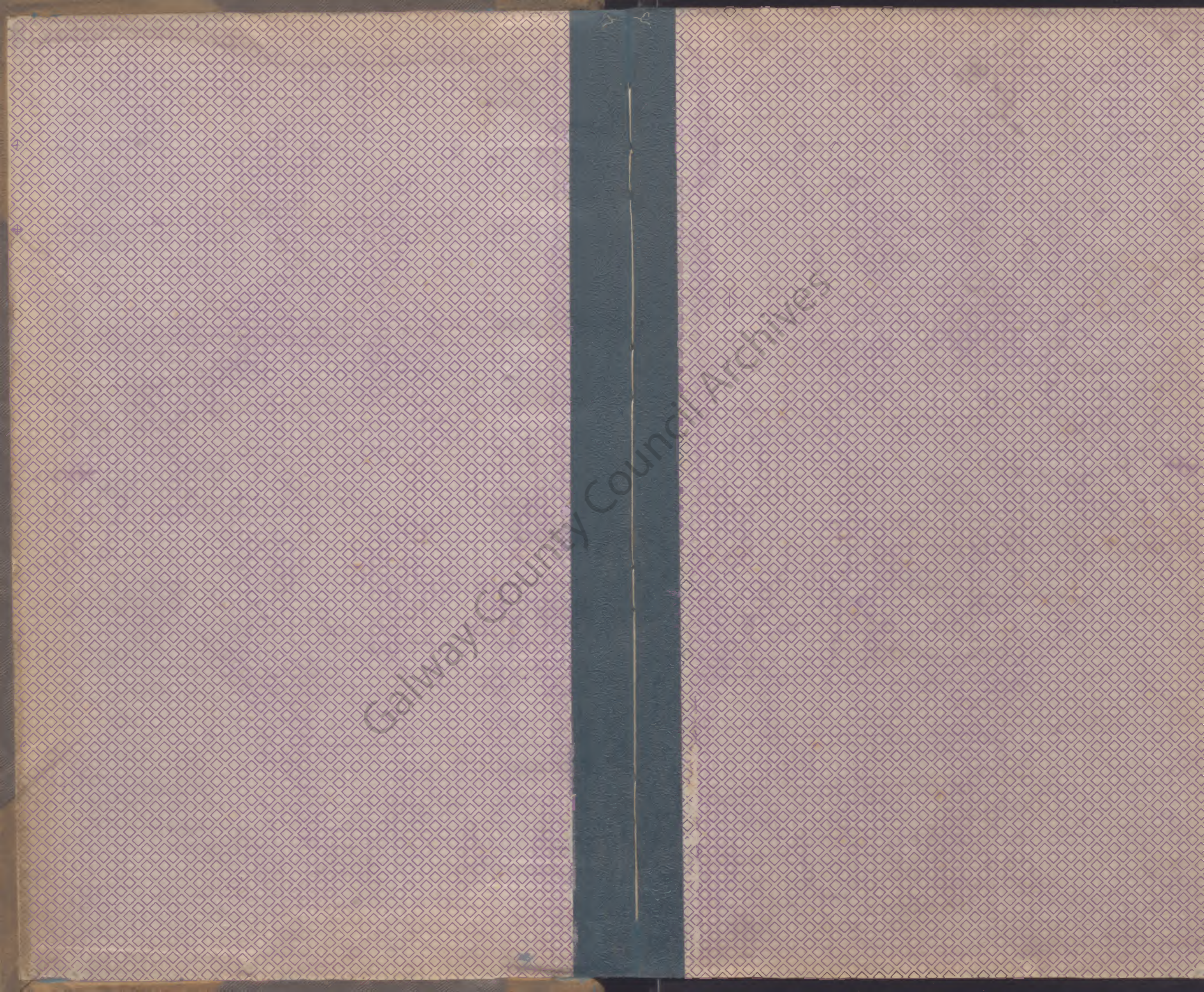

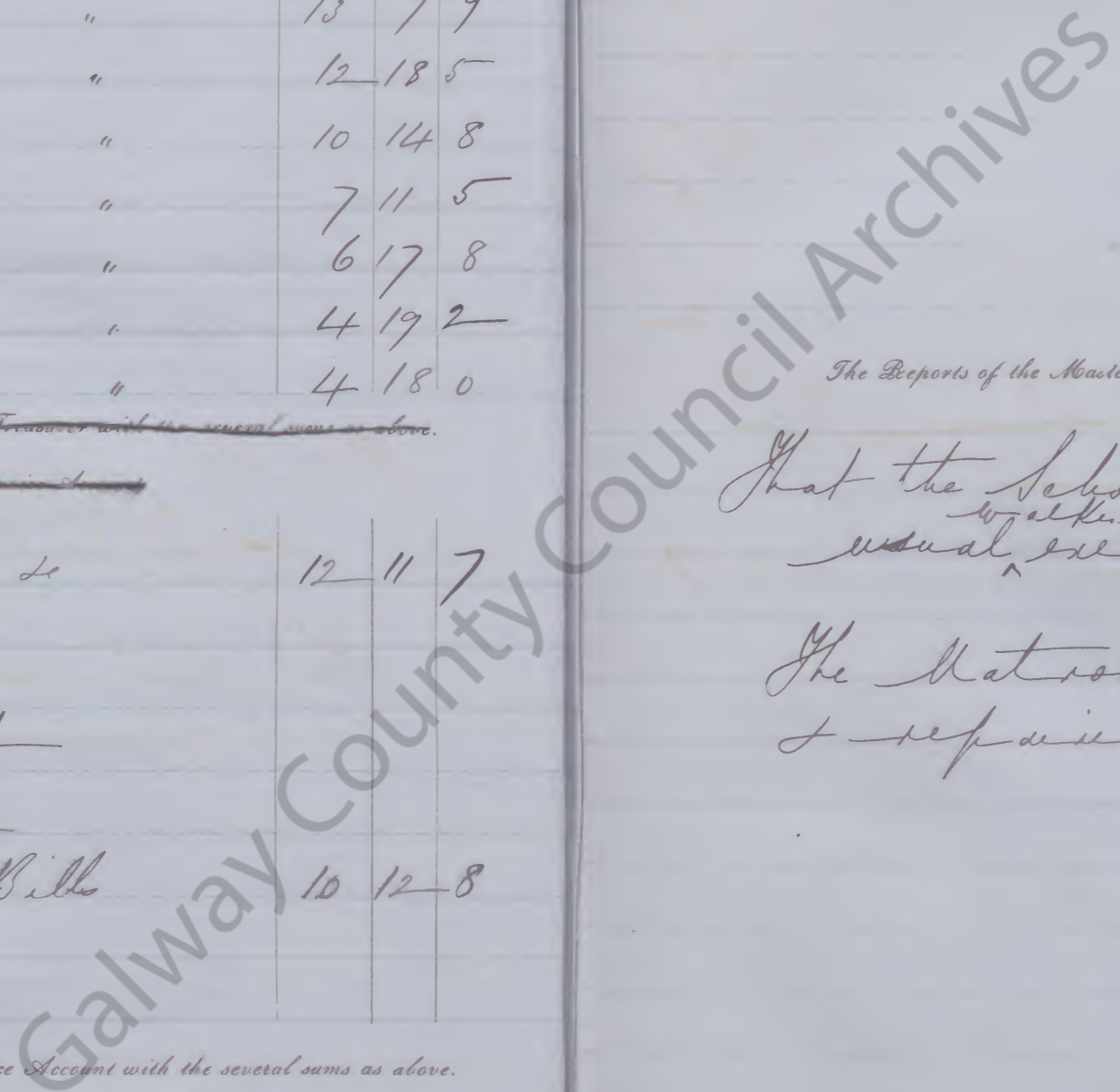

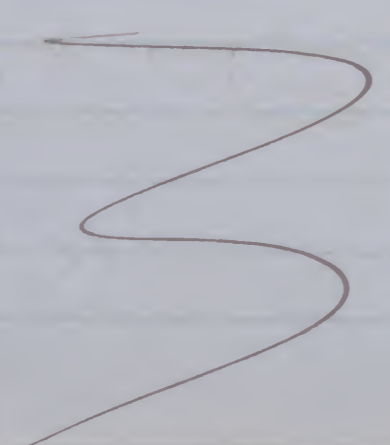

- 1 There appears to have been a balance of £1-0-2 in the hands of Mr. Kellian, Late Relieving Officer, when he ceased to hold office and this amount should be at once applied for.
- 2 A sum of 2/6 was struck off as irrecoverable on the Ballintemple Division for which no authority was shown to exist and I accordingly debited it in the Collectors Abstract.
- 3 There was £26-13-0 in the hands of the Clerk, in his Petty Cash account, at the close of the half year - a sum altogether in excess of his ordinary weekly requirements under this head, and I have therefore pointed out to him that the sums to be retained by him for this purpose must be kept within ordinary limits in future.
- 4 An error has occurred in regard to lodgments of rate erroneously credited to Moycullen and Shiveeneena Divisions which however will be rectified in the a/c of the following half year -
- 5 The Books of the Temporary Relieving Officers in the Spiddal District were not forthcoming: but inasmuch as the Clerk had checked them in due course there seems no reason to doubt but that the expenditure was regularly authorized.
- 6 The Application and Report Book of the Relieving for Inishmore was not produced. It is stated to have been stolen so that no examination of his accounts could have been effected.
- 7 A large sum appears due for Relief afforded by way of Loan and it appears desirable that a statement of it should

be prepared and submitted to the Guardians for their information and instructions thereon. It seems to me that several cases exist in which the money so due could have been easily obtained before now: For instance:— there is 18¹/₄ due by a Policeman since November 1879 and £1-9-0 due by the Spiddal Orphanage for an equally long time.

8. Considerable irregularity exists in regard to the furnishing of Bills of Articles supplied to the Workhouses. In nearly all cases the invoices are made up in the Masters Office and in some cases they are not furnished regularly; but are allowed to remain out for a year and upwards, so that a proper check upon the items is rendered difficult if not impossible. The Contractors and others should be required to furnish their accounts regularly and the Bills should be made up by them upon printed forms which can be supplied from the Clerks Office.

As a striking illustration of the laxity which exists in this way, I may mention that a Bill was submitted for audit, for goods stated to have been supplied by James Campbell, some of the items extending as far back as 1876 although he was paid another account for articles subsequently supplied.

I find also that Board Orders are not regularly procured for articles required from time to time.

Upon the whole it is obvious that a considerable degree of carelessness exists in these respects on the part of the Master to which I feel bound to call special attention.

9 I again feel called upon to draw the attention of the Guardians to the necessity for stock taking — a duty not performed in this Union for many years:

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
It is usual in many Unions to appoint and pay a person for the discharge of this duty and the adoption of a similar course here would, in my opinion, be for the advantage of the Union.

10. I regret to have to observe that the financial Business of the Union does not appear to be carried out in a sufficiently satisfactory way. The Finance Book, which contains a record of all sums intended for payment does not, in many instances, appear to be examined or the items authorized, and in like manner most of the Bills submitted for payment bear no evidence whatever of having been inspected or authenticated by any member of the Board. It seems to me that the appointment of a Finance Committee for the discharge of this important duty, is a point well deserving the consideration of the Guardians.

" The a/c's kept and supervised by the Clerk are fairly satisfactory; but nevertheless still require on his part a more careful preparation and stricter examination -
