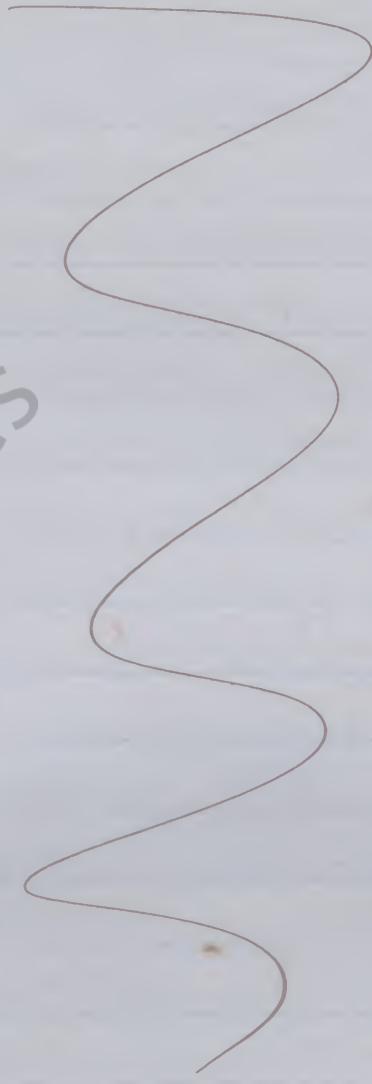

Med. Charities

We the Committee appointed to enquire into certain matters connected with Galway Dispensary, and ~~the~~ workhouse Hospital have to report, that we met on the 8<sup>th</sup> Inst. & went very fully into the subjects referred to us —

We were assisted in the investigation by Dr. Hoeyhan F.L.S. whose practical knowledge of the proper working of Dispensaries & of workhouse Hospitals, helped considerably to guide us in our enquiry —

Drs Grady & Clayton were examined with regard to Galway Dispensary —

We found that the number  
 of persons attended or prescribed  
 for by these Officers for the year  
 ending 30<sup>th</sup> Sept 1880 was 3924,  
 as against 2950 the previous year,  
 being <sup>nearly</sup> 1000 in excess —

allowing for the exceptional  
 privation experienced by the poor  
 during last winter and spring, ~~and~~  
 and the ailments consequent thereon,  
 we are of opinion that the numbers  
 receiving gratuitous medical relief  
 were far in excess of those entitled  
 to it

This would seem to arise  
 from the fact that Dispensary  
 tickets were issued in the  
 names of, W. James Martyn,  
 3

Mr Ferdinand; Mr. M. Dooley;  
 Mr. W. Sullivan ~~and others~~; but not

always signed by those members  
 of the Dispersary Committee -  
 the result being that four Medical  
 Officers were called on to visit and  
 afford Medical relief to many  
 who should never have received  
 red tickets -

One of the tickets thus  
 issued was given to a retired  
 constable of Police, in the receipt  
 of a Pension of £75 p annum,  
 and with other means of support -

Another ticket so issued  
 was to a person of the name of  
 Feeney, since deceased, then  
 living at Upper Salt Hill; and

Who it was stated could well have <sup>441</sup>  
 afforded to pay for Medical advice.

We were further informed  
 that Guardians, and families of  
 Guardians of the Union were attended  
 and relieved at the expense of this  
 Union.

To prevent a recurrence of  
 this manifest abuse of Medical  
 Relief thro' the Dispensary, we  
 would call the attention of the  
 Dispensary Committee to the following  
 extract from a circular addressed  
 to Dispensary Medical Officers from  
 the Poor Law Commission Office,  
 dated 3<sup>d</sup> Sept 1869. When the  
 attention of the Commission had  
 been drawn to the irregular manner

" The ComMISSIONERS think  
it right to point out that the  
practice of giving Medical Relief  
without the production of a Ticket  
Signed by a person duly entitled to  
give Tickets for Medical Relief under

and not authorized by the provisions  
of that Act — Cases of ~~emergency~~<sup>urgency</sup>  
urgency may occur, in which the  
delay necessary to obtain a Ticket  
might be a serious consequence,  
and in cases which are of this

will act at once on his own responsibility.

But in such instances he ought to  
require the applicant to procure tickets  
and present them as soon afterwards  
as possible."

Your Committee are of opinion  
that your Medical Officers would  
be relieved from the difficult &  
delicate position in which they  
are often times placed, were there  
more circumspection observed by  
Members of the Disbursary Committee,  
and by a more careful selection  
of the recipients of Disbursary Tickets.

In the event of a repetition  
of the abuses above pointed out,  
we recommend that the Disbursary  
Medical Officers bring under the  
notice of the Disbursary Committee



Such cases as they may be called  
 on to prescribe for gratuitously,  
 who in their opinion could afford  
 to pay for medical relief.

With reference to the second  
 part of our investigation, viz the  
 large amount of medicines ordered  
 during the past year for this House,  
 we laboured under a certain disadvantage  
 owing to the absence from the position  
 of the Workhouse Apothecary

Dr. Colohan & Clayton however  
 afforded us every assistance and  
 information in their power,  
 and we are thus enabled to state  
 before you the following facts.

We found that the sum paid  
 for Medicines for this ~~the~~ Union  
 for the year ending 29<sup>th</sup> Sept  
 1880 was £559-7-3; of which  
 £190-14-7 was for this Hospital  
 alone; a sum which we were  
<sup>assured</sup> ~~assured~~ by Dr. Foyhane exceeds,  
 in proportion, the amount required  
 for any other Hospital in his  
 District; and he would venture  
 to add - in all Ireland -

We therefore directed the  
 Clerk to call on the Apothecary  
 to explain the cause of so large  
 an increase in the Medicines  
 asked for by him.

Two of your committee accompanied Dr. Doughan to the Medicine room, and were there pointed out a quantity of Medicines and other necessaries that had evidently lain on the shelves for a length of time, and are now mouldy or otherwise, & thereby unfit for use.

We think an inspection by of that Department, say every week by Drs. Johnson & Clayton alternatively, would have a salutary effect.

 felt, &c. &c., beyond all proportion  
 we believe to the requirements of  
 the Hospital -; and we further

That we regret to be obliged to call the attention of the Med. officers to the present unsatisfactory state of the medicine room of the Workhouse, and particularly to the tenor of the letter of the Poor Law Commissioners of the 11<sup>th</sup> August 1862 with respect to the custody of poisonous medicines, it having appeared that there is no lock to the case in which such poisonous medicines are contained in the medicine room, and also that the key of the medicine room is left in charge of a porter inmate of the Hospital.

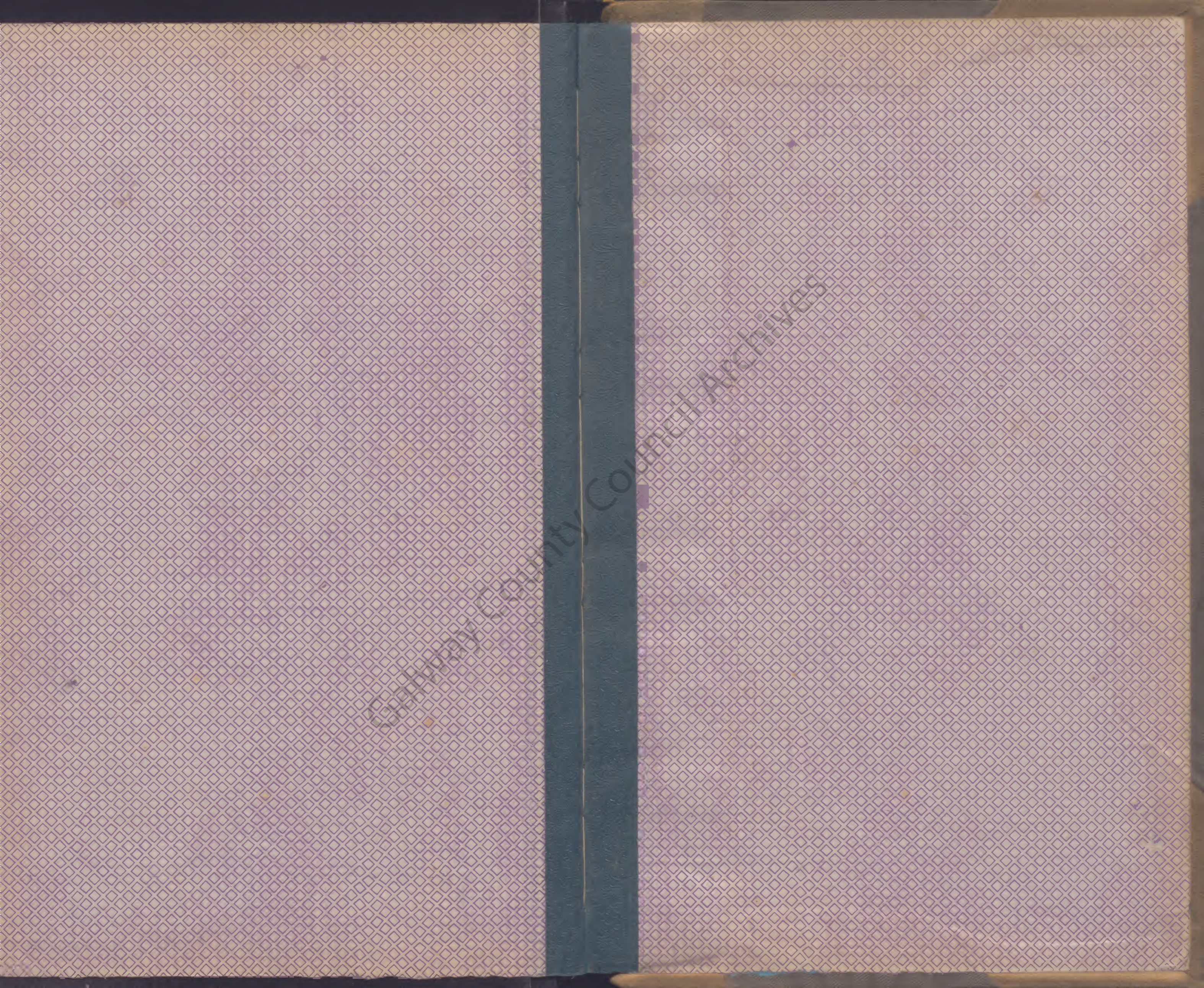
