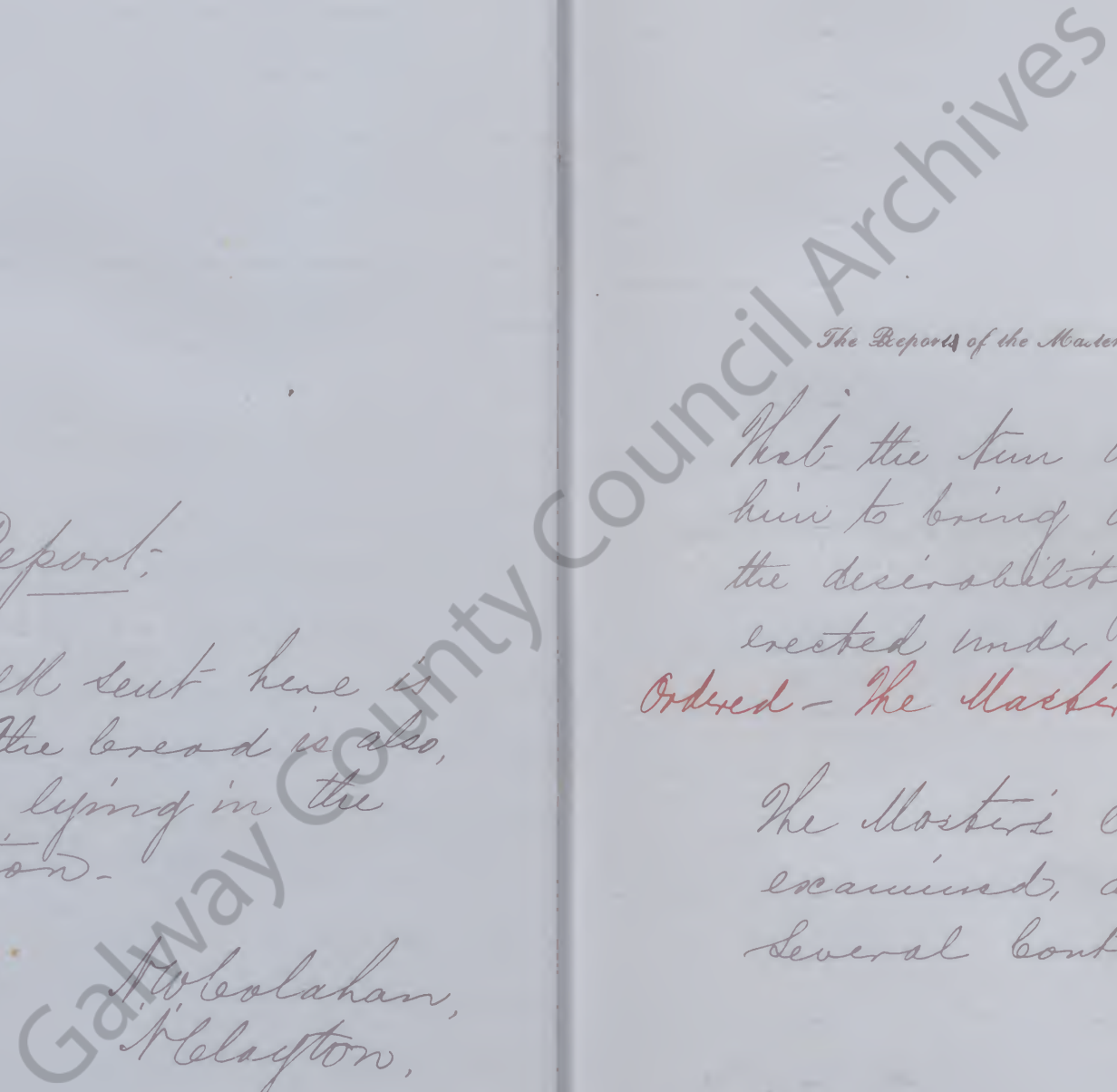

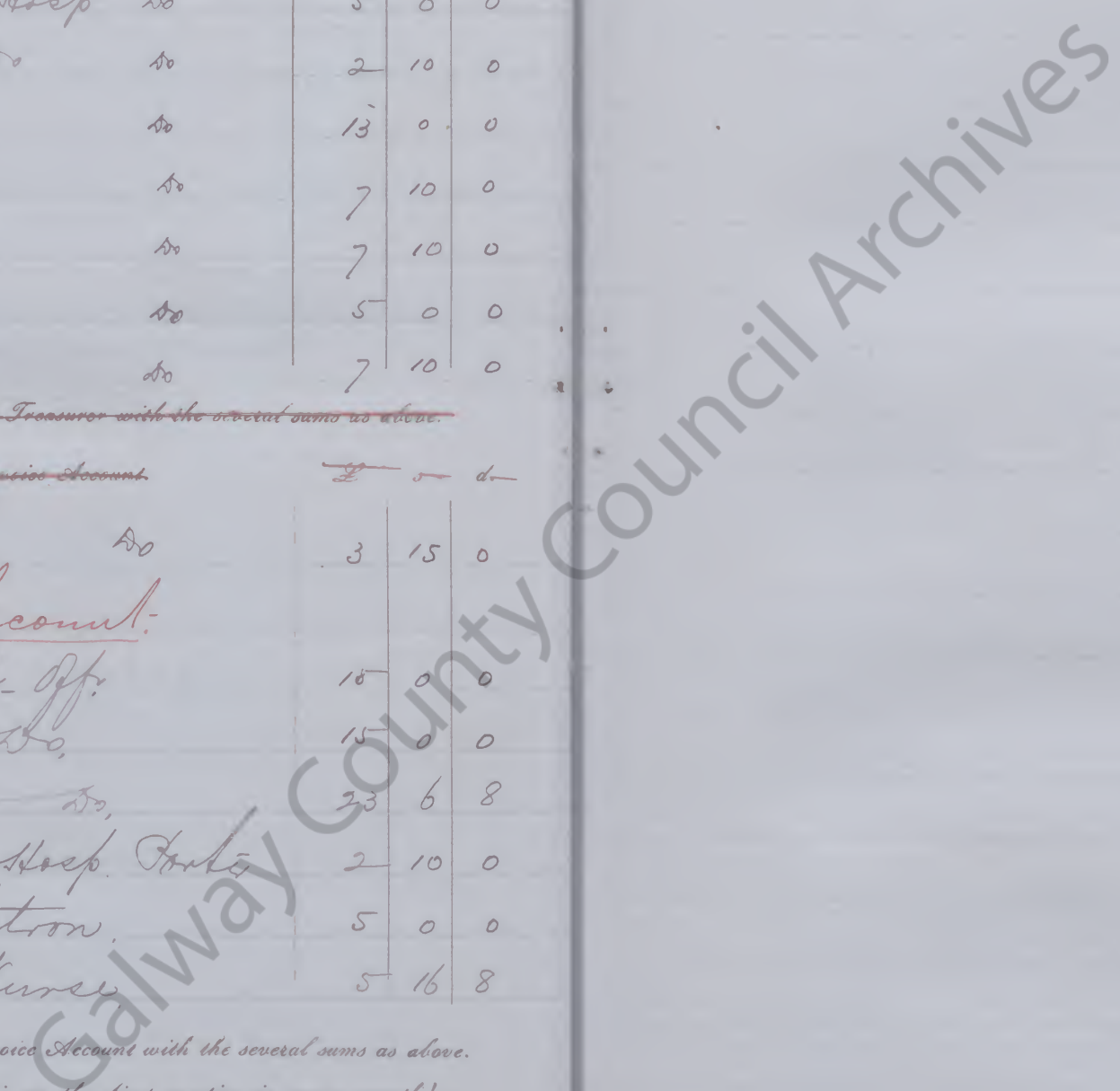

A Meeting of the Oranmore Dispensary Committee was held this day - In the Chair Lord Wallacourt. Other Members present. George Hill, John S. Kerin, Mathias Finn, and Patrick Brady.

Examined Medical Registers from N<sup>o</sup>. 974. to 1041 and N<sup>o</sup>. 996. was struck off.

Read a letter from the Local Gov. Board, which enclosed a letter of Complaint from D. Dalton, relative to a black ticket issued by Mr. Hill to Michael Brennan, not on a dispensary day - - The following is a copy of Dr. Dalton's letter - - Oranmore 8<sup>th</sup> Sept. 1881

Sir. I beg to forward you for information of Local Gov Board, particulars regarding my attendance on Michael Brennan. who presented me with enclosed ticket on 31<sup>st</sup> August at my own house. Brennan sustained severe injuries, his right thumb at base was almost cut through by a Doctor's barrel. indeed it was only held by a little skin, Brennan's mother called on Mr. Hill for a ticket, he gave her a black one, though not a dispensary day. The ticket was called for at 8 o'clock or earlier. If she got a visiting ticket, and if I went to Oranmore at 8 o'clock, or 9 o'clock I would find the Doctor absent, & consequently would be unable to dress the wounds. I would be forced to return without attending to the patient, and if on the other hand I refused to attend him, I had a perfect right to do so at my own house, and sent him home, he might have died from Hemorrhage &c. The boy who was working at the time of the injury with Mr. Kerin, secretary, Oranmore Dispensary Committee, was conveyed to my residence on a donkey cart. On last dispensary day I had to send Brennan's mother for hot water as I could get none

the Dispensary. In future when I get a business notice I will call at once to see the patient & afterwards at Dispensary, and if I find not the bottles. I will not take down shutters or discharge other duties of porter, but leave without prescribing for the sick. If I refused to attend Porenan, and that serious consequences turned up, I think the Dispensary Committee would be to blame for not placing me in a position to discharge my duties. I am informed on very high authority that it is dangerous for me to be dispensing medicines which are kept in old papers in Dispensary and I want to know can I get them thrown out and replaced by new. I hope the case of Porenan will show the Local Gov. Board the way I am situated and that my letter of 11<sup>th</sup> Augt. will be considered

The meeting being called to consider the foregoing letters, the Committee considers the Doctors statement, that the Dispensary would be closed at a particular hour, is not reasonable as the Porters residence is scarcely one hundred yards from the Dispensary, and although not being Dispensary day, the door would be opened and the shutters taken down by the porters family which was frequently done before, and since, the Committee had the Porters to reside in the Dispensary until June last. The house having four unoccupied rooms, and during his residence there, the entire house was put into a most commendable state of order and cleanliness. Dr. Dalton had him put out on account of the temporary illness of two of his children

The Committee considers that Dr. Daltons efforts to make a case, against the Dispensary arrangements, in consequence of a black ticket being taken to his lodgings nearly two miles away from the Dispensary, the patient being obliged to use a doney cart to get there, is

not reasonable. The advertisement in one issue of his appointment required that he should reside in Oranmore - wherein there were three vacant and suitable houses - during a portion of the year, to be let. at present there is one, as could also be had suitable lodgings. That the poor person who received this black ticket being obliged to use a cart to go to the Doctors lodgings two miles away is what the Committee cannot well remedy. The Local Gov. Board, could apply a remedy, by requiring the Medical officers to reside in Oranmore. The Committee from their experience of from twenty to thirty years, in management of the Dispensary matters all their arrangements, for the best interests of the poor, who have to avail themselves of Medical relief, and for the interests of the Ratepayers.

The Committee regrets, that the poor, availing themselves of Dispensary relief have diminished considerably in number from causes it would be <sup>proper</sup> to enquire into, but which the Committee, object to put on record, as complaints are made, to separate members of the Committee by poor persons, who will not come before a meeting of the Committee.

The Committee have no motive whatever in view, but what they consider, the best for the interests of the poor and the Ratepayers; they cannot make these, subservient to those, of the Medical officers, whose views they would be most anxious to meet, if reasonable and practicable -

Mr. Conway also complains that Mr. Francis white building blocked up the drain which leads from his back yard to main sewer, so that in wet weather his house becomes flooded. If such be the case notice should be at once served on him to have the drain at once reopened. I met Mr. Carter Draper on Tuesday last in Spiddal, showed him the place, & respectfully beg to refer you to him as to what he held to be done.

I also wish to call your attention to the Spiddal Grove yard which is indeed in a bad state. It is overcrowded, not a foot of soil to be got in any part of it, and it is dangerous to the health of the neighbourhood. The difficulty for some time back was to find a suitable site, as it was very hard to get depth of soil. Now that I find there is such a place to be got, both as regards locality and soil it being all sand at a place called Laine I request you will be good enough to have a new one built at said place and the present closed immediately.

new. I respectfully beg to call your attention to the sewerage and sanitary state of Spiddal. The sewerage is in a very bad state and most dangerous to the health of the inhabitants. As to what is necessary I beg to refer you to my report on the matter forwarded to you in March back as January 1880, and to state that until the sewers and drains I then recommended be made, the health of the people will always be at risk and liable to an epidemic of fever, &c. &c. There is a field at the back of St. Francis, in a most disgraceful and filthy state. A large cesspool in the middle of it which is a receptacle for all kinds of nuisances. St. Francis removed the road boundary wall while building latrines, so that the place is now a common receptacle, &c. &c. is as I before stated in a terrible state of filth and dangerous to public health.

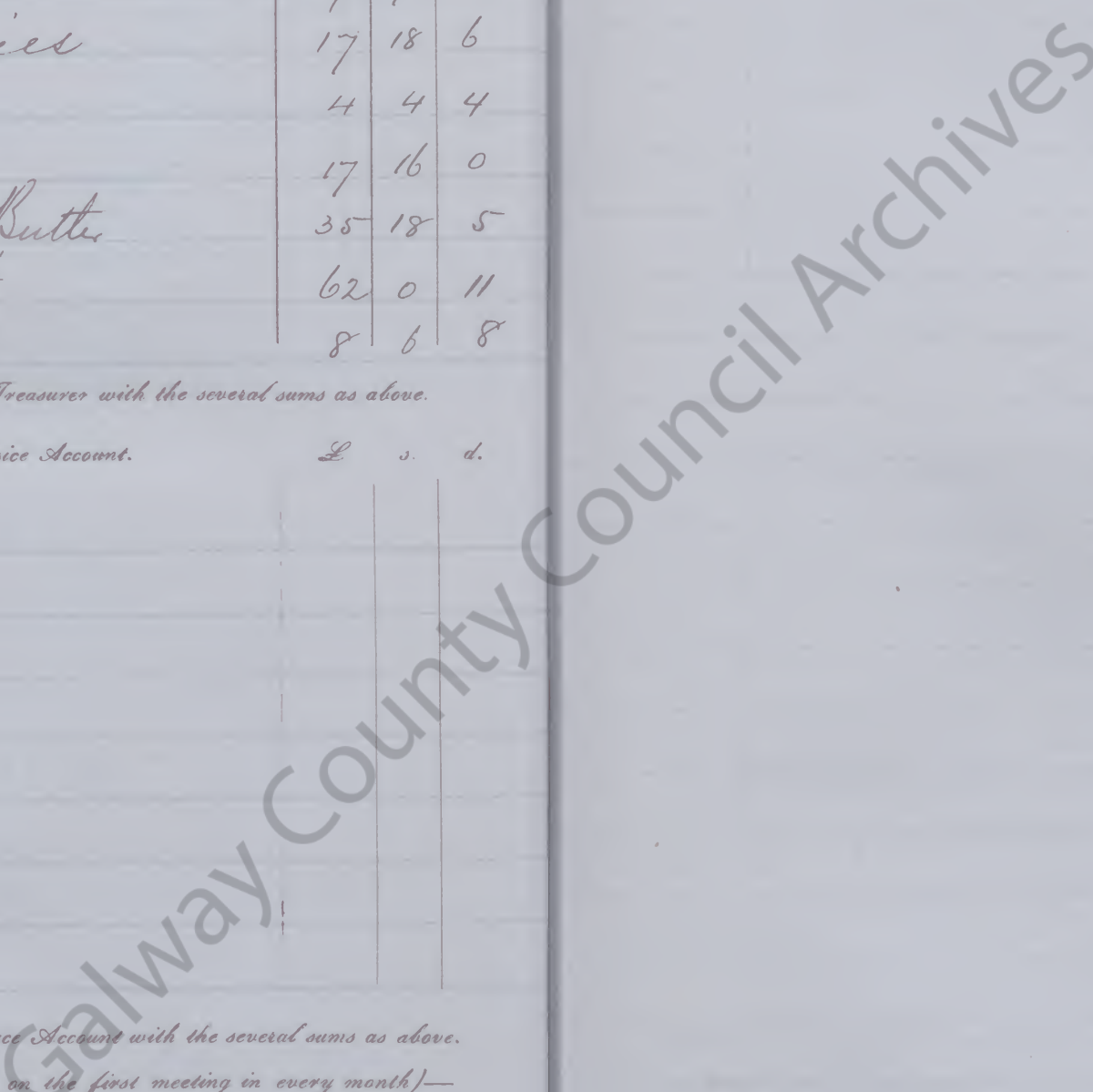

The nurse stated she would leave on Sunday next unless she was also allowed her food with the £1 a week she is at present getting.
