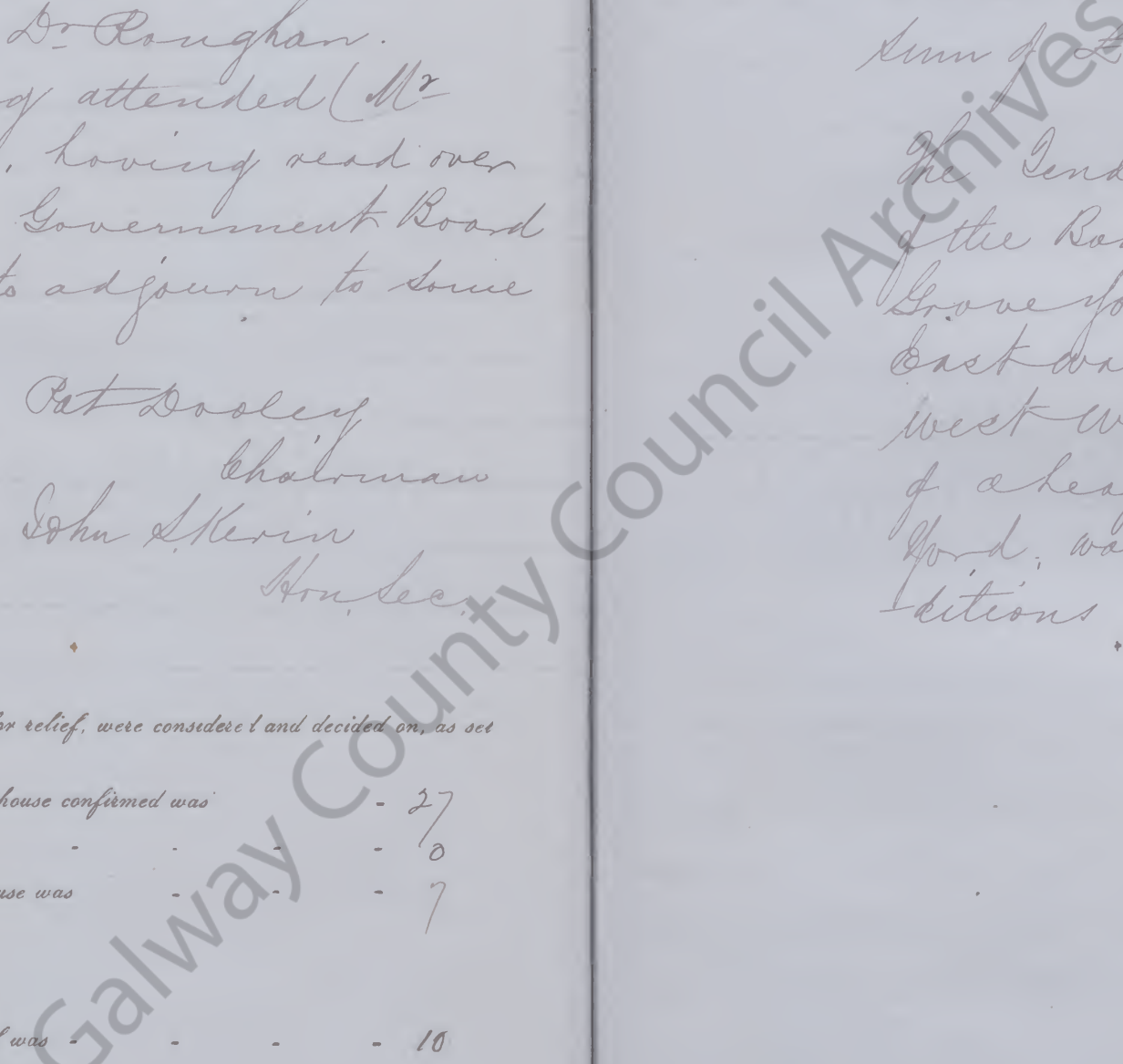

In compliance with the request of the Guardians of Galway Union, as conveyed to me in your letter of 12th ultimo, that I should inspect the sewers in the village of Oranmore, and report thereon with the view of their present defective state being remedied, I beg to say that I have made a careful survey of the existing sewers, and also taken the levels in several directions in order to ascertain the facilities of the ground for new sewerage—

The accompanying tracing will explain the present state of affairs.

From A to B and along chapel lane to C, an old dry rubble sewer exists. From C to D is an open drain of the average depth of 2 ft. 6 ins. and bottom width of 1 ft. 6 ins. This open drain originally discharged into the stream at D; but it was objected that persons took the water below this point, and therefore a covered drain was built from D to E, entering the stream at a point below any place from which water need be taken—

I am of opinion that the covered drain from A to C is almost inoperative both from wrong levels and bad construction, and is in fact

a

a mere "Sewer of deposit".

The only other available outfall is in the tidal river at F, but the necessity of the case does not, I think, warrant a main sewer from B along the main street to the outfall F, for which, according to the levels I have taken, the depth of trench would average 7ft. reaching in places to 13ft.

The length of this main sewer would be 468 yards, and its probable cost, including all necessary adjuncts, would be £250.

Under these circumstances, probably the best course to pursue is to abandon the old sewer from A to C, and to substitute a pipe sewer, having five properly constructed street gullies in suitable positions connected with it.

The length of this sewer is 175 yards.

With regard to the open drain from C to D, it should be deepened to the extent of 1 foot throughout, and slightly widened.

The cost of this work would be about £60.

At any future time this open drain, CD, could be converted into a pipe drain if required.

The Chairman of the Board of Guardians, I have been requested to call your attention to a Resolution passed some time ago, requiring the attendance of a clergyman at the interment of the poor from the Workhouse to the graveyard, and to inform you that a sum of £30 per annum, was voted and is paid to the Chaplain in consideration of this extra duty, so consoling to the feelings of the poor and their friends.

The Board of Guardians shall take it as a favour if you will kindly inform them why so desirable a duty has been discontinued.

Dear Sir,

I am in receipt of your letter on the part of the Board of Guardians, calling my attention to a resolution of your Board requiring the "attendance of a clergyman at the interment of the poor", and stating that "a sum of £30

per annum, was voted to the Chaplain in consideration of the extra duty," and also asking "why so desirable a duty has been discontinued."

In reply I beg to state that until I received your letter, I never even heard of the existence of such a resolution. On enquiry however, I have learned of its existence, and am now in a position to inform you why the duty it imposes has been partially discontinued.

The Chairman of the Board of Guardians for such a lengthened period, I presume you must be aware of the fearful sacrilege committed at the Workhouse, a sacrilege which caused intense pain to the community at the time, and the very recollection of which now, makes us shudder. Since that time the practice has been to read the funeral service in the Dead House of the Union, before the remains are taken away for interment, the clergyman always taking the absolutely necessary precaution, to assure himself that the remains are present.

The sacrilege referred to occurred long before my appointment to the Chaplaincy. On my appointment, I made inquiries of the Master (McLynch) about the duties. He informed me of the practice in reference to interments. I then followed out exactly what had been done by my predecessor. I may observe however that very frequently funerals
from

* coincidently meant
"January"

from the workhouse house had the funeral service at the grove by either myself or one of my colleagues. when the friends of the deceased expressed a desire on the matter.

The precaution I refer to, you will admit, was a necessary consequence of the sacrilege, and the opening of the coffin at the grove would be a ceremony that might occasionally be attended with unpleasantness; but it is unnecessary to argue this point.

The resolution accordingly of your Board has been complied with to the fullest extent, that could be consistent with proper regard for religious observances, and I must say with all due respect, that the recent action of your Board, affords entire evidence, that it is still imperative to take the precaution introduced previous to my connection with the workhouse.

Now, with proper precaution, I can't see the slightest objection to the resolution referred to, being fully carried out, when the Guardians make the necessary arrangements.

The interments now take place in the New Cemetery, and as your Board has thought proper to appoint a Protestant Caretaker, it will be necessary that you provide an approved attendant for the clergyman at the Cemetery.

You being a Catholic renders it entirely unnecessary for me to explain the necessity that exists in this regard. The Master too must arrange that the funerals shall take place at stated hours. When those arrangements are satisfactorily made, the resolution, of which I thoroughly approve, can be fully carried out.
