The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 1972 to No. 2009, both inclusive, by the Signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 3355 to No. 3414, inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:—

That he had summoned a Meeting of the Committee of Management of the Galway Dispensary District, for 11.30 am, on the 10th inst. Special business - appointment of an Honorary Secretary in room of A. J. Grealy resigned.

That he had furnished Rate collectors W. Kelly and J. Wallace each with a copy of L. G. Board letter of the 2nd inst, and called upon them to furnish without delay an explanation of the cause of their having failed up to this period to complete the collection of the Rates of 29th Octr 1880. Neither of them had since replied.

Copy of Auditor's memoranda on completion of audit of Union Accounts on the 9th February 1882.

- I was obliged to disallow illegal out door relief in three cases.
 - The case of Sarah Hession, Lachaghbeg C.H. in Relieving Officer Stack's Books, is not one properly falling within the provisions of Sec. 1 of 10 Vic. Cap. 31, and the expenditure is not a legal payment from the funds of the Union. Under these circumstances I hereby disallow the amount expended viz. £6.5.11, and surcharge same against Pierce Joyce Esq. being the Guardian by whose initials the relief in question was authorized.
 - In the case of Mary Devany, Galway C.H. as described in the Application and Report Book of Relieving Officer Stack, is not one legally falling within the provisions of Sec. 1 of 10 Vic. Cap. 31, and the sum expended in this case is not, in my opinion, a legal charge upon the funds of the Union. Under these circumstances I hereby disallow the amount, viz. £2, and surcharge same against Pierce Joyce Esq. being the Guardian by whose initials the relief the relief in question was authorized.
 - The Relief given in the case of Bridget Kennedy, Galway C.H. Relieving Officer Stack's Books, could not have been le-
-gally

- gally afforded, and the expenditure is not a legal charge on the funds of the Union. Under these circumstances I hereby disallow it, and surcharge the amount, viz £0.6.0 against Pierce Joyce Esq. being the Guardian by whose initials the relief in question was authorized.

2 I had also to surcharge Relieving Officer Young with £0.8.0, and Relieving Officer Stack with £0.4.0, being so much taken credit for in their Relief Lists in excess of the amount authorized.

3 The Relief List and Application and Report Book of Relieving Officer Hannon were so imperfectly made up as to render the audit of them most unsatisfactory.

4 £3.1.4 the price of Mangolds sold to Mc Gill has not yet been paid. He should be required to lodge the amount to the credit of the Union without any further delay.

5 The particulars of Sales of Farm Produce to be entered by the Master in the Farm Account in future.

I have to bring under your notice the state of the water tank in the hospital (Female side) It has frequently gone out of order since it was put up and during the week it burst in some part, flooding the Ward and clothes store.

I beg respectfully to state that the erection of a water tank inside a ward where chest cases and delicate children are placed, is not calculated to promote their welfare. During the winters of '80 & '81, the tank became frozen for weeks leaving the Ward so cold that the bad cases had to be removed. At all other times there are only a few inches of water in the tank at night time, and when high pressure is put on outside the flow of water lasts for hours, depriving the patients of every chance of sleep. I wish to bring under your notice the case of James Coleman residing in the village of Kilronan. It appears that this man who is over 80 years of age and a complete imbecile has been receiving out door relief for the last four years and is now confined to his bed owing principally to the fact the R. O. Mr. Bartly Vernon has withheld the miserable pittance of 2/- a week for some petty spite or something of the sort, as no one can understand why he should deprive him at the eleventh hour of what was keeping his soul and body together for a number of years. I may mention that his son who was in America for the last 20 years has come home destitute and dying of consumption and both are now laid up in the same bed without covering or fire and left to die because they have displeased the Relieving Officer. It is nothing short of a public scandal that this officer who boasts openly before the Priests and people, that he can do what he likes and withdraw what he likes from the destitute sick poor of Arran. To one in Arran has ever seen a notice posted up showing the amount of relief given by him since his appointment, and hence it is that the rate payers have grave reasons to doubt how it is that they are saddled with 5/- to the pound for what they never get

got the least information about. The Committee of Arran who are supposed to look after the wants of the poor, have been told at one of their public meetings by your R. O. when recommending some aged and destitute people for out door relief that he would not give one straw for their advice or suggestions, and unless they kept very quiet and gave him all his own way, he would have us lodged under the coercion act. It is the wish of the Committee that you would inquire at once into the case of poor Coleman and his son before it is too late, and call upon your R. O. to give some explanation to these truthful and lamentable charges.

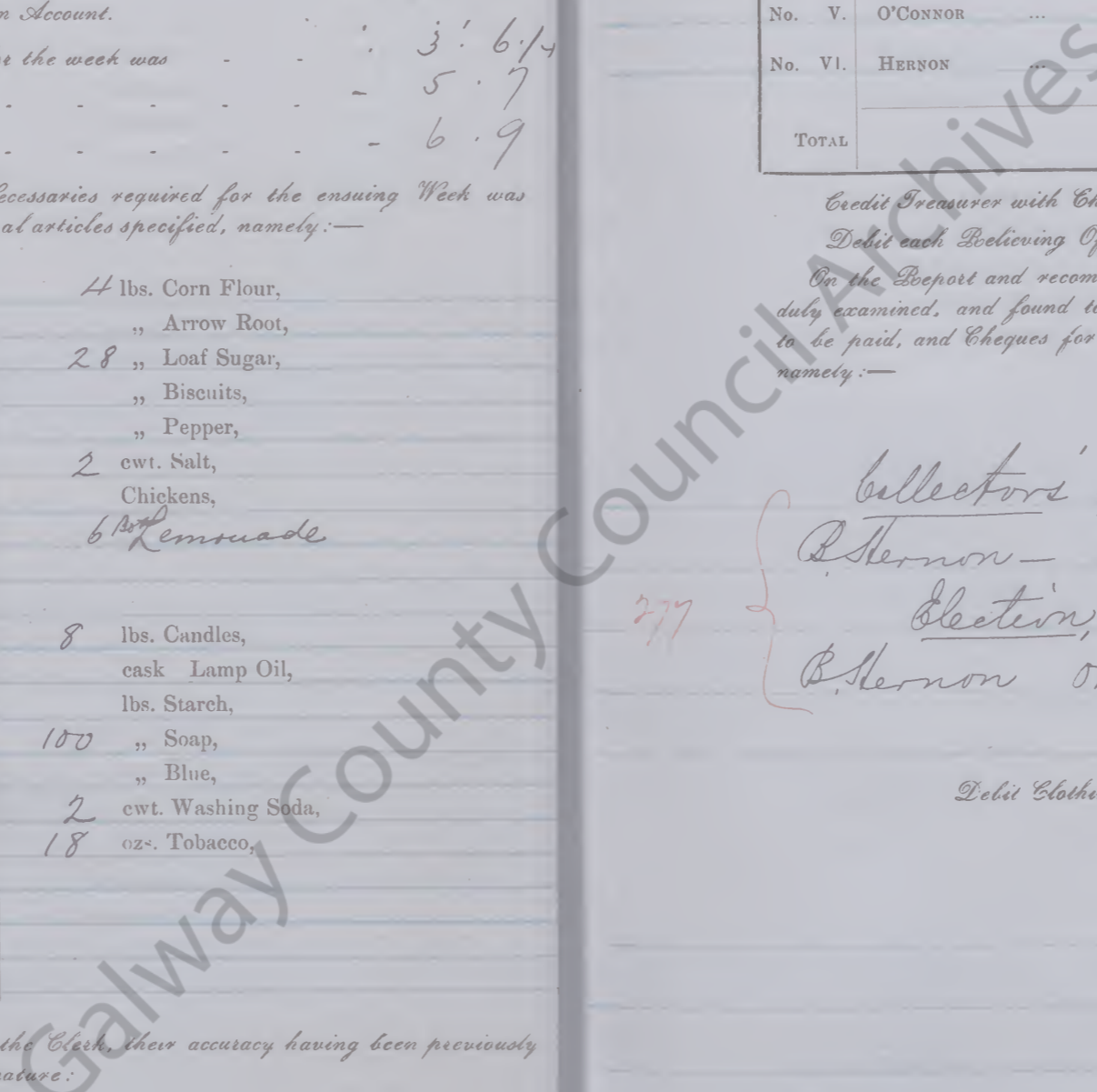

Having sent in a report some weeks ago with reference to defaulters under the compulsory Vaccination Act, and it having been returned to me to put in particulars of the number of those who have been vaccinated, those who have not complied with the law, &c. I beg to report that in Galway No. 1 Dispensary District, Dr. Clayton furnished a list of 111 names. Of these 71 have complied with the law, 8 have left the district, 10 have been declared unfit, 8 have died, 2 of the persons I could not discover, and 12 have failed to comply with the law.

In Galway No. 2 Dispensary District, Dr. Grealy furnished a list of 41 defaulters. Of these 26 have been vaccinated, 3 have left the district, 2 have been declared unfit, 2 of the persons I could not find, 1 died, and 7 have not complied with the law.

Dr. Grealy furnished a supplemental list containing 111 names of defaulters who did not comply with the law in the years, 1879, 1880, and 1881. Of these 54 have been vaccinated, 13 left the district, 8 were unfit, 7 died, and 10 did not comply with the law, and 19 on whom I did not serve notices. Being unwell for some weeks past I was unable to serve all the defaulters in No. 2 district, personally, which I consider caused the number who did not comply with the law in that district to be so large together with the number.

The Relieving Officer was directed to summon all in his district who have not complied with the law.

26th April 1882. From Pat Kearney informing the Board that he had completed the fencing of Moyus Burial Ground. Relieving Officer Connor was directed to inspect the Burial Ground and report to next Meeting of the Board on the manner in which the work of fencing had been executed.

28th April 1882. From J. McLaughlin, Slater, stating that he had now procured slates of the size, quality, and colour, required, to repair the roofs of the Galway Cemetery Buildings. Pursuant to advertisement, Mr. A. Caulki tendered for the supply of from 100 to 200 tons of Scotch screened coals @ 7/6 per ton delivered free of all expense. Accepted for 100 tons to be delivered in such quantities as may be required.

Mr. Harrison Secretary to Galway Interspinnering Co. came before the Board and requested to be informed if inmates of Workhouse are available as lack sewers, the Company being unable to get sewers in sufficient numbers in Galway.

The Workhouse Master was directed to make enquiries amongst the inmates, and if he succeeded in getting sewers to call on Mr. Harrison and arrange terms &c.

Mr. Townsend C. E. came before the Board to give information relative to the water supply to the Workhouse. He strongly recommended that the 3 inch water main be extended from the College Gate to the Workhouse, as the 3 inch pipe would give $2\frac{3}{4}$ as much water as the 2 inch pipe at present in use.

The Clerk was directed to call attention to his letter to the Town Commissioners dated the 29th ult. in which the Commissioners were requested to extend the 3 inch water main to the Workhouse. Also to request the use of the Stand Pipe for the supply - if the Commissioners had no objection.

The Clerk was directed to inform Mr. P. McDonald that the Guardians do not at present require an estimate for the lowering of the Hospital Cistern.
