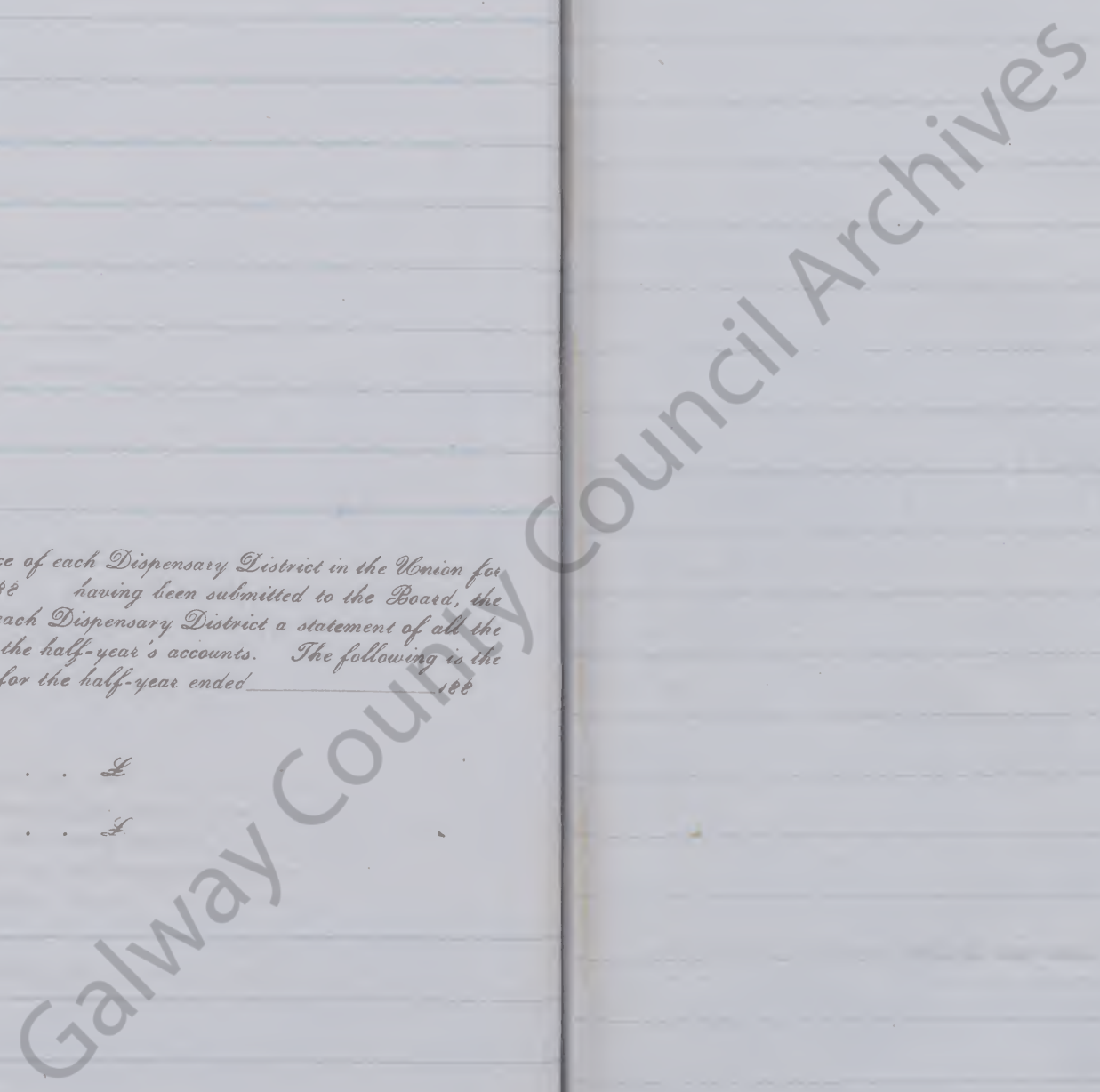

Sir, I am in receipt of copy of a letter signed John Gray, 4-8 Minis Island, sent by him to the local Government Board, complaining of being overcharged for rates due by him, and stating that he was harshly treated by me. The contrary of this is the fact. The rates due on his house struck for 1880 & 1881 were unpaid on May 1881. I then sent him a bill for the rates then due. He and his wife called on me and stated they had only then come into the house. I told them I would under the circumstances charge him only for a half year, and asked them to pay that amount. They neglected to do so until the 29th of May, the following year. I then had to serve them with a six days notice for the current year 1881 and 1882, and the half year in arrear. This they paid in May 1882, and for which I gave them separate receipts. I never gave them any trouble or annoyance except to say I should after not having paid either arrears or present rate be obliged to enforce the payment. This they have done and so the matter ended without any litigation or complaint by them or me.

On a division the amendment was lost, 5 Members voting for, and 10 against it.

The Motion was then put and declared carried, and the increase marked in the Relieving Officers Book.

John Quinn, Contractor for painting of the Workhouse, came before the Board to enquire if the painting of the Fever Hospital, and making good all mortar or cement pointing between all the door and window frames and stone sills, were to be included in his contract, as these matters were mentioned in local Government Board Specification.

Contractor was informed that the painting of the Fever Hospital would not be included in his Contract, and that he would not be required to make good the mortar and cement pointing.

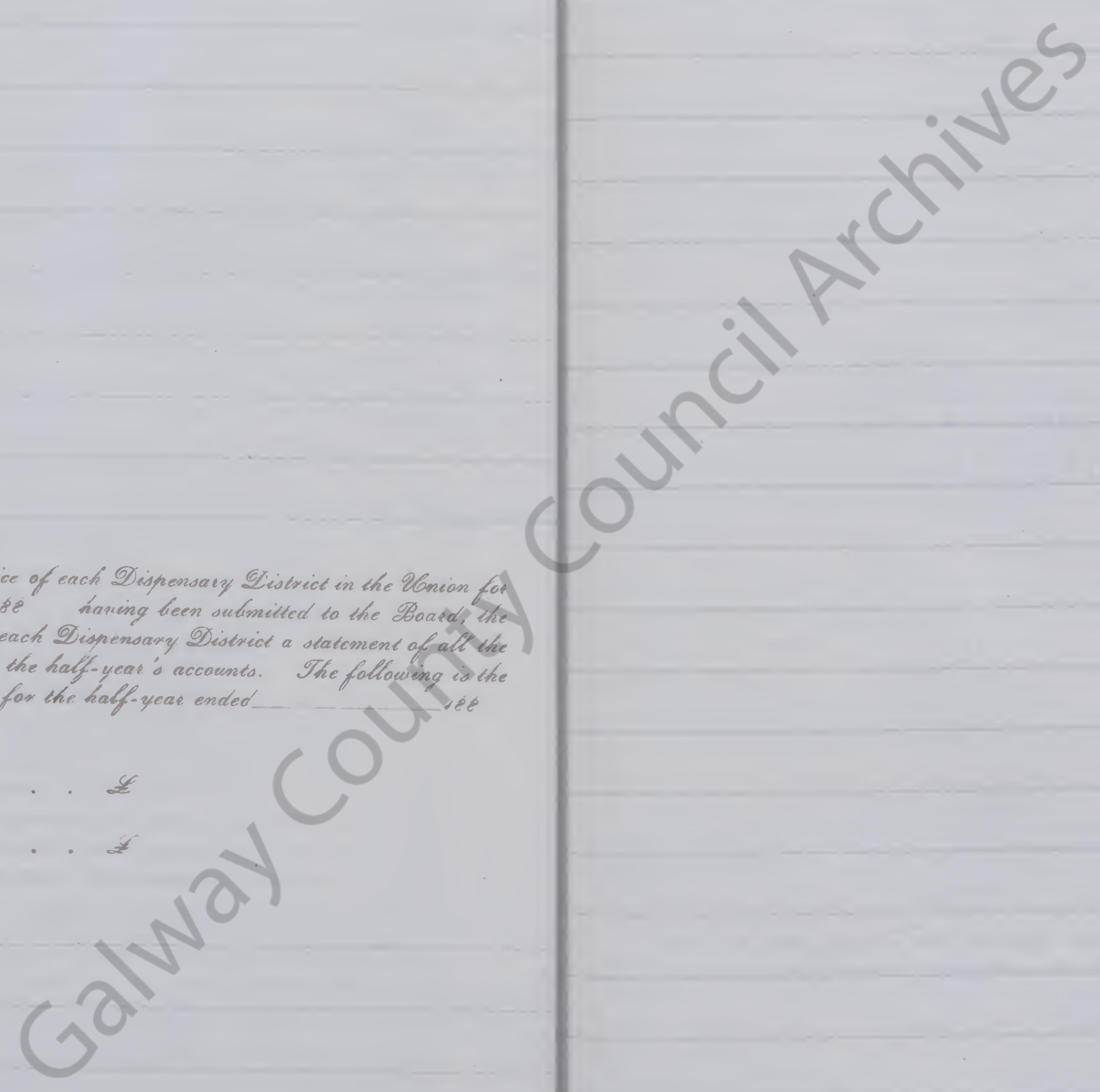

Gentlemen,

The letter from the L. G. Board of the 15th inst. requires explanation on two points. Firstly as regards the number of times my duty was performed by deputy, and secondly as to the number of times my visits were after the prescribed hour. With reference to the former I have to state that I was absent on leave granted by your Board to the 13th Aug. and from the 1st to 11th Oct. of last year. During the month of February of this year I was absent for 8 days through illness, and during the months of March & May I obtained 5 & 6 days respectively. During each of these periods of absence my duties were performed by my colleague Dr Clayton. With reference to the second point I have to state that it is my custom to leave my house a few minutes before 12 o'clock each day, and if on any occasion my visits were deferred to a later hour, it was in consequence of my being detained by some private professional duty, either at home or in town, and I can recall to mind many occasions when such delay was unavoidable and unforeseen. I find by the attendance list that on most of these occasions I reached the hospital at some time between the hours of 12 & 1 o'clock, seldom later. In conclusion Gentlemen I beg to say that although my visits to the hospital after 12 o'clock are an infringement of the Workhouse Rules which I regret extremely, and will endeavour to prevent in future, yet beyond this they have caused

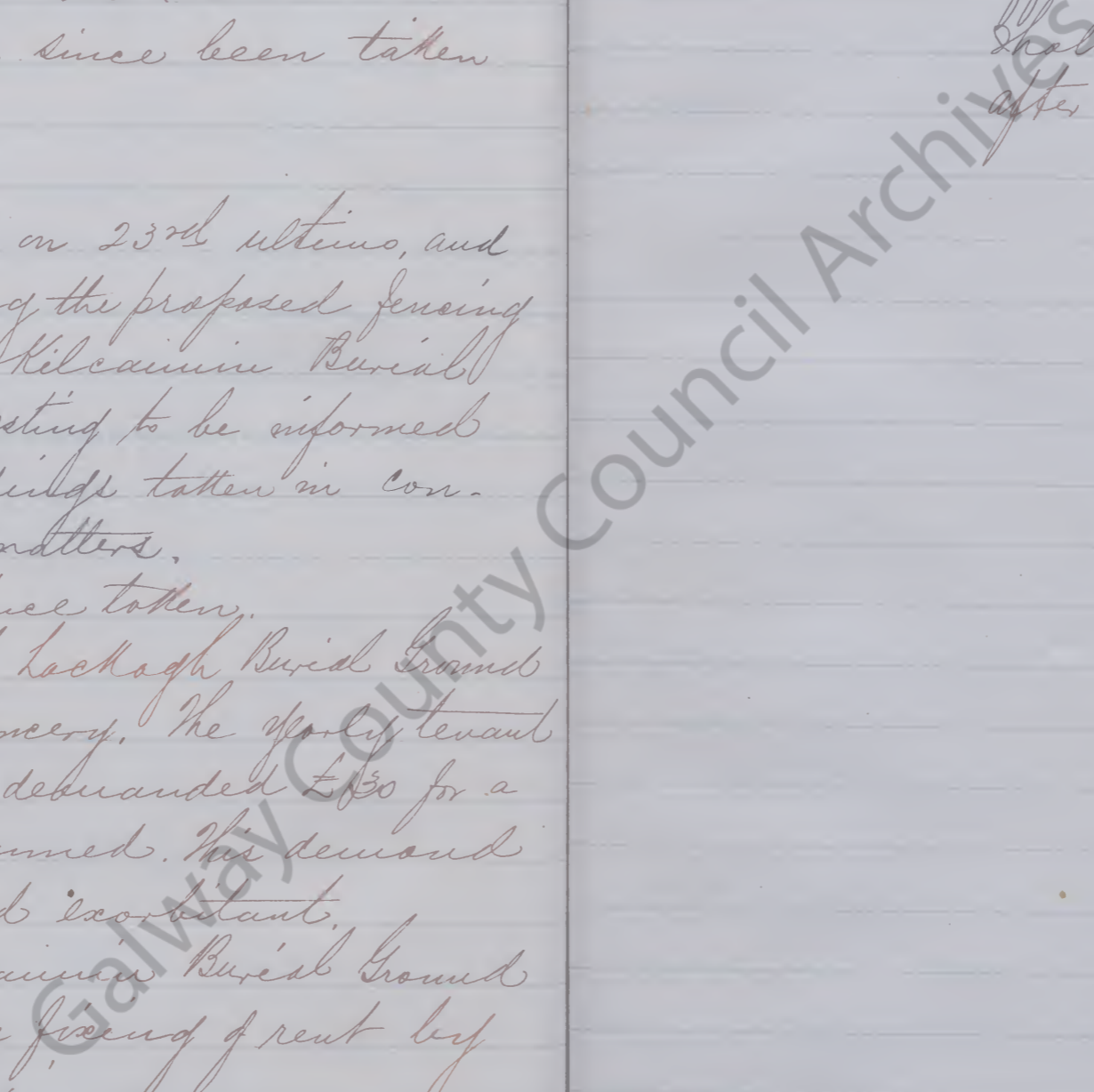

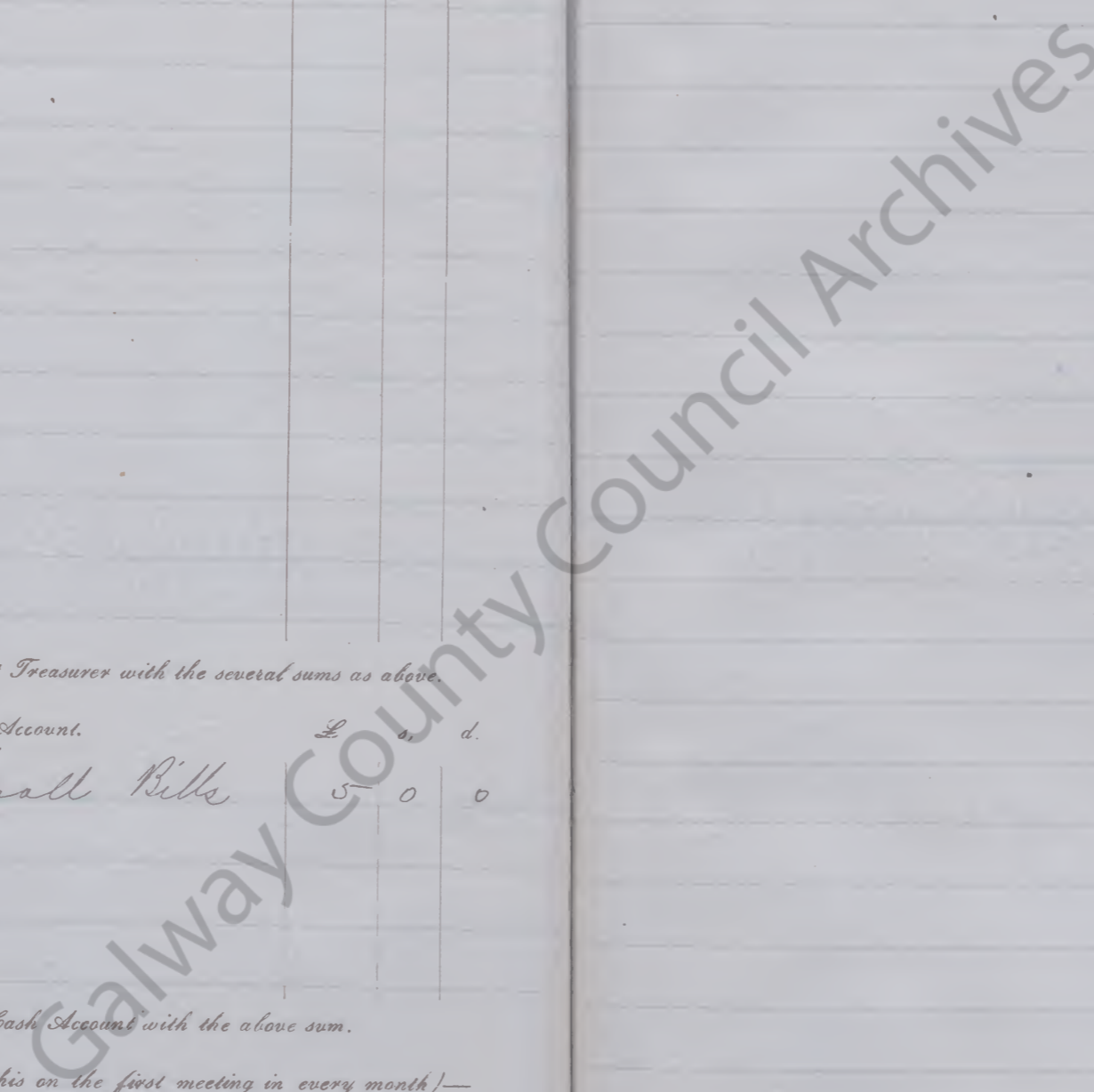
