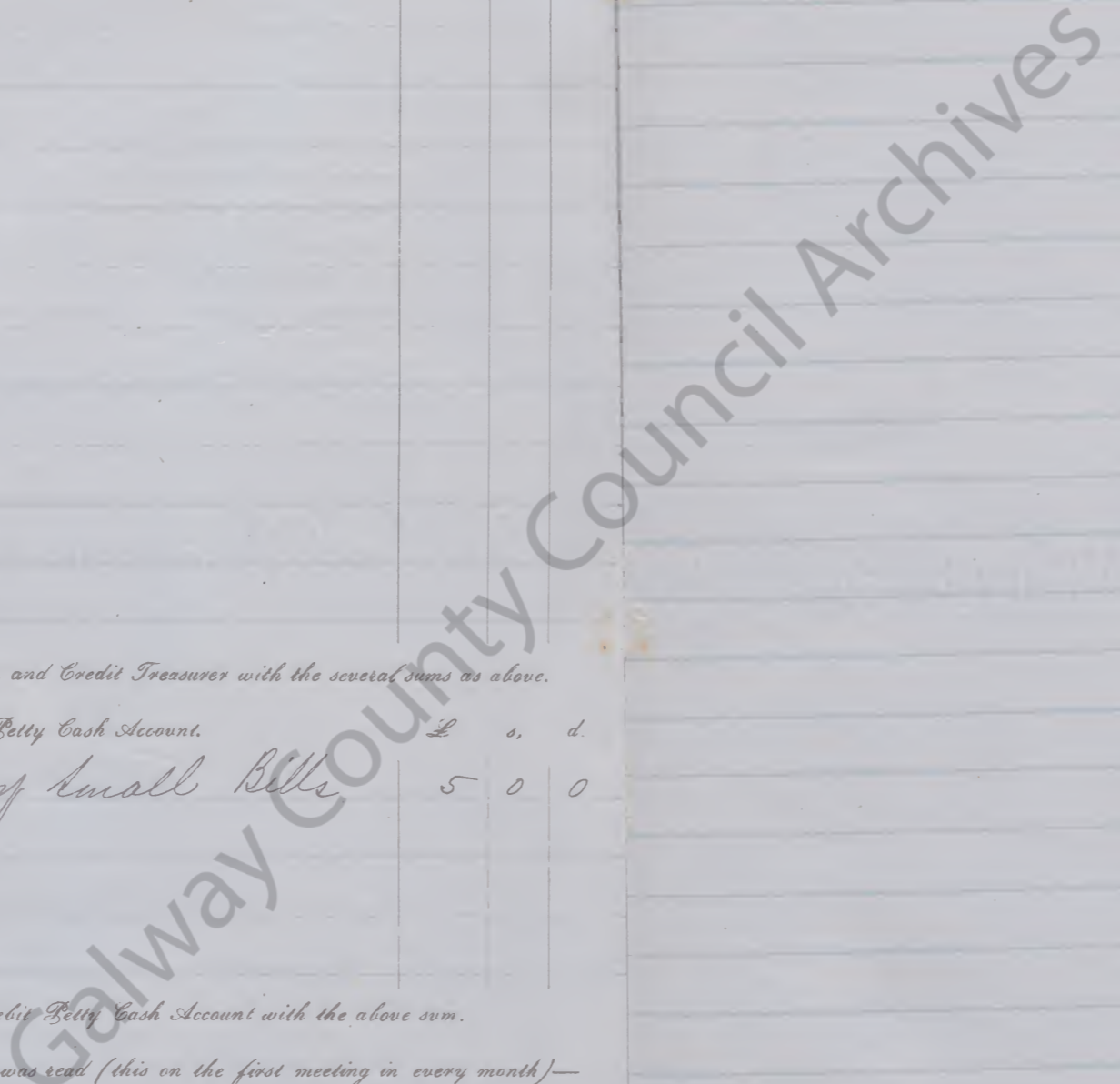

Gentlemen

In reply to a letter received from the clerk as to my making no observations on the letter of the L. G. Board of Aug 12th, I have to state that the communication of the L. G. Board was forwarded to me to Worcester, during the medical meeting, and I unfortunately mislaid it; and I thought it late to reopen the matter after my return.

I have read the letter from the L. G. Board again within the last few days, and I have to state as regards the first part; The medical officers of the Galway Workhouse are not as I am aware, required or forced in any, by the Board of Guardians to discharge any duty outside their own. And if at any time, one of the medical officers undertook to discharge the duties of his colleague, either during illness or leave of absence; it was entirely a ~~rather~~ self imposed duty, and undertaken as an act of Courtesy common among colleagues in all the largest Hospitals. And I can only hope that when a medical gentleman undertakes to discharge conscientiously, his colleague's duty for a short period, in addition to his own - the patients must not suffer.
