 Malley 9/9. Total £3.2.10.

Mr Davis stated that he was informed that a quantity of bread not consumed by the inmates, ^{of the workhouse} went to waste, and suggested the advisability of having pigs to consume the waste food.

After some discussion the following resolution was moved by Mr Somerville, and seconded by Mr Davis and carried -
 "Resolved - That after the statement of Mr Davis as to an apparent waste respecting the distribution of food to the inmates of the House and Hospital, that the matter be referred to the Visiting Committee to inquire fully into the several matters alluded to, and report to this Board as soon as possible."

Ordered - A meeting of the Visiting Committee be summoned for 12 o'clock on Tuesday next.
 Messrs Somerville, Ferdinand & Hennessy be added to the Committee -

It was proposed by Mr Gill and seconded by Mr J. Gealy, that Dr Colahan be allowed £2 per week for the 5 weeks during which he discharged double duty in workhouse pending the appointment of successor to Dr Clayton.

The following amendment was proposed by Mr G. Burke, and seconded by Mr Walsh, that no remuneration be allowed Dr Colahan for temporary services -
 On a division, 4 voted for, and 19 against the amendment.

A second amendment was proposed by Mr H. McDonogh and seconded by Mr Gealy, that Dr Colahan be allowed £5.5.0 as remuneration for discharge of double duty, carried. The original proposition was withdrawn.

"TO THE RIGHT HONOURABLE AND HONOURABLE THE COMMONS OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND, IN PARLIAMENT ASSEMBLED:

"The Petition of the Londonderry Board of Guardians.

"HUMBLY SHRETH—That the legislative enactment intituled 'The Poor Removal Acts,' with the several amendments thereof, empowering England and Scotland to remove by deportation those born in Ireland that have become burdensome on their rates (and cannot qualify under the law of residence) is unjust and partial. That it is unjust, because the law of residence, namely, one year in a Parish or Union in England, and five years in a Parish or Combination in Scotland, precludes those born in Ireland, that have spent from youth to old age in either country, from getting relief, if not resident for the above specified time in the particular Union, Parish, or Combination in which such relief is sought. That the fact of Ireland being conducive to the material prosperity of England and Scotland, as a feeder to their labour market in all its industrial departments, entitles those who may become indigent in the country that has profited by their labours to be recipients of its bounty, and would be in harmony with the spirit of fairness and the dictates of our common humanity. That said enactment is partial in not extending to Ireland the power of deporting English or Scotch paupers becoming burdensome on the rates. That the time of residence entitling persons to relief should be equal in each country, and be computed from the date of the person entering such country, and engaging in a lawful industrial calling or occupation.

"That the working of the present Removal Laws is attended with injustice and great hardship towards the Irish poor.

"Your petitioners therefore pray that the existing 'Poor Removal Acts' be repealed, and the Bill to amend the law regarding the removal of poor persons to Ireland from England, Wales, and Scotland, now before Parliament, be passed.

"And your petitioners will ever pray."

The foregoing petition on the motion of Mr. Gill was unanimously adopted, and the Clerk was directed to furnish a copy to each of the ^{Salisbury} County and Borough Members of Parliament.

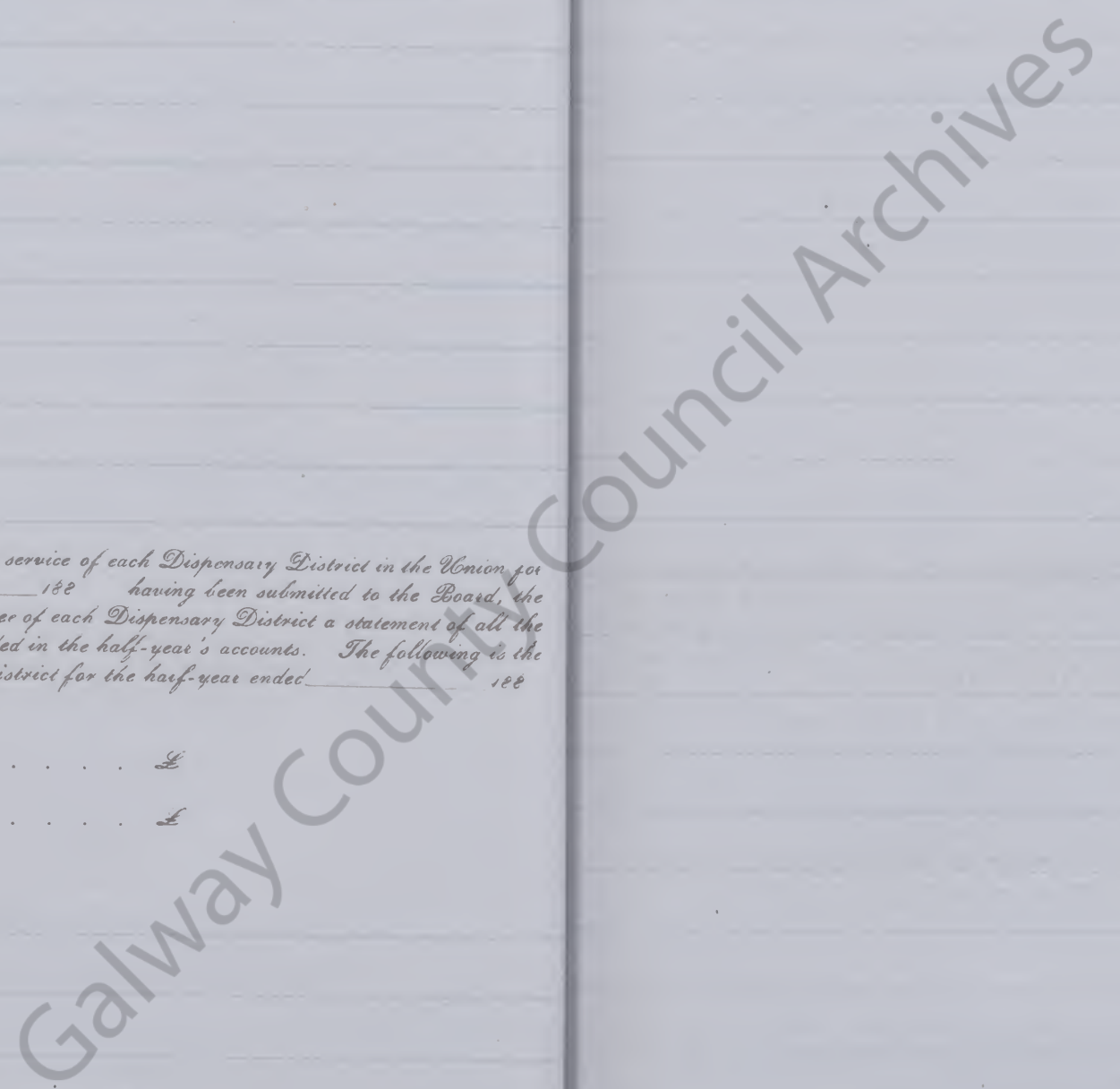
