Auditors' memoranda at conclusion of audit of Union accounts on 6th June 1883.

I I regret having been obliged to surcharge the Chairman with a sum of £1.3.0, and three other Members of the Board, namely Mess^{rs} Gill, Davis and Campbell with the respective sums of ²/₆, ⁵/₆ and ⁷/₆, being so much illegal out-door relief authorized by them in the Belerna and Kilmunmin Divisions. Mr. Lyons the temporary Relieving Officer of this district appears to me not to fully understand either his duties or powers in connection with the administration of out-door relief and seems to think that destitution alone is a sufficient qualification entitling an applicant to become a recipient of it.

If an Auditor were to be guided by the information he affords in his Report Book, most of the cases recorded in it, as in receipt of out-door relief, would not fall within the provisions of the law.

II Mr. Hernon failed to attend the audit and consequently his Books, both as regards out-door relief and the State of his Collection, were not examined by me.

III Mr. Chamberl attended the audit; but inasmuch as his Abstracts were not made up to the 25th March last, or of course since then.

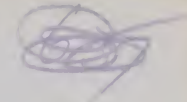

We therefore strongly protest against the power proposed to be given to the Local Government Board to give pensions, raise or lower same when agreed to by Boards of Guardians duly representing the Ratepayers who are to be the paymasters of such pensions. We further believe that if such power of giving or changing pensions be added to that almost absolute Board, the Government supporting such an arbitrary power ought also pay such pensions or portion of such pensions so forced on Boards of Guardians, out of the consolidated or other general funds provided by the public, and not out of local rates, especially in the case of Medical Officers and School Teachers, at least in the same proportions as their salaries are paid at present; as, if the control of Union Officers' pensions be handed over to the Local Government Board, Officers' interests will tend to be more obedient to such Board than the Board of Guardians.

We the Lord Lieutenant General & General Governor of Ireland, by and with the advice and consent of Her Majesty's Privy Council in Ireland, by virtue and in exercise of the powers in us vested under "The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act 1878", and of every other power enabling us in this behalf, do order, and it is hereby ordered as follows -

1 This order may be cited as "The Infected Places Marking or Branding of Animals Order 1883" -

2 Any local authority in Ireland, may from time to time, make Regulations for the following purposes -

For requiring the marking or branding of animals in a place declared to be infected with disease.

For prescribing the mode in which such marking or branding is to be effected -

3 In this order words have the same meaning as in "The Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act 1878"

4 This order shall take effect from and immediately after the 22^d day of August, 1883 -

5 Copies of every Regulation made by a Local Authority under this order shall be forthwith forwarded to the Veterinary Department, Dublin Castle.

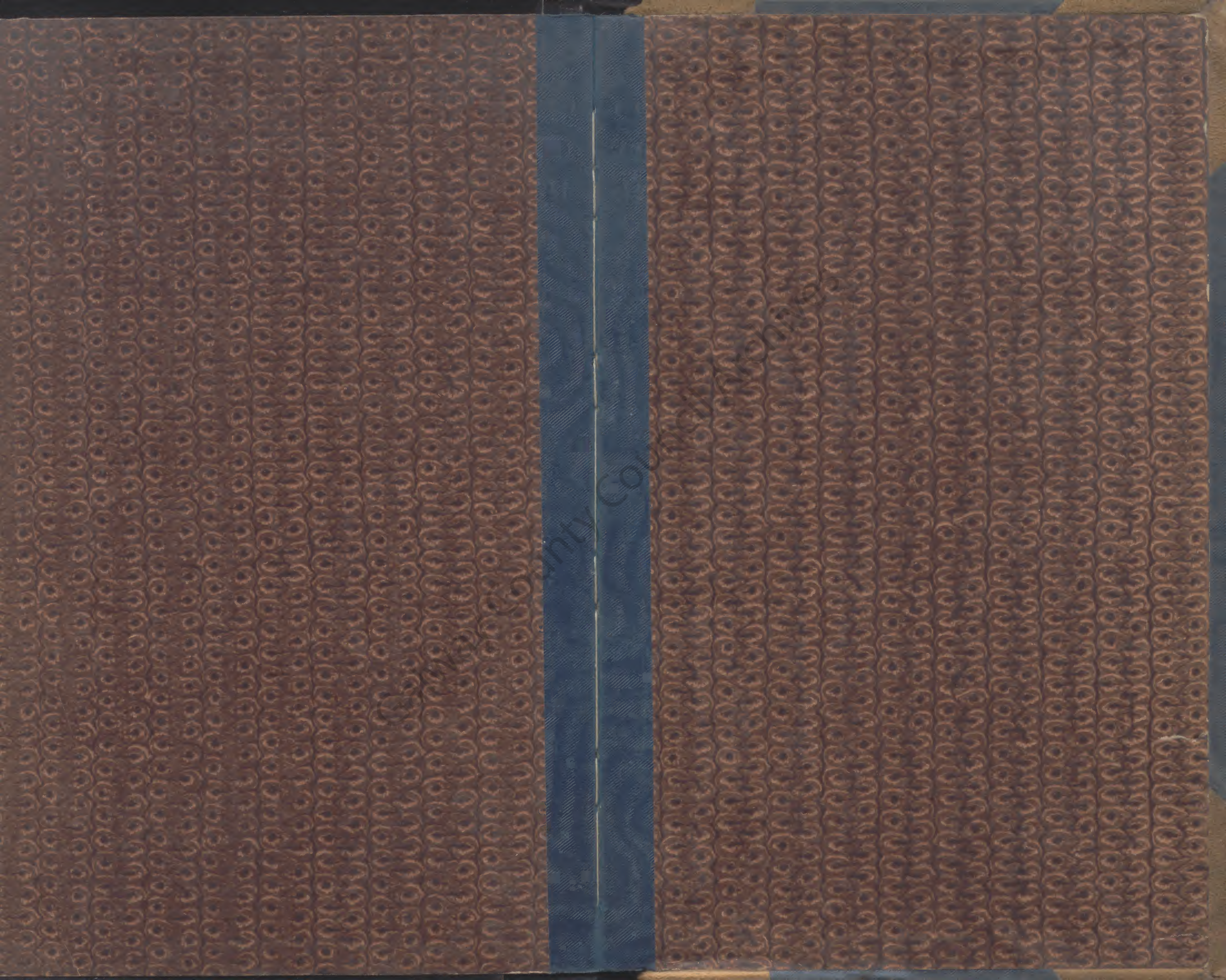
