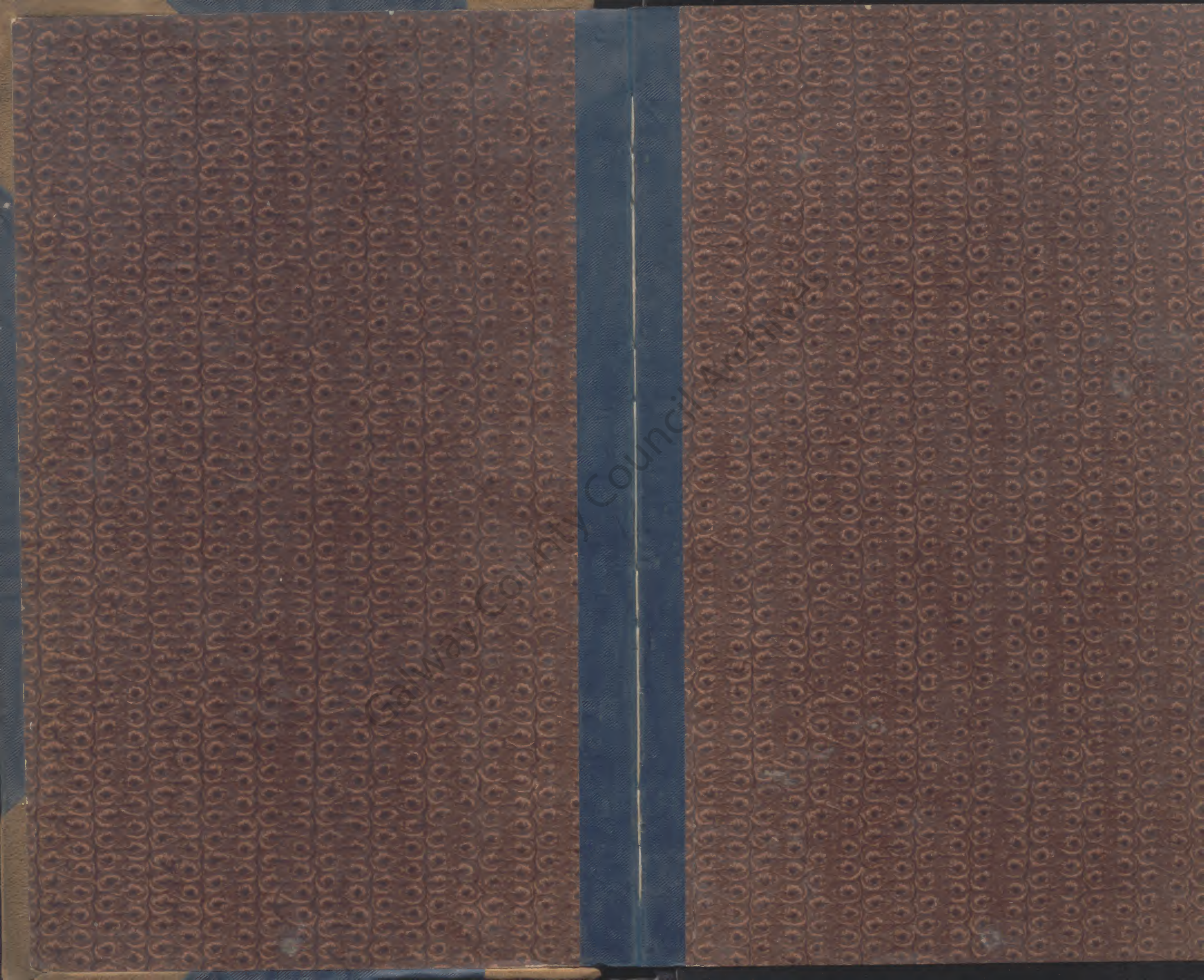

Resolved that the Local Government Board be requested to sanction the payment of £50 to the Clerk of the Union for his services

services in connexion with the Emigration of poor persons from the Union. The work in this Union was exceptionally heavy, and the Guardians are of opinion that this amount is only fair remuneration.

Ordered - Collector Lambert to be called upon to lodge £400 within a fortnight.

Resolved - That collector Hernon be allowed 3 months to close the Collection of Rate of 1882. If closed within the time specified, to be allowed a poundage of $\frac{7}{10}$ on the amount collected and lodged. If not closed within 3 months, the poundage will be $\frac{7}{10}$ only.

Ordered the issue of an advertisement inviting tenders for the supply of best Champion Potatoes to the Workhouse for 6 months. Tenders to be considered at Meeting on the 14th proximo.

16th Aug. 1883. From the Clerk of Union, Ennisceorthy, forwarding a copy of a Resolution adopted by the Guardians of that Union. Resolved - That this Board believe the Land Act of 1881 to be defective and calculated to do injustice to a large majority of the tenant farmers of Ireland - It fails to protect tenants who have notified their landlords of their intention to have a fair rent fixed, and who are still compelled to pay an exorbitant and unjust rent through the inability of the Land Court to hear their cases.

It also embitters the relations previously existing between the landlords and tenants. It also encourages landlords to take the most costly proceedings against their tenants for the recovery of all rent and arrears up to the date of fixing a fair rent, no matter how long delayed, or how unjust the rent. Tenants are also deterred from applying to the Court from the above causes, and from their inability to pay up all arrears. We earnestly recommend that all judicial rents should date from the next gale day after notice being served by the tenants, which would cause the landlords to settle with their tenants out of court. We also believe tenants should reap the full benefit of their own improvements, as long as the enjoyment cannot make such improvements the property of the landlord. Leaseholders should not be exempt from this Act when they can satisfy the Court that their rent is a rack-rent. We further believe that an occupying proprietary is the only final settlement of the Irish Land Question.

The adoption of the foregoing Resolution was proposed by Mr. E. Morris, and seconded by Mr. M. C. Keamey, and carried.

Dear Sir

"Since the local Govt Board judged it expedient to ignore the letter and spirit of the law affecting intramural interments as in the case of the late Mr. John O'Connor, who though denied at the late investigation the right of future interments in his family grave owing to its overcrowded state, was in virtue of a sealed Order from the Local Government Board interred in the same grave. When the evidence of its overcrowded state became disgustfully apparent, for three coffins, two that of adults, and one that of an infant, had to be lifted up out of a single grave to make room for the fresh coffin.

To prevent the possibility of a recurrence of a like partial administration of the law so discreditably before the public and intolerable to us, I take the liberty of declining to commit the Key of the grave-yard to the care of any other than the Fathers attached to the West Chapel."

The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland, were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon as follows:—

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

No 241975/1883 } Forwarding a communication dated the
29th Nov. } 24th instant received from Mr. Devinhan, relating to his tender for the supply of Tea to the Workhouse, and requesting to be furnished with the Guardians' observations on the subject.

The Guardians beg to observe that from the report of Dr. Cameron, there appeared to be no material difference between three out of four samples of Tea, submitted to analysis, and the Guardians disposed of the contract by resolution, and in the ordinary manner.

(The enclosures accompany Minutes.)

Pursuant to notice given for this day, Mr. M. A. Lynch moved—

"That the inmates of the Workhouse be employed when practicable, in sewing Bags for the Lute Spinning Company, Galway, at the usual rate of remuneration allowed by the Company, the amount realized by such industrial employment to be lodged to credit of the Union."

The motion was seconded by Mr. Kaine and declared carried, one member of the Board only, dissenting.

The Clerk submitted the claim of Messrs Allan Bros. for forwarding to final destination, Emigrants from Galway Union, amount £16.5.2. Consideration of this matter had been postponed from a previous meeting.

By reference to Original Lists, the destinations of the persons mentioned in the claim of Messrs Allan Bros. are given as New York & Boston.

Resolved— That the Messrs Allan Bros. be informed that the Guardians cannot entertain the claim put forward by them, inasmuch as the Guardians undertook to forward to New York and Boston, respectively, the two families Greany & Moore.

When the Messrs Allan Bros. forwarded them to Chicago and Gorham, it was on their own responsibility.

The return furnished by Mr. Stafford, Emigration Agent at Quebec, of the cost of transport inland of the Emigrants from the Galway Union, consideration of which was ^{also} postponed from a previous meeting was now considered. The return shewed a balance due Mr. Stafford, amount \$50.89.

Resolved that this claim be not entertained inasmuch as the Guardians forwarded for each shipment, cheques to cover transport charges at rate of £1 per statute adult, the Minister of Immigration at Ottawa having agreed to take the responsibility of forwarding from Quebec emigrants on whose account funds were placed in Mr. Stafford's hands, at that rate.
