REPORT ON TAXATION.

That the burden of Taxation falls very unfairly on the Land and Tenement valuation of the country, which is made liable to all the direct Taxes, viz.:—Income Tax, Tithes, County Rate, and especially Poor Rate, under which head is now comprised a number of extras, which are yearly increasing, to wit,—The Parliamentary Voters' Act, the Jurors' Act, the Registration Act, the Sanitary Acts, the Contagious Diseases (Animals) Act, the Explosives Act, and others—all of which, being for Imperial purposes, should be properly provided for out of the revenue of the Imperial Exchequer.

With respect to Poor Rate, which now comprises so many extras, as set forth, we represent that that Tax should not continue to be a burden upon one description of property only, by which it has now become so excessively oppressive.

We find that the Land and Tenement valuation of Ireland upon which alone it is primarily levied amounts in round numbers to £13,801,521, and which is represented under the Income Tax Schedules A & B, and we find that property represented under the Income Tax Schedules C, D, E, amounting to £10,743,500, is wholly exempt from all such charges, though it should as reasonably be made liable to contribute to all the charges now levied under the heads of Poor Rate.

We suggest that an appeal be made to Parliament setting forth the unjust incidence of the Taxation referred to, with the view of obtaining a subsidy, by a contribution from the Total Income Tax under Schedules A, B, C, D, E, amounting say to 2d. in the £ on that area, to be awarded to each of the Poor Law Unions in Ireland, according to their valuations, to supplement their rates, which would make about 3½d. in the £ on each of their valuations and so reduce their rates by that amount.

If this would, perhaps, have the effect of increasing the Income Tax by 2d. in the £ it would have the effect also of reducing the Poor Rate by 3½d. which would be in the first instance a direct bounty to the great majority of occupying Tenants, who are not liable to pay Income Tax, by having 3½d. less Poor Rate to pay.

The Landowner might have 2d. more Income Tax to pay but there would be 1½d. less Poor Rate to be deducted from him, leaving him at the loss of only ½d. by the change, which would be amply compensated by his being able to deduct the full Income Tax from all payments on charges or incumbrances on his property, from which he cannot deduct Poor Rate.

We do not propose to limit the amount of contribution from the Income Tax to 2d. in the £, but we have named that small sum in order to lay the frame-work of the scheme before you; by which we suggest to lessen the undue pressure of Taxation on one particular area of property, and to disseminate it in gradual proportions to each holder of money.—Adopted.

Gentlemen,

In accordance with your desire we beg to submit our report on the expenses in connection with the maintenance of paupers in the hospitals and workhouse.

On analyzing the accounts of the Union for the last twelve years we find that in almost every item of expenditure an increase is apparent in each successive year, the result of which is that the expenses of the Union have risen from £5938 in 1872 to £9534 in last year. One notable item of increase is that of outdoor relief which in 1872 amounted to £214 whilst in last year it reached the large sum of £1007. The expenses in supporting the

same name. It is not used.

Unions we find the Galway Workhouse to be considerably ahead of all others; for instance. The average cost in Lavan is $2/8$ Armagh $2/9$ Ballinastoe $3/-$ Loughrea $2/10$ Teury $2/8$ ~~Armagh~~

Considering that one penny per head means an expense of about £100 annually to this Union, we spend in the maintenance of paupers alone £1000 a year ^{for an equal number} more than Lavan Union, £975 more than Teury, and £900 more than Armagh.

We have failed to trace any peculiar circumstances which might account for this great discrepancy in the expenses and must therefore attribute it to a ^{more} careful supervision of the dietary of the house and a restriction in ~~the~~ anything like an excessive use of stimulants in the Unions we have quoted. It is for the Board to

paupers in the hospitals and body of the house have likewise largely increased within this period.

We were unable to trace the actual amount expended on the hospitals as no separate account appears to be kept of same but from the quantity of stimulants alone consumed in these wards it is obvious that a considerable portion of the increase referred to is due to the manner in which these are distributed in this department of the house. The average cost per head weekly for stimulants for the last two years comes to eleven pence, while in other Unions now which we were able to procure statistics on this point the average cost in most of the Unions is less than a third and even the highest is far under

our expenditure.

As an example of the extravagant use which is made of these stimulants we may mention a fact that came under our notice.

In the year 1881 the Guardians decided on substituting eggs and butter for stimulants such as whiskey &c. in the infirm ward, and as a ^{consequence} ~~consequence~~ the consumption of eggs and butter increased but to our surprise no corresponding reduction appeared in the consumption of whiskey but increase as will be seen by the following figures.

On comparing the general average ^{of 3/6} cost per head in the house with other

to determine how this excessive expenditure is to be curtailed, certain it is that if the Guardians allow the present state of things to continue our expenses, and consequently the rates will increase even still more.

The Doctors in charge of the hospitals should be called on in the strongest manner to check the present lavish use of stimulants so as to bring them on a par with other unions. The Board may be powerless as they have often been told to control the action of these gentlemen but in the interests of the ratepayers ^{the Guardians} they are bound to make every effort being about a better state of things and to correct the abuses which evidently largely exist.

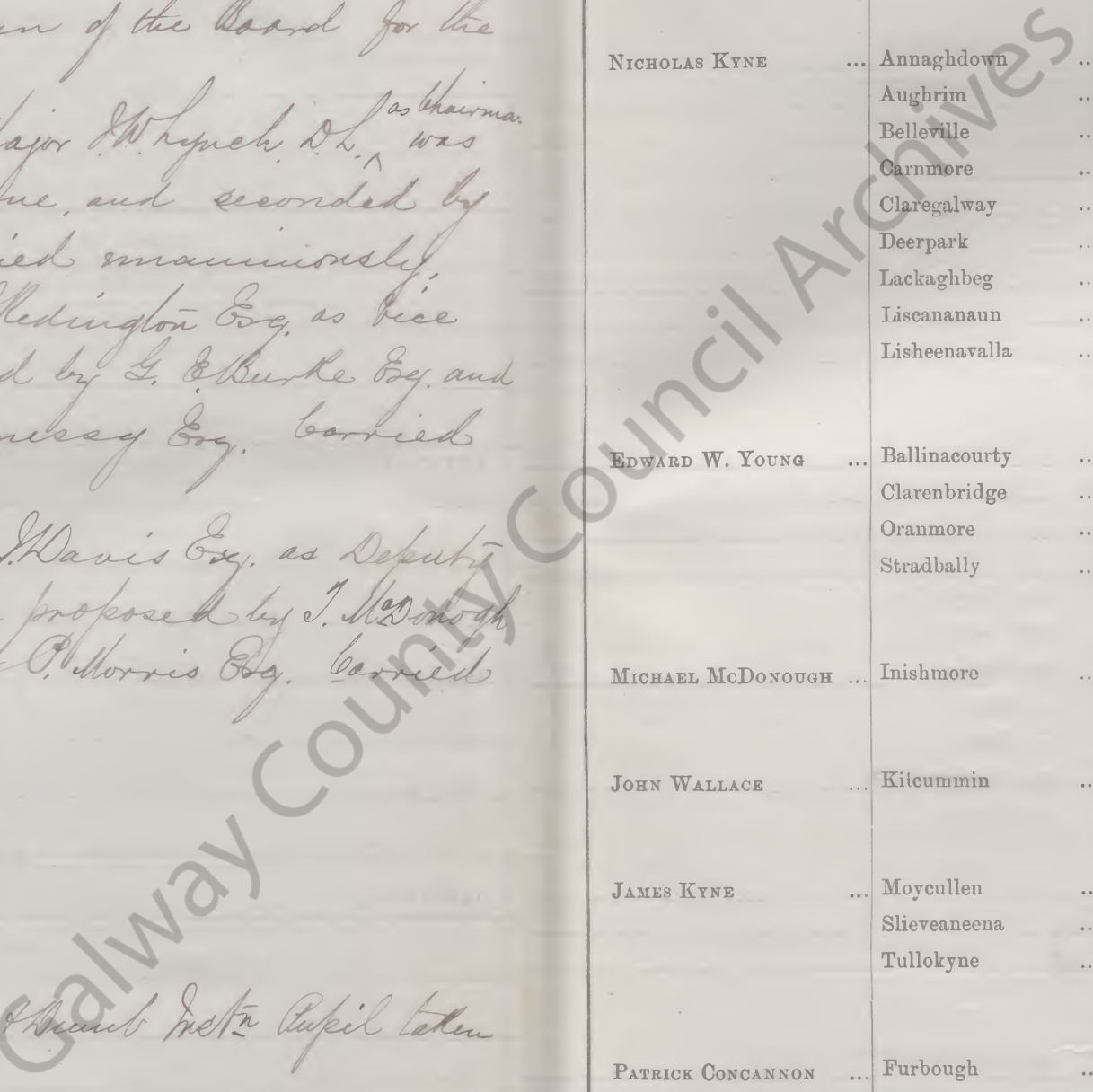

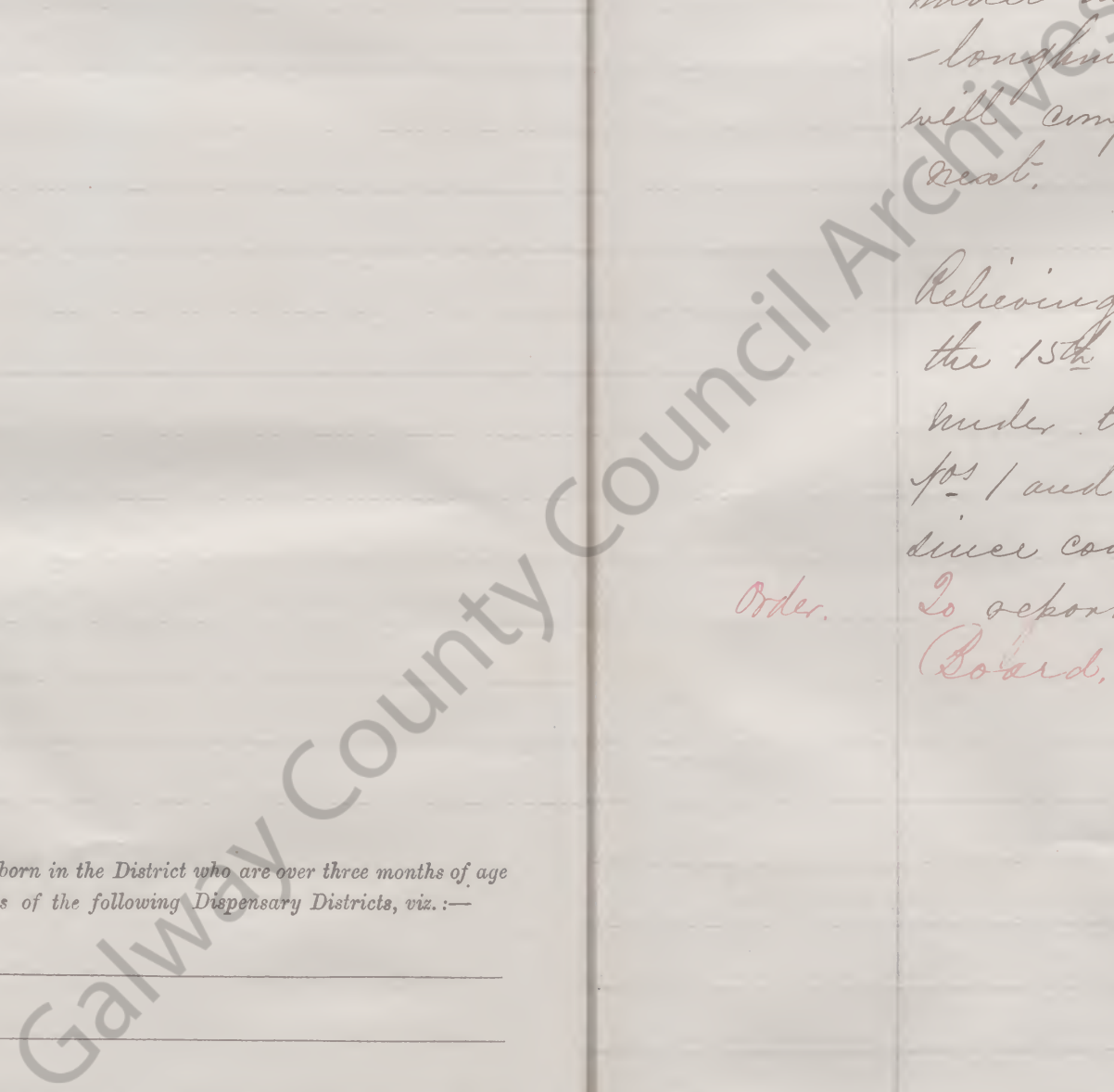

(1st) Notification from Emigration Office, Local Government Board, that Sir R. Jackson a member of the Emigration Committee will be in Oranmore on Thursday 19th instant to inspect the family Brennan whom the Guardians desire to emigrate. Sir R. Jackson came before the Board, and explained that there was a difficulty in the case of the Brennan family, inasmuch as some members of the family had been emigrated by the State last year, and the family had all been in America and returned home. Sir R. Jackson stated that there was another family of two persons from Oranmore District who desired to emigrate. The Guardians declined to take any further action in the matter of emigration.

31st May 1884. Circular from the Clerk of Union Inlhamore forwarding

forwarding a copy of a petition adopted by the Guardians of that Union.

That the Clerk would furnish a list of persons in receipt of out-relief from 5th April to 31st May last.

was asked if he had complied with the order of the Board to post up on the Island lists of persons relieved, with amount of relief, also if he had furnished lists to the Clergymen. The Relieving Officer replied that he had posted up lists at end of each half year, and had furnished recently a list of persons in receipt of out-relief to the Clergymen of the district.

Mr B. Sernon proposed to collect the Poor Rate at $\frac{7}{16}$ in the pound and the Seed Rate at $\frac{3}{4}$.

Mr. Mich. Maherty proposed to collect the Poor Rate at $\frac{7}{14}$ in the pound, and the Seed Rate at $\frac{3}{4}$.

The Rev. M. O'Donohoe P.P. Arran Island, strongly recommended

recommended M. Flaherty as a fit and competent person.

The appointment of Mich^e. Flaherty having been proposed by Mr. M. Sullivan (Smith) and seconded by Mr. J. J. Kirwan was carried unanimously.

The sanction of the Local Government Board at earliest date is requested, in order that the collection of the Rate may be at once proceeded with.

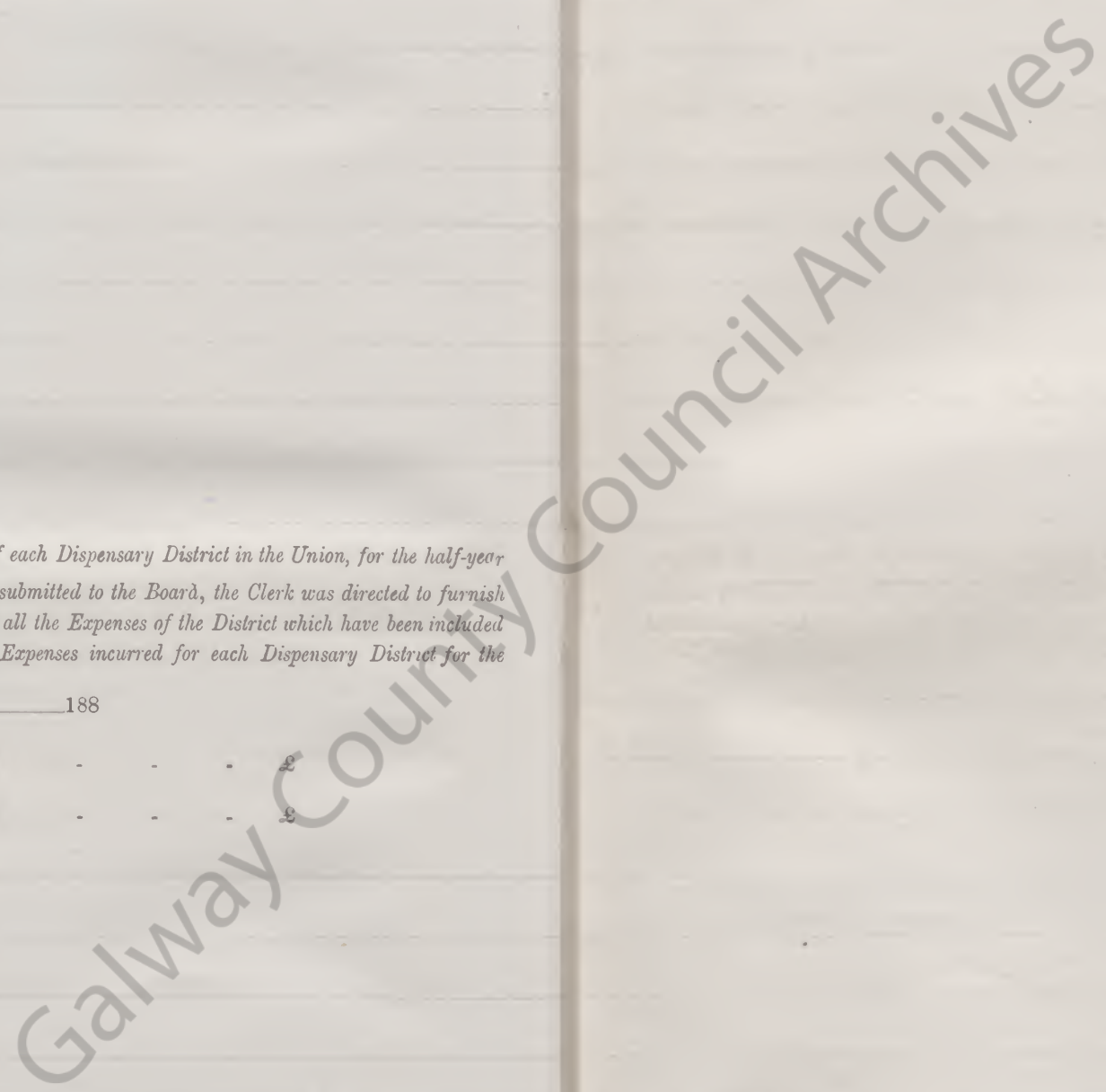

Read Letter from L. G. Board No. 17844 dated 19th June 1884

stating that

referring to Minutes of 25th April and 2nd ultimus and requesting to be informed whether the defaulters under Vaccination Act in Oranmore Galway, Spiddal and Inverlongmore Dispensary Districts have since complied with the Law.

Relieving Officer Young reported that there are still 5 defaulters under Vaccⁿ Act in Oranmore Disp. Dist. three of whom are unfit for vaccination.

Order. Two defaulters to be summoned to Petty Sessions Court.

The Relieving Officer of Galway 4th 1 + 2 Dist. reported at meeting on the 13th instant that all the defaulters had complied.

Order. The Relieving Officers of Galway ^{Spiddal} No. 3 Dist. to furnish reports on state of Vaccination in their Districts.

The Relieving Officer of Inverlongmore District reported that there was one defaulter in his District and that he has been summoned to Petty Sessions Court.

The Medical Officer of Galway No. 3 Disp. Dist. furnished Report Form H, certifying that he had, between the dates 17th November 1883, and 16th June 1884, successfully vaccinated 527 persons, all of whom are residents in his District,

Mr. G. J. Kaine moved — "That this Board having become aware that the result of the amalgamation of the Galway with Arran Islands Dispensary District has unfairly entailed on Galway a large amount of expense, that whilst the members of the Committee of Management of Galway District have been quite willing to afford every assistance in their power, they beg to protest most strongly against any expense being thrown on the Galway Dispensary District through this connection, and further that Arran Islands District being now represented by local men, it is considered most expedient that we revert to the original position of two independent Dispensary Districts."

The motion having been seconded by Mr. M. O'Sullivan (Junr) was carried unanimously.
