The Minutes of last Meeting were read and signed.

The Workhouse Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 4722 to No. 4733 both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated, from No. 4101 to No. 4107, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:—

recipients of out door Relief on the Islands, stating that he wrote to the Relieving Officer three weeks since, reminding him of the order made by the Guardians with regard to furnishing the list, and that he neither condescended to reply to his note or furnish the list. That he made minute inquiry of the persons living close to the Chapel and could find no person who saw the list posted on the Chapel gate. That he had been informed by the Police that they had not seen <sup>for past year</sup> a return of persons in receipt of out relief on the Islands in any place. That this unwillingness on the part of the Relieving Officer, to comply with the order of the Guardians is very suspicious. That the orders of the Guardians are treated with contempt by this Officer, and it would appear with impunity.

Order - That a copy of letter be furnished to Relieving Officer Hermon, and that he be called upon to furnish a written explanation.





The Master reported that his attention having been called to the existence of foul air in the Board Room Water Closet, he got the earth removed from over the Sewer pipes and found them in a most unsatisfactory condition. The pipes, being only 6 inches in diameter are unsuitable for 4 Water Closets connected with them - and they should be replaced by 8 inch pipes. A foul air trap also should be required.

Dr. Colahan, Medical Officer of Workhouse also called the attention of the Guardians to the extremely dangerous condition of these sewer pipes - as leakages have existed for some time, and recommended immediate action being taken to remedy the existing defective arrangements.


