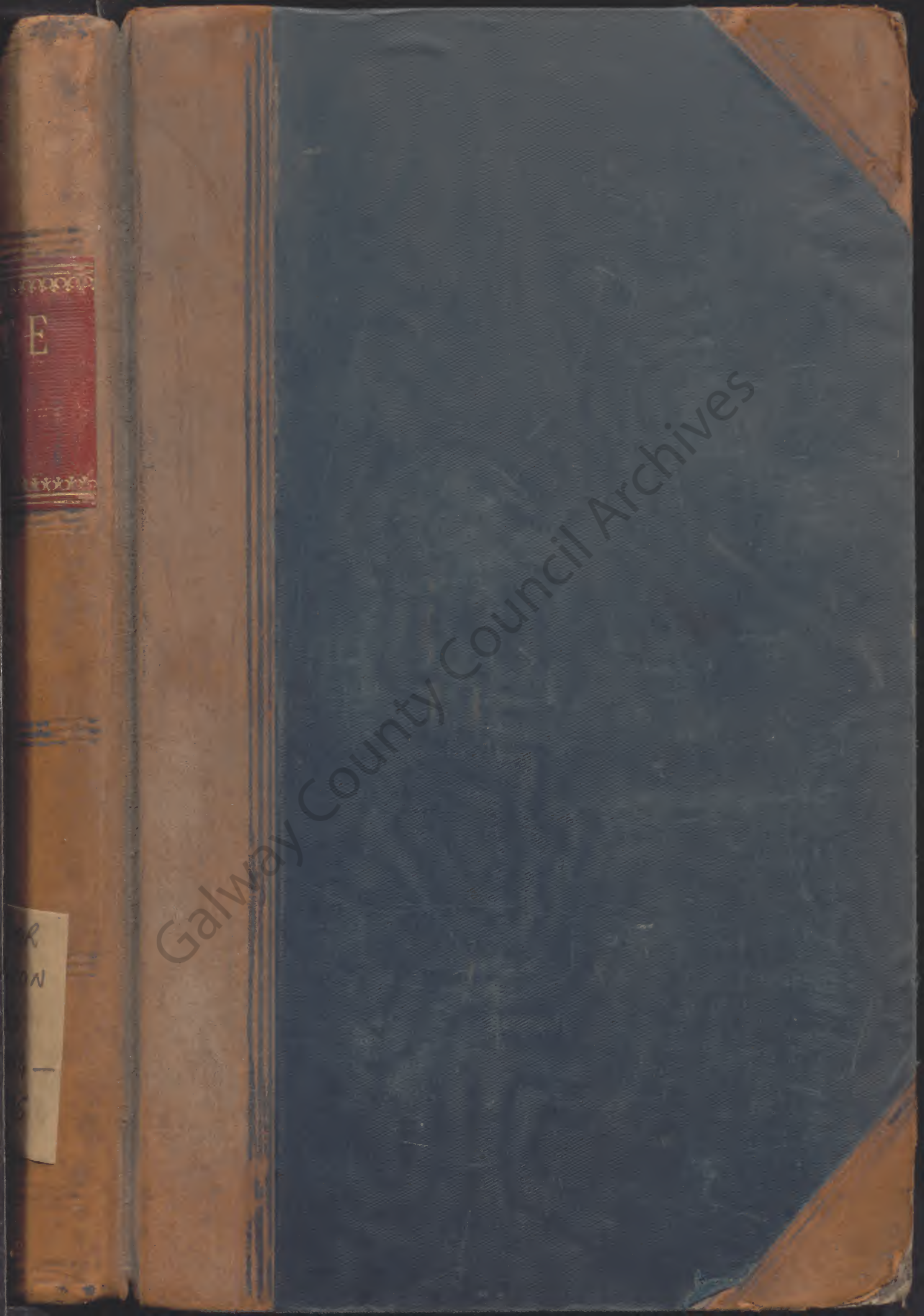

Letter from Dr. Hydon, Medical Officer of District No. 3.

9th Sept. 84 I wish to bring under the notice of the Committee the manner in which red tickets are indiscriminately given out here. I enclose a red ticket marked urgent, signed by Father McDonogh which ticket I want to have cancelled should the members think it proper to do so. I left Aran Island for Galway on the 30th June last, having leave from Committee. I left orders if any urgent case should occur during my absence to send for Dr. Kirwan. The enclosed ticket was left at my place by Father McDonogh's boy on same day. Now Gentlemen I can prove that the person for whom the ticket was issued never asked for it. His husband will prove on oath that he never asked nor authorized him to send me one. I enclose the statement he has made before a witness. I beg also to state that a boat and man had to be sent for Dr. Kirwan to attend this urgent case, and that I have been put to considerable expense by paying Boatman

boatmen that had to cross the Bay four times. Dr Kirwan visits the house of the patient and he finds she is out on business, or visiting a friend. I would have sent down this ticket long before this time but expecting every day that things would mend, but as I see no sign of improvement I must try and take other measures. I must state also that if the man required my services tomorrow that he would not ask a ticket, as he is well able to pay. I trust you will have no trouble in cancelling this ticket, and also that you will be able to see the way. I am tormented by a person who ought to know better.

In the first instance it affords me unqualified pleasure to be able to state that having made very particular inquiries on the subject I have failed to discover even a single case in which the Funeral Service has been omitted. When on a very few occasions the Service was read in the Workhouse Mortuary and not at the Public Cemetery it was entirely due to the fact that sufficiently definite instructions either as to time or place of interment had not been furnished to the clergy by the Master of the Workhouse. Our invariable practice, as indeed our earnest wish, is to read the service at the Public Cemetery whenever ^{reasonable} notice of the interment is supplied by the Workhouse Master, the person responsible for this duty.

It has sometimes happened that two clergymen have been present on occasions of interment, one of my Colleagues and myself. In future care will be taken to set forth fully in the Chaplain's Book any reasons of this character - indeed the

the only reasons that could occur - to prevent a clergyman from attending at the Public Cemetery on occasions of interment. Trusting this explanation may be deemed satisfactory, permit me then to observe in conclusion that without meaning the smallest discourtesy or disrespect to your Board as a body, I shall decline in future to notice vague and baseless charges of this nature, emanating from persons whose sole motive would seem to be - to put it mildly - to give annoyance. The duties devolving upon the clergymen in connection with the Workhouse and its Hospitals are continuous and exceedingly onerous and I hope are faithfully and conscientiously discharged."

In compliance with your request I beg to offer the following explanation to the charge made by the Medical Officer of the Man Dolis "without, to use his own words, being asked, and without being required;" on the day on which the visiting ticket-complained of was issued, I received a call to attend Mrs. Liberty. On inquiry from the messenger, what was wrong with his sister, he told me that she was queer in her head & disposed to be violent. I at once told him to go, & bring the Dr to see her. He went away & not long afterwards the husband came to me, and said his wife was getting worse & asked to go & see her. I asked him did he bring the Dr to visit her & he said not, that he was going for him to be he heard he was gone off to Galway. I then at once, went to the call, & found the poor woman suffering from a severe attack of Epilepsy. She was very violent & we had to put her under restraint. In one of the fits, she made an attempt to bite me - during the agony, I had to insert the handle of a Spoon between her teeth, to prevent injury to the poor creature's tongue. There was neither medicine nor medical aid to afford her relief - After a good deal of time, some Castor oil was got & I ordered a dose of to be given to her. On my return home, having previously administered the last of the Church to the poor patient, I issued a visiting ticket with a two-fold view -

One of the objects in doing so, was that I hoped the Medical Officer might, by any boat which he had leave, & remained four days away. He said he had leave. 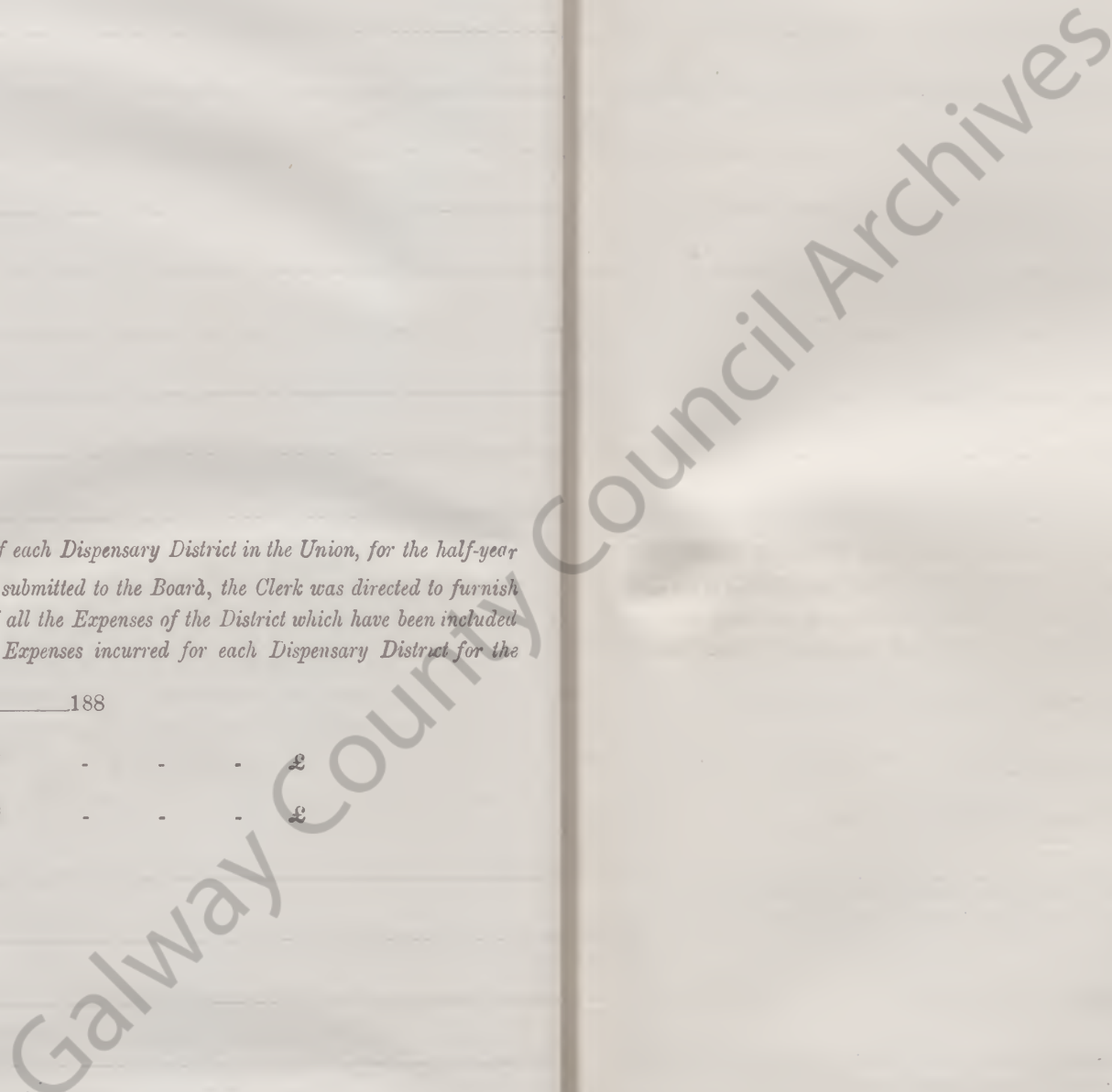

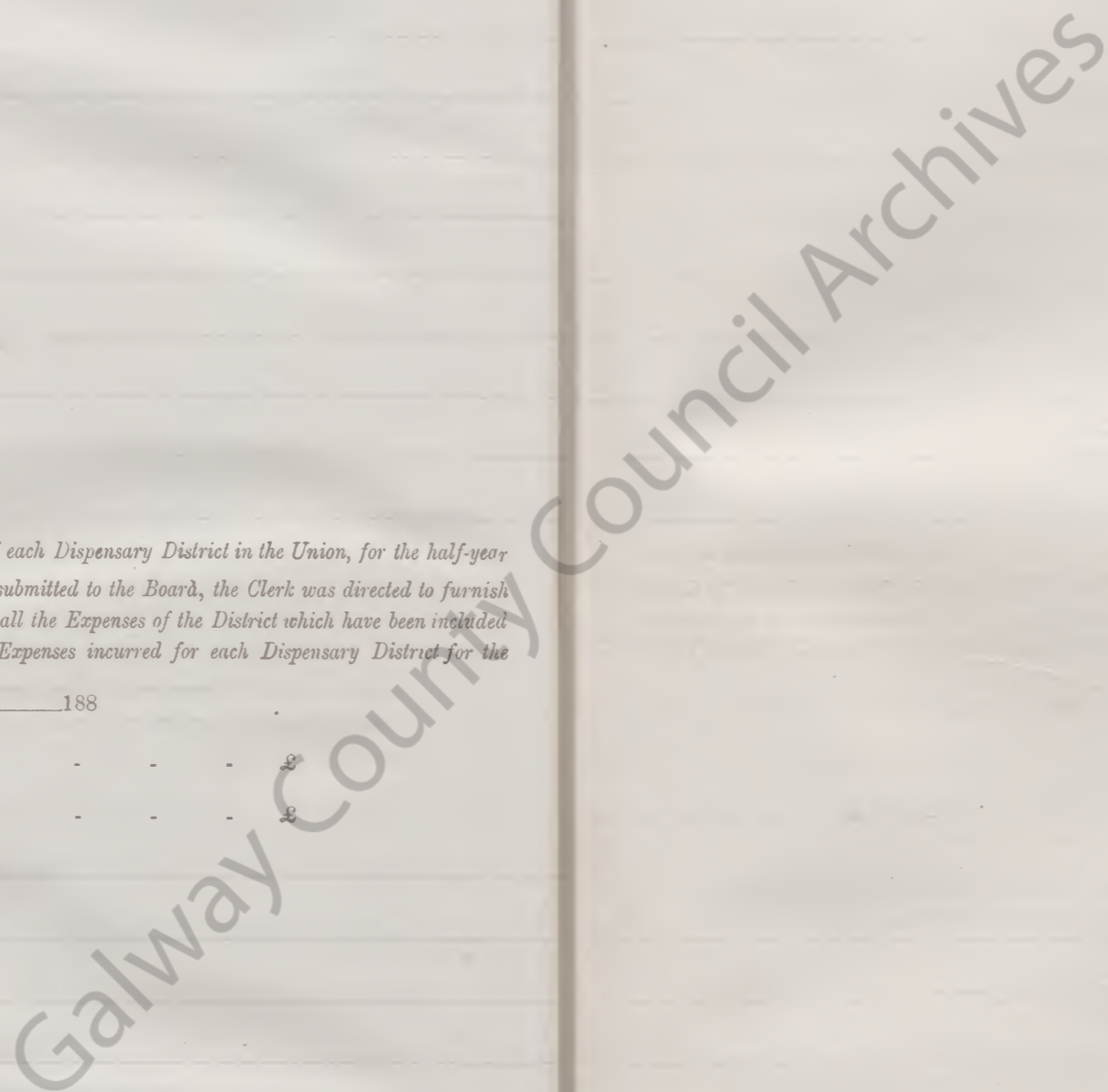

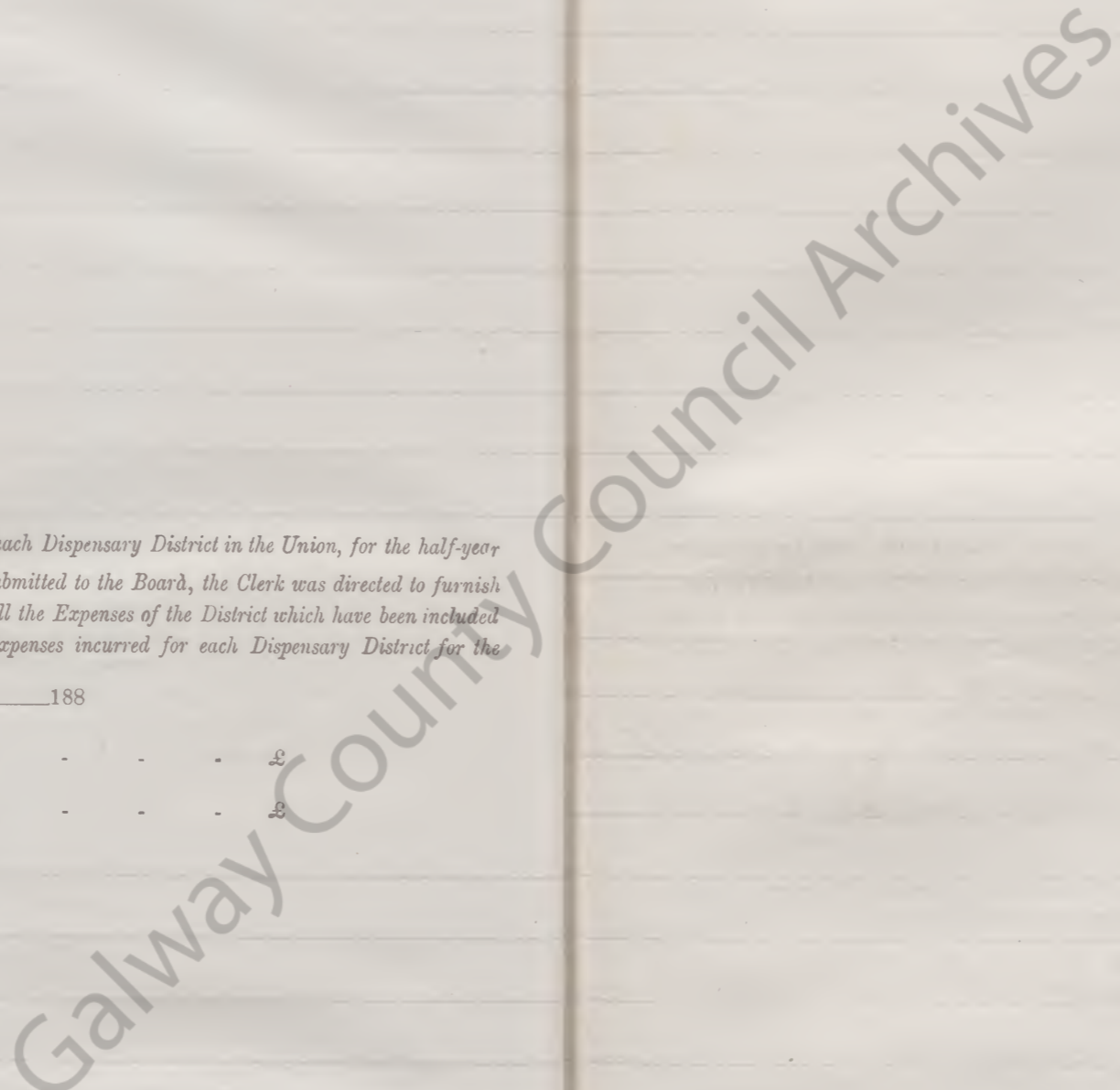

BURIAL BOARD PROCEEDINGS.

The Cemetery Committee submitted a Report, in which they make recommendations as follow.

- 1 That there is a superfluous width in the main avenues - viz. 18 feet - that a width of 10 to 12 feet would be sufficient, and thus add to Burial Ground space.
- 2 That all the walks be harrowed with a strong iron harrow. That all loose stones be removed from sides to the centre. That after all the weeds have been removed, a good coating of gravel be spread over the walks, and a roller be provided to keep them in proper order.
- 3 That a man be permanently employed to keep the grounds, graves, and walks in order. A hand labourer or gardener's assistant would be most suitable. The duties of such a person be distinct from those of the Superintendent, as any attempt to combine both in one individual would not, alone be futile, but must operate injuriously to the well being of the Establishment.
- 4 That Mr. Darcy be paid a sum of Ten Pounds for the expenses he has incurred in trying to keep the walks in order.
