In the replies to queries relating to the appointment of Mr Dillon his age is entered as 22 years, and requesting to be furnished with an explanation on the subject,

On the motion of Mr. A. Lynch, seconded by Mr. Kean, it was
"Resolved— That the Local Government Board be respectfully requested to sanction the appointment of John Dillon as Poor Rate Collector for Kilmummin Electoral Division. It was simply through inadvertance and without reference to the Register of Births that he gave his age as 22 years. The Guardians feel assured that he is fully competent to discharge the duties of Rate Collector, a position which his father filled for 25 years with the utmost satisfaction to the Guardians."

Relieving Officer, Connor submitted explanation of the charges preferred against him at last meeting of the Board by Dr. Brodie, Medical Officer of his District, as follows—

That when McCabe applied to him for out-relief, he exercised the power vested in him and offered instead, admission to Workhouse. Subsequently when the Board made an order for relief in this case of 2/- per week for a month, he gave McCabe 4/-, two weeks allowance, and 2/- the third week's allowance he gave to the daughter of McCabe.

That McCabe again applied to him on the day of his (McCabe's) wife's death, and was informed that a coffin only could be supplied, with this he was satisfied. Accordingly an order for a coffin was sent to the

Mr Kelly's letter, & certiff. returned to L.G.B. with mins.

the person who usually supplies Coffins for the district. Two or three days after, believing the Coffin had been supplied, he drew out a receipt for 7/- the price of a Coffin, and considered it no attempt at fraud to do so as the Carpenter cannot read and write. That in so doing he had no other motive than that of expediting the payment. Shortly after on proceeding to Spiddab he found a coffin had been supplied out of the proceeds of a collection made in the parish, as the friends of the deceased had an objection to her being interred in a pauper's coffin. This prevented him carrying out his arrangement for the supply of the Coffin, and the fact that the price of the Coffin since remained in his hands arose ^{out-} of neglect.

The Relieving Officer concluded by tendering his resignation of the office, respectfully thanking the Board for the many favours received from them during a service of many years.

Resignation accepted.

Ordered The issue of advertisement for a Relieving Officer and Sanitary Sub-Officers for Spiddab District, at a salary of £32 per annum for the former, and £8 per annum for the latter office.

The person appointed to reside in a central part of the district, not nearer to Galway than the village of Spiddab.
Appointment to be made at meeting on the 23rd instant.

On the motion of Mr. Davis, seconded by Mr. McDonough it was Resolved - That Francis Connor who has had previous experience of the duties of the office, be appointed temporarily to act till the appointment of Relieving Officer is made. Remuneration same as late Relieving Officer was in receipt of - viz at rate of £50 per annum.

7/- the price of the Coffin referred to in the late Relieving Officer's explanation was handed to the Clerk to be lodged with Union Treasurer. and the balance of cash on hands for out relief purposes, amount 27^{rs} 8^d was handed to the temporary Relieving Officer.

Ordered - clothes to amount of 5/- be provided for the child of Mary Carr on discharge from Workhouse.

Ordered clothes to amount of 10/- be provided for the child of Ellen Connor on discharge from Workhouse.

Resolved That the Paymaster of Pensioners be asked for explanation why the amount claimed for maintenance of Army Pensioner Mr. Reedy in Workhouse Hospital - for past Quarter was not paid in full.

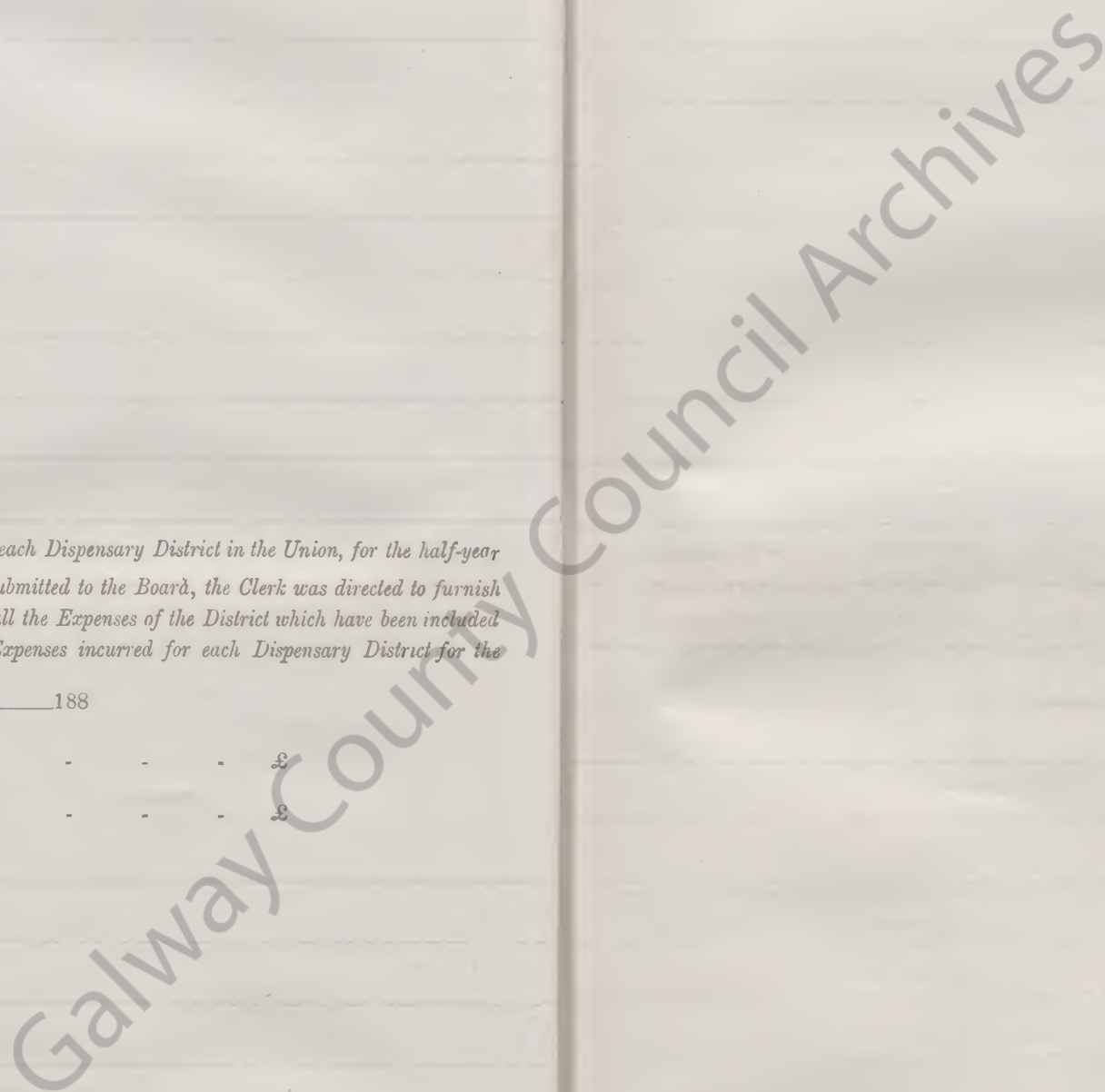

1 That as an Amendment of the Poor Law is coming before Parliament, that the Government be called upon to extend the payment of Poor Rates on the principle of the Income Tax, to all those who are in receipt of Incomes, whether from lands or other sources, so as to equalise the burden of Rates on all those who are in possession of means, and not be an oppression on any particular class. It is estimated that about 12 millions of the property of Ireland pay the entire Poor Rates, while 8 millions are exempt.

That the rents so exacted are, for the most part, spent out of Ireland, and are thus lost to every Irish trade and business. That we therefore resolve to direct the attention of the Legislature to the pressing necessity of amending the Land Act of 1881, in the session of Parliament now about to be opened, by bringing within the scope of that Act every holding in Ireland, whether held by lease or otherwise, and by giving definite legislative instructions to the rent investigators of the future to exempt all tenant property, no matter at what time created, from rent. That this just rent relief will leave so much money in the hands of the working classes of Ireland, that trade and business will be stimulated, pauperism lessened, and the earning capacity of the Ratepayers increased to meet the inevitable burden of local taxation. That we also believe that neither mental nor manual labour in Ireland is overpaid, where the work is efficiently done; that we therefore postpone the consideration of the reduction of the salaries of our Officers, until we reduce our pauperism, then we shall be in a position to consider, not the reduction of salaries, but the reduction of our staff."

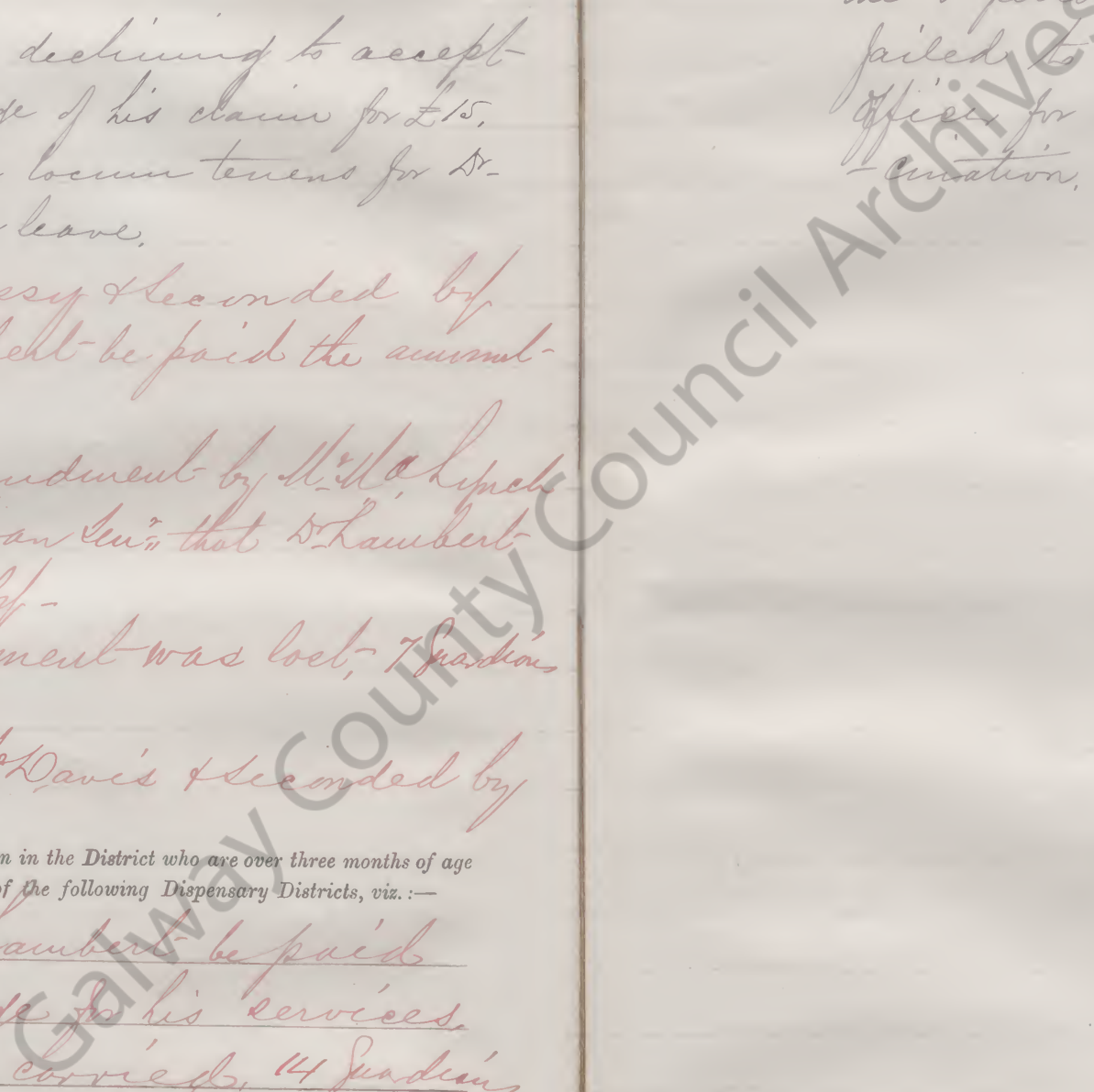
