The Out-door Relief Register was produced, examined, and authenticated from No. 4329 to No. 4334, both inclusive, by the signature of the Chairman, and countersignature of the Clerk.

The Clerk's Report on the execution of the Orders previously made by the Board was read to the following effect:—

The clerk reported that Rate Collector Lambert had not submitted his Books for examination since the 22nd ultimo; and that having failed to attend when called upon to assist in the preparation of the Parliamentary Voters Lists for ensuing year, he (the Clerk) reported the negligence of the collector to the Local Government Board, who are now in communication with the collector relative thereto.

The collector was called upon to attend on the clerk early on the morning of the 2nd inst. but failed to attend till 12.50 p.m. on the 4th instant, and that in consequence it will be impossible to complete the lists in due time. 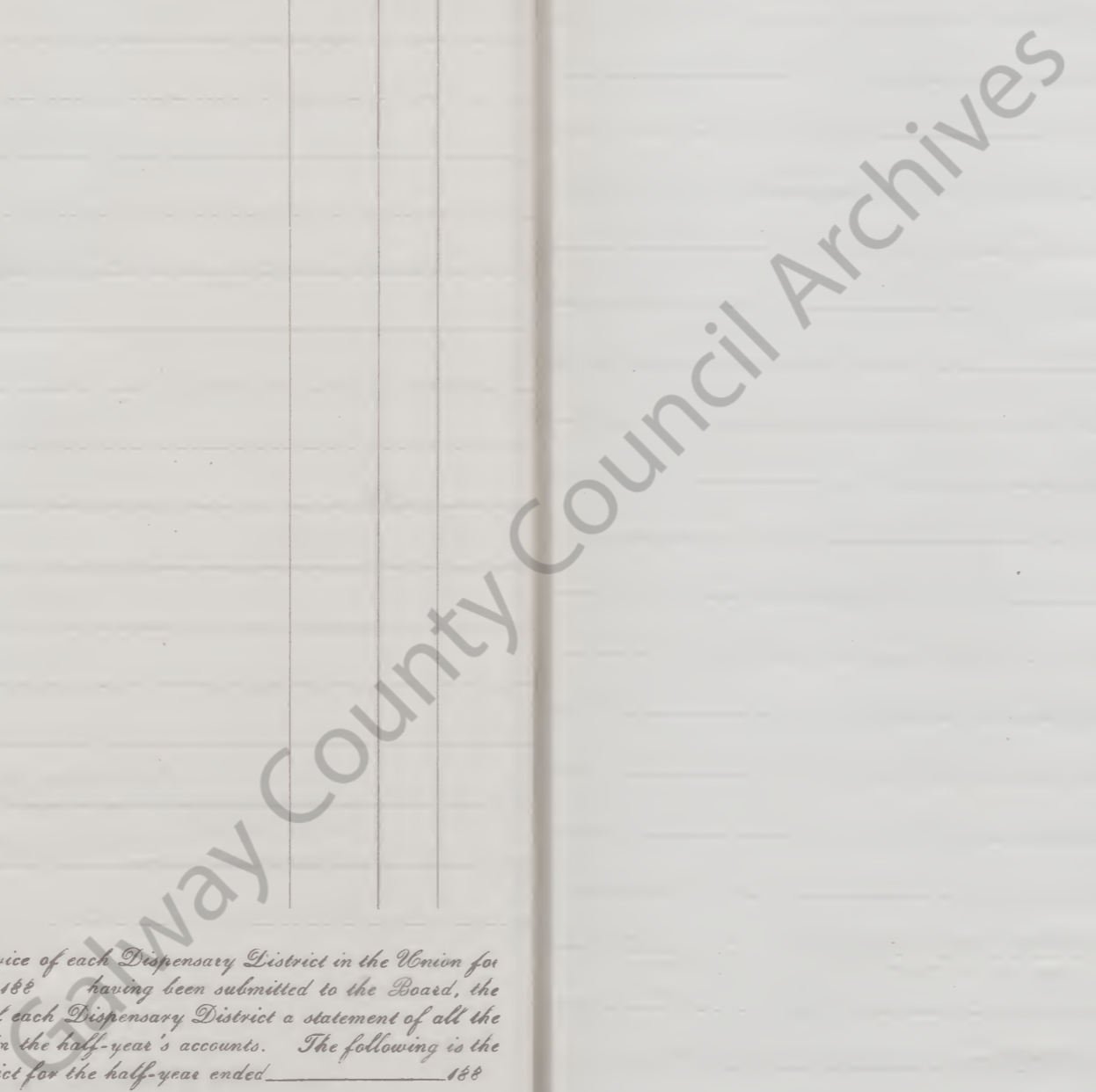

Evidence in favour of, or against the measure should be taken at one place in the presence of the representatives of all the Unions concerned, and Doughterard being a central place, will be most convenient for the purpose.

The Inspectors will probably visit each Union named, to collect statistics bearing on the question at issue, and they will be glad to look into any point connected with such statistics to which members of the Board of Guardians may wish to direct their attention.
