Report of Visiting Committee.

The Galway Dispensary Building.

The entire upper portion of this Building to be allocated for the exclusive use of married women as a lying-in Ward. By taking off a small space from the Surgery and breaking a doorway in the rear wall, a passage to the staircase can be obtained, the present entrance to the stairs closed up, thus providing a separate entrance to this Ward.

The apartments formerly allotted to the Apothecary consisting of a Bed Room, Sitting Room, Kitchen, and a small room over the Kitchen, to be converted into a lying-in Ward for women of No. 2 Class. The door leading into the Consulting Room to be closed up. An entrance to this Ward is already provided at the end of the Building.

The existing entrance from the main road to this Building to be closed up. The gate and the piers to be removed and placed in the wall which separates the Workhouse from the Dispensary grounds, a few yards inside the outer wall, thus ensuring all communication with the Dispensary and lying-in Wards in that Building to be through the Workhouse Main Entrance Gate and under the immediate supervision of the Workhouse Master and Porter.

The Black shed.

This ^{wooden} shed requires a brick lining to the frame work on the inside.

The dividing partition to be removed to the centre thus giving an increased space to the portion occupied by the women which is at present needed.

The doors to be shifted from their present positions, the one at the end of the shed near the privy to be placed towards the centre, and the one at the other end of the shed to be placed in the front angle.

The Windows in front to be raised into the roof like dormer windows.

Two new windows to be opened in the stone wall against which the shed is built: one for each division, for the purpose of thorough ventilation.

The Lumber Room adjoining the Separation Ward to be converted into a haying-in Ward for Class No 3. The window to be enlarged.

A concrete channel to be made from the privy to the main surface sewer in the yard, and the paving at the privy to be re-set.

A new privy in connection with the Infirmary Womens' Day Room to be provided.

Chapel Gate, and furnish to the Parish Priest
monthly lists of persons relieved in his
District. Stating that he posted up the half
yearly lists without fail, the last being posted
up in October last, and a copy was furnished
to the Parish Priest. With respect to the
monthly list - he considered it was to be fur-
nished every two months, and in support of
this statement forwarded a copy of a Resol-
ution of the Guardians to that effect passed
on 14th March, 1884. That he furnished a
list for two months to the Parish Priest on
the 2nd instant.

The explanation was marked "considered
satisfactory." The Relieving officer's
attention to be drawn to the direction
given him personally at meeting of the
Guardians on the 20th June 1884, that lists
should be posted up, and copies fur-
nished to Parish Priest monthly."

9th Jan'y '86. Orders of removal by Justices of the Peace,
of John Lyons and Patrick Lynch from the
Parish of Liverpool to Galway Workhouse,
Copies to Heads of Inquiry and copy of the
Removal

Removal Warrant in the case of Patrick Lynch who entered the Workhouse on 13th instant, accompanying minutes. John Lyons did not come into Workhouse

12th Jan 1886. From Dr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, stating that it would be a great charity if the lunatic McWhinney an inmate of the Workhouse could be sent to his home in Belfast, and that an offer of 10/- towards defraying his expenses had been made by Col. C. O'Hara.

Order - The Clerk to write to the man's brother on the subject.

In pursuance of notice given at last meeting Mr. H. A. Lynch moved -

"That the Board take into consideration the question of the Sureties of Mr. Lambert, Rate Collector."

Mr. Lynch stated that some ratepayers were not satisfied with the security offered by Mr. Lambert.

After a discussion of the subject, Mr. Lynch was proceeding to move a Resolution when the Chairman ruled "that he declined to receive a Resolution rescinding a former Resolution accepting of the Sureties without a notice of motion."

The following notice was handed in -
"Take notice that I shall move on this day

day week that the Sureties offered by Rate Collector Lambert are not satisfactory, and that in the meantime his Bond be not perfected."
(Signed) "H. A. Lynch."

"13th Jan 1886."

A crowd of labourers numbering it was stated 200, came before the Board and demanded relief, stating that they ^{with their families} were in a state of utter destitution, being without employment, the majority of them, since October last.

Having been informed that being able bodied they can be relieved in Workhouse only, they elected to enter the Workhouse.

The Workhouse Master stated that at present only about 30 persons in addition to the inmates already in the Workhouse, can be accommodated, but after a few days' preparation a large number can be accommodated.

It was moved by Mr. H. A. Lynch, and seconded by Mr. H. Kean.

"That a telegram be sent to Local Government Board enquiring whether the Guardians may order relief to persons for whom there is at present no indoor accommodation; & telegram was accordingly sent."

The applicants were informed that the most necessitous cases amongst them may come into the Workhouse at once, up to the number that can be accommodated.
