Gentlemen,

In reply to your communication of the 30th ultimo, we beg to say that the number of deaths amongst the children in the "Black Shed" since December last is four. With reference to the sanitary condition of the Shed we must repeat that it is a most unhealthy structure, and were it not that classification requires its being left open, we should long since have considered it our duty to urge its being closed up. Children who are admitted there apparently strong and healthy, soon show signs of the effects of the vitiated atmosphere of the Shed on their health. At this moment there are puny children in this place who were strong and healthy on admission. Except when the windows and doors are open the smell is almost unbearable, and in ~~hot~~^{moor} weather the foul water from the neighbouring closet can be seen soaking under the boards of the Shed which are quite rotten."

Reid for payment to him of two fees of £2 each, for examining two lunatics, and with reference to Guardians' resolution thereon, pointing out that the Guardians are obliged to pay the amount certified for by two Justices, under restrictions named in 14th Sec. of Act 38 & 39 Vic Cap. 67.

Resolved. That we desire to be informed by the Local Government Board whether it be optional with the Justices to decline to make an order upon the Guardians for remuneration to the Medical Officer, in cases where the lunatic is possessed of means to pay the Medical Officer's fee.

These Reports are to be made up and forwarded by the Medical Officers to the Board of Guardians quarterly, viz., on the 31st March, the 30th June, the 30th September, and the 31st December.]

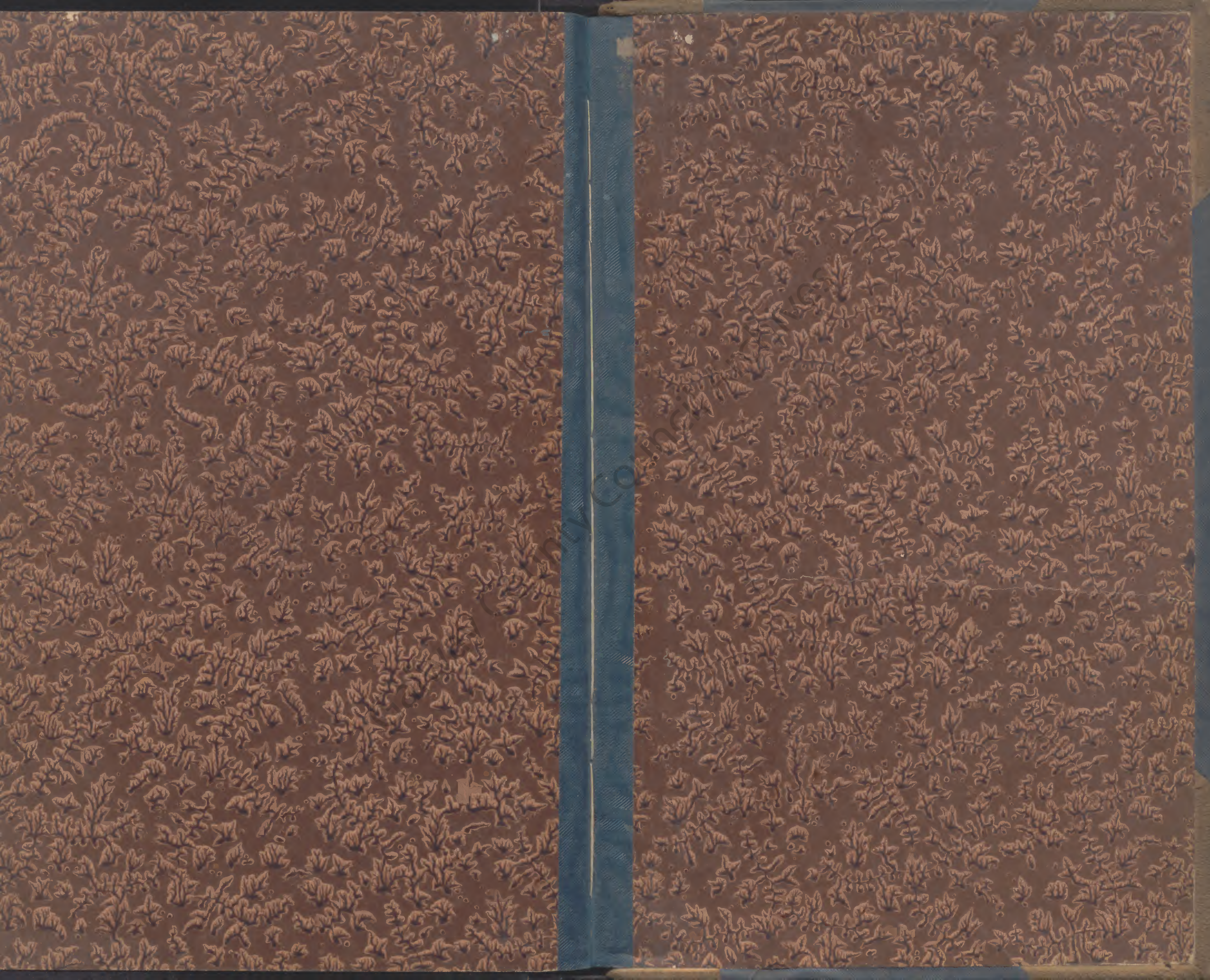
