Messrs J. Davis & J. J. Kirwan reported having arranged with a carpenter for the construction of the Screen at the Workhouse Chapel entrance the repairs of Window frames, &c.

The Board approved of the arrangement made by the Committee.

Masters Report in the offense and Punishment Book
That on the ^{night of the} 6th instant, six ducks the property of the Nurse acting as Officers in the Workhouse were stolen from their private yards. The Police on being informed of the theft came to the Workhouse and from inquiries made discovered the thieves to be Pat Connor, Pat Hanly, Martin Cubbard, and Pat Connolly, four inmates of the Workhouse. The first named is an old offender having been in prison frequently, and the other three are boys of about 17 years each.

The robbery was committed at the instigation of Connor, and a ladder, kept in the yard for use in case of a fire breaking out, was used to scale the walls. Connor and one of the others brought the ducks to Connor's wife who lives at Prospect Hill, and sold them to her for 5/-.

The Magistrates have committed Connor for trial at next Quarter Sessions, and the three others are bound over to appear as proven witnesses against him.

Resolved, That the Workhouse Master be directed to keep the ladders in the Workhouse carefully locked up in future.

That a Roll Call of the inmates of the Workhouse be made at 11 am, on the 19th instant, and that each member of the Board be requested to attend as it is intended to discharge any inmates not considered in need of indoor relief.

Dr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer, came before the Board to complain of the condition of the Fever Hospital, being in sad need of repairs, and more serious still, in need of trained nurses, the only trained nurse at present there, being temporarily laid up, the untrained Workhouse inmates sent to act as nurses proving almost useless.

Dr. Colahan suggested the necessity of authorising him and his colleague, Dr. J. Grealy, to procure the services of a trained nurse forthwith, there being at present eleven patients in the Hospital, and in the meantime the Board to advertise for trained nurses.

Rev. Canon Sullivan also came before the Board to complain of the serious want of proper nurses at the Fever Hospital.

On the motion of Major Whynes, seconded by Mr. J. J. Kirwan it was

Resolved - (1) That the Workhouse Medical Officers be authorised to procure the temporary services of a trained nurse for the Fever Hospital at once.

(2) That we advertise for two trained nurses for the Fever Hospital, at a salary of £10 each a year, together with rations. Applications to be considered at meeting on 26th instant.

(3) That Messrs J. J. Kirwan and P. Kearns be appointed a Committee to arrange for the execution of the necessary repairs at the Fever Hospital.

The relief afforded under the Act 49 Vic. cap. 17 was not authorized on the face of the Application Books of the Relieving Officers in the form legally necessary for the purpose; but a certificate is appended to each of those Books, and signed by the Guardians of the Divisions concerned, testifying to the general accuracy of the record:

In the case of the Galway Division however the relief was afforded in some cases without the recipients of it being subjected to any labour test; but in those instances it was explained to me that the application of the test was not practicable at the time, and there certainly seems no reason to doubt the extreme destitution of the applicants so relieved.

Having regard to the exceptional character of the relief afforded under the above Act, and the apparent urgency for its administration at the time, I am not disposed to question the legality of the expenditure under the circumstances, especially as no misapplication of the funds so far as I could observe, appears to exist in the distribution of the relief.

The total amount of relief given was £12.5.8, which exceeds by £8.10.5.8 the grant given to the Union under the authority of the Relief Act.

The Books of the Relieving Officers relating

to this relief were, on the whole, fairly well kept; and I feel bound to add that the duties of the clerk in connection with the administration of the Act, and the supervision and examination of the accounts, were performed in a most efficient manner.

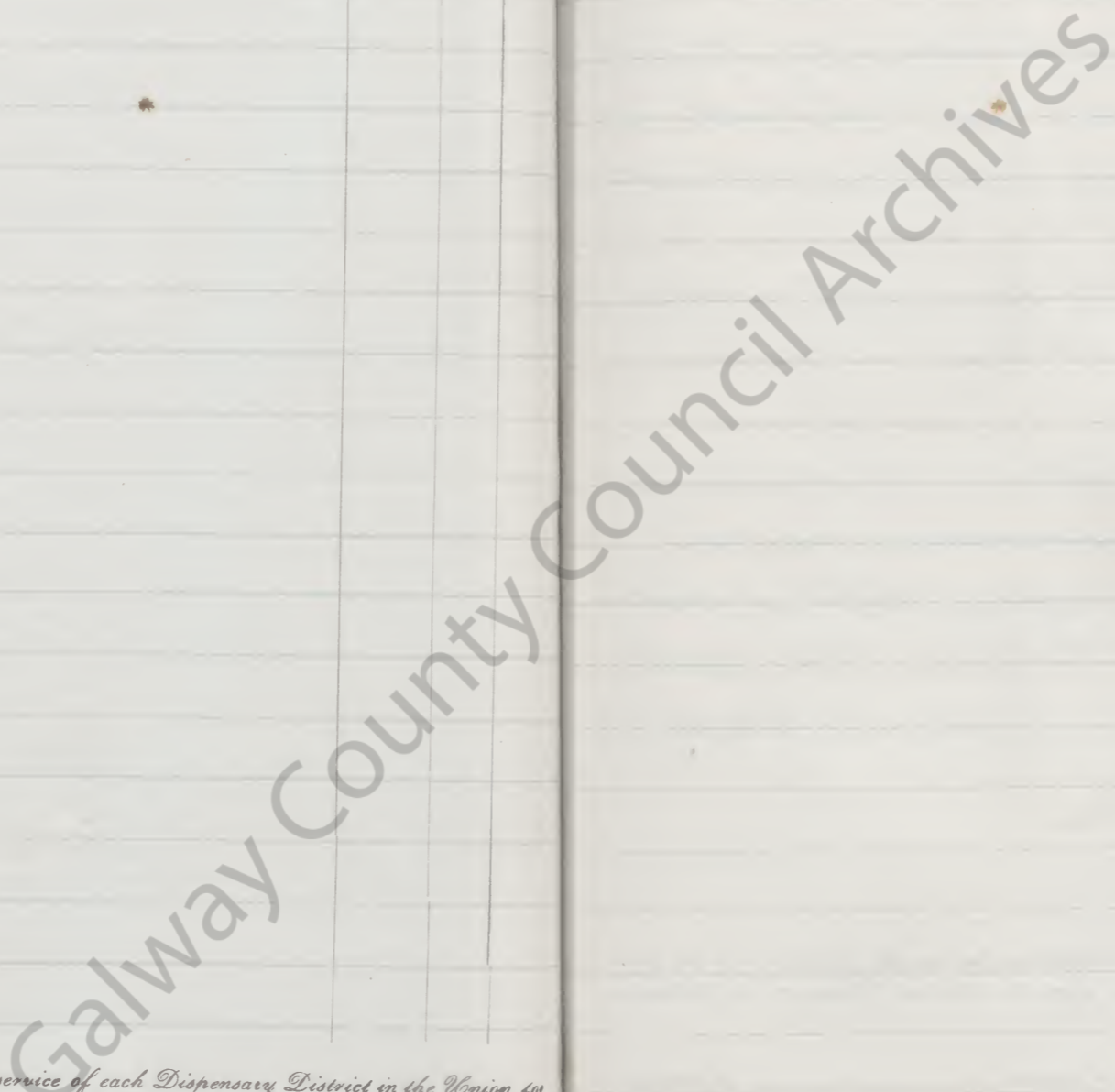

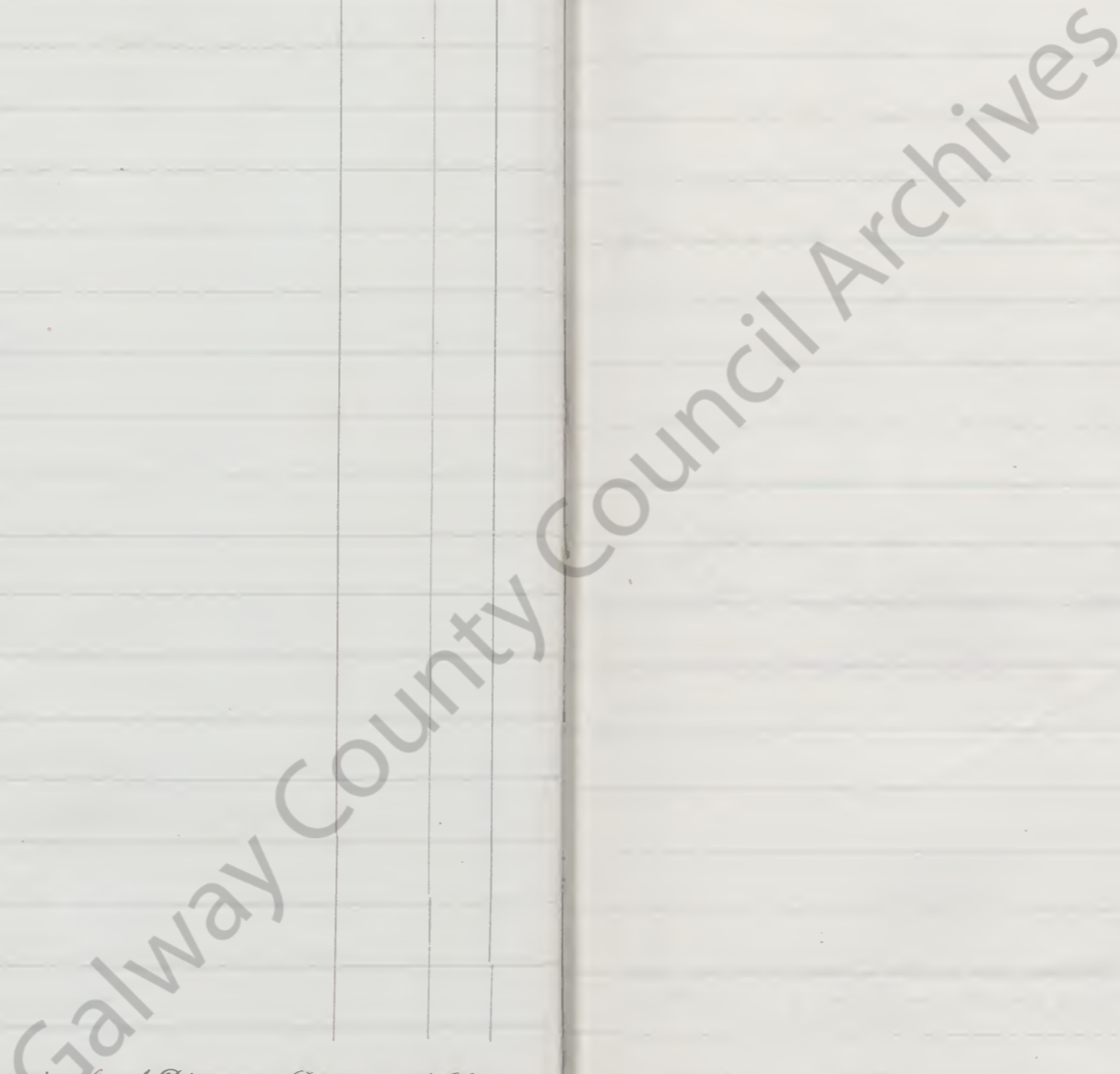

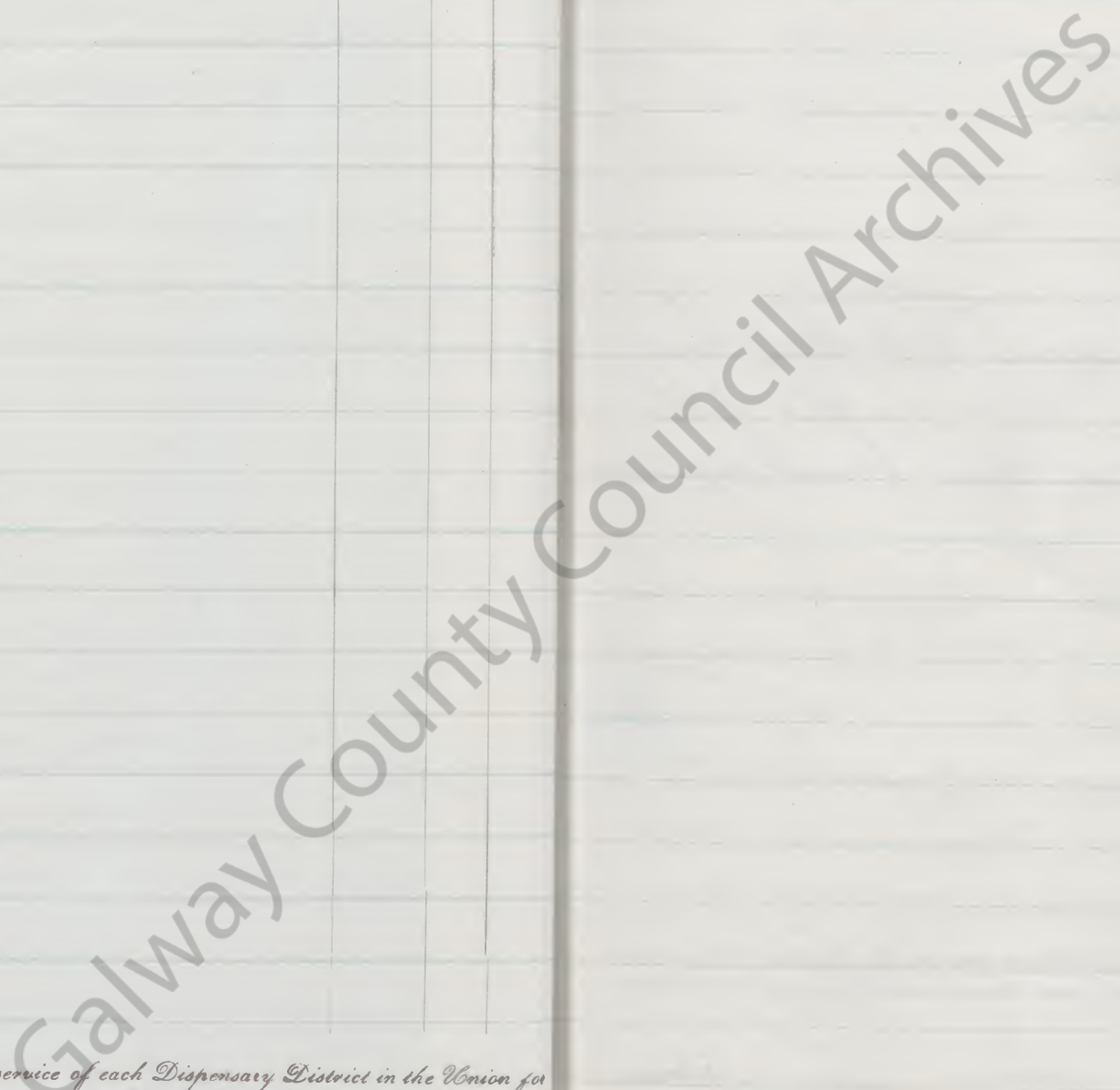
