The Reports of the Master and other Officers were read, and Orders made thereon as follows:—

The Master reported that the large ladder for ascending to the Workhouse roofs, had been broken in two by the Plumbers' men when they were raising it to the roof.

The Estimate of Petty Requirements for ensuing week was examined, and orders were issued on Contractors.

Four pairs of women's Boots supplied by the Contractor were compared with Contract sample, approved, and ordered into stock.

Dr. Colahan, Workhouse Medical Officer came before the Board and requested that the opening from the Closets at Fever Hospital to the river, at present choked up with refuse matter and weeds, be at once cleared, as in its present state it is most dangerous to public health.

Also that when the patient at present in this Hospital will be discharged, that the entire premises be completely overhauled & repaired.  
Order—That Mr. H. Sweeney, Builder, be asked to furnish a report on the requirements at Fever Hospital.



The following Orders of the Local Government Board for Ireland, was laid before the Board, and directions given thereon as follows:—

The following Letters from the Local Government Board for Ireland and others, were read by the Clerk, and directions given in answer them respectively, to the following effect (or Orders made on them respectively as follows):—

No. 13658/87  
9<sup>th</sup> April Informing the Guardians that they have received the half yearly report of their Inspector Mr. P. Bourke on the Union, the Workhouse of which he inspected on the 21<sup>st</sup> ultimo, and forwarding extracts as follows, viz.,

- 1 That the financial condition of the Union is fairly satisfactory, and that there is a considerable improvement in the general cleanliness of the Workhouse.
- 2 That the Sisters of Mercy in the Hospital complain of the want of assistant nurses, and the Board think that the Guardians should consider the propriety of giving them the services of one or two Wardswomen.
- 3 That the roof and windows of the Workhouse Buildings

Buildings require to be repaired, and the Dispensary to be painted, and attention is also drawn to the condition of the chimney of the Infirmary laundry and of the water supply to these premises.

- 4 That a few chairs should be provided for the use of convalescents in the Infirmary ward.
- 5 That the following improvements be carried out in the girls' school:—(a) the construction of a small raised gallery for the very young children and of two desks and seats lowered in height—(b) the provision of a single plank shelf round the lavatory and of some hat-hooks.
- 6 That the Fever Hospital will be repaired when the patients at present located there shall have been discharged.
- 7 That none of the boys receive any industrial training, and as a tailor and shoemaker are constantly employed in the Workhouse it would be advisable for the Guardians to make an order that some of the boys should obtain instruction in these trades.
- 8 That the boys' school is not in at all a satisfactory condition, that the boys look neglected and want clothes, that the Schoolroom is untidy and that the Schoolmaster does not appear to realize the importance of the duties which he has to perform and is frequently absent from the Workhouse as shown by the Porter's Book.

The Local Government Board desire to point out the complaints previously recorded against this officer since his appointment in



1879. and under the circumstances they must now request the Guardians to call upon Mr. Sherrin for his immediate resignation as they are not prepared to allow him to retain the office of Schoolmaster any longer.

The Schoolmaster was called before the Board and the portion of the report which referred to him having been read, he stated that he would be prepared to tender his resignation at next meeting of the Board.

The Workhouse Master reported that since the date of inspection the roofs of the Workhouse Buildings have been repaired.

Resolved - That the consideration of the remaining portion of the report be postponed for a week.

13<sup>th</sup> April '87. An application from Mr. W. Lambert, Rate collector for Galway District, for remuneration for his services under the franchise Act. Consideration postponed.

Ordered. Clothes to amount of £1.5.0 be provided for Mary Hauly and her two children on discharge from the Workhouse. James Ashe to get the clothes of his father, and Mary McDermott the clothes of her father, both of whom died in Workhouse Hospital recently.

On the motion of Mr. M. Sullivan (Cm) seconded by Mr. M. A. Lynch, it was  
 "Resolved that we the Guardians of Galway Union emphatically protest against and denounce the conduct of the present Party Government in attempting to impose upon Ireland in its present marvellously peaceable condition so odious, infamous, and oppressive a measure of coercion as that embodied in Palfour's Bill, especially in opposition to the constitutionally expressed wishes of the Irish people through their elected representatives; and that we appeal to the democracy of England for the sake of their much boasted national pride and the genius of their statesmen to stand between Ireland and the dismal future which is in store for both countries if this Bill becomes Law, and to forward instead the message of peace contained in Mr. Gladstone's Bill for a Statutory Parliament in Dublin, which is the best policy to restore peace, contentment and prosperity to this long suffering Ireland." That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Lord Salisbury and Mr. Gladstone."

On the motion of Mr. P. Kearns, seconded by Mr. Tho<sup>s</sup>. Ashe, it was  
 Resolved. That we the Board of Guardians of Galway Union condemn in the strongest manner possible the unjust imprisonment of the Rev. Fathers Keller and Ryan as an unjust attempt to make Priests divulge the confidence of their flocks in the interest of the



Lauds, and that we condemn the action of Judge Boyd in acting at the instigation of the Lord Government in trying to force the Tenants to pay unjust and impossible rack-rents. That copies of this resolution be forwarded to Father's Keller and Refau to Kilmainham Prison."

Relieving Officer Coleman, Galway District, submitted a return giving the names of persons indebted to the Union for relief afforded in Workhouse Hospitals by way of loan. Order - The several persons to be proceeded against forthwith.

13<sup>th</sup> April 87. An application from the Nurse in Lying in Hospital for an increase in salary being at present paid only £5 a year. Also requesting to be supplied with necessaries and requisites for use in Hospital, as per list furnished. The application for increase in salary was marked "Refused," and the list of requisites was referred to the Workhouse Master for his report.

Gentlemen,

In reply to my communication of the 28<sup>th</sup> ultimo, relative to the neglected and over-crowded state of the Rahon Cemetery, you very kindly and considerably appointed a Committee of the Guardians, to confer with me in reference to the suggestions I advanced in my letter, and to endeavor to arrive at a practical understanding of what might be the best measures to adopt under the existing circumstances.

I had the pleasure of meeting your Committee on the subsequent Friday, when the following Gentlemen attended: Marcus Lynch Esq. D. L. Vice Chairman, Daniel Curran Cornelius O'Connor, James Laine, Patrick Kearns & Patrick O'Sullivan Esqs.

It was proposed and agreed, that I should prepare a report of any decisions the Committee would arrive at on that occasion and submit <sup>them</sup> for the consideration of the Board at the earliest date - This I have much pleasure in doing to-day.

After a minute and most diligent examination of the present Rahon Cemetery, your Committee are unanimously of opinion, that in consideration of its over-crowded condition, it is no longer a suitable place for the decent interment of the dead.

They are also strongly of opinion, that in consideration of the very large population who use the present Cemetery for Burial purposes; in the necessary event, of its being immediately scheduled, as unsuitable for interments, a plot of ground should be provided by the Guardians in its immediate vicinity; to serve the purposes of a graveyard.

In order to give practical effect to these

resolution in this matter, and, for the purpose of enabling the Board to come to a precise and definite understanding in reference to it. Your Committee selected a field which, for very many considerations, they believe would be the most desirable site that the Guardians could provide.

The Field alluded to is in close proximity to the old Cemetery, and, would therefore, be the most central position, for the large population who may require it. It also contains a much greater depth of soil, than any other plot of ground in the neighbourhood for a very extensive area.

This Field has recently become the property of Mrs. Eglmore Mullingar. Your Committee suggested, that I should communicate immediately with Mrs. Eglmore & ascertain her views in reference to the disposal of it. This I have done & from the last letter I received, she seems inclined to believe, it would not be to her advantage, to let the Guardians have the land. This, I would respectfully suggest is a matter entirely for the consideration of the Board, as to what should be done under the circumstances.

The unanimous opinion of your Committee, appointed to examine the matter, as I have already stated, and in their decision I entirely concur, is, that no more desirable site could be selected for a Burial Ground and that the Guardians should endeavour if possible to secure it for that purpose.

Forwarding a communication which the Board have received, signed by certain ratepayers of the Ballintemple Electoral Division, protesting against its inclusion in the area of charge for the expenses incurred in connection with the new cemetery at Rahoon. Requesting to be furnished with the Guardians' observations on the subject.

(The communication referred to, is returned with Minutes.)

It was proposed by Mr. Redington, and seconded by Mr. W. P. Hennessy, and Resolved - That after full discussion on the subject - the area of chargeability was fixed and defined upon what was considered the most equitable principle, the area being the same as that for the new cemetery at Galway with Turbrough Electoral Division added; and this principle was adopted because the Electoral Division of Barna and a large district of the Electoral Division of Galway have been included in the area of chargeability for the new cemetery at Galway, and these districts are to be accommodated by the projected new cemetery at Rahoon,

Messrs R. H. French, P. Dooley and P. Hamon, dissented from the terms of the Resolution and protested against the inclusion of the Electoral Divisions of Ballintemple and Carrabrowne, in the area of charge.

On a division the Resolution was carried, 18 Guardians voting for it - and 6 Guardians declining to vote.
